

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Strictly Come Blind Dancing for Everyone

From the foxtrot to the jive and the waltz, Britain has gone dance crazy in recent years, thanks to Sir Bruce Forsyth and Strictly.

Of course, ballroom dancing has been popular for decades and not just for its visual appeal.

Susan Thorogood is testament to this. She is registered blind and has been putting on her dance shoes for over 60 years. Now the nimble toed pensioner is doing as much as Brucy to get people dancing in Cumbria.

Susan, who has the eye condition Retinitis Pigmentosa, [RP], lives in Skinburness near Wigton. She and dance partner / husband Gerry support dancing events in north Cumbria and organise their own dance evenings for beginners and improvers, encouraging residents to ballroom dance.

The couple move effortlessly together across the floor, but they have had to learn steps in a very different way. Gerry has been able to watch and learn but Susan, without the benefit of sight, must learn through verbal instructions. I certainly know my left from my right, she jokes.

I must memorise the steps and learn Gerrys' steps too. When we are ready, it is like I am re~programmed, ready to dance and keep Gerry on his toes too. The couple love to share their love of dancing with others.

In 2011 Action for

Blind People in Carlisle trained Susan to touch type on her specially adapted computer equipped with voice recognition software. It reads what's on the screen. The training was invaluable, enthuses Susan. Now, sight loss is not a problem when it comes to promoting our dance evenings. I type the words for our posters, with the computer reading back what I have written. Gerry then does the design. We are the perfect team, both on and off the dance floor. Susan is supporting a campaign by Action for Blind People, showing that with the right support, sight loss should not be a barrier to achieving ambitions and career goals.

She says "My passion has always been ballroom. I have always had limited vision but I was learning to dance by the age of three. As my eyesight deteriorated further, I have never thought about giving up this wonderful hobby. In fact, I am learning new routines such as the Argentine tango. Being registered blind will never stop me dancing, losing your sight should not prevent anyone from continuing to strive for success, regardless of their goal. I am delighted to support this message from Action for Blind People.

Our dance evenings restart on 11th January at Mawbray village hall from 7:30pm to 9:30pm for beginners and improvers."

Free Energy Survey

Residents of Allerdale are being offered a free home energy survey to help them understand what they can do to have a warmer home this winter.

Allerdale Borough Council, in partnership with the Cumbria Affordable Warmth Partnership and e.on, is offering residents an energy survey of their property, with a follow-up report that will identify opportunities in the home that may help them save money. Residents will be given advice about how to insulate their home and how to improve their heating, along with details of renewable energy options that may be suitable for their property.



When the survey report is complete, the homeowner will be provided with a noobligation written quotation for the energy-saving measures for their home. In all cases, the survey will ensure that householders are given access to any free and discounted schemes that will help insulate their homes and in many cases, for those who are in receipt of benefits, such as pension credit, the works will be free of charge.

Residents in Wigton have had information packs, inviting them to take part in the project, closely followed by other areas of Allerdale.

Councillor Carni McCarron-Holmes, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive member with

said: "The Council is encouraging residents to take up this offer. In particular, we wish to see the homes of those on low incomes, elderly residents, or those with cold related illness and other vulnerable groups, having a survey that could result in helping them keep warm and save money on energy bills this winter."

Project workers will be clearly visible wearing high visibility jackets that will show the Allerdale Borough Council, Cumbria Warm Homes and contractors logos; they will also carry identification cards relating to the project. Mobile Phones

Anyone caught using their mobile phone whilst driving now receives three penalty points on their license and a £60 fine.

This new legislation meant that if the case goes to Court the fine could increase to £1,000 or £2,500 for drivers of vans, lorries and coaches. Effectively this means drivers can now end up losing their license for using their mobile while driving.

You don't have to be caught many times to be disqualified. If you get just six points in the first two years after passing your test, you will lose your license under the New Drivers Act.

You can also be prosecuted for using a hands free mobile phone if you are not in proper control of your vehicle. The penalties will be the same as for using a hand-held phone. If the driving is deemed careless or dangerous, as a result, of using the phone, they could

be disqualified, face a large fine and up to two years in prison.

- When driving you should use voicemail, a message service or call diversion so you can pick up messages later.
- Only use your phone after you have stopped in a safe place. But never stop on the hard shoulder of a motorway except in an emergency.
- Avoid taking calls even on a hands-free phone while driving. They can be just as distracting. If you must answer, say you're driving and end the conversation. Otherwise, you will put yourself and other road users

at risk. • If you make a call to

someone and realize they are driving, stop the call and arrange to speak to them

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

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Winter Warmth Fund

Cumbria Community Foundation's Winter Warmth Fund has now raised £20,650 in the first month of the appeal doubling last year's winter total.

As quickly as the Winter Fuel Payments are landing in homes around the county, Cumbrian's are handing over all or some of their money from the Government to help others in need. And the charity is hoping to bid for another £180,000 funding from the Department of Health's Warm Homes Healthy People Fund - a £20 million pot which will be given to fund revenue projects which help vulnerable people.

Andy Beeforth, Director of Cumbria Community Foundation, was part of a delegation that met Health Secretary Andrew Lansley to discuss how to help older people suffering because of the cold.

Andy said: "We're currently pulling together a bid for some of this new pot of cash with support from Cumbria County Council, NHS Cumbria and a number of other voluntary and statutory organisations. The Warm Homes Healthy People Fund is aimed at providing support to vulnerable people where support from existing schemes is not getting through or not getting through quickly enough. The money can only be used for specific revenue projects that don't overlap with the existing Warm Front project, like refurbishing boilers, social housing, low energy lighting repairs, maintenance, like for like replacement and emergency repairs to heating systems."

With the snow falling across the county, Cumbria's Lord Lieutenant James Cropper is urging people to consider whether they can help other Cumbrian's in need in these financially challenging times.

James Cropper said: 'We've all noticed how much colder it feels this week with the arrival of the snow. Even though temperatures are not really falling below zero yet, the winds are really biting and many older people are starting to suffer. Every

penny donated to the Winter Warmth Fund will go to help older, colder Cumbrian's in need, if you can afford to donate, please do."

Everyone over the age of 60 is automatically entitled to the Government's Winter Fuel Payment and for many people this is vital. While noone wants to see the end of this universal benefit, some people can manage without it and are putting it to good

The Winter Warmth Fund works by collecting donations of Winter Fuel Payments and redistributing to elderly people in need through a grants programme.

Andy concluded: "All the money raised is used to provide support to elderly people who are suffering because of fuel poverty. It is directed at those most in need through voluntary and community groups in Cumbria who are supporting vulnerable older people."

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Silloth Airfield Memorial Unveiled

Six former airfields in Cumbria have been commemorated with granite memorials.

The Airfields of Britain Conservation Trust (ABCT) said the monuments would acknowledge the locations as heritage sites and highlight their contribution to our freedom.

A 4ft (1.2m) high memorial was unveiled at Windermere earlier and others have been unveiled in Hutton-in-the-Forest, Kingstown, Brayton as well as Silloth. The simple grey inscribed stones are funded by private donations. About 1,300 will eventually be installed around the UK.

Established in 2006, the Trust aims to erect a memorial at each known disused airfield site in Britain in order to provide a permanent reminder for future generations.

Kenneth Bannerman, who founded the charity, said: "Cumbria is steeped in aviation history. These airfields played a crucial role not only in World War Two but Windermere's original airfield also pioneered the start of seaplane flying in Britain. ABCT wants to make sure these places, and the people who served there, are not forgotten."

Silloth AirfieldAs the possibility of war

Wi (Ei)

approached, the urgent need for Aircraft Storage Units further north in Britain saw Silloth open in June 1939 for immediate use by No 22 Maintenance Unit, after the possession by agreement of 460 acres of land was obtained in April 1938. Long-term benefits arose as a new wharf had to be built at the town's docks in order to handle the huge amounts of construction materials required for this airfield and also Kirkbride,

Despite its obvious role as a place for aircraft storage and preparation, with a vast variety of aircraft designs passing through for many years afterwards, in World War Two Silloth was also deemed a most important Coastal Command training base with the increasing threat from German U-boats. An early resident was renamed as No 1 (Coastal) Operational Training Unit in April

with which Silloth shared a

broadly similar career.

1940 and employed many examples of the Lockheed Hudson, which to this day still remains the best known aircraft associated with Silloth, not least as the adjacent part of the Solway Firth became known as 'Hudson Bay' because so many Hudsons had to ditch there due to the overall rigours of wartime duties. Wellingtons of No 6 OTU subsequently appeared from Thornaby, switching bases with its predecessor in March 1943 and continuing

with general reconnaissance instruction – notably including use of the Leigh Light illumination device to search for U-boats - for Coastal Command crews until leaving for Kinloss in July 1945.

For the next 15 years Silloth saw No 22 MU hold sway at military level, still carrying on in its original role, although peacetime

resulted in far greater numbers of aircraft now being scrapped as well as stored. However, both the MU and Silloth closed on the last day of 1960, though aviation activity did not end at this time as steel companyrelated civil aircraft continued to land at this now private unlicensed site until into the 1970's.

Ships that sail from Silloth "to sea for orders" do not have a planned or confirmed next port of call. The ship's owner or operator will direct the vessel out of the Solway Firth to then head either north or south at an economical speed, towards an area where they assess that the most likely cargo opportunity may arise. Most vessels head south, to be available to pick up a cargo either from one of the Irish Sea ports in passing, or from one of the many English or European ports, once they are near or into the English Channel.



This practice for acquiring cargoes is quite normal for coastal shipping, but used to be a common practice in world trade as well and was known as "tramping".

Perhaps the greatest person who possibly said the least, was my dear mother. 'What a warrior'. Perhaps she didn't wear the type of battle dress that we were given to wear but what ever it was, she certainly set us our example and I certainly know where she is enjoying her reward. In our nation we have great great warrior mothers 'Boedicas' of many many numbers and I thank my god for every blessed one of them. They have hearts of LOVE who gave without a murmur just what they were able to do. When they wept they cried to our God for our nation and for their sons and their daughters. If the Hitlers and Mussolini's could get a glimpse of these princely ladies there would be no need for this great game of war, which their so foolish endeavours have taken them into. "O Foolish men".

So now I speak from a close encounter which happened to involve my own life. I know that there were many of various incidents in the build up to the seeking out the enemy in my war. Sometimes I wish had never come into my war. It says you always hurt the one you love, the one you would not hurt at all, so it happened to me in that way. When very young I took the advice of school friends who said it won't hurt you Arthur, how wrong they were. In my old age I still have regrets about that one particular incident.

In one incident a civilian woman approached me looking for what I thought was her bambino, her baby. So I said if I saw anything of her baby I would certainly let her know. I saw a young man who was lying with a head injury, so I called upon the lady who was still looking for what I thought was her baby and said "do you know who this young man is?" The expression on her face was wonderful to remember and behold, "my bambino" she cried. I often wondered how the young Italian lad fared. The lady

would be his gran no doubt. We are like ships who pass in

the night.

Another incident happened to me whilst I was in a position near the Florence Railway Station, again another Italian lady came to me crying "Bomba" and so I said to her, show me, come, so I followed her to her bungalow on the hillside on the outskirts of Florence. I was certainly in for a surprise, she took me in through her back yard and there in a most glaring position was an eighty mm shell in all its pristine glory and she wanted me to do something about it. What could I do? What would you have done? I didn't know if it was about to blow up in my face but anyway I climbed up to the shell, lifted it off her roof and carried it to the safest piece of ground I could possibly find and there I dumped it. True or false that is the burning question. My life put on the line for a Florentine bungalow.

Now we have the Gothic Line to fight for after that. Where would you go with me? On a fighting patrol armed to the teeth with an Italian guide as our leader and we out searching for the enemy. Guess what a surprise, the only soldiers we met were of our own army. They were the glorious 'Gurkhas' so we retired for

2012 the Mawbray Entertainers will be following the yellow brick road to Culterham Hall in Mawbray.



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
On the 26th of November Silloth AFC held a fund-raising evening in the Rugby Club with entertainment provided by the Carlos Experience.

November was a mixed month for the Seagulls as they crashed out of two cups, but went 5 points clear at the top of Tesco Division One thanks to a couple of superb wins in the league.

The Seagulls are out of the JJ Club (Workington) Whitehaven Cup despite putting on a superb performance against reigning Premier League champions Netherhall.

Silloth made an overly cautious start to the game and only had a handful of counter-attacks to show for their first half efforts. Defensively the Seagulls were rock solid (limiting the opposition to only a couple of half chances) so it was disappointing when a goal direct from a free kick left them 1-0 down at the break.
