Credit Union Success

Supporting credit unions forms an important part of the county council's commitment to financial inclusion and tackling poverty and I'm sure this credit union is making a real positive difference to the lives of residents in Allerdale. Here We Go Again!

The recent announcement from the government confirms our very worst fears - the nuclear dump in Cumbria is back on the agenda. MRWS2 is about to be unveiled.

SPAND has been keeping an eye on the situation and it comes as no surprise that government claim to have learned the lessons from its last attempt. Yes, it certainly has. Just move the goalposts to suit your own game plan. **The End of Democracy in**

Cumbria The government announcement on MRWS 2 signals the end of democracy in Cumbria. The key change to the process is that the Government has shifted the responsibility for the decision from Cumbria County Council to the district councils. By making this change the government has, at a stroke, taken out two layers of local government from the democratic process. It just happens to be the two layers that objected to the dump. Allerdale and Copeland now have carte blanche to resurrect the dump.

We take issue with Allerdale Council. There are 56 or so councillors on Allerdale Council

Gorse Pruning Plans

Following our request for feedback in a previous edition of the Solway Buzz, the Town Council received a number of letters and emails from residents in relation to the pruning or cutting back of the gorse on Skinburness Road.

The Town Council are grateful for the feedback we received and after due consideration have decided that maintenance work be carried out. The gorse bushes will not be removed but will be cut back to a lower level, with ongoing maintenance in the future. but Allerdale's version of democracy only gives a vote on the dump to the 7 councillors who make up the council executive. Five of these councillors voted to support the dump, two voted against.

This means that 5 out of 56 councillors have a stranglehold on the council. If you are unfortunate enough to be represented by one of the other 51 then you have no way to influence the decision. In short we are disenfranchised. We will have more to say on this as the battle progresses.

So Where does Silloth and the Solway plain stand in this new battle? The answer is "in a very strong position indeed." Last time, our community was united and sent clear messages that we won't tolerate nuclear waste being dumped on, under or anywhere near the Solway Plain. **Our message remains** the same.

None of the five seem to have the faintest idea of the damage and distress they caused to their communities in ignoring public opinion and anger and pursuing their own nuclear agenda. Ironically we came out of that battle a much stronger community than we were when we went into it. We celebrated together and worked together to promote tourism in Silloth and we have had a wonderful summer. We have gone from strength to strength as a community.

This consultation process claims that unless the councils can demonstrate active support for a dump the process will not move forward. Take note Allerdale executive - we intend to demonstrate overwhelming public opposition to a dump in Allerdale or anywhere else in Cumbria.

Free Electric Blanket Test

Cumbria County Council's Trading Standards and Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service are offering free electric blanket testing sessions across the County.

Safety checks will be undertaken by qualified staff who are able to correct minor faults. For those blankets which fail safety tests, Cumbria County Council will provide one replacement under-blanket per household.

Events will be held across Cumbria in October and residents can bring their blanket to be tested, by appointment only, between 9am and 5pm at the following location: Thursday 3 October - Methodist Church Hall, Wigton.

Testing is strictly by appointment only with limited spaces. To book your appointment or for further details on collection points please contact Trading Standards on 01539 713594.

National fire statistics show that electric blankets account for over 5,000 fires a year in the home with blankets over 10 years old posing a particular danger. During testing sessions over previous years, nearly half the blankets tested in Cumbria failed the safety check. Among the common issues are problems such as defective overheating protection, exposed wires or failing insulation. Although electric blankets have to comply with strict safety standards when they are sold, they do wear with age and can become damaged. Improper storage during the summer is one of the

main reasons for blankets developing faults.

Cumbria County Councillor Barry Doughty, Cabinet Member for Community Safety and Local Services, said: "We all want residents to keep warm and safe this winter. Faulty and old electric blankets carry a very real risk of causing fires and personal injury, often to the most vulnerable people. I hope that people who own an electric blanket will take advantage of this free service and book an appointment to get their blanket checked before the winter. The statistics show a simple safety check can help to save lives"

Silloth RNLI lifeboat were tasked by the Coastguard to a man cut off by the tide with his dogs near Powfoot. He was walking along the beach when the fast approaching tide surrounded him and left him stranded with two of his dogs.

When Silloth RNLI lifeboat approached the casualty, he was up to his chest in water, holding both dogs at chest height. One was a chocolate coloured Labrador and the other a black Scottie Dog. A third dog, a white Scottie, was also missing but was thankfully

found later on the beach.

The casualty was very cold and wet but otherwise safe and well. The lifeboat recovered the man and his two dogs and took them ashore at Annan Waterfoot to the awaiting Coastguard, Police and Ambulance personnel.

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Tour of Britain Stage Two Carlisle to Kendal

The world's leading cyclists competing in the Tour of Britain race in Cumbria on 16th September were reminded both at the start and the finish of the race of the gruelling challenge of cycling through some of the country's most magnificent mountain scenery. That's because Cumbria's fells are featured in both of the winning designs of a county wide schools competition to design the starting flag and stage winner's jersey.

Two pupils emerged victorious from more than 1,600 entries in the competitions to conjure up a design for the official flag to start the race in Carlisle and a cycling jersey for the stage winner to be presented on the podium at the finish in Kendal.

Cumbria County Council Chairman Cllr Alan Barry visited both of the winners to present them with unique copies of their winning designs, a £150 voucher from Scotby Cycles in Carlisle and a goodie bag provided by British Cycling.

The original winning drawings will also be

documents to be kept for generations to come. 11-year-old Hannah

Atkinson designed the winning flag – a detailed drawing which actually features five flags layered on top of each other, as well as the obligatory hills and sheep. Hannah moved up to Ullswater Secondary School in Penrith this term, but was a Year 6 pupil at Plumpton Primary School when she entered the competition, so returned to her former school to pick up her prizes and the congratulations of her old schoolmates. Hannah said: "It felt really special to be named the winner, particularly as so many other children had entered the competition. I tried to combine all the different features of the Lake District into my design. We should all be really excited about the Tour of Britain coming because it's bringing some of the world's greatest cyclists right to our doorstep and showing off the beauty of Cumbria."

10-year-old Ellie Holmes, a Year 6 pupil from Fairfield Primary School in Cockermouth, designed the winning jersey, which featured a winding road in

the foreground, the fells and blue sky in the background, with patriotic Union Flag sleeves. Ellie said "I couldn't believe it when I was told I'd won. "Our whole family watched the Tour de France and the Olympics cycling on the telly. When I was thinking of the design, I wanted something that seemed both Cumbrian and British. It will be really exciting to think that one of them is going to be given my jersey!'

Cllr Alan Barry, Chairman of Cumbria County Council, said: "It was a delight to meet the winners and to see their fantastic designs made real. I've been really impressed with both the standard of entries and the amount of effort our school children have put into conjuring up their designs. It's a shame that we can only have two winners but both Hannah and Ellie have done a great job of representing the county in their designs. It's been a really good way of generating enthusiasm for the Tour ahead of the race and ensuring young people

are involved and engaged." The starting flag was waved by the Mayor of Carlisle Cllr Ray Bloxham when the racers set off at 10:45am from outside the Old Town Hall. The Leader and Chair of South Lakeland District Council, Cllrs Evelyn Westwood and Peter Thornton, presented the stage winner's jersey in Kendal.

The competition, in which 111 schools registered and 1,620 designs were submitted, was co-ordinated by Active Cumbria, Cumbria County Council and Sport England's partnership body for promoting sports and physical activity.

The starting flag was made by the Whitehavenbased Amazing Art group, a mental health and wellbeing project facilitated by local arts company New Arts North which engages young adults in Copeland and Allerdale in practical art and film projects. The winner's jersey was produced by Vitesse, official jersey supplier to the Tour of Britain.

On the Water Front

August 2013 7th Phantom from Jorf Lasfar via Ayr with part cargo fertilizer, then in ballast to SFO. 9th Randzel from St Petersburg via Ayr with part cargo fertilizer, then in ballast to Ferrol. 10th Ben Maye from Liverpool with wheat, then in ballast to Kilroot. 18th Muhlenau from Rouen with fertilizer, then in ballast to Runcorn. 20th Leonid Leonov from Riga with fertilizer, then in ballast to Bideford. 23rd Ben Maye from Liverpool with wheat, then in ballast to Liverpool.

Billy Irving ('Malchris'), Mr Jim Wilson ('Minnie'), Mr Seaton Irving ('Eliza Jane') and Mr Bob Stitt ('Zora'). As time went by, engines were to be put into the boats, replacing the sails and allowing them to venture further afield and down the Solway, to waters as far away as those off Maryport. Fish and shrimp stocks in the Solway, then and even now, have never been endangered by local fishing craft, due to the small number of boats engaged in fishing these waters and by maintaining the traditional ways of fishing.

From the 1920's until the outbreak of WWII, during the summer holiday periods when Silloth was

the last fisherman/pilot being the late Mr Alan Ray, who owned and fished with the Orkney built 'Jolanda', and then in 1990-91 built and launched a steel fishing boat of the same name at Silloth Docks.

The hazards of fishing in the Solway include the small but dreaded Weever fish, with a dorsal fin and gills that have sharp spines which exude a very painful venom if accidentally grabbed whilst sorting the catch, or cleaning the nets, (or sometimes trodden on in wet sand at low water with bare feet). Another local hazard is the number of moving sandbanks of the upper Solway, which if struck during a strong tide, the fast



The small but on-going fishing industry at Silloth has always been a feature, but never a major source of employment for the town. In the early 1900's there were only two small fishing boats operating out of the port. One was called 'Pursuit', sailed by a Mr Woodhouse who had moved here with his family from Morecambe. The other was 'Victory', sailed by Mr Billy Harris, who also worked as a local railway employee. They were joined in 1914 when the Baxter family moved here with their fishing boat 'Lizzie' from a mooring in the River Annan, located a few miles further up the Solway estuary on the Scottish side. Silloth was that bit closer to the Solway fishing grounds and the tides were not quite so strong at Silloth Docks. The following generations of the Baxter family increased the size of the Silloth fleet, adding the 'Foam' and the 'Venetia'. These sailing boats and their fishing gear were all made and maintained by their owners. They trawled for the plentiful brown shrimps from March to October, when the water was a little warmer, and for other catches of opportunity such as cod and plaice during the winter months. Other fishermen from Annan later moved with their boats to Silloth to join the local boats, including Mr Woodman ('Britannia'), Mr G. Irving ('Ada'), followed by Mr Billy Wilson ('Gypsy Queen'), Mr

full of holiday-makers and day trippers, brought to the town by railway from Carlisle, the fishermen and their boats offered pleasure trips out onto the Solway and up to Annan. Five shillings (25p) got you to Annan and back, whilst nine pence (8p) was the going rate for a 'Trip round the Bay'. Passengers embarked from a small landing stage that the fishermen themselves had built, located on the beach adjacent to the old Baths building on Silloth Green. After the war, the trips were resumed in a small way but as mass tourism to Silloth declined, so did the sea trips, which finally ceased in the mid 1960's, as did the railway line to Silloth. Tough Health & Safety Regulations on passenger carrying these days would probably render these trips financially impracticable. Following war service with the Royal Navy, local brothers Cyril and Stan Akitt took up fishing with an ex Morecambe Bay shrimper call 'Ann', built at Arnside, whilst the Baxter family fleet expanded to include the 'Danny Boy', 'Children's Friend' and the 'Sanna', a wammel boat built for salmon fishing. On leaving school in the early 1960s, Colin Akitt Jun. partnered his uncle Stan Akitt in their boat 'Respect'. Some of the fishermen in the past, using their knowledge of the local waters and with an aptitude for handling larger vessels, were employed as a shipping pilot for the port of Silloth,

moving waters can quickly roll a small boat over. Then there are uncharted obstacles such as the temporarily exposed remains of a few crashed wartime aircraft, (possibly an unfortunate RAF Hudson bomber on a training flight from Silloth airfield), which can snag a net and drag a moving boat over.

In recent years, most of the few remaining local fishermen have invested in slightly larger steel built fishing boats, but it's generally a tough life with meagre returns and the number of boats here has



gradually reduced. The brown shrimp remains the primary catch and fresh, frozen or delicious potted shrimps can be purchased from fish retailers located on the small industrial estate near to the docks. The number of white fish to be caught in the upper Solway has declined over the years, possibly as a result of overfishing in the deeper waters of the Irish Sea, rendering the commercial fishing for them not viable from Silloth. Stocks of all types of fish and shellfish found in the Solway are closely monitored by the N.W. Inshore Fisheries & Conservation Authority, previously known as the Cumbrian Sea Fisheries Committee, using their patrol launch the 'Solway Protector', based at the port of Whitehaven. From time to time and when stocks are assessed as sufficient, a small number of licenses are offered to Silloth fishermen, to trawl for the more lucrative cockles and mussels.

There are currently just six local fishing boats at Silloth. The 'Trebla' (Mr Danny Baxter Sen.), the 'New Venture' (Mr Danny Baxter Jun.), '3 Sisters' (Mr Jamie Baxter), 'Jolanda' (Mr Ioe Ray), who also owns the 'Solway Provider' (Mr J Allison) and finally the 'Jaana B' (Mr Alfie Bennett). The port is also used from time to time by the company 'Tom Nicholson Trawlers', which is based at Annan and operates a small fleet of scallop dredgers that work in the Irish Sea. Six of these larger beam trawlers, the 'Philomena', 'Georgelou N', 'Mattanja', 'Olivia Jean', 'Tobrach N' and 'Noordzee', have been calling in at Silloth over the past three years for maintenance, modification and repair purposes, but generally having landed their scallop catches at Whitehaven.

On 9th August the Port of Silloth accepted one of its largest vessels. This was the MV Randzel, which delivered part of a cargo of fertilizer from Russia, the other part having been unloaded at Ayr in Scotland en-route. The Gibraltar registered ship has a length

of 98m, a width of 14m and can carry around 4,500 tonnes when full. Her gross Tonnage is 3,173, the second highest of any ship seen at Silloth. The highest was 3,277 gross tonnes set by MV Tequila Sunrise in 1987. Randzel is operated by Briese Shipping of Germany. She left Silloth bound for El Ferrol in Spain after a stay of 24 hours.

County Council View on Nuclear Waste Disposal

Cumbria County Council has issued a crossparty response to the announcement from the Department of Energy & Climate Change that it is starting a new 12-week consultation on the best way to engage communities in the process of managing the storage of high-level radioactive waste.

Details of the Government's new proposals can be found here https:// www.gov.uk/government/ news/communitiesconsulted-on-radioactivewaste-disposal-site.

Cumbria County Council will be responding fully to the new proposals in due course.

Cllr Stewart Young, Leader of Cumbria County Council and Leader of the Labour Group, gave his initial thoughts on the new proposals: "The county council expressed its concerns about the previous process when Cabinet decided in January 2013 not to proceed to the next stage. Those concerns included uncertainty on the right for communities to bring the process to a halt if they are not happy, a complete lack of detail about the timing and quantum of any community benefits package, and the lack of a 'Plan B' for more robust interim surface storage plans for the high-level radioactive waste currently kept at Sellafield if a site for a GDF cannot be found. We will be looking closely at these revised proposals to see

whether our concerns have been addressed." Cllr Jo Stephenson,

Deputy Leader of Cumbria County Council and Leader of the Liberal Democrat Group, said: "The Government needs to get this right as, according to the timeframe set out in this new consultation, construction of a new Geological Disposal Facility in the UK could begin within as little as nine years. It is crucial that the Government works closely with communities right across the UK in finding the best long-term solution for the waste and the community of Cumbria will be a vital voice in the process as most of the waste is currently stored here."

Cllr James Airey, Leader of the opposition Conservative Group, said: "The county council agrees that the best long-term storage solution for highlevel radioactive waste is to store it safely underground, with the ability to retrieve it if necessary. We have always said that the Government's efforts need to be focused on disposing of the waste underground in the safest place, not the easiest. It is crucial that the Government works with communities in its quest to find a suitable location. Local voices must be heard properly and local authorities will have a key role in ensuring communities can make informed decisions. This isn't just an issue for Cumbria, it is one the whole nation should be engaging in."
