Allerdale Chief Exec

Allerdale Borough Council is considering the long term options for the position of its chief executive.

Following the Council's decision in August to put in place interim arrangements to share a chief executive with Carlisle for a six month period to February 2009, the Executive Committee and Corporate Management Team are proposing to evaluate this arrangement with the help of external consultants.

SERCO Consulting, which carried out the Better Government for Cumbria work on behalf of the districts at the time of the Unitary Authority proposals, has been jointly appointed by Carlisle City Council and Allerdale Borough Council to look at the shared arrangements.

The review will consider:

• Advantages and disadvantages for both councils

- Financial implicationsPotential risks and
- impact on performance
- Possible options for enhanced joint arrangements.

The consultants have been asked to look at these issues and report back to both councils in early October, outlining possible options for future arrangements, so Members from the two authorities can decide how to proceed.

Councillor Joe Milburn, Leader of Allerdale Borough Council, said: "This piece of work will help both Councils decide if they want to enter longer term joint arrangements but there are no firm preconceived proposals.

"It is important that we look at all options to make efficiency savings and improve service delivery in the face of the difficult long term financial situation facing most authorities such as ours in the country."

Allerdale Borough Council's Corporate Management Team and Executive Committee are working together to manage this work. As part of the review individual staff across the Council will be contacted shortly by the consultants in order to discuss the issues and give their views.

Have You Returned Yours?

Residents in Allerdale are reminded they need to return their electoral registration information this autumn, if they want to vote in next year's elections.

Allerdale Borough Council sent out Annual Canvas forms in July and, whilst there has been a good response, more people need to reply if they are to have a voice in the European and county council elections, taking place next year.

Many people have already confirmed their details using the more cost-effective methods of telephone, SMS text and internet registration. The Council is promoting this approach through the social networking website Facebook as it is more environmentally-friendly and also saves the council money, with postage and processing costs greatly reduced.

Results have been positive with responses so far totalling 28,426 (62 per cent) – a five per cent increase on figures for the same time last year. The number of reminder forms needing to be sent out by the Council has dropped by 2,257.

Of the number responding, 12,338 people have already used telephone, SMS text or internet registration – with the system looking set to smash last year's final total of 13,499.

The Council is offering telephone, SMS text and internet registration, using a two-part security code printed on the top of the form, if people have no changes to make to their details. Those who need to change the information on the form can do so by returning it by post with a signature.

Full instructions to help residents register their information are provided with the registration forms. The new register will be published on 28 November 2008.

However, if responses have still not been received by October, canvassers will have to visit individual households to check information currently held on the electoral register is correct, causing unnecessary expense to the taxpayer.

Sheila Brown, Allerdale Borough Council's Democratic Services manager, said: "Sometimes parents just send the electoral registration forms back without adding their children's names to it because they forget they will have turned 18 by the time of the next election and will be eligible to vote. We're trying to reach out to the next generation of voters through the internet and text messaging to ensure they don't miss out on their right to have a say in democracy.

"However, it is also wrongly assumed that the only reasons for registering are so that

Eyesore Property Action

Allerdale Borough Council has secured a new tool in its bid to tackle the problem of eyesore buildings.

The Council's Executive committee has agreed a recommendation to use empty dwelling management orders under the Housing Act 2004. These orders enable a local authority to "step into the shoes" of the owner of a long-term empty dwelling, to bring it back into occupation, where there is no reasonable prospect that this will occur otherwise. The authority does not compulsorily purchase or take ownership of the property but takes over management, and can arrange refurbishments and let the property to a tenant. The costs of any refurbishment and a management fee will be deducted from the rental income, with the remainder being passed to the owner.

Long-term empty dwellings are a national problem and it is the Government's ambition that no-one should have to live in a neighbourhood scarred by the blight of empty properties. The latest statistics from the Empty Homes Agency for 2007 indicate that there were 279,281 privately owned dwellings in England standing empty for more than six months. A total of 30,021 empty private dwellings were brought into use in 2006-07. In Allerdale there were 831 privately owned dwellings empty for more than six months in 2007 and 25 were brought into use in 2006-07.

ABC has had significant success in persuading owners to bring properties back into use; primarily as an indirect consequence of using legislation to tackle dilapidated and untidy properties. Councillor Margaret Jackson, Deputy Leader of Allerdale Borough Council and with responsibility for Regeneration, said: "Eddie Dawson, a senior technician in the Council's Housing Services unit has taken a lead on this work, using Building Act and planning powers and is hoping that this new legal tool will allow the root cause of the issue to be dealt with directly." There are several exceptions where empty dwelling management orders cannot be used, including, but not limited to: Holiday/second homes

• Where the occupier is temporarily working away from home

• Properties where the previous owner/occupier has died and probate procedures are underway • Properties that are genuinely being sold or marketed for let on realistic terms.

In addition the authority must show that all reasonable efforts to persuade owners to bring their properties back into use have been unsuccessful. Allerdale **Borough Council** already has a short list of properties suitable for empty dwelling management orders and is in the process of preparing cases to proceed.

Cross Solway Swimmer makes Donation to Silloth RNLI

Following his World Record Cross Solway Swim Derek Griffiths and his wife Sharon returned to Silloth to present the RNLI members who accompanied him on the crossing with the sponsorship his swim had raised.

Derek presented a cheque for £284 to Eddie Studholme on behalf of Silloth RNLI.

In the last issue of the Buzz we stated that this was the first officially recorded crossing of the Solway by an unassisted swimmer. We now know that this is not true. A Mr John Humphrey from Preston swam from Newbie, near Annan, to Silloth in September 1931 in a time of 3 hours 23 minutes. So Derek's swim in 3 hours 14 minutes 9.51 seconds is still a World Record.

We are indebted to local sisters Heather and Olive Wood for providing the evidence of the 1931 swim.

They kindly supplied the Buzz with a letter detailing the event which we are pleased to reproduce here.

Point View Silloth 9/9/31 Dear Everybody Many thanks for postcards, we have had the swimmer here since Thursday a John Humphrey from Preston he was a fine big fellow, he was going to try on Friday but it was too rough for him so he decided to have a go on Monday morning from Annan to Silloth. Capt Iddron and a few more went with him in the morning to Annan arriving there about seven.

He entered the water at Newbie at 8.24 arrived here 11.47. Capt said there was about 3000 waiting, the sea wall was packed some of the people made a collection for hím. I thínk he got \mathcal{EF} - 2/6d, Holmes sent hím a cheque for \mathcal{E} 2, I've had no tíme to advertíse the event as he only arríved with the síx train and said he would swím ín the morníng. I got ít put on the píctures and Mason gave ít out off stage but ít was quíte a surpríse to see all the people. I thínk all the old people of Silloth were there. The lady swimmer turned up on Thursday to make arrangements, she told me if the man got across she would not try it, so I expect it's off now. It has caused quite a talk, most of the people followed him along from Skinburness the water was so clear they could see his body and every stroke he made. He was telling me that he had not had such a cold swim before. Kelly's family arrived this morning five of them. The swim I think is in every paper this morning so it is quite a good advert for Silloth. Weather is very fine but the visitors are getting thin. Fondest love to all.

Gardening in Shetland

The Shetland Isles are the most northerly islands in the British Isles, situated where the North Sea meets the Atlantic Ocean at 60 degrees north. They are often confused with the Orkneys which lie much closer to Northern Scotland, Orcadians however are said to be farmers who fish whilst Shetlanders are fishermen who farm. Indeed a visit to Orkney has the feel of Northern Scotland but the Shetland Isles feel different - maybe because of its strong Scandinavian heritage.

Until the early 1970's life was hard in the Shetlands and there was no spare money for such luxuries as plants. Electricity did not arrive on the islands until the 1950's. Most Shetlanders farmed the croft and were self sufficient. They caught fish from the sea and kept sheep for wool and meat. On the croft would be a "plantiecrub" or stone enclosure, which was used to grow veg, mainly brassicas, for winter food. Few species of moths and butterflies survive on the Islands so these crops don't get too nibbled.

With the discovery of oil off the shores of

Shetland, prosperity came to the islands and an influx of new residents saw many new homes built. These new houses tend to have a garden, just as they would on the mainland.

Shetland is often thought of as a bleak place where no trees will grow, but Sycamore trees



are found throughout the islands, also Birch, Alder, Scots Pine and the occasional Horse Chestnut. Where these trees have been planted to provide a shelterbelt from the strong salt laden winds attractive gardens have been created. Hedges are frequently composed of these trees. Other plants for hedges are mainly Rosa rugosa, Fuchsia and Flowering Currant and Potentilla. Within the hedges the plants still need to be tough to withstand the exposure and the acidity of the soil so the range of herbaceous plants grown is fairly limited. They are frequently killed by the cold winds and where they do survive, have stunted growth. Over

wintering is a challenge as glasshouses are not really an option in the strong winds.

However the Shetlands do have relatively mild summers and this together with up to nineteen hours of daylight each day provides the perfect growing conditions for short season plants. Annuals such as Mesimbryanthemum, Lavertera and Poppies thrive in the long days as do bedding plants bought in as young plug plants each year. Gardens, in summer at least, are often a riot of colour.

Wild flowers adorn the crofts and fields with dandelion like hawkbit and yellow flag iris seeming to be just about everywhere. Celandine, Tormentil and Silver weed are the more common yellow flowers, but fox and cubs, geums, red campion, heathers, orchids, ragged robin, cranesbills, gentians, meadowsweet, daisies and sneezewort complete the colour spectrum.

Enjoy your gardening, it could be worse!
