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What's the Big Secret?

It has been reported to the Buzz that for several months now it appears that Silloth Town Council and all the Parish Councils have been considering the implications of Silloth being one of the two most likely sites for the Nuclear Repository!

This has been done in camera, behind closed doors. Are they in favour, or are they against? Nobody knows. Why the secrecy?

The West Cumbria Managing Radioactive Waste Safely (MRWS) so-called consultation process has now homed in on two proposed areas for the repository, based on geological criteria. These are: The Mercia Mudstone Group (MMG) of northern Allerdale. The Eskdale/Ennerdale granite in Copeland.

Professor David Smythe [Emeritus Professor of Geophysics, University of Glasgow] has demonstrated to MRWS that both these rock groups are unsuitable, but his arguments have not been considered properly. The red outline shows the area within which the repository would be sited within the MMG, which is found near the surface below glacial rocks. The outline is demarcated by the British Geological Survey (BGS) exclusion zones to the east and west. These zones are excluded because there is future potential for coal or coal-bed methane. To the north it is bounded by the coast, and to the south because the layer is too shallow. The underground workings will require about 20 sq km, just over half of the 39 sq km of the red outline. The grid squares on the map are 1 km by 1 km. There is thus little or no leeway for lateral movement. They have to be sited in the middle, below Parkhouse and Blackdyke. Residents will not, of course, see the workings, but will see three main features: 'Temporary' (for 50 years or so) installations including multiple vertical shafts and a railhead, over the centre of the red outline. The spoil will come up these shafts. This surface installation will require 0.5 - 1 sq km. Adjacent piles of spoil - around



The whole area could be under 5m (16ft) of waste

15 million cubic metres, equivalent to six pyramids of Cheops in volume. If these are dumped locally in 'bunds' (flat-topped heaps) 5 m high, they will require around $4 \operatorname{sq} \operatorname{km} (= 400 \operatorname{Ha} =$ 1,000 acres). Spoil from the MMG has no commercial value (unlike granite), and cannot be used for anything. The heaps will be highly porous, so there will be a major engineering problem in isolating them from the surface and underground water. The MMG is very high in chromium, a toxic (carcinogenic) metal, which might pose a threat.

There will be a separate permanent installation to the south (i.e. for 150-250 years), within the blue outline, where the entrances to sloping tunnels would be sited. These have to be on the higher ground, maybe 5 km away from the centre of the underground repository, because of the threat of sea level rise in the next century or so. This installation does not have to be confined by the BGS exclusion zone. Again, it will require 0.5 to 1 sq km of land. In short, the region would be converted into a very large mine working such as one sees in South Africa or Zambia. Allerdale councillors might be unselfishly proposing this area on your behalf in the national interest - but not

so, because the MMG is a very poor kind of clay rock, which does not match up to the excellent clay sites being developed now in France or Switzerland. It will leak radioactive contamination within a short time. So your councillors are not doing the country any favour, by such a 'sacrifice'. On the contrary, the best clay rocks are to be found in eastern and southern England, which is where investigations should be focussed.


Solway Plain Artists Working on 2013 Display

Foul Dog Owners

Allerdale Borough Council is promoting responsible pet ownership by tackling irresponsible dog owners who do not clean up after their dogs have fouled.

The Council's crackdown on dog fouling has been continuing and is showing success. The number of deposits of dog fouling is showing a steady decline from over 800 per week at the start of the campaign to under 400 last week. Over the last three months 39 Fixed Penalty Notices have been issued, 26 of which have been for dog fouling.

RNLI urges beach-goers to think safety when heading to the seaside this summer.

With school summer holidays upon us and the weather forecast set to improve, the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) is calling on anyone planning a beach visit to put safety first.

Last year, RNLI lifeguards responded to 15,625 incidents, helped 17,671 people and saved 84 lives on some of the UK's busiest beaches, while the charity's volunteer lifeboat crews launched to 2,814 beach-related incidents, rescuing 1,300 people and saving 171 lives.

The charity is encouraging anyone planning a trip to the beach – but particularly families and those with young children - to make safety a priority. Last year, children accounted for nearly two-thirds (61%) of incidents RNLI lifeguards dealt with.

Surf sports (including surfing, bodyboarding, kitesurfing and windsurfing), swimming, inflatable toys and coastal walking are consistently among the top

activities requiring lifeguard assistance and beach-related lifeboat launches.

To help people remember their seaside trips for the right reasons, the RNLI is offering the following top five beach safety tips: 1. Swim at a lifeguarded beach, between the red and yellow flags (none in Cumbria)

2. Never use inflatables in strong winds or rough seas 3. Check weather and tide times before you go 4. If you get into trouble, stick your hand in the air and shout for help 5. If you see someone else

in trouble, tell a lifeguard. If you can't see a lifeguard, call 999 or 112 and ask for the Coastguard.

Stay Safe at the Seaside

In an innovative approach to saving lives at sea, the charity has launched a new 'beach finder' mobile app to make it easy for anyone heading to the seaside find their nearest lifeguarded beach.


'The 'RNLI beach finder' app locates the user's position and then lists the nearest lifeguarded beaches, as well as providing important information such as water quality (provided by the Marine Conservation Society); a description of the beach; the lifeguards' patrol dates and times, and hazard information specific to each beach, such as whether it has big waves, strong winds, tidal cut off points or rip currents. Users can also plan their trip to the beach by typing a postcode or town into the app's search function to find lifeguarded beaches in that

Real-time weather information and a five-day forecast for each location is also included with the app ideal for anyone wondering whether they'll need to bring out their sun cream or

waterproofs! Ross MacLeod, RNLI Beach Safety Programmes Manager, says: 'With the school holidays just starting, and the weather set to get better, it's likely people will want to make the most of it and head to the beach. The RNLI's advice is to choose a lifeguarded beach and swim between the red and yellow flags, which is the area most closely monitored by the lifeguards. For anyone who can't get to a lifeguarded beach, there are some straightforward steps they can take to help keep themselves out of danger. They can find out about their chosen beach before they visit, check the weather and tide times, and follow the advice shown on safety signs at the beach entrance. By following this basic advice, we hope people will have a great time but stay safe as well?

The RNLI's has two beach safety guides which are available free-of-charge. The first, On The Beach, is aimed at families and is packed full of top tips on how to stay safe at the beach, as well as ideas for games to play on the beach. The second, In The Surf, includes vital safety and kit information for popular surf sports. Both guides are available from beachsafety@ rnli.org.uk or by calling 0800 328 0600.

Volunteering is Good for You!

Following a recent survey of our volunteers we are really pleased to share the news that volunteering with West Cumbria Carers has a lot of benefits for the volunteer as well as the Carers we support. Our volunteers tell us they gain a great deal of satisfaction from knowing they are making a difference and say there are many other benefits such as a boost to their self esteem from feeling useful, learning new skills and enjoying chatting with someone new as well as improving their CV.

Being a carer can have a significant impact on an individual's life. The caring role is often the main responsibility of only one person, and many carers say they are forced to ignore their own health or are unable to take breaks or attend appointments because of a lack of alternative care.



Carers have told us how valuable volunteers are to them, saying it would be extremely difficult to cope without the support provided. Volunteers are able to provide respite breaks, emotional and practical support, reducing stress and feelings of isolation for the Carers.

A carer's main concern is the person they care for, and as a result carers generally tend to place their own needs at the bottom of their priority lists. However, it is vital that carers take care of themselves in order to maintain their own physical, emotional and mental health, thus enabling them to continue in their caring role. Encouraging and

enabling Carers to take respite breaks or to have one-to-one support from a trained volunteer can help to minimise adverse effects on their own long term physical and mental health. Our Volunteers fulfil a

number of roles to achieve this:



Respite Sitters regularly visit and sit with the cared for (provided there are no practical care needs), enabling the Carer to have a valuable break, with peace of mind that the person they care for is safely looked after. Carer Supporters will

due to their caring role they have become socially isolated or lost their social support networks. The volunteer will have a chat and provide support, or assist with reentering the community and becoming socially active again.

Drivers can help alleviate transport difficulties and are often needed to help with attending events, support groups or essential appointments.

Counsellors provide oneto-one counselling support to Carers who feel themselves in need of this specialist form of therapy as a result of their caring role.

West Cumbria Carers covers West Cumbria (incorporating the districts of Allerdale and Copeland) and our aim is to provide support to carers who look after a family member, relative, friend or neighbour who could not manage without their help. This could be due to age, physical or mental illness, disability or addiction.

Volunteers are an essential and valued part of

our services for carers and we like to ensure volunteers enjoy their activities and are fully supported within their volunteering role. 

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Poem

For the last few years my grandmother has lived with the care and thoughtfulness of Silloth Nurshing Home. I always felt that when I left her after visiting I left her with what felt like family and cannot begin to thank the Matron, nurses and staff enough.

I wrote this poem last year when she had a bad turn. I spent a long time walking in the dunes and marshes, thinking about passing over from one side of the waters to the other. She stayed with us another year and passed away peacefully recently with family around her.

The Solway Boat by Marie-Elsa Bragg

Steady, the small boat rested while silver winds slithered and moaned through the marsh, carrying the bottle neck slippery slank Waver over, under, through the weave of strong bent reeds; ablaze with dank flippering tails.

Steady, the silent thick oak hull lifted, peacefully creaking in surrender to the sea, absolving now here, now there, the slick slack lashes of speckled grasses and splayed branched bur reeds. The bambooed yellow iris stems creaking with whippet yelps, and the hiss of the pestilent wind, shivering across its obedient burnished flanks

And how long, how seasoned long had its old boughs anchored there. How long, its tipping weight etched into sweet grass and threaded summer nesting; its rusted links knitting into Solway through layers of floods and blood brown maltern mulch; down and bound with grittled sands and shafts of old black oak. And who heard the silver moan, the wind across the outstretched hull. Stippling its taught sides, veined in netted wires of silt. Veins answering the ground, the sunken fissures lying hidden under the upper swaddle of matted moss and water mint. Where clotted sap bleeds through secret saline estuaries back, back, to the Solway and out into the sea.

Grandmother, my grandmother I am here with you. I breathe and watch you. I sit with you and your silk skinned hands. I sit while you rest in a warm metal bed. And now it moves, strong and steady pressing you forward. Slanting you towards the window. Here, here, the morning comes. Here the morning comes, my Grandmother, and the light.

I want my breath to move your lungs. To take the weight. You would ask these pillowed bones to move with a click of that red switch, if you were able to see this room is your final home. But life has become scattered. So others switch it for you, admiring your smile as they do. Your soft downed legs rest, sunken into nested warmth. You sigh. Pleased to have company, and find delight in small things to lift their spirits. I know that delight my Grandmother. It lit me through darken days and lifted my tip toes to walk with you. Todle-uma-luma. Klick clack of your heals. Toodle-uma-luma, toodle-i-ay. Can I wear those shoes down street Grandma, the shiny patent ones, scraping heels with a trrum trrum, as my little feet slip in the toes on a spring day. Or is it cold. Shall I dress up warm Grandma. Can I come into your bed in the morning, if I keep my legs still. Can I sit and watch wild horses by the gas fire, bulging red down one side, while you wash the kitchen floor. Can I, before I go to the baths. Will you walk pigeons with my feet on yours and hum.

Todle-uma-luma, let it pitter patter, don't mind the rain. Let us join together, always be together, cheerful again. Cheerful as the day is long, and breaks are filled with a good crack between well mannered, long houred, head down hard work.

'Not a bad day today' Stacy says hanging on 'bad' with tones of uncertainty, knowing you like to see where you are with the weather, to know where you are with your day.

'Not a bad day today' you answer, ' Might get better later'. 'Well' Stacy leans into the comfort of a pleasant chat, holding back the curtain. 'I rather think it'll rain Ethel, I'm not so sure about them clouds

You peer out and see nothing but light. Is there a tree there, or an old school. Its wide. 'Not sure about the clouds' you repeat and lean back tutting. 'I think I'll have a quiet day today'

Stacy smiles 'I would. I wouldn't go out in that If I didn't have to! 'Well I won't then' you say glad of the choice and decision made with friends. 'We'll just stay nice and warm together won't we' 'Aye, better warm.'

And now someone comes in to ask if you would like a cup of tea but you don't hear properly and turn your ear towards the door. Stacy repeats it slowly with a raised voice 'Would you like a cup of tea Ethel?

One; your gaze skates hope with open eyes. Two asks: are you my daughter? And it lands. 'Oh! A cup of tea' you laugh 'dear me, it's terrible isn't it!' and you call out your quick answer as if your piled in the room with others, sitting legs dangling, all calling out cheerfully to someone with a list. 'Yes please!'

Stacy is following the duvet round the bed now and tucks you in. 'Oh, thank you. Very good' you say with reassurance, tucking in your courage, sensing she is about to go.

Tll pop in again later' she says as she turns towards the door, and you obediently accept her promise to return soon. Promises which disappear in all but scent as soon as she has left sight.

The light draws you to the window again. Your lap is covered with a red tartan blanket, bought down street in the market Hall. You lightly shake your head. 'Beautiful day' I hear you sing. 'Is there a tree out here? I do love trees. There is something special about a tree'. And the wind blows across the grasses, mounted in clusters on knolls of sand. They glitter along the matted ledge, with that bright sky behind. They glitter and wave. And you; you're smiling. Overseeing children at play in the dunes, and behind you is the sound of brass, warbling through 'Lord of all hopefulness' from the band stand in the distance.


A gentle breeze through summer leaves, a swallow's secret to your ear. A sloe slip, beaded lip of Amphetrisia. The tide frithles across the sands, scattering its bulbous froth like sherbet. It's here. The small boat is here.

Blow into the summer light, climb through tails of beaded grass, of mossy dunes, of burnet rose. The Solway boat is on the shore, the silver boat is here.

Bright, it reaches to your hand, no, no, it's gentle to your hand, and you will rise, yes, you will seep through lady's straw and ruffled thrift, glowing through the light of night into the waiting boat.

And how it glides through streaks of night, the distant toll of bell at sea, its cheeks of threaded amber veins, it's bark a hull of breathing gills and with its flanks it breaths a name that only spittled waves can hear.

And now the distant rocking stills, the sail a line in open dawn. And there beneath the summer sun, they welcome on the shore. 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

On the Water Front

Navigation to and from Silloth, through the gradually shifting channels of the Solway Firth, would be foolhardy and dangerous without accurately knowing the position of your vessel. Running aground on a sandbank, or striking one or more of the numerous exposed boulders that are scattered around the Solway seabed, can damage the vessel and possibly cause pollution of the tidal waters. Part of the practice of fixing the vessel's position at frequent intervals, has traditionally been achieved by following a surveyed channel, which has been marked to some extent by navigation buoys.



also undertakes surveys of most of the waters around the UK, except waters that are privately owned or pilotage waters that form a part of a port's approaches, for which the port takes responsibility. However, the relatively quiet and shallower waters of the Solway Firth are not considered busy enough for regular surveys to be undertaken by the Admiralty. In fact, on Admiralty charts for many years now, a vast area of the Solway is shown blank and "unsurveyed". Areas of the upper Solway Firth that have occasionally been surveyed, soon become out of date due to channel movements, almost before the Admiralty chart amendment is finally produced. Consequently, finding and marking a navigable channel to Silloth is the responsibility of the Silloth Harbour Master, in consultation with the Silloth Pilots. In finding the channel, he is now assisted by a Hydrographer from the port of Barrow.

(Barrow & Silloth are jointly managed as a single unit within the parent company, Associated British Ports). This assistance is usually provided on an annual basis, or whenever it has been noticed by Silloth Pilots, or other interested mariners, that depths anywhere within the channel have become significantly reduced. The Hydrographer will spend several hours in a small boat, when tidal conditions permit, criss-crossing the area of concern with a GPS receiver and echo sounder, noting positions and depths, whilst taking into account

the tidal height at the time, in order to find the location of the deepest available route through the shallows, the most difficult area of which is a three mile section off Dubmill Point. A local chart of the latest channel will then be produced for the use of pilots and other interested mariners. As the channel moves, the navigation buoys may no longer mark the best available water, but they





New Food Hygiene System

Allerdale businesses are scoring well under the new national food premises rating scheme.

Many people may not be aware that it is the Council's responsibility to help businesses provide safe food to people when they go out to eat or when they are just buying food. The operation of the new scheme does create additional work for the Council's staff but it is worth it because of the benefits to the public."

The food hygiene rating scheme is run by local authorities in partnership with the Food Standards Agency. Each food business is given a food hygiene rating on a scale from 0 to 5 when it is inspected by a council food safety officer. The top rating is '5', which means the hygiene standards are very good. The bottom is '0,' which indicates urgent improvement is required.






Sea Fury over Silloth Again




