Opportunity to Become an On-Call Firefighter

Service is on the look-out for new On-Call Firefighters to serve their communities.

The service has launched a rolling programme to recruit new Firefighters to vacancies within its 36 On-Call stations across the county.

An On-Call Firefighter provides cover for one or more stations in their local community; they have a primary iob and respond as and when there is an incident. Each station is different, and have varying degrees of busyness throughout a year,

> and an annual retainer is paid based on a On-Call Firefighter's hours of availability, in addition to an hourly rate when they attend incidents, training and community activity.

On-Call Firefighters receive the same training as their full

time colleagues, and there are opportunities to receive additional training to enhance their skills and knowledge, and potentially progress within the service.

Rick Ogden, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service's Chief Fire Officer, said: "Being an On-Call Firefighter is an incredibly fulfilling and challenging role, and we have On-Call stations across Cumbria, from very rural areas to highly populated towns. Our On-Call teams offer a highly professional service in responding to incidents and engaging with their communities to reduce

fantastic opportunity for anyone interested in joining Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service. On-Call Firefighters are an integral part

> of CERS, and the role is an incredibly rewarding one for those interested in keeping their communities safe. I would encourage anyone interested in joining to fill in an application to help keep Cumbria safe."

Hilary Cater: Loved the wing waggle after the first pass over Skinburness.


Sandy Hodgson: Then a low flying helicopter joined in.. sounded like WW3.


floral and gardening. Set a closing date for entries.

Garry Ware RIP

Silloth RNLI crew pay their respects for former crew member

On Tuesday 31st October 2023, Silloth RNLI crew members gathered at Carlisle Crematorium to pay their respects to the late Frederick 'Garry' Ware, who sadly passed away on Saturday 21st October 2023.

Frederick, known as Garry to those around him, volunteered at Silloth Lifeboat Station for many years. Members of the volunteer lifeboat crew stood together to pay their respects to Garry, they assembled themselves at the entrance of crematorium to give a guard of honour as the coffin entered the building.

Garry's grandsons Mark
Ware, a Helm for Silloth RNLI,
Daniel Ware a former volunteer
crew member and Nathan Ware
gathered with three other members
of the family to carry the coffin
dressed with the Royal National
Lifeboat Institution flag into the
building.

During the service the funeral officiant spoke about Garry's life, talking in depth about his love for the RNLI and the dedication and hard work he gave to Silloth Lifeboat Station in the many years he volunteered there as crew. They spoke about his passion for lifeboats and volunteering when he took part

in station visits, talking to the public about the important roles within the station and reminiscing about past events.

On Saturday 4th November, the volunteer lifeboat crew gathered at the station to scatter Garry's ashes at sea. Garry was always down at the sea front or in the lifeboat station talking to everyone around him about the memories he had of the station. Family, friends and other lifeboat crew members gathered on the sea front to pay respects once more, and to watch the scattering of the ashes which was one of Garry's wishes.

With the help of the RNLI's Launch a Memory campaign, Mark, Garry's grandson, has ensured that his memory will live on by inscribing his name on to a Shannon lifeboat.

Those who attended the funeral and the wake donated £246.22 to Silloth RNLI Lifeboat Station.

Silloth RNLI Lifeboat Press Officer, Rebecca Clark said: 'From everyone at Silloth RNLI we want to say a big thank you for the generous donation received. That money will go on to save lives at sea just as Gary did through his dedication to our charity. Garry's presence will be hugely missed here at the station. Rest in peace Gary, you will be missed by many and will always be in our thoughts.'

On Wednesday 13th March Young Carers Action Day took place. This is an annual event organised by Carers Trust to raise awareness. It highlights the pressures and challenges young carers face, and the incredible contribution they make by caring for their family members and friends.

The theme for 2024 is "Fair Futures for Young Carers".

Caring for someone should not be a barrier to learning,

earning or being able to participate and get on in life. But for far too many young carers and young adult carers, it is.

A shocking number are caring for fifty hours a week or more. This has a catastrophic impact on their ability to learn and ultimately to earn: young carers are significantly less likely to undertake higher education or enter employment than their peers without a caring responsibility.

Carer Support West Cumbria can provide help and guidance to Young Carers and their families around managing their caring role alongside education and learning. Our Support Workers can be someone to chat to in confidence as well as ensuring young carers are supported in school.

Days Gone Bye in Allonby

When Silloth was a mere hamlet the 18th Century fashion for therapeutic sea bathing had reached Allonby, transforming the small fishing village into an exclusive summer seaside resort.

For women bathing offered physical enjoyment and even liberation. So in 1794 Mary Yates aged 44 of Skirwith Abbey accompanied by her youngest child Henry and daughter in law Mary, the sister of Richard Matthews of Wigton Hall went to Allonby. Mary recorded her visit in a diary now deposited at Carlisle Archive, it is a fascinating insight into the social structure of this period and displays Mary's strong character Below are some extracts-

19th Sept: "got up between six and seven and set off for Mr Matthews". Unfortunately Mary's coach was late and breakfast was finished when they arrived at Wigton Hall. Collecting Mary they continued on a "very rough and uneasy road...calling upon a Mrs Wethrall" on the way. Allonby was reached "in a little more than two hours over the commons the road being "very good". However arriving at the "Younghusband House" beds were full "and after some altercations I was settled in a bed in the drawing room and Mary asleep in the next house. Mrs Harrington, Mrs Graves, Mr Mathers, Mr Thomlinson, Mr Duplay, a clergyman named Bird and Kitty Lowther were the company. Mr Salkeld, Mr Graves and Redman came just after played at cards and sparked a very disagreeable evening, left after supper and retired to write home by the servant who I am sending back in the morning".

20th Sept: "Breakfasted in my own apartment until eleven, when I went to bathe in a very great swell in the lea, which worked quite into the machine (bathing machine), then when I got out I was not knee deep, but the water was warm...walked a little on the land afterwards, but a little change in the wind drove me in."

21st Sept: "incessant storm, beat against the windows violently...no bathing".

22nd Sept: "windy and rain when I

went to bathe...the sea was unpleasant, spend the rest of morning in my own room."

23rd Sept: "violent storm ... prevented bathing...cards in the evening."

24th Sept: "Got up before 9am and bathed before breakfast...cold... attempted to get a walk but drove in by a shower. Had a present of a starfish and piece of coarse coral from Ruth. Wrote to Mrs Robinson. Mrs Harryman's came in the evening, stupid as usual, left the supper soon after 10".

25th Sept: "Bathed before 10am, the only day bathing has been good since I came. Henry and I took a long walk... and got among the tops just above the Old Salt Pans from whence we had a fine view...I was much fatigued and before sleep I was asked to dinner... with Captain Brown from Wigton and the Harryman's, the only tolerable cheerful day I have had since I came here, there was some singing and more cards than usual...eleven before I left the supper room".

26th Sept: Much of the company left leaving- "ourselves, Mrs Graves and her sister, Miss Lowther and Miss Bird...I fear we shall spend a most disagreeable week with them...bathed at 2pm when weather clearer".

27th Sept: "Mary unwell...walked about with Henry... a very sunshiny morning but a cold air from the north...bathed at 2pm sea beautifully clear and bright...Mr Bateman came and made the evening pleasanter, stayed up till 12pm there were cards after supper, he has taken the house at Linethwaite and is great raptures with it".

28th Sept: Mary better, and up for breakfast, but I believe more of a compliment to Mr Bateman than her own inclination...got a very pleasant walk with Henry in the afternoon...sat myself all the evening and attempted to read."

29th Sept: "Got a parcel of news from Ewanrigg (Ewanrigg Hall, Maryport) and saw the servant fall as he was mounting his horse, got a walk in the morning and evening, played Vintane after tea, bathed at 2pm".

30th Sept: Walked...played Vintane

till past eleven".

1st Oct: Did not get up until 10am went for a walk with Henry as far as Dubmill, read newspapers all morning, went to see a Manta Ray they follow the herrings and are taken by the fishers. Mrs Harrison of Whitehaven came in the afternoon."

2nd Oct: "Only Miss Harriman, Lowther and ourselves left... unpleasant in the morning did not bathe...played cards in the afternoon and again won money in the evening which I will return as soon as I have had supper".

3rd Oct: Called at Ewanrigg saw Mrs Curwen, Mr Stanley, Miss Fanny, Christian and the children...dined... went onto Flimby where we were received with open arms. Mrs Nelson and Miss Helen spend the day with us...Mary unwell at Ewanrigg and went to bed early."

4th Oct: "Spend the morning in conversation with Mrs Gaitson and Mrs Nelsons left them at 2pm for Ewanrigg... Mrs Curwen, John Christian (Curwen) and two Henley's there. Mrs Curwen very silent and reserved which made the visit unpleasant to me...returned to Allonby by moonlight...only three left to play cards...after 12pm when I got to bed."

5th Oct: "Sunday had intended to go to church but heavy showers prevented this. Left Allonby got to Wigton in less than two hours rain all the way, very glad to find myself off as the place had been very disagreeable, found Mr Matthews at home...left at between four and five pm and got to Carlisle by 6pm found a good fire and everything very comfortable".

The following year Mary went to Blackpool.

Note: Mary Yates's daughter in law Mary Matthews was married to Francis Aglionby MP whose statue stands in front of Carlisle Courts, Henry Bateman was Francis's cousin. Both changed their name to Aglionby in accordance with a bequest. John Christian Curwen MP and wife Isabella owned Workington Hall. Sadly Henry, Mary's youngest son died in 1801 at which Mary concluded her diary.

Having recently celebrated the first anniversary of Fox Maritime, the Group's stevedoring operations and shipping agency, based out of Lancaster's Glasson Dock, they are further expanding their services as well as continuing on their journey of carbon reduction.

Red Squirrel Grant Award



The Solway Red Squirrel Group has been awarded a grant of £1,500 by the operators of the Robin Rigg Windfarm to help support continued voluntary efforts to conserve local red squirrel numbers.

The grant was made by the Robin Rigg Community Fund which generously supports projects and organisations in the Solway area that benefit the environment or the local community. The fund is administered on both sides of the Solway by the Solway Firth Partnership.

The Solway Red Squirrel Group was formed in 2012 and oversees red squirrel conservation efforts across an area of approximately 200 square miles. Through a team of dedicated field volunteers working in collaboration with local landowners and communities, the Group undertakes an all year round conservation programme of camera monitoring, supplementary feeding, recorded sightings and grey

squirrel control. This is alongside educational talks and public events to raise awareness and support red squirrel conservation efforts both regionally and nationally. Their latest project aims to survey various pieces of woodland in and around the Silloth area to establish the extent of any squirrel presence and then hopefully create designated strongholds to provide safe areas for red squirrels to disperse to and become re-established. This follows on from a similar project which has already seen a small red squirrel population spread to woodland around Aspatria and Fletchertown.

Over the last 50 years there has been a dramatic decline in red squirrel numbers and the species is at serious risk of extinction in the UK if this continues. This decline is due to habitat loss and, in particular, competition from the invasive, non-native North American grey squirrel, first introduced to the UK in the late 1870's. The grey squirrel is larger and stronger than the red and better able to survive harsh weather and occasional food shortages. It breeds more successfully and can quickly out-compete the red squirrel for resources. The grey squirrel also carries a virulent disease (squirrel pox virus) to which the grey is immune but which is fatal to red squirrels and can rapidly kill whole populations. In addition to the devastating effect on red squirrel numbers, the grey squirrel is also responsible for extensive damage to UK woodland and tree planting by bark stripping. Figures show that grey squirrel damage costs the UK economy around £40 million a year.

Marion Grave, Secretary of the Solway Red Squirrel Group, said "We are delighted to be awarded this grant and would like to thank the Robin Rigg Community Fund for their generous support. Hopefully, with their help, we can protect our remaining red squirrels and encourage their return to the wider Solway area. Until about 2010 red squirrels were regularly seen around Silloth and Skinburness and we would love to hear from anyone who did last see a red in those areas".

Reported sightings of any squirrels (red or grey) are always extremely helpful to the Group so please get in touch. 














Gardening for the benefit of nature doesn't mean a lack of colour. To support the naturally occurring plant life we have, over the years, planted a range of spring bulbs and flowers which provide an important early source of food for bees and other insects. We have sown wildflower seeds which will come back year after year and this Spring we have planted 100 Rosa Rugosa. An ideal shrub for a windy coastal area Rosa Rugosa has pollen rich flowers, provides shelter and habitat, has seeds for birds and makes a colourful wildlife hedge in Summer. (Pictures 6, 7 & 8)

Dolly Partons' Connection to Silloth part 1

It has been quite a vast journey! At 55 years of age, I look back to the time when I first started loving the music and work of country music luminary Dolly Parton.

Dolly has been entertaining the world for many decades and is still going strong.

The most recent of her releases is a steer away from country music and a daring, yet highly successful venture into Rock Music! More about that later.

As with any star, there are many stories, myths and tales about their celebrity. Here, I will give you the true picture. I have been lucky enough to meet the great Dolly

I remember being brought up in poverty, in a small coal mining town on the west coast of Cumbria. A religious cult was part of my background which I managed to break free from at 19 years old.

Like any other youngster, I had dreams and aspirations. Although at



the early stages the cult life restricted these to nothing. The chance to break away and deprogramme was a challenge and rocky path. Part of that was to do things I would never have been allowed to. The adoration of a country music star was likened to idol worship in the eyes of a religion I needed to escape from.

The getting away or breaking away is another story and I think it will be great to share another time. The point here is, breaking away allowed me to follow my interests and rub shoulders in the future with music royalty.

In 1982, Dolly released a Greatest Hits album which intrigued me. Never had I heard such a crisp, stripped-down, angelic-like voice. I remember first hearing the song 'Old Flames...Can't Hold a Candle to You' and just thinking "wow". The album itself was re-issued at some point whereupon her fantastic duet with Kenny Rogers "Islands in the Stream" replaced another song from the original entitled 'Hard Candy Christmas. That's a song that's become a firm favourite with me and

features high in my top 10 Dolly tracks of all time.

'Hard Candy Christmas is often referred to as a Christmas song. It's not. Taken from one of the movies and written with "hard times" in mind, it has made it a

firm favourite with myself and other

Dolly had moved from the backwoods Appalachian Mountains of East Tennessee to Nashville. Meeting her future husband Carl Dean outside the local launderette. They were married May 30th, 1966, and yes – have been totally devoted and together ever since.

The first album Dolly released was called 'Hello, I'm Dolly' in September of 1967 – some two years before I was born. There had been other demo style releases prior to this however, 'Hello, I'm Dolly' was officially No 1 release in the Dolly back catalogue.

Dolly signed with Monument records back in 1965 and they wanted to market her as a bubblegum pop singer. The squeaky, high pitch vocals became their focus

Dolly kicked back at this – Dolly Parton became country.

There was a syndicated TV show at the time called 'The Porter Wagoner, show. Dolly was introduced as the new regular

became a heavily featured and highly regarded duo within the country music scene and released 13 full studio albums, 15 compilation albums and 21 singles during their recording time together. A very notable song 'Jeannie's Afraid of the Dark' came from the album 'Just the Two of Us' and is so haunting and moving – it gives me shivers even

Wagoner was quite a controlling character and even though Dolly had expressed her wishes to go separate and pursue a solo career, he was inclined to make it hard and put obstacles in the way.

Dolly did, indeed make the break and although the relationship had become strained, she still felt the need to express her appreciation for the man that had somewhat helped to fuel Dolly's career.

It was from this situation that the song 'I Will Always Love You' was born in 1974. Dolly wrote this to tell Porter Wagoner how she really felt – communication had broken down and this was the only way to get the message across. The song was very much loved

by Elvis Presley. Elvis wanted to record this and arranged a meeting with Dolly to start plans to do so. The project sadly never materialized because then Presley manager, Colonel Tom spoiled the chances. He demanded half the publishing rights to the song which of course Dolly declined. When telling the story today Dolly will liken her selfpenned songs to her children - "she needs them to support her when she gets old". Therefore, Elvis was never allowed to record and release the

song.

Dolly has never had any children herself.







Is Your Holiday Booking Real?

Many people's thoughts are turning to their next break or their big summer holiday. Sadly, as with many ways we spend our money, fraudsters may look to exploit people in this area of life. That's why our partners at Get Safe Online are offering their tips on keeping free of fraud when looking for some time away - and we're reproducing them here to help you stay safe.

Most of us look forward to an annual holiday or short break. Many people find and book these online. The trouble is, fraudsters love the internet. They use fake websites, listings, emails, advertisements, social media posts and texts – and also phone calls – to trick you into paying for a holiday or other travel to a holiday that doesn't exist.

To help save you from losing your holiday and your money, look at these tips on safely searching and booking holidays - and travel with confidence. Advice to steer you clear of fraud. Thoroughly research your package holiday, flight, accommodation, cruise, pilgrimage or other break or travel to make sure it's authentic. Be wary of unusually cheap holidays or flights, as well as high deposits. Check that accommodation actually exists by finding it on Google Maps and looking for independent reviews and recommendations. Make sure

there's a phone
number and call
the owner or agent
directly to try to find
out if the person you're
booking the holiday
with is authorised to
sell it to you. If the
number isn't provided,
email and request it.
Ask questions to see if
they have knowledge
of the area. Check reviews on
TripAdvisor or similar sites.

If you're booking accommodation via Airbnb, always keep communications and payment on the Airbnb platform and don't be tempted off it as this may indicate an attempt at fraud. Read Airbnb's safety advice for guests. Never pay by bank transfer to a company or person you haven't had personal experience of buying from previously. If it's a fraud, you may never get your money back. Paying by credit card means more chance of getting your money back if something goes wrong. Check that travel agents and tour operators you book holidays and travel through are members of trade associations such as ABTA or ATOL, by checking on these bodies' websites

Enter the address of the website you plan to book a holiday through, at www.getsafeonline.org/checkawebsite to check if it is likely to be legitimate or fraudulent.

Check terms and conditions prior to making any payment. Before paying online or providing any confidential details, type in the website address you know to be correct (instead of following a link) and ensure the

payment page is secure (begins with 'https' and has a locked padlock in the browser window frame). Keep confirmations and payment receipts and check bank / credit card statements for irregular entries

What to do if you have been the victim of fraud. The first thing you should do if you've been a victim of fraud is to contact Action Fraud. You can report a fraud via their online fraud reporting tool, or by calling them on 0300 123 2040.

If there is a crime being committed right now or if you are in danger you should call the police on 999. If debit or credit cards, online banking or cheques are involved, your first step should be to contact your bank or credit card company. If you have any friends or family who you feel would benefit from receiving this newsletter, please direct them to our website where they can sign up.

January saw a new ship visit the port carrying a cargo of German wheat. The general cargo vessel, TRUFFALDINO, with a name associated with a colourful Italian harlequin is one of a fleet of more than thirty vessels operated by a Lithuanian company. A sister ship, TROUBADOUR had called at Silloth last year. The fleet comprises several ships with names following the same theme, for example, MINSTREL and JONGLEUR.

TRUFFALDINO, carrying the first grain delivery of the year, had loaded in the Baltic port of Vierow in the far north of Germany. The 3,000 ton capacity ship was built in 1999 to a design typical of those calling at Silloth. The sailing took twelve days, much longer than would be expected for the route. Maybe she was ahead of schedule as, after passing through the Kiel Canal, she dropped anchor for four days before continuing towards her destination via the English Channel.

The ship is registered in

Kingstown, the capital of St. Vincent and the Grenadines, one of the Caribbean island chain. The colourful national flag flying from the ship's stern brightened up a grey winter's afternoon as the ship passed by.

Amongst the onlookers were a group who introduced themselves as regular readers of this page. Photographers were pleased to answer their queries about the approaching ship and its cargo. One local lady had included the dockside walk as part of her 60th birthday celebration - now that's dedication!

There were busy scenes at the quayside as the pilot and master turned the vessel and brought her alongside. The ship was quickly tied-up and made ready for the grab crane to start unloading. In addition, there appeared to be a crew changeover about to happen as a group of seaman waited on the quayside ready to board ship and begin their duties.

All in all, an interesting afternoon at the waterfront.

January/February Shipping at the Docks

Silloth had four vessel calls during January, our old faithful Zapadnyy with 2,000 tonnes of Molasses was followed by two vessels from the Wilson fleet, the Aveiro which was a maiden call here during my time in the saddle and the Dordrecht who has visited before. Both vessels were carrying fertiliser.

The Truffalino carrying 3,000 tonnes of German grain in two grades for the mill, scraped in at the end of the month after a very hectic couple of days digging on the beach to create a channel for her to get in due to the recent strong South Westerly gales piling nearly four metres of sand in the entrance.

Further digging will follow to allow the Zapadnyy to return early in February.

Overall, a good start to the year and looking forward to further vessels over the coming weeks

There has been no further advancement on the coastal footpath works by Cumbria County Council and ABP have not progressed any further with their slow attempts at getting the public car park arrangements finalised.

Hope you all stayed safe during the recent strong winds which reached 78mph here at the dock, which is an official Hurricane force wind strength.

Silloth was visited in February by the Zapadnyy carrying the normal Molasses cargo, with a slight bump on the sand and a short stop between tides awaiting refloating, she ended up staying almost two weeks in the end whilst she was checked out by various entities

She was followed shortly after by a further cargo of molasses coming in on the Kaprifol, a new one for us here in Silloth. A product tanker with double skin hull and all the pipes and fittings on deck, she looked a busy ship. She handled well coming in and again heading out, however her
