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
Visitors to Cumbria County Council's libraries can now have free access to more than fifty popular magazines online via a new digital magazine service.

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Save on Your Gas & Electric with Allerdale

Join the Big Allerdale Switch and save cash on your energy bills.

People across Cumbria are being urged to join a new initiative which could save them money on their gas and electricity bills.

The Big Allerdale Switch is a 'collective switching' scheme, which allows people to group together to purchase their gas and electricity and save money. The initiative, which was launched on Tuesday 10th December, is being run by Allerdale Borough Council but is open to all - wherever you live.

Councillor Carni McCarron Holmes, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive Member for Housing, said: "It's frequently the case that those people who are more in need are often paying the most for their gas and electricity. Prepay meters can be expensive and some people have limited

access to the internet to shop around for the best deal or learn more about affordable warmth schemes. And because Cumbria has a high number of rural and remote properties, people are forced to purchase expensive oil and LPG to heat their homes. The Big Allerdale Switch will give people a better deal on their gas and electricity purely because of people power – by getting large numbers of residents together to purchase their energy en-masse, the energy providers will offer far better deals. And you don't need to live in the Allerdale borough to join our scheme – the more the merrier! Cutting bills is a key initiative in the Council's Reducing Poverty Strategy and we pledged to promote, champion and coordinate schemes to secure good value energy supplies this is the first step to put

that plan in action." The Big Allerdale Switch is completely free to join, really simple to do, and, at no point in the process are residents under any obligation to change energy providers if they change their

The Big Allerdale Switch is part of the Big Community Switch, a scheme involving a number of local authorities throughout Great Britain. The Big Community Switch is run by i-Choosr, an independent company which has experience in collective switching schemes. iChoosr sets up a reverse auction and invites energy suppliers to offer their cheapest dual fuel and electricity only deals.

To sign up to the scheme, visit www.allerdale.gov.uk/ warmhomes, call 01900 702702, or visit Allerdale House or the Discovery Centre or any of the Council's district offices. You will need a copy of an energy bill to hand as information will be required from it.


Anne Weightman and Joan Armstrong served the refreshments provided by Joan Gilbertson as it

Harlequin Choir





proceeds from the raffle £175 was raised for the Silloth and District RNLI fund raising group.



BMX Track Opening



Youngsters in Silloth used the old Pines behind the lifeboat station as a makeshift BMX track. This track did not comply with any safety regulations. So, it was removed and fenced off to make way for the play area now in its place.

Subsequently, young people and parents in Silloth approached Silloth Town Council and attended meetings to voice their disappointment at losing the dirt track and make a case for a new facility.

In November 2011, the young folks along with Cllr. Stuart Graham and other parents, completed a sponsored bicycle ride and raised £550, demonstrating the high level of commitment from youngsters, parents and adults in the Town.

Given the high levels of support, a committee for Silloth BMX Club was formed. The club were now in a position to seek further funding. Committee members include Stuart Graham, Deputy Mayor (Chairperson) David Baker (Treasurer) and Diane Graham (Secretary).

Silloth Town Council suggested the proposal for the BMX track could be

included as part of the Green re-generation, and Cllr Stuart Graham, Jason Dixey, the project manager for the Green's refurbishment and Anna Malina, the Community Engagement Officer for the Green obtained funding.

The track officially

opened on Saturday 14th December. A professional BMX Team, the Clan, displayed their skills. In addition, they gave advice and encouragement to the youngsters during interactive sessions. All are encouraged to bring their BMX bikes along to use the new track.

Wigton Furniture Project

Allerdale Borough Council has given its backing to a new social enterprise, which will provide low cost furniture to North and West Cumbria, and give valuable work experience to volunteers of all ages.

Steve Wilson and Debbie Watson have set up Wigton Furniture Project, a Community Interest Company. They are offering free collection of unwanted furniture from Wigton and the surrounding area, which will then be 'upcycled' and sold on at a low price to local residents. All the profits will be reinvested in the business.

The project will provide opportunities for volunteers to learn how to repair furniture, as well as learn basic business and retail skills, such as stocktaking and dealing with customers. The project has already forged strong links with the Job Centre, NHS and local homelessness organisations.

There are also plans to turn the company premises, on Western Bank Industrial Estate, into a community hub with space for bands to practice. Some of the unit has also been converted into a shop selling new clothes, perfumes and shoes, which is ploughing its profits into the Community Interest Company.

Councillor Alan Smith, Leader of Allerdale Borough Council, said "This is a great project and I'm really pleased the Council has been able to support it through the 'Ways Into Successful Enterprise' project. Not only will it prevent tons of usable furniture ending up in landfill because it can be upcycled

into something attractive and useful, but it also allows those who may not have a lot of money to spare to furnish their homes. The added bonus is that it will also be helping people develop new skills whether that's for use in their future careers or simply as a hobby."

Steve and Debbie are looking for donations of furniture and would also like to hear from any volunteers who want to get involved.

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Rotary Bearhugs



1000 Bearhugs is a small charity based in the Philippines that revolves around helping children. It is part of an organisation known as Blackpencil which is run by Mon Corpuz, a professional photographer and graphic artist.

Following the recent typhoon, Mon wanted to expand the operation and he asked his friend Philip Smithson (son of Silloth Rotarian Colin Smithson), if he could improve the www.1000bearhugs.org website free of charge. Philip who runs Foolproof Labs Inc in Makati, Metro Manila along with Russell Morgan formerly of Silloth, immediately agreed and upgraded the website forthwith. Many townsfolk will remember Russell's mother Sharon who was Silloth Town Clerk for many years.

Colin Smithson then suggested that the Rotary Club of Silloth might like to become involved in collecting bears for them.

Play is a child's natural language and a means for them to make sense of their experiences. Trauma can be addressed through play therapy and allows a child to speak of what he or she has gone through when they cannot find the words to do so. Toys can provide children with a certain amount of security in a sometimes very scary world.

On hearing Rotarian Tim Barker speaking about the scheme on Radio Cumbria, Silloth Community Technology College quickly responded and at a recent assembly, presented the Club with almost 1000 bears. The College showed great leadership and involved Silloth Primary School, Jelly Tots, Holme Saint Cuthbert, and Allonby Schools in the project. To collect almost 1000 bears in little over a week was a remarkable achievement and good news travels fast because in addition to the local schools, Bolton Low Houses School has contributed, along with various other Rotary Clubs and schools in Cumbria. At the moment we have an astonishing 5000+ bears and other huggables!

The bears are currently waiting patiently in the departure lounge in Tony Markley's warehouse in Silloth, and Rotary members are maintaining a shift system to feed and water them, as well making sure they visit The Pines twice a day. They will be transported in the new year when the current international humanitarian effort to provide food and water has abated slightly.

Silloth Town Council Response to the Siting Process for a Geological Disposal Facility

Consultation – Review of the Siting Process for a Geological Disposal Facility

The Town Council have submitted their response to DECC in relation to the above consultation, a copy of which is reproduced here and also on the Council's website at www.silloth-on-solway-tc. gov.uk.

The Town Council will not be holding a public meeting.

Silloth-on-Solway Town

Council response: Silloth Town Council are alarmed that the Government can reopen the search for a nuclear repository in our area, in the same year as it declared the MRWS process officially dead. The Cumbria County Council Cabinet ruled out the suitability of our area by a unanimous vote in January this year. We were told to respect the process and we did despite neither us, nor our elected representatives in Allerdale, having a say in the decision. How can Government renegue on its own process and then remove the only barrier (Cumbria County Council) to having another go, with another set of rules, whilst expecting us to believe it is actually looking at the whole of the country. We already know we are again to have no say in the decision and call into question the integrity of the Government and the honesty of its approach. Is this the true meaning of localism in a landscape which enjoys the highest level of protection in law and is already suffering from a plague of onshore and offshore giant turbines, with many more in the pipeline, whilst its people will be forced to live in the shadowy prospect of a nuclear repository, during many years of worry, anxiety and confusion. Rule us out now and make the national search for safety a genuine one. We also urge the leaders of Allerdale Borough Council not to renegue on

their promise to abide by the democratic process which they asked us to accept.

Question 1: Do you agree that the test of public support should be taken before the representative authority loses the Right of Withdrawal? If so, what do you think would be the most appropriate means of testing public support and when should it take place? If you do not agree with the need for such a test please explain why.

In the true form of localism, each local parish/town council to decide for its own area. The test of public support must be taken at a very early stage by each local parish/town council if there is a possibility that their area is under consideration. The form of the test whether public meeting, referendum or other, is best left to the individual council.

Question 2: Do you agree with the proposed amendments to decision making within the MRWS siting process. If not how would you modify the proposed phased approach, or, alternatively, what different approach would you propose? Please explain your reasoning.

No, we do not agree. Two levels of local government cannot be removed from the process, leaving the third to be represented by an unrepresentative oligarchy. We are extremely concerned at the reduced role of the County Council and the virtual elimination from the democratic process of the local tier.

Question 3: Do you agree with this approach to revising roles in the siting process set out in the White Paper? If not, what alternative approach would you propose and why?

Yes, as long as the process follows the localism agenda and as long as there is a genuine national approach. We agree with a genuine national approach led by

geological safety as the paramount concern.

Question 4: Do you agree with this proposed approach to assessing geological suitability as part of the MRWS siting process? If not what alternative approach would you propose and why?

The Town Council propose the sensible solution would be a subsurface retrievable storage facility in the area where the bulk of it is at present located, but that is for the local people in that area to determine.

Question 5: Do you agree with this proposed approach to planning for the geological disposal facility? If not, what alternative approach would you propose and why?

The Town Council do not agree that a geological disposal facility is safe for Cumbria.

Question 6: Do you agree with this clarification of the inventory for geological disposal - and how this will be communicated with the volunteer host community? If not, what alternative approach would you propose and why?

We do not agree with a geological disposal facility but propose a safe retrievable subsurface storage facility, as one day the waste could be reprocessed or made less dangerous through advances in science.

Local people will always need to know precisely what is to be stored, volumes, origins etc

Question 7: Do you endorse the proposed approach to community benefits associated with a GDF? If not, what alternative approach would you propose and why?

Discussion on community benefits is premature and should not be considered until a host community is identified and agreed in principle. Any detailed list of benefits should be mirrored by a list of disadvantages and risks.

Question 8: Do you agree with the proposed approach to addressing potential socioeconomic and environmental effects that might come from hosting a GDF? If not, what alternative approach would you propose and why?

The report needs to be available to the wider public and give a balanced view, setting out the potential gains and possible drawbacks. We do not agree that the case for a safe geological disposal facility has been made.

Question 9: Do you have any other comments?

Our preface document is an integral part of our response and must remain attached to it. It gives the overarching view and rationale behind Silloth Town Council's views expressed above.



Lab in a Lorry, a mobile science lab for young people, visited Silloth last month to connect young people in the region to science. Local school groups took part in organised visits to the Lab which was based at Solway Community Technology College.

Designed to inspire the next generation of scientists and engineers, Lab in a Lorry offers 11-14 year olds the opportunity to explore science through specially created interactive experiments.

RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch

It will be all eyes to the skies on Saturday, 25th and Sunday, 26th January 2014, as the nation takes part in the RSPB's annual Big Garden Birdwatch.

The activity is the biggest garden wildlife survey in the world and last year almost 600,000 people counted the birds in their garden.

Big Garden Birdwatch, which has been running for 35 years, provides the RSPB with masses of information about changes in numbers of garden birds in winter, and helps to alert conservationists to significant declines in UK garden species such as house sparrows and starlings..

And this year, for the some of the other wildlife you see in your garden too.

We want to know whether you ever see deer, squirrels, badgers, hedgehogs, frogs and toads in your gardens, to help build an overall picture of how important our gardens are for giving all types of wildlife a home.

Doing the Big Garden Birdwatch is fun and easy, and you don't even need to leave the comfort of your own home. To take part, spend just one hour at any time over the Big Garden Birdwatch weekend noting the highest number of each





Cumbria County Council are presently mid consultation on proposals to reduce their spending for next year. One of those proposals is to remove all subsidised bus services in the County (5% of the Bus infrastructure in Cumbria). Rural areas will be badly affected but also inter town routes and some town services. There may be a case for economies and parishes banding together to organise community directed transport but that and community minibuses will only be able to replace a fraction of the annual 927,659 passenger journeys made on subsidised transport.

Many passengers, some vulnerable and isolated, will find themselves without access to essential services. Cuts in the transport provision at this level will isolate many people and undermine any attempts to encourage people to travel more sustainably. Routes in the Silloth area that will affected are nos 71, 101, 97 & 94. You can find details of all routes under threat at http:// www.cumbria.gov.uk/ budgetconsultation/ budgetconsultation2.asp then scroll down to 24 to view details and the pdf of services.



University Royal Navy Unit (URNU) since 1992. In addition to her primary role of training undergraduate Midshipmen (and women) of the URNU, she is tasked with minor roles in maritime exercises and festivals and representing the Royal Navy at smaller ports. Following her first visit, she was formally affiliated to the town of Silloth and has made several annual visits to the town in recent years. Members of her crew have also been travelling here annually by road, to attend the November 'Service of Remembrance' at Christ Church and pay their respects to war graves at

During the years that I was Harbour Master at Silloth, I had tried on several occasions to persuade the Royal Navy to arrange a goodwill 'showing the flag' type of visit to the town, of a warship, hopefully something of a size comparable to the merchant ships that routinely call here on business. That size limitation could include the impressive mine countermeasures ships of the Hunt and Sandown Classes, or patrol vessels of the River Class and the somewhat smaller Archer Class. For the Royal Navy it would surely be a good public relations and recruiting opportunity in this region. And for the general public, a great chance to see a warship at close quarters, to offer a bit of Cumbrian hospitality and to meet the ship's company on board.

It was not until 2005 that my efforts eventually came to fruition. Following intermittent on-going discussions with the Royal Navy's North West Regional Office in Liverpool, they decided that they could send a patrol vessel for a trial visit. And so on 19th March 2005, we were delighted to welcome HMS "Biter" P270 to the Port of Silloth for a weekend call. Advance notice through the media meant that the vessel was met at the docks by a large crowd of people, including the then Mayor of Silloth, Graham Wilkinson, all keen to see and possibly go aboard a ship, albeit a small one, from the Royal Navy. HMS "Biter" P270 is an Archer Class fast patrol vessel, measuring just 20m x 6m x 1m and tendered to the Manchester & Salford

Silloth cemetery. During the ship visits, return hospitality is offered to the public, to step aboard and explore the vessel, whilst the Mayor of Silloth is usually invited to attend their special Trafalgar Night Dinner at the University campus. In 2011, we also welcomed HMS "Charger", for a weekend visit. She is a sister vessel to



HMS Biter

HMS "Biter" and is tendered to the Liverpool URNU and affiliated to Workington. Both vessels came in company to briefly enjoy Silloth's hospitality.

When HMS "Biter" first arrived in 2005, I mistakenly believed and stated, that this was the first time that a Royal Naval vessel had ventured into the Solway as far up as Silloth, possibly since WWII. Port logbooks had been examined and no record could be found of any earlier visit. But then a couple of members of the public were swiftly on the phone, to advise me that a minesweeper had in fact visited Silloth, as recently as 1976! Further research beyond the port records unveiled the fact that the Royal Naval Reserve manned 'Ton' Class vessel,

The very short visit, mainly through the hours of darkness, unfortunately meant that the ship was not able to be safely opened to the public. Over one hundred of those 'Ton' Class

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Do You Want Pure Water?

Report by Dianne Standen **Cumbrian Against** Fluoridation

For 40 years people in West Cumbria have been drinking water dosed with hexafluorosilic acid-fluoride.

We have been told that using this industrial grade chemical, not approved for human consumption, reduces dental decay.

This claim is not supported by dental data for Cumbria and there is no international quality scientific evidence that has proved its use in water to be safe or effective. The recent launch of a six-year, £1.5 million research project using West Cumbrian children, to discover how well water fluoridation works and how cost effective it is in the current climate of falling decay, confirms that lack of evidence.

Water fluoridation exposes babies and young children to more than the recommended levels of fluoride and put their long term health at risk.

The impact of fluoride on public health has been well documented.

Amongst the many concerns are the following:

Fluoride displaces iodine, which is essential for thyroid health

' Iodine deficiency in pregnant women is linked to increased pregnancy loss and infant mortality

* Fluoride's impact

on the thyroid can lead to depression, fatigue, muscle/ joint pains and weight gain.

* Fluoride displaces iodide which assists in cancer prevention.

* Thirty-six research reports from other parts of the World have established that fluoride reduces a child's intelligence and first indications of that are in the womb.

There is a strong possibility that both obesity and mental health issues are a consequence of the presence of fluoride in the water. These are public health issues and Cumbria County Council is now responsible for public health issues.

Local people and the council should be concerned that health authorities have failed to undertake the monitoring of fluoride upon our bodies legally required by the 2003 Water Act.

Dosing a population through the water supply to affect the teeth does not respect the individual's reaction to fluoride or their medical rights.

We urge local people to defend those rights and oppose water fluoridation.

Fluoridated communities include Silloth, Skinburness and Abbeytown and Wigton
