# Slipped on Rocks 27th July Shout RNLI 10th Aug Shout

Silloth RNLI lifeboat attended a request for help from the Coastguard on Tuesday 27th July to a 72 year old casualty who had fallen on the rocks at McCullochs Castle in Scotland.

The tide was coming in and the

casualty needed to be moved off the rocks quickly. The ambulance could not get close to the rocks and it was decided that Silloth RNLI lifeboat should take the casualty round the coast where there was better access for the ambulance. The casualty, who could not

be moved unless on a stretcher

due to a suspected broken hip, was transferred onto the lifeboat along with a paramedic from the Scottish ambulance service and taken to Powillimount beach where they were met by an ambulance and coastguards from Portling.

Silloth RNLI lifeboat was stood down and returned to station.

Silloth RNLI lifeboat was paged at 1:29pm on 10th August to launch for a suspected casualty, who had gone missing at the north end of Burgh marshes. The casualty was a 16 year

old male, last seen on the marsh

heading towards the sea.

Silloth RNLI lifeboat launched at 1:37pm and made their way to the area. However the casualty was soon found safe and well and the lifeboat was stood down.

The lifeboat returned to station and made ready for service.

# Up to Neck in Water!

Silloth RNLI lifeboat was tasked to attend a casualty seen up to their neck in sea water, at Bowness on Solway on Saturday 14th August.

The crew were paged at 5:26pm and the lifeboat was launched at 5:35pm. The lifeboat had just arrived in the area where the casualty was last seen, when Belfast Coastguard stood the lifeboat down at 5:47pm, after it was ascertained that the person was safely out of the water and on land. Burgh, Annan and Maryport Coastguards were also involved in the call out.

Silloth RNLI lifeboat returned to station and was made ready again for service.

The postponed 65 miles kayak event to raise money for Eden Valley Hospice (Jigsaw) and Silloth RNLI lifeboat originally planned to go from Ullswater, but due to lack of water in the River Eamont, they set off from Kirkby Thore ending at Silloth.

The marathon paddle took place on 6th and 7th August. The weather was favourable for the sea leg of the journey, in that there was little wind and the sea was calm, despite being overcast and showery. Silloth RNLI lifeboat out on exercise, supported the kayaks on their way to Silloth, after they emerged into the Solway Firth at Port Carlisle.

The seven kayakers consisting of two sea kayak coach/leaders and five paddlers, had paddled from Kirkby Thore to Rockcliffe on the 6th August. They set off from Port Carlisle on the 7th August and made their way to Silloth on an ebbing tide.

They arrived safely at Silloth lifeboat slipway having spent a total of 13.5 hours paddling, over the two days.

# Vaccine Passport Scams

Action Fraud has received over 700 reports from members of the public about fake emails purporting to be from the NHS. The emails claim to be able to provide people with a "digital passport" that "proves you have been vaccinated against COVID-19".

These emails are fake, and the links within them lead to genuinelooking websites that steal your personal and financial information.

How to protect yourself: In the UK, coronavirus vaccines will only be available via the National Health Services of England, Northern Ireland, Wales and Scotland. You can be contacted by the NHS, your employer, a GP surgery or pharmacy local to you, to receive your vaccine. Remember, the vaccine is free of charge. At no point will you be asked to pay.

• The NHS will never ask you for your bank account or card details.

• The NHS will never ask

you for your PIN or banking passwords.

• The NHS will never arrive unannounced at your home to administer the vaccine.

• The NHS will never ask you to prove your identity by sending copies of personal documents such as your passport, driving licence, bills or pay slips.

• Your vaccination status can be obtained for free through the official NHS app, NHS website, or by calling the NHS on 119.

How to report scams:

If you receive a call you believe to be fraudulent, hang up. If you are suspicious about an email you have received, you can report it by forwarding the email to: report@ phishing.gov.uk. Suspicious text messages can also be reported by forwarding them to the number: 7726 (it's free of charge).

If you believe you are the victim of a fraud, please report this to Action Fraud as soon as possible by calling 0300 123 2040 or visiting www.actionfraud.police.uk.

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# **Covid Scam Alerts!**

Scammers are posing as the NHS in fake calls and text messages claiming to be contacting people about Covid-19.

Ofcom has issued a warning about the fraudsters saying some are posing as the Government, your GP surgery and even the World Health Organisation.

In the calls, a recorded message or caller will claim to be contacting you about the coronavirus. The Ofcom warning said:

"They might offer a test for the virus, a treatment or cure, or might offer to discuss your medical needs. However, these calls are designed

to encourage you to either speak to an operator, or press a button on your phone for more information. If you speak to an operator, you could be at risk of giving them your personal information or your financial details, which could result in identity theft or financial loss. If you press a button on your phone you could be connected to a highcost premium number, leaving you liable for a significant call cost".

The warning adds: "It claims to be sent by the Government, offering a payment related to the coronavirus. On the left is the text; on the right is the web page you'll be taken to if you click on the link

in the text. However, look at the URL – it does not link to the UK Government website. It is a fake website which requires you to enter your personal details - it is a phishing scam."

If you are suspicious about an email you have received, forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk.

Suspicious text messages should be forwarded to the number 7726, which is free of charge.

Nyla Martin aged 7 took her first train journey in August, it was to London and she loved the train. She had been invited to the British Library for a tour which included an exhibition in the Treasures Gallery.

Nyla attends Silloth Primary School and during the first lockdown in May 2020 as part of home-schooling children from all over the country had been asked to make miniature books.

Nyla wrote two books one of them being a recipe book on the Rice Crispy Cake that she makes. Her mam Dawn then sent photos to the British Library, and in September 2020 she was contacted to say that Nyla's recipe book had been chosen to be showcased. This was one of 12 books chosen from over 420 books made by children across the country, from Motherwell, Newcastle and Cumbria to Cardiff, Bristol and Plymouth.

There were contributions from online art clubs and children at home, and from key workers' children and vulnerable children in school. Topics ranged from a guide

to Minecraft to facts about planets, cats and rainbows and insightful accounts of life in lockdown.

In June this year Dawn received an invitation for her and Nyla to go and view the exhibition at The British Library London. Nyla was met by Dr Andrea Varney, Goldsmiths' National Outreach Manager Digital Learning who presented her with a bag full of library goodies then took her on a tour of the library which is home to millions of books and treasures. Nyla's book was in a glass case along with the others and will stay at the library forever. The family are so very proud of her achievement.

# Allerdale needs to talk about Geological Disposal ~Working Group launches Online Events



The Allerdale GDF Working Group has launched two online versions of their community dropin sessions to give more people an opportunity to join the discussion on whether Allerdale could be the right place to build a Geological Disposal Facility, or GDF, to securely dispose of the UK's radioactive waste.

'We need to talk about Geological Disposal' is free to attend and the first took place on Zoom on 26th August and the next is on 9th September. The sessions will be hosted by Community Organisers - a national charity, and the membership body and training organisation for community organising in England - who are independent of the Working Group.

The formation of the Allerdale GDF Working Group in January 2021 was the very beginning of a local conversation about

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geological disposal and a gradual, consent-based process to identify an initial 'search area' in Allerdale within which Radioactive Waste Management (RWM) will look for potentially suitable sites to build a highly engineered facility deep underground to dispose of the UK's radioactive waste.

No potential site has yet been identified, and for now, anywhere within Allerdale is being considered, except for the Lake District National Park. However, a Geological Disposal Facility will only be built where there is both a willing community and a suitable site, and with permission from independent regulators, including the Environment Agency, who would need to agree that the facility can be designed, constructed and operated safely.

Establishing the Working Group was the starting point for engaging with the community in a process that will take several years, and before any decision is made, there must be a Test of Public Support by the community to demonstrate it is willing to host a Geological Disposal Facility.

Working Group member, Eva Chua said: "This first step in the GDF project is about listening to local people to understand their views and vision for their community and future generations. These online events are a great opportunity for those who are not



able to attend our face-to-face drop-in sessions to be part of this important conversation about what we should do with our radioactive waste and whether it would be right for a Geological Disposal Facility to be built in Allerdale. As a Working Group we're committed to hearing as many voices as possible, so I would encourage anyone who lives, works or has a business in Allerdale to sign-up to an online session or come and talk to us at a community drop-in."

The hour-long online sessions will introduce attendees to the Working Group, before moving on to a series of 'breakout rooms' where participants will be able to ask questions, find out more information and discuss their thoughts with other participants. Flu vaccine for people with long-term health conditions

The flu vaccine is offered free on the NHS to anyone with a serious long-term health condition, including:

• respiratory conditions, such as asthma (needing steroid inhaler or tablets), chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), including emphysema and bronchitis

- diabetes
- · heart conditions, such as coronary heart disease or heart failure
- history of stroke or TIA
- being very overweight a body mass index (BMI) of 40 or above
- chronic kidney disease
- liver disease, such as hepatitis
- neurological conditions, such as Parkinson's disease, motor neurone disease, multiple sclerosis (MS), or cerebral palsy
- a learning disability
- problems with your spleen, for example, sickle cell disease, or if you have had your spleen removed

on bread on the same cutting board with the same knife and no bleach, and we didn't get food poisoning. Our school sandwiches were

wrapped in wax paper in a brown paper bag, not in ice pack coolers, and I didn't get E.coli.

Almost all of us would have rather gone swimming in the creek, the lake or at the beach instead of a chlorinated pool.

We all took PE and risked permanent injury with a pair of plimsolls or bare feet instead of having cross-training athletic shoes with air cushion soles and built-in light reflectors that cost as much as a small car.

I can't recall any injuries but they must have happened because they tell us how much safer we are now.

We got the cane or the strap for doing something wrong at school, they used to call it discipline yet we all grew up to accept the rules and to honour and respect those older than us

We had around 35 kids in our class with one teacher and no assistants, and somehow we all learned to read and write, do maths and spell most of the words needed to write a grammatically correct letter.

We all said prayers in school irrespective of our religion, sang the

national anthem and saluted the Flag and no one got upset. Staying in detention after school netted us all sorts of negative attention we wish we hadn't got. We knew we had to accomplish something before we were allowed to be proud of ourselves.

I was never bored as a youngster, even though I didn't have a computer, playstation, Nintendo, X-box or 270 digital TV cable stations.

Don't even mention the rope swing over the river or climbing trees

We played "King of the Castle" on piles of dirt or gravel left on vacant building sites and when we got hurt, Mum pulled out the 1/6d bottle of iodine. Now it's a trip to the emergency room, followed by a 10-day dose of antibiotics and then a call to a Solicitor to sue the contractor for leaving a horribly vicious pile of gravel where it was such a threat.

To top it off, not a single person I knew had ever been told that they were from a dysfunctional family. How could we possibly have known that?

July saw a visit from the dredger ADMIRAL DAY which *s*pent a week working in New Dock.

The first cargo vessel to benefit from the increased depth was WILSON DAVANGER which had spent a week sailing from Estonia. The crew would be keen to reach their destination and have a break from sea duties. The ship was bringing a full cargo of fertiliser from Sillamae, the easternmost port of the European Union in the Baltic Sea. The Estonian port is a large facility capable of receiving ocean-going vessels. It has an extensive road and rail network, including links with its neighbour Russia a few miles to the east.

WILSON DAVANGER's voyage took it from the Baltic Sea to the north of Denmark and onward into the North Sea. At this halfway point the ship would head for Scotland and then down the west coast to Cumbria. It was a fine morning for the final stage of the sailing, arriving off Silloth in good time for the midday tide. Conditions allowed the pilot to make a direct approach to the dock entrance rather than perform the usual pirouette before lining-up.

This suited photographers who were able to get a different view of the passing ship. Onlookers were treated to a blast on the ship's horn as it entered Marshall Dock. The ship was soon turned and brought alongside its berth where a convoy of wagons was already waiting. In no time, the pilot had disembarked, hold hatch covers opened and the dockside grab made ready to begin its work.

The ship is chartered by the Norwegian company 'Wilson' which, with a fleet of more than one hundred, makes it one of the largest operators on European short sea routes. The company has a reputation for high standards of ship maintenance and crewing.

DAVANGER is the third member of the fleet to visit this year. Just twenty-four



hours after arrival the ship was ready for departure to its next destination in northern Spain. The quick turnaround

Silloth had only two vessel calls in what is normally a quiet month for the port, so we actually achieved target. MV Elsborg called again with more fertiliser for Origin and the Wilson Davanger brought in even more fertiliser at the tail end of the month.

During this month we also carried out a small dredge campaign, removing some 8,800 tonnes of silt from the dock, not as much as we had hoped to move, but better than none at all. As part of this we removed a small lump from the mud encroaching on the north side of the channel in Marshall dock, giving us a straighter run in over the coming months. We have also notified the Marine Management Organisation that we believe that legally we have the right to dredge all areas of the channels into Silloth under the 1855 Carlisle and Silloth Railways Act, which has caused a few issues for us in the past and we are now taking samples from the beach to send in for testing to ensure none of the sediment we remove is contaminated in any way prior to carrying out further works later this year.

Next year, as part of our dredge material disposal license we have to take further samples in New Dock and submit them for testing as well, to show that the silt in the dock (every 5 years) is not contaminated and has not been contaminated by any of the vessels calling in Silloth.

We are looking forward to a busier August and enjoying the warmer weather. July

### New Directory Launched to Support Sexual Violence Survivors

A new digital directory of services has been launched across the North West to help survivors of sexual violence find support.

www.sexualviolencesupport. co.uk features a postcode search function which allows users to find local support services.

The website also contains Survivor Support Packs which are downloadable resources created in collaboration with survivors. These packs provide all the information you need to know around the definitions of sexual violence crimes, information for parents/ carers on supporting children or how to have open conversations at home, and a simplified 15-step summary for the 'report to court' process.

Becky Johnston, Sexual Violence Communication and Engagement Manager and project manager for the website said: "Until now, if a survivor was to look for support online, the information can be confusing and overwhelming. There are loads of support organisations out there but it's hard to know which one is specifically commissioned for the area you live in. You could contact an organisation then be referred onto another, then another - a process which when speaking to some survivors has been described as a deterrent for seeking support. This new website has been built in collaboration with survivors and

using their feedback to improve access to services. We really hope this site makes the process easier for survivors."

The website has been built in collaboration with North West Police Crime Commissioners, NHS England, and Sexual Assault & Abuse Services.

Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner, Peter McCall, said: "This website is a great resource for anyone who has experienced sexual violence and is looking for support. As PCC, I would urge anyone who has experienced any form of sexual violence to report it to the Police, whether it is a recent or historic assault, but I understand that this is not an option for everyone which is why these types of resources are so important. We have several organisations in Cumbria including the Bridgeway, Victim Support, Safety Net and the Birchall Trust, all of which can be found at www. sexualviolencesupport.co.uk. Anyone looking for support, please visit the website and reach out to one of these organisations - do not suffer in silence."

# What is a Ghost Broker?

Just 15% of people have heard of a 'ghost broker'.\* Do you know what one is?

Have you ever heard of a 'ghost broker'? No, we are not talking about things that go bump in the night – this is a lot scarier. 'Ghost brokers' are fraudsters who sell fake or invalid car insurance policies. Victims are sold fake insurance documents for a policy that does not exist, or for a genuine policy that has been set up using false details to lower the price of the premium.

How do 'ghost brokers' operate?

Fraudsters lure victims in with the offer of cheaper insurance premiums, usually via social media or by word-of-mouth. These individuals or groups pose as middlemen for well-known insurance companies, claiming they can offer you legitimate car insurance at a significantly cheaper price.

This type of fraud is typically carried out either by forging insurance documents, falsifying your details to bring the price down, or by taking out a genuine policy for you but cancelling it soon after.

Often, the victim is not aware that they have been scammed until they are involved in an accident and try to claim on the policy.

Who do 'ghost brokers' target? 'Ghost brokers' tend to target vulnerable communities, including members of non-English speaking communities who may not have full knowledge of UK insurance and laws, as well as

young people looking for cheaper insurance deals.

Last year, Action Fraud received 694 reports of 'ghost broking', with almost a third (29%) coming from victims aged 17-29. The reported losses for these victims alone totalled £113,500, with each individual losing an average of £559.

Figures also indicate that over half (58%) of all reports in 2020 were submitted by men.

What could happen if I drive without valid insurance?

As policies sold by 'ghost brokers' are either invalid, nonexistent or fraudulent, this means that the driver is technically uninsured, meaning that you could face:

• £300 fixed penalty notice

- Six points on driving licenceVehicle being seized and crushed
- How can I protect myself from 'ghost brokers'?

There are simple steps that you can take to spot the signs of these scams and avoid being taking for a ride by 'ghost brokers':

• 'Ghost brokers' often advertise and communicate via social media, online forums and messaging apps. If a broker is only using a mobile phone or email as a way of contact, this can be a sign of this type of crime. Fraudsters do not want to be traced after they have taken money from their victims.

• They may also try to sell insurance policies through print adverts in pubs, clubs or bars, newsagents.

• If a deal seems too good to be true, then it probably is. If you are not sure about the broker, check on the Financial Conduct Authority or the British Insurance Brokers' Association website for a list of all authorised insurance brokers. You can also contact the insurance company directly to verify the broker's details. You can also check to see if a car appears to be insured on the Motor Insurance Database website.
