Allerdale BC is now CardiacSmart



Allerdale Borough Council is the only local authority in the country to have received a national lifesavers award.

Ten employees and councillors have made Allerdale a safer place by becoming CardiacSmart giving them all the potential to save a life. The Council had to fulfil a series of criteria to gain its silver CardiacSmart award from the North West Ambulance Service NHS Trust (NWAS). The aim of the CardiacSmart award is to recognise local authorities, businesses and community groups for their dedication to raising awareness of heart health, basic life support and defibrillators.

Allerdale Councillor Nicky Cockburn who is also a first responder initiated the process and helped get Allerdale the defibrillator which could one day save a life.

The CardiacSmart initiative works to extend the blanket coverage of public access Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) and provide more individuals with training in basic life support in order to improve a cardiac arrest victim's chance of survival.

Corporate Health and Safety Officer, Barry Chambers, said: "This is a great achievement for us and we are taking positive steps in making Allerdale Borough Council a safer place to work and visit. The training, which included CPR and operating a defibrillator, was provided for free by the North West Ambulance Service together with information and support on how to become CardiacSmart. It's helped us to make a difference and maybe save a life."

Councillor Philip Tibble, Executive Member, added: "It's fantastic that the Council has been awarded this accreditation. As an ambulance driver myself I know how imperative it is to act quickly at an individuals time of need. By installing a defibrillator and providing staff with emergency life support training is a positive and simple action to take and will make the difference in saving a person's life."

Around 30,000 people suffer a cardiac arrest outside of hospital each year, and with every minute a person does not receive treatment their chance of survival decreases by 10%. Cardiac arrest is the most extreme

case of an emergency, as the patient loses consciousness at once and there are no signs of life. Defibrillators give an electric shock through the chest wall and help to restore a normal heartbeat. No one knows who will suffer from cardiac arrest, but what is known is that the speed of response, Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and defibrillation within the first few minutes will improve the patient's chance of survival and recovery.

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Railway Weekend

The Cumbrian Railways Association is organising a major Educational event looking at the History of Railways in Carlisle over the weekend of 11-13 October 2013.


The event starts on the Friday afternoon with visits 'behind the scenes' to see items of railway interest not normally available to the public at Tullie House, Carlisle Library and the County Archive Centre. In the evening the two local model railway clubs, Border Railway Society and Carlisle and District 'O' Gauge Group (CDOGG), will be opening their doors to welcome visitors.

The major event of the weekend is a full day Conference being held in the Hallmark Hotel. With doors opening at 10am for coffee. A formal welcome to the Great Border City will be made by the Mayor of Carlisle, Ray Bloxham. The first speaker of the day will be Eric Martlew, a former Labour MP for Carlisle, who during his time served on the Parliamentary Transport Group and campaigned hard for the upgrading of the West Coast mainline. Bill Fawcett will outline the coming of the very first railway to arrive in Carlisle from Newcastle. Peter W Robinson will explain how the present Citadel station came about and how the different railway companies were involved. Roger Pigeon covers the three Scottish companies that had lines into Carlisle. The Midland Railway arrived in Carlisle and had a big impact which will be explained by David Joy. Finally Allan McLean will talk about the

McLean will talk about the Railway Races to Scotland which still do impact on the City! To end the day a dinner


On 11th June Brenda Dowdell from Skinburness Road held a Strawberry Tea in aid of Breast Cancer Awareness.

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Training on the Mersey



Cumbria's apprentice firefighters took to the River Mersey to get a taste of carrying out water rescues.

The eight apprentices, who are undertaking two-year advanced apprenticeships in emergency fire service operations, paid a visit to Merseyside Fire and Rescue Service (MFRS) last week.

They attended MFRS's water rescue unit, based near the Liver building on the River Mersey, where they went out on the water in Fire and Rescue Service dinghies and were briefed about casualty rescue techniques.

Earlier in the day the

apprentices visited MFRS's training academy and were introduced to various pieces of equipment including a hovercraft and rescue dogs.

During their twoyear apprenticeship the apprentices are undertaking the same training as full time firefighters and the Service is committed to qualifying the eight for a Firefighting Diploma and BTEC.

The apprentices, who come from around the county, began their roles last September and are experiencing a wide range of duties across Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service.

Barrow Station Manager

Jon Griffiths, who is running the apprentice scheme for Cumbria, said: "Going to Merseyside was a good opportunity for the apprentices to learn about water-based rescue and see how another Fire and Rescue Service operates. The day was a valuable experience and one that will serve them well as they move forward with the apprenticeships and securing qualifications."

Video footage from the day, including the time spent on the Mersey, and interviews with the apprentices about the experience will be uploaded to the county council's website.

Quilt for Oz



campaign, The RSPB has come up with a list of loads of different things you can do in your garden to help wildlife.

If you are feeling lazy, then why not give your mower a rest and leave an area of your lawn to grow wild. This will provide homes for lots of bugs and minibeasts, which in turn are great food for birds. Making logs piles and growing flowering plants are also easy ways to attract insects like bees, while the more adventurous of you might want to dig a pond or build a home for swifts, house martins or bats.

The theme to my work revolves around people enjoying the landscape. Time spent in the lakes and along the west coast can be both relaxing and invigorating. The moodiest and most daunting of landscapes often leave the most positive impression. My favourite artworks and pieces of music nearly always have something inspiring and uplifting about them. It is this feeling of elevation that I try to bring to my landscapes.

I paint in oils on canvas. I make a point of making my paintings affordable. Partly because I think every home should be able to have something of original craftsmanship within it even in this age of austerity.

Council's Fire and Rescue Service is looking to recruit new members to its firefighting team in Silloth.

To be in with a chance of getting the job potential recruits must be able to attend a two-hour training session at the station each week and be able to get to the



to attend emergency calls, either from home or work.

The service is looking for males and females from all different backgrounds, who are fit and healthy, up for a challenge and prepared to commit to the role.

These are not volunteer roles. The pay scales for an on-call firefighter

are: • A retainer of £2,115 - £2,821 dependant on the cover provided · An hourly rate of £12.88 when competent in your role • An on-call firefighter can

earn up to around £6,000 a year To apply people will need to complete

an application form; carry out a number of tests which are recognised nationally, have an interview and then have a medical check.

Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service is looking to recruit 26 new on-call firefighters across the county including two in Workington, two in Coniston, two in Milnthorpe and one each in Silloth, Aspatria and Staveley.

A series of open days are being held so people interested in becoming an on-call firefighter can visit their local station to chat to the crews and find out more about what this lifesaving role entails.





New Community Garden on the Green

Morning and afternoon workshops were held in Silloth's Community Technology College on Sunday 14th July. This was so that the community in Silloth could have an opportunity to say what they would like in the new community garden, due to be built by volunteers on the corner of Criffel Street and Lawn Terrace. The overall aim of the project is to encourage the local community to produce their own ideas for the design, planting and interpretation of heritage; and also to consider, along with the Steering Group, the long term sustainability and care of the Community Garden. Key objectives are: "to develop a garden for the community to own, relax in and enjoy; for nature studies, education and conservation; and to reflect on aspects of the Green's rich heritage."

A number of very creative and interesting ideas emerged from the children during the morning workshop session. Adults then built on these suggestions and added a few more ideas during the afternoon session. Final suggestions were summarised and scribed by Jennifer Rowlands, who had been brought in as the main facilitator for the day.

The garden designers from Moota have now taken all the suggestions away and will incorporate them into a first draft design. The Community Garden Steering Group will then look the plans over (around the end of August), and either OK them or make additional suggestions. Moota will then produce the final design.

The next stage will be to find artists and creatives who can carry forward the interpretation aspects of the garden. It will also be necessary to arrange tenders for landscaping and plants.

Anna Malina will be updating the Council and submitting periodic reports to HLF, who will then, hopefully, release funds to continue with the landscape development followed



by planting in the Spring of 2014. Friends of the Green and Anna will also be keeping the community updated about progress via the Silloth Green website and the Silloth Green Facebook page.

Many thanks to all who

came along and all those who lent their support to the children. We had a great day and await with excitement the design plans from Moota. When finalised, the design plans will be available on this website, in the Community Engagement Officer's room in the Community Hall on Petteril Street, and in the Community College.

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On the Water Front

In the April 2013 'Waterfront' article, I covered the original opening of Carrs Flour Mill at Silloth in 1887, the Jubilee year of Queen Victoria. The mill continued to run without interruption until August 1904, producing up to 16 sacks of flour per hour. It was in the August of 1904 that mill production was cut back, to allow major modifications to the mill buildings and milling machinery, which would increase production to 30 sacks per hour. The new, modern milling machinery was built and installed by Messrs Henry Simon Ltd of Manchester. The same firm also built and equipped a new 125 feet tall storage silo, with a capacity of 140,000 bushels of wheat, increasing the total grain storage capacity of the mill to 222,000 bushels of wheat and other cereals, including maize, barley, beans, oats and rye. (A bushel in those days was a unit of volume equivalent to 8 gallons / 36.4 litres). A new 700 HP Carel-Freres condensing steam engine was installed for driving all the milling machinery, with boilers built by Messrs Babcock & Wilcox Ltd.

This new engine, or prime mover, was built by the reputable company, Carel-Freres, in their factory at Ghent, in Belgium, and transported directly to Silloth by sea, where it was reassembled within the modified and enlarged mill buildings. Very few of this type of prime-mover were to be found in the UK, this ossibly being the first. Consequentially it was given a special 'exhibition finish', so that it might be a suitable demonstration machine for other potential customers. The massive flywheel of this machine was 18.5 feet in diameter and was unusual in that there was no key, (steel peg), locking it to the crankshaft of the steam engine. It was fixed solely by friction between the bore of the flywheel and the shaft. Two large steel rings, one on each side of the flywheel, were heated and then shrunk onto the shaft, holding the flywheel firmly in place.

On completion of all the modernisation works, the flour mill was formally re-opened by the Mayor of Carlisle, Mr F.P. Dixon, on 28th June 1905. The conspicuous flour mill, along with all the ships in Silloth Docks, were bedecked with large flags and bunting. By opening a steam valve, the big Carel engine, controlling all the mill machinery, was set in motion by the young Miss Aileen Carr, daughter of Mr Theodore Carr. A specially decorated railway engine pulled a trainload of 800 invited guests from Carlisle to Silloth and those, along with many other guests were presented with a souvenir tin of biscuits, the tin lid having been embossed with a colour image of Carrs new looking Solway Mill. The biscuit tins were manufactured and presented by Hudson-Scotts & Sons Ltd of Carlisle, and presumably would have contained a selection of Carrs tasty biscuits!

The great Carel engine flywheel can still be seen today, in the museum area of Carrs Mill at Silloth. It is now turned by a small electric motor for museum purposes only. When installed for commercial operation within the mill, it turned at 66 rpm and drove several large belts that in turn rotated line shafting, which transferred power to the various milling and ancillary machines located around the mill building. Only once was the flywheel dismantled during its working life. This was in

Tips on How To Stay Safe during the Hot-Spell

With the hot weather forecast to continue, the county's public health leaders are asking people to make sure they're prepared.

Although most of us like warmer weather, high temperature can cause as many health problems as colder temperatures. In particular, people must be careful not to leave children or vulnerable people exposed to high temperatures or strong sunlight for prolonged periods of time, whether outside or inside a car. Heat exhaustion can have a serious effect on normally healthy people and, for vulnerable people such as babies, older people and those suffering from chronic conditions, the symptoms can be severe. Heatstroke is a serious condition that occurs when the body is unable to control its temperature due

to excessive heat. Symptoms of heat exhaustion include; headaches, dizziness, nausea and vomiting, muscle weakness or cramps, stomach cramps, tiredness, loss of appetite, weak pulse and a high temperature.

The symptoms of heatstroke include; confusion and disorientation, visual hallucinations, muscle convulsions, unconsciousness, a racing pulse, flushed, hot and dry skin, a sudden rise in temperature and any of the above symptoms of heat exhaustion.

A few tips to protect yourself if you're at home: - If it's cooler inside than out, shut and shade your windows

- If it's hotter inside than out, open windows for ventilation

If you're vulnerable to the effects of heat or you have a pre-existing medical condition try not to go out in the middle of the say
Drink cold drinks regularly, such as water or fruit juice to stay hydrated, but try to avoid tea, coffee and alcohol

- If you're going outside, stay in the shade, wear cool, covering clothes and use sun cream with at least SPF15.

If travelling make sure you're prepared especially in case of being stuck in extreme temperatures in a car or train.

- Take plenty of fluids, and stock extra water or fruit juice in the car
- Pack and use sun cream - Take regular breaks allowing both driver and passengers chance to get some fresh air

- Make sure air ventilation is working

If anyone remains in the car make sure it is not for a prolonged period and ensure they have access to ventilation and fluids
Do not leave children unattended in hot cars
Do not leave pets

unattended in a hot car Dr Rebecca Wagstaff, said: ""Both heat exhaustion

and heatstroke are serious conditions, especially for older people, young children and those with a pre-existing condition."

If you believe someone is suffering from heat exhaustion, move them somewhere cool, give them plenty of water or fruit juice and make them take a lukewarm shower, or sponge themselves with cold water.

If you believe someone is suffering from heatstroke, call 999 and whilst waiting for help to arrive, move the person to somewhere cooler, loosen their clothes, sprinkle them with cool (not cold) water or use a damp sheet/ cloth, if conscious give them water, but do not give them paracetamol or aspirin.


case was dismissed by Judge Brough as 'attention seeking,' Ian will find out his fate on the first day of next years ride.
