the coast from Maryport we have decided to roost and made the Silloth area our home.

Over recent years we have both started to really appreciate the world of birds and now can't go anywhere without a pair of binoculars and a bird book.

We have been stunned by the diversity of birds we can see in the Cumbrian and Solway areas; we have loved watching birds coming and going as the seasons change and birds migrate in and out of the area. We have watched in awe as they have built intricate nests, laid eggs on the tiniest of cliff ledges or burrowed into sand dunes. Spent hours watching them hunt for tiny voles and shrews, digging for worms on the beach or catching the smallest of insects in flight. Neither of us can quite believe how we managed to ignore all this activity and all these fantastic birds for so many years.

What we will always say is that we are absolute beginners and even after four years would never dare to call ourselves fully fledged 'Twitchers' This column is not about teaching, telling, informing or advising it is all about sharing.

Each month we would like to share with you some of the wonderful photographs Bert has taken and to tell you about some of the birds we have been lucky to meet as we progress through the seasons. Bearing in mind that we

are beginners we are also really keen to learn from you too. We are likely to pose loads of questions and hope that you can help us out with local knowledge and birding insights. We will often get things wrong, and are by no means experts. We just want to share with you our love of the birds we see in our local area.

We are starting this month (January) with what we are calling the 'Curlew Conundrum'. We both love Curlews; their haunting calls, their winter gatherings on the Solway coast and the joy when we are lucky and they stay and nest inland locally over the spring and summer. We love that crazy bill that makes them such a unique sight when flying or probing for food in the wet sand as the tide goes out. We are honoured here on the Solway that we have so many visiting Curlews as it is now Britain's most endangered bird with half of breeding birds lost

since 2000.

So, what is the Curlew Conundrum? Over the years that we have been watching Curlews in Winter we have endlessly wondered why some days the birds choose to base themselves on the beach feeding in the wet sand and other days we see them in farm fields beside the sea. We have never been able to work out what causes this change in feeding pattern? Is it all to do with tides and weather, do they simply fancy a change of scene, do they fancy munching on an earth worm rather than a lugworm, or is it something way more complicated? We look forward to hearing your thoughts.

Thanks for reading, we'll be back in February. In the meantime, don't forget to watch the skies, look in hedgerows or just out your kitchen window and see what you can see.

shipping. Their small red tankers dominate the European market for the transport of edible oils, especially fish oils and molasses. ORANESS is one of a fleet of eleven ships all with the prefix 'ORA' in their name, which is Latin for coast. ORANESS was built in 1985, acquired by 'Simonsen' in 2001 who converted it into a speciality tanker. The shipping company's policy is to modernise existing ships rather than opt for newbuilds as this has become uneconomical for small vessels.

Our tanker had loaded 2,500 tonnes of liquid molasses in Bremen before reaching Silloth five days later. On the morning of arrival, the Silloth pilot had boarded the ship via the tug DERWENT out of Workington. The tricky sailing up the Solway proceeded smoothly with the ship arriving in good time to enter Silloth dock. The occasional appearance of the sun was appreciated by the crowd of onlookers gathered at the port entrance to watch the ship make its approach. ORANESS performed the usual pirouette manoeuvre before heading for the dock entrance on the midday tide. The ship was photographed as it passed by and while being turned in the dock and brought alongside.

It was a brief visit for ORANESS, and two days later she headed north for a circuit of Danish ports. Enthusiasts are hopeful that more of Simonsen's specialist tankers may call at Silloth in the future.

In Memory of Malcolm Wilson

Many from an older generation would remember him from the garage (Silloth Motor Company) where he worked with our Grandfather.

He was a long-standing member of the Miramar lodge with over 50 year's association.

He was also an avid local historian with a wealth of knowledge about the area.

His passion was model making, in particular model ships. His attention to detail was second to none and would undertake hours of research before embarking on any new project. This would often entail tracking down original plans which he would then scale down to make an exact replica of the original.

He has left a rich legacy of model ships which are on display across the world including Liverpool and Greenwich maritime museums.

He will be greatly missed.



Shipping at the Port of Silloth

Again, only two vessel calls to Silloth this month, the Oraness with Molasses for animal feeds and The Ayr with fertiliser for Origin. The Ayr was our second Vertom vessel this year and a third was also planned, however changed for another vessel at the last minute.

Our water pumping system on the beach has been pulled apart again by winds and tides and so needs rebuilding, in the meantime we will have to get a digger in to open the port up again prior to our next vessels.

Our Annual stakeholder meeting was held on the 19th in the Golf Hotel and was very well attended. Police are warning people across Cumbria to be on be vigilant to scam phone calls from fraudsters.

This follows a report made to police recently in which the victim was contacted by the fraudster claiming to be from her bank and that their bank card had expired, and she is due to be issued a new one. The following day a male attending the victims address in Barrow and introduced himself as a police officer who needed to carry out fingerprint checks on her cards. He also offered to take her jewellery for safekeeping.

The male left with the cards and later posted them back through the door after having made a number of transactions with the cards.

The scams fit the pattern of fraudsters pretending to be officials, such as bank fraud teams, police officers or HMRC officials. However, the scams can differ slightly from call to call. But

the fraudsters often request bank details, money to be sent electronically, cash to be withdrawn at the bank for collection or expensive items to be bought for collection at a later time. Police and other agencies would never request this.

If you have any concern that the person on the phone may be a fraudster, put the phone down and call the police from a different phone on 101 for advice and guidance.

Officers are asking anyone who has been victim to such a scam to come forward. If you receive a call you're not expecting, you should be suspicious. The vital things to remember are that your bank, other agencies and the police would:

Never ask you for your bank account details or PIN number over the phone.

Never ask you to withdraw money and send it to them via a courier, taxi, bank transfer or by any other means. Never ask you to

send your bank cards or any other personal property to them via courier, taxi or by any other means.

If you have any doubts about the identity of the person that you are speaking with, put the phone down and attend the bank or police station in person, wherever possible, to discuss the call you have received, or call a trusted number for the bank or police using a different telephone than the one that you have been contacted on.

It's recommended you wait at least five minutes and make sure you can hear a dialling tone before you call, as there have been cases of fraudsters keeping the line open after a victim has hung up.

We ask that the public please share this information with any vulnerable friends or family.
