Lifeboats' First Shout of the Year

Silloth Lifeboat was requested to launch at 01.10 by Belfast coastguard on the morning of 3rd January to assist other emergency services at Bowness on Solway due to the severe flooding.

Emergency services could not reach a property along the shoreline where it was believed some elderly residents were stranded. Silloth RNLI lifeboat was tasked to try and approach the property from the seaward side. The weather conditions were extremely dangerous and the lifeboat was operating in very shallow water. A depth of approximately 3ft with 10ft waves. The ebbing tide was at full flow by this time and the conditions began to compromise the safety of the lifeboat crew.

After discussion with Belfast coastguard the lifeboat was stood down and returned to station. Burgh coastguard team could not establish if anyone was in the property and it was decided that the Police would follow up later in the morning to check the property.

Crew and lifeboat got back safely to station. The elderly gentlemen it turned out were fine.

Be a Homestay Carer



Cumbria County Council has around 80 Homestays carers across Cumbria who support young people on their journey to independent living

The Homestays initiative, which launched in Cumbria in 2012, offers a home environment for young people, aged 16-25, who are in need of support for a variety of reasons; including leaving foster care or due to an adoption breakdown. To be considered for a Homestays placement, young people must be in education, training or employment. As most young people tend to stay in Homestays placements for up to three years there is an urgent need to recruit 30 more carers for the initiative during the next 12 months.

Retired foster carers, Eileen and Richard Binstead, who live near Workington, have been Homestays carers for four years. Eileen said: "We fostered for 16 years and then decided to have a break and go back as Homestays carers, which we felt would be more flexible for us. Since then we've had six young people come to live with us and have found it very rewarding helping older children coming into care to prepare for independent living. We've raised three sons of our own and I wouldn't have liked to see them embark on an independent life without some help, so I can see how essential this support can be for young people in care. I think our experience as parents and of fostering gave us a very good grounding to

take on Homestays caring and it's worked well for us."

The couple are currently Homestays carers for 19-year-old Angel, who's been living with them since she was 16. Eileen said: "It's been very gratifying to see how she's developed in her time with us. She suffered a lot of rejection in her life and it was very difficult at first trying to connect with her. But, with our support and reassurance, she has flourished and achieved so much; completing a college course and recently starting her first full-time job. She's an excellent example of what Homestays can help young people achieve."

Angel is also very positive about her Homestays experience. She said: "I was placed with Eileen and Richard when my adoption broke down and I have never looked back. I now see them as my family because they give me the support that I never received when I was adopted and they have encouraged me to take on new things.

Team Manager, Homestays & Fostering Supervision & Support, Margaret Brennand, said: "As one of our Homestays carers you have the opportunity to support a young person on their road to independence; helping them to learn new skills and reach their potential, while all the time being fully supported by our Homestays advisors. With a time commitment of seven to 10 hours each week, many people find this a more flexible alternative to fostering, as they can

continue to work full time, while still having the satisfaction of knowing they are helping a young person take their first steps to independent living in a safe, caring environment."

Interested in becoming a Homestays provider?

Ideally you are a person who understands and likes teenagers and has an insight into the unique pressures and needs of young people. If so then Homestays could be for you:

Providers go through a formal approval process where DBS checks are sought. The process takes between 5-8 months. You will be required to offer 7-10 hours of your time to supporting a young person in developing independent living skills such as budgeting, laundry and cooking.

You must have a spare room in your home, though where a Homestays carer is unable to accommodate a young person they may still be considered to offer support for a young person who is living independently, in their own accommodation.

Homestays carers are offered the opportunity to develop their skills through the Fostering Service training programme and to be involved in support groups. Carers are also fully supported by a dedicated Homestays Advisor.

Have Fun at Beach Clean

Rubbish arrives on every tide, so local volunteers are busy cleaning beaches from Bowness on Solway to Crosscanonby.

After eleven events up to the end of 2017, the group called Fix the Firth has collected 242 black bags of rubbish, 11 tyres, 2 fridges, 2 broken wheely bins, a vacuum cleaner, a burnt-out motorbike and half a sailing dinghy. Organiser John Gorrill comments, 'It's funny to think of the odd things we find but all of it is avoidable - people treat the sea as a liquid landfill site?

Where does the rubbish go? Allerdale Borough Council collect it from beside the B5300 coast road. It is processed at Carlisle's Hespin Wood Mechanical Biological Treatment Plant which claims to recycle about 85% of rubbish received. Some is sold as recyclable plastic, metal and glass. Some is converted into fuel pellets which are burnt elsewhere to generate electricity. The rest - about 15% - goes to landfill. This is good for the Cumbrian coast and for local council tax payers. The Landfill Tax takes money from any council that exceeds its government quota for burying rubbish.

In 2018 the group will hold one beach clean per week. 'On average we get eleven volunteers but it has The Carter family of Wigton

been twenty people on a sunny day and four during a hail-storm, says John the organiser. 'Most people stay for two hours but a few stay longer - we don't force anyone to do more than they want to'. The group provides work gloves, litter-pickers, black bags and metal hoops to keep the bags open. 'All you need is warm clothes, strong shoes or wellies and energy - it's as simple as that, adds John.

Fix the Firth does not have its own website but details of coming beach cleans are in the Solway Buzz. You can also check the What's On pages of Cumbriawildlifetrust.org. uk, the Events Calendar at Lovemybeach.org or join the email list of the

Solway Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. 'We're an independent local group,' explains John, 'but many people have helped and trusted us. It's like pushing on an open door.

Fraudsters Claim to be from HMRC

Police are continuing to receive calls from members of the public regarding a scam which attempts to gain money.

The scam relates to a member of the public receiving a call from someone purporting to be from HMRC, stating that they had an outstanding tax bill.

The latest incident reported to police was on December 12th, when a woman from the Millom area, was instructed to pay the £597 bill in iTunes vouchers. She went to a local supermarket and purchased the vouchers – the details which she handed over the phone to the fraudster.

A Cumbria Constabulary spokesperson said: "We want to advise people to be vigilant to prevent them from falling victim. Our advice for such scams is to disregard the message. Do not contact them on the number they request you to call on and do not hand over any money. If possible record the details and if you are in any doubt, contact HMRC to verify the information. The HMRC website states they would never use these methods to tell you about a tax rebate, a penalty or even to get personal payment information, and they would not request overdue tax to be paid in iTunes vouchers or similar. We'd also like to take this opportunity to alert retailers to the fact that this is happening. If you get a customer attempting to buy high value amounts of iTunes vouchers, please help that customer by checking it is not being purchased to pay a HMRC tax bill or other debt, and report this matter." Anyone who comes

across such a scam should contact Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.org.uk or contact the Action Fraud Hotline on 0300 123 2040 as they are the investigatory body for offences of this type.

Cumbria County Council adopts MND Charter

Cumbria County Council has agreed to adopt the motor neurone disease (MND) Charter in support of local people living with this

terminal disease and their carers.

MND is a fatal, rapidly progressing disease that can leave people locked in a failing body, unable to move, talk and eventually breathe. It kills around a third of people within a year of diagnosis, and more than half within two years. There is no cure.

Unfortunately, MND is still little understood and this contributes to many people with the disease not receiving the care and support they need. The MND Charter was launched to change this.

Councillor Peter Thornton, Cabinet Member for Health & Care Services, said: "I am delighted our council has agreed to adopt the MND Charter. It is vital that more people

are aware of the needs of people with MND so those living with this devastating disease can maximise their quality of life and die with dignity."

Chris James, Director of External Affairs for the MND Association, said: "The importance of the MND Charter is undeniable. We want everyone to be clear that access to the right care, in the right place, at the right time, as set out in our Charter, can transform lives."

Test Your Smoke Alarms Every Month in 2018

With 2018 underway, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service (CFRS) is urging people to make testing their smoke alarms at least

once a month a New Year's resolution. Why not circle the first of every month on your new calendar and tick it off when you have tested your alarms? Or program your electronic diary on your mobile phone to remind you on the first Tuesday of every month with a 'Test it Tuesday' message?

Many people see January as an opportunity for a fresh start, and safety should be at top of the list. So this January, CFRS is encouraging everyone to make sure they have enough smoke alarms in their home and that they work. It only takes a few seconds and can save lives.

Smoke alarms can give someone the few extra

people are not aware that the average alarm has a life-span of only 10 years and then it needs to be replaced.

For people who live in a larger property, a single smoke alarm is not enough. The recommendation is for least one alarm on every level of a property. Last year, in nearly half of all fires in the home where the smoke alarm did not give a warning, the reason was that the alarm was not close enough to detect the fire. Missing or flat batteries were another major cause.

Cumbria Fire & Rescue Service is urging people to make sure that their alarms are up to date and are up to the job.

To keep your alarms in working order:

Make sure there is at least one smoke alarm on every level of your home

Test your smoke alarms by pushing the button every month

Check that your smoke alarms are less than 10 years old Fit smoke alarms on landings and hallways and near bedrooms. Also consider in rooms which have electrical appliances – eg a heater or charger

Take a moment to check on your loved ones or elderly neighbours who may need help to ensure they're fully protected

Station Manager Mark Ducie from CFRS's Prevention department said: "At this time of year, many people will be thinking of what they can do – big or small - to make a fresh start and improve their lives, homes and wellbeing. Smoke alarms can offer vital protection for you and your loved ones, but most people simply fit and forget – they don't know if it might be coming to the end of its life-span or even if it's working at all. For most of us, there is nothing more important than keeping our loved ones safe and secure. So if your alarms are getting past their best or your top floor is missing an alarm of its own, make your New Year's resolution to fit new ones, test them on the first of every month and protect your loved ones in 2018."

Russian Visitor to Silloth Dock

December saw an unusual visitor to the dock with the arrival of Russian registered MEKHANIK TYULENEV from the Baltic.

Choppy seas and a light covering of snow on the Scottish hills made for a wintry scene as the ship made her way up the Solway to await high water at Silloth. The ship is a 'geared' vessel equipped with two deck cranes for cargo handling at quays with no facilities, particularly useful for timber at remote locations. However at Silloth the dockside grab crane was used to unload the cargo of lime into waiting wagons.

Meltdown & Spectre

'New security attack is the latest IT threat to businesses'

A security flaw has been found in a vast majority of Intel processors, with developers working tirelessly behind the scenes to fix this loophole.

Now known as 'Meltdown' and 'Spectre, these hardware bugs allow programs to steal data from Intel processors. This might include your passwords stored in a password manager or browser, your personal photos, emails, instant messages and even business critical documents.

Intel processors account for 82% of all processors found in PC's and servers worldwide, including Apple Mac. The security flaw also affects cloud server providers including Amazon Web Services, Microsoft and Google.

While the risks to business customers has not fully yet been publicly disclosed, the actions being taken by the various operating system developers to fix something indicates that they view it as a serious problem. This has been further evidenced as we have already seen a number of vendors take servers down to perform emergency patching since the news was announced.

Cumbria's Public Health Supports New Smokefree Campaign

Smoking contributes towards approximately 2,800 deaths in Cumbria each year in people aged 35+.

In Cumbria, 64,000 people over the age of 16 smoke, that's 15.5% of the population. The estimated annual cost of smoking to the Cumbria economy is £6.7 million. 12.3% of mothers in Cumbria say they smoke when asked about their smoking habits at the time of giving birth (national average 10.6%). Every year smoking causes around 96,000 deaths in the United Kingdom and further data reveals one person in England is admitted to hospital every minute with a smoking related illness.

Public Health England's new Smokefree campaign uses a hard hitting TV advert to highlight the dangers of tar in cigarettes, showing how poisons from tar in cigarettes enter the bloodstream, spreading around the body within seconds and causing damage to major organs.

To support people in Cumbria to quit, local services and pharmacies are available to provide free, expert support and guidance. People who quit with the support of a stop smoking service adviser are four times more likely to successfully stop for good. Members of the public can contact Cumbria's stop smoking service by calling 0300 013 3000, going online at po.st/ HHCumbria or by dropping into a local pharmacy for a chat.

Colin Cox, Cumbria County Council's Director of Public Health said: "We hope as many smokers as possible

will see the New Year as the perfect opportunity to quit. Every cigarette a person smokes causes real harm and quitting smoking or switching to e-cigarettes is healthier for you and your family. People can choose what works best for them: face-to-face help, stop smoking aids, a quitting app, email, social media, and SMS support. E-cigarettes are also particularly effective when combined with support from pharmacies and people who choose this route have some of the highest quitting success rates. It doesn't matter if you have tried before and it didn't quite work out, you can access support as many times as you need. Make 2018 the year

you became smoke free." Cllr Deborah Earl, Cabinet Member for Public Health and Community Services, said: "Our vision is to create a smoke free generation in Cumbria by 2022, to support our vision, and the national tobacco control plan, we are kick-starting our efforts by making 2018 the year when we join forces with our health partners to help Cumbria to become smoke free. We would like to see everyone across the public, private and third-sector pledging to do at least one thing to help people to stop smoking and help achieve our vision for a smoke free Cumbria."

Professor John Howarth, Deputy Chief Executive at Cumbria Partnership NHS Foundation Trust and GP, said: "Giving up smoking is the biggest single thing you can do to improve your health. Breathing easier is one of the first things that people notice but within just a year your risk of having a heart attack drops by half and you are likely to live longer with a much better quality of life. By working together across the health system we can support more people in Cumbria to lead healthier, smoke free lives." Carlisle GP Colin

Patterson, Clinical Lead for Primary Care for NHS North Cumbria Clinical Commissioning Group, said: If we could encourage the next generation to truly be a smoke-free generation making a positive decision to avoid this harmful addiction – we could make a significant difference to the lives of Cumbrians. Smoking is responsible for so many health problems that we see as GP's and costs our health economy a huge amount. It really is clear that smoking is bad for us as individuals and as a community. Even if you have tried to stop before, don't be put off trying again, the health benefits when you stop are enormous."

People are reminded to improve their home safety by taking the simple step of registering their fridges, freezers and washing machines on the new streamlined version of www. registermyappliance.org.uk.

Developed by the Association of Manufacturers of Domestic Appliances (AMDEA), the portal, now optimised for smartphone, makes registration of over sixty leading brands of old and new appliances faster and easier via mobile, tablet or PC.

As part of the national fire safety campaign, Cumbria Fire & Rescue Services, is keen to ensure that every UK household is encouraged to take this very simple step, and made aware of how it can help to protect their homes and families.

Many brands are running prize draws to encourage owners to look around their kitchens and register their older appliances too. Every registration increases the chances of winning a luxury prize and ensures the traceability of these products. Most makes accept registration of large





appliances up to 12 years old. For manufacturers and fire and rescue services increasing home safety has never been more important. With an estimated 93 million (92.7m.) wet and cold appliances currently in use in our homes, keeping track of our fridges, freezers and washing machines is a crucial safety precaution. By taking just a few minutes to register domestic appliances directly with the manufacturer, via the user-friendly portal www.registermyappliance. org.uk, householders can be contacted quickly if a recall or free safety repair is ever needed.

Despite intensive efforts by the campaign's many influential supporters, accurate ownership data on white goods remains sparse. New YouGov research, shows that less than half of owners (46%) register the fridges they have bought, primarily appliances aren't registered because they don't think it's necessary (39%). Similarly, almost a third (29%) of households found a fridge in situ when they moved into their current property, and although they continue using it, the great majority (80%) have no idea if it is registered. Very few people (15%) realise that they can register an appliance with the manufacturer, even if they acquired it second hand or inherited it. The latest YouGov

survey also revealed that our most important material possessions are our phones and cars, followed closely by our fridges and washing machines. Yet, unlike our 32 million cars, the majority of the large white goods, that we keep running for years without a health check, are untraceable. Women placed a higher importance on their washing machine than their car. Despite this, only half (52%) of these prized purchases were registered.

Station Manager Mark Ducie urges the public to register products they may have bought in the sales and not to forget the older appliances they have been using for many years: "We have been working hard to help our local community to understand why registration is so important. In the new year we also plan to help the elderly and more vulnerable to register their appliances, to ensure they are first in line if a safety modification is ever needed. These large powerful machines are indispensable, yet we tend to take them for granted and forget they are there. It is also vital that they are installed and used according to the instructions, and advice on safe usage is also available on the Register My Appliance portal."

On Register my Appliance Day manufacturers are sending reminders to over 4 million consumers to register their products. While supporters, the Local Government Association, RoSPA, Trading Standards, Citizens Advice, Electrical Safety First, leading private and social landlord groups are using internal communications, regional press and social media to promote www. registermyappliance.org.uk
