# **On-Call Firefighters Wanted**

Cumbria County Council's Fire and Rescue Service is launching a new recruitment drive to find additional on-call firefighters to serve their communities.

On-call firefighters are needed to join crews at 27 fire stations across the county. The fire and rescue service is recruiting more than 50 on-call firefighters in total. Firefighters are needed at: Aspatria, Bootle, Cockermouth, Keswick, Maryport, Seascale, Silloth, Workington.

Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service is looking for men and women from all walks of life and all ages who can work as part of a team and are prepared to commit to the role. Qualifications aren't necessary, applicants must be at least 18 when their contract starts and physically and medically fit.

On-call or retained firefighters are 'on call' to



rates and workloads vary across the stations.

To apply people will need to complete an application form, carry out nationally recognised fitness and practical tests, have an interview and a medical check.

A series of taster sessions, providing an opportunity for people to chat to fire crews, find out more about the role of an on-call firefighter and have a go at some of the tests, are being held at the dates and locations below:

• Tuesday 4th April – Penrith Community Fire Station

• Tuesday 11th April – Workington Fire Station

All sessions start at 6:30pm and anyone interested is advised to arrive promptly to get the most out of the session. Potential applicants can find more information about the recruitment process at cumbria.gov.uk/ oncallfirefighters

Cumbria's Chief Fire Officer Paul Hancock said: "On-call firefighters play a crucial role in our communities and are called upon to attend the full range of incidents, from fires and floods, to road traffic collisions and chemical spills. I would urge people living and working in the areas where we're recruiting to consider applying to become part of the Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service team."

### Allerdale Eco Projects Benefit from Wind Farm Fund

Seven community organisations in Allerdale have been awarded a share of £68,000 from a fund that supports eco projects.

The funding comes from the Robin Rigg West Cumbria Fund, and supports a range of community groups helping to improve the local environment and also increase understanding of environmental issues.

The fund was set up by energy company E.ON to benefit communities close to the Robin Rigg offshore wind farm and is administered by Cumbria Community Foundation. More than £400,000 has been given out in grants since 2009.

Tim Morgan, E.ON Plant Manager, said: "The fund from E.ON provides assistance to voluntary or community groups in the area who are looking to use energy more sustainable or improve the environment. Our funding helps to provide a lasting benefit to the area."

Annalee Holliday, Grants & Donor Services Officer at Cumbria Community Foundation, said: "The fund is of real value to the local community, supporting voluntary groups and charities and enabling residents to continue to build on their vibrant and thriving communities."

Successful groups can expect to receive £1,000 – £15,000 funding.

continue to offer schemes like this to ensure people are getting the best possible value out there. We recognise that this is a time when household costs are rising and we will strive to do what we can to help our residents to cut their fuel bills and reduce the fuel poverty risk for the people of Allerdale."

Allerdale Borough Council is running the scheme year-round to reach all residents whose contracts are up for renewal at different times throughout the year, so everyone can benefit from the savings that may be on offer.

Allerdale Borough Council is running the switching initiative as part of the Big Community Switch, a scheme involving a number of local authorities throughout Great Britain. The Big Community Switch is operated by i-Choosr, an independent company with experience in collective switching schemes. It works by setting up a reverse auction and inviting energy suppliers to offer their cheapest dual fuel and electricity only deals.

# Holme Cultram Abbey Restoration

Report by: Will Tillotson Work is about to begin

on the final phase of restoring Holme Cultram Abbey.

The twelfth century building was wrecked by an arson attack in 2006 and didn't reopen until September 2015.

The interior of the church and the roof have already seen considerable work done.

Now the entrance is going to get some much needed attention. The limestone floor that covers the body of the church is being extended into the porch which, at present, is a simple concrete screed which was laid after the fire.

In addition to that the ceiling that separates the porch from the rest of the tower is being removed to reveal the roof space.

Chris Spencer is the Project Manager for the Heritage Lottery funded Solway Wetlands Landscape Partnership, which has been working with the Carlisle Diocese and the local community to make improvements to Holme Cultram. He said visitors will see a real difference: "Taking out the ceiling will allow two big windows in the upper part of the tower to let more light into the space. People will be able to see the new



oak timbers in the tower roof as well. It will make the porch a much more welcoming entrance to the church".

In another aspect of the project, the body of the tower is going to be lit to highlight architectural features and the balcony which runs across the back of the church is

going to be opened to the public.

It is having a new balustrade fitted and the spiral staircase leading to it is getting new lighting.

Chris said this final phase will add even more to visitors' experiences of the church. "Once the balcony is opened

up it will offer a wonderful view of the new roof as well as down to the new floor. Work should be finished by mid May and there will be access to the church while it is going on. Everyone involved is very excited that the church is finally going to get the entrance it deserves".

Mr Liverick (Harry) Mr Trotman, Miss Hazelwood, Miss Cooper, Miss Hoodless and of course Joe remembers Mr Donald Waugh, Mr Todhunter, Miss Wallace, Miss Storey and Mrs Hurst from 'the juniors'.

We had several hours of "can you remember" ie when the sun started to shine the very Friday we broke up for our Summer holiday and shone for the entire six weeks (did it really)! # Molasses Arrive at Silloth



#### ZAPADNYY, a familiar sight at Silloth Dock

Regular walkers along the road to the South Beach, or members of the Golf Club, may have spotted the green hull of molasses tanker ZAPADNYY moored on the far side of the dock from time to time. Her unpronounceable name is in common use for towns in southern Russia. She's a familiar sight in Silloth visiting every two months with a cargo of molasses for Caltech's dockside production unit. Here, molten molasses are pumped from the ship into storage tanks before being blended with vitamins and minerals to produce blocks of 'Crystalyx' animal feed supplement; a common sight in sheep and cattle pastures.

Molasses are obtained as a by-product of sugarcane or sugar beet refining. Produced in huge quantities in such diverse areas as Central America and India, they are traded as a worldwide commodity. ZAPADNYY picks up her cargoes in Europe, typically from tank farms in Germany and Lithuania in France and Holland. Other tankers of her class are capable of these deliveries but ZAPADNYY appears to be the ship of choice for Silloth, based on her ability to discharge cargo efficiently. Molasses are a difficult material to handle. Heaters in the ship's hold maintain a constant temperature consistent with a stable fluid; lower than this, molasses become too viscous to pump, any higher and caramelisation can occur, with disastrous consequences.

ZÂPADNYY was built in 1988 and later modified to work as a modern molasses tanker. She is Ukrainian owned and crewed and registered in Belize City. At over

14 metre in width she is relatively broad in relation to her length and is one of the widest vessels to navigate Silloth tidal dock entrance on a regular basis. This design together with

her weight and absence of bow thrusters makes her difficult to manoeuvre.

As recently as September 2016 she became grounded on a sandbank to the south of the dock entrance. No damage was suffered and she was safely refloated on the next tide and able to enter port. She is known to have ĥad a history of 'incidents'. Back in 2011 serious damage was sustained to the hull after colliding with a floating dock on the Weser River in Bremen. ZAPADNYY wasn't to blame however as she'd been forced off course by a passing vessel. Two months later after being repaired and fitted with new bow plates her first voyage was back to Silloth. The old

# **Dementia Action Alliance**

A new Dementia Action Alliance for Aspatria & District is moving closer with a launch date now agreed.

A recent study carried out by Dr Claire Kelly and Dr Richard Yarwood at Plymouth University into the experience of rural dementia identified four areas if concern including the farm environment which can have many physical hazards, a reluctance to ask for help, a lack of awareness of the support available and the considerable changes that are taking place in rural communities.

The study was supported by Ian Sherriff, Academic Partnership Lead for Dementia at the university and Chair of The Prime Ministers Rural Dementia Friendly Task and Finish Group funded by Seale Hayne Educational Trust and the Farming Community Network.

Dr Richard Yarwood, who was involved in the study indicated that types of support were often perceived as urban-focused and inappropriate for people

who have lived and worked outdoors all their lives and have been very independent. Pride, a tradition of selfreliance and a desire for privacy also often prevented people asking for help.

Aspatria & District Dementia Action Alliance will invite people from several organisations to share their experience, research and learning with the Aspatria and wider rural community at the launch day

Phill Roberts (Chair, Aspatria Dementia Action Alliance) said: "Dementia is having a devastating impact on our communities and there is now evidence that the impact on our rural communities will be greater

given that there are more elderly people living in rural areas. The launch of the Aspatria Dementia Action Alliance will ensure that we can develop a Dementia Friendly Community to meet the needs of those with a diagnosis and their carers who are often family and friends. I would urge people to become a Dementia Friend and for all businesses to consider becoming Dementia Friendly Businesses"
