# Japanese Learn From SPAND

Representatives from The Hokkaido Shimbun Press recently met with members of SPAND. Toru Shikoda san, London Bureau Chief and Steven Ivings, London Correspondent had contacted SPAND as they were interested to learn how the new campaign against the siting of a nuclear dump on the Solway Plain was progressing.

John Haywood, Kath Ostell, Vivian Russell and Don Graham met with Toru Shikoda san and Steven Ivings to give them an opportunity to see an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty whose very existence could be threatened by the siting of a nuclear dump on the Solway Plain. The group spent some time walking out to Grune Point to see the landscape and the wildlife that depends on the environment remaining as

Both visitors were taken by surprise at the sheer beauty of the marshland and expressed their understanding as to why SPAND and local residents were fiercely campaigning They were particularly interested in the process that was being applied in the UK to find a suitable site. They were dismayed to learn that Government

was not placing geology at the top of the selection criteria.

They were keen to learn about the activities of small local groups and wanted to know the details of how



the SPAND campaign had been conducted. They were impressed to hear that these groups had helped influence Cumbria County Council into saying no in January 2013 to proceeding further down the route to the siting of a nuclear dump in West Cumbria.

Having spent some time on the marsh the group retired to the Golf Hotel for refreshments and to continue their discussions. Whilst in Silloth they took many photographs and commented on the beauty of the Green and the local architecture. In fact, they described Silloth as 'a hidden gem.'

# Heating Help

More support is now available to vulnerable adults below pension-age in Cumbria who may be struggling with heating bills.

Cumbria County Council has set aside £47,000 this winter to help low income families with children aged under-5 years, disabled people and people with long-term health conditions that are made worse by cold. One-off grants of £125 will be available to vulnerable households which meet the criteria, from December 2013 until end the end of February 2014.

The funding comes from the council's Ways to Welfare programme which provides support and advice to working-age people throughout the year who are experiencing severe hardship. The winter help will compliment support already available for pensioners in Cumbria through Cumbria Community Foundation's Winter Warmth Fund and other government schemes.

Councillor Beth Furneaux, Cumbria County Council's cabinet member for Adult and Local Services, said: "This is one-off funding of £47,000 which the county council is making available to help vulnerable people stay warm this winter. The latest figures show that there are around 190 more deaths in Cumbria in winter compared to nonwinter months. Keeping warm is a basic human need and this one-off help is there to help vulnerable working-age adults to stay safe and well this winter. Although times are tough for local government, we are determined to make sure that the vulnerable receive the help they need."

# Portable Heater Warnings

With plunging temperatures predicted to follow the fierce winds and flooding, fire chiefs are warning of the potential dangers posed by portable heaters.

While an electric or gas heater might seem an unlikely fire hazard, if not used carefully it can be a serious risk.

Faulty devices, negligent use of equipment, overheating and placing combustibles too near a heat source can all be factors that contribute to the increased risk.

To help residents keep safe and minimise the dangers of electric heater fires, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service is warning people to take extra care and follow this advice: Buy a heater that carries the British Standard Institution (BSI) kite mark and read the manufacturer's instructions and warning labels before use.

- DO NOT leave heaters unattended
- DO NOT use your heater with a power strip or extension cord. Overheating of a power strip or extension cord could result in a fire.
- Keep combustible materials, such as furniture, pillows, bedding, papers, clothes and curtains at least one meter from the front of the heater and away from the sides and rear.
- DO NOT block the heater's air intake or exhaust source.
- Keep flammable materials away from the heater.
- Unplug the heater when not in use
- DO NOT use a heater with
- a damaged cord. - DO NOT plug any other electrical device into

the same outlet as your heater. This could result in overheating.

- Heaters should be kept away from children and not be placed in a child's room without supervision.
- Place heater on a level, flat surface. Only use the heater on table tops when specified by the manufacturer.
- DO NOT place your heater on furniture. It could fall, dislodging or breaking parts in the heater or fall and ignite furniture.

Advice for the safe use of portable gas heaters is as follows:

- Ensure the appliance is serviced regularly. If it develops a fault it can emit Carbon Monoxide.
- Always install a Carbon Monoxide alarm when using gas appliances.
- Ensure there is adequate ventilation when using the appliance.
- Check that the valve on the empty cylinder is closed before disconnecting from the heater. Do not turn on the valve of the new cylinder until the cylinder is securely connected to the heater.
- Ensure that the pierceable cartridge is empty before removing. Check that the valve on the heater is closed, the sealing washer is in good condition and correctly located before fitting a new cartridge.
- Store spare cylinders outside whenever possible. Never store them in basements, near drains, under stairs or in cupboards containing electric meters or equipment.
- Spare cylinders must be stored upright.
- Never use a lighted match or any other flame to test for

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# **Cook Carefully**

A call for careful cooking is being issued after a spate of kitchen fires around the county.

New figures from Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service show that between 1 April 2013 and 31 October 2013 there were a total of 61 cooking-related incidents county-wide - with the Workington locality (which covers Allerdale and north Copeland) topping the chart with 26 incidents.

The Barrow locality (covering Barrow, south Copeland and part of South Lakeland) has seen 14 incidents, Carlisle (covering Carlisle and north Eden) 17 and Kendal (covering South Lakeland and southern Eden) four.

While the number of cooking-related fires has been lower over this period than the same time last year, firefighters are calling on residents to show more care.

Cumbria's Chief Fire Officer Ian Cartwright said: "More than half of all accidental house fires start in the kitchen so it's absolutely crucial that people are aware of the dangers when cooking and take steps to keep themselves and their families safe. Getting distracted is often the cause of cooking fires. It's very easy to forget you've got something boiling in a pan or roasting in the oven, so just ensuring you're switched on and paying attention to what you're doing in the kitchen can go a long way towards reducing the fire risk. Just about every piece of kitchen equipment from chip-pans to toasters and hot-plates to microwaves can be a potential fire hazard if not treated with care. As well as being aware of cooking fire safety in your own home, I'd encourage people to look out for their friends, family and neighbours, especially if they're vulnerable through age or disability and living alone."

Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service is encouraging people to follow these hints and tips for staying safe:

- Keep handles of pans turned to the back of the hob and away from other gas burners/electric rings.
- Take care when cooking with oil it sets alight easily.
  Take pans off the heat and

- turn off the hob and/or grill if you have to leave the kitchen while cooking, and make sure the oven, hob and grill is turned off when you have finished cooking.
- Don't overfill a chip pan with oil – never fill it more than one third full.
- Avoid cooking if you are tired, have been drinking excessive amounts of alcohol or are taking medication that can make you drowsy.
- Keep electrical leads, tea towels, cloths, loose clothing and anything else that may catch fire away from the oven and hob.
- Keep the oven, hob and grill clean a build-up of fat and grease can easily catch fire.
- Keep your toaster clean, free of crumbs and away from curtains, kitchen rolls and anything else that could catch fire
- Never put anything metallic inside your microwave.
- Never attempt to sterilise dish cloths or sponges by heating them in the microwave.
- Never overload sockets use one plug in each socket. If you have to, use a fused adapter and keep the total output to no more than 13 amps (a kettle alone uses 13 amps). Remember, high-rated appliances such as washing machines always need their own socket.
- Make sure plugs have the correct fuse for the appliance being used. If in doubt, refer to the manufacturers instructions.
- Turn off electrical appliances when not being used and have them serviced regularly.
- Keep electrical leads and appliances away from water.
- Use a spark device to light gas cookers as this is safer than using matches or lighters.
- Never leave children alone in the kitchen. Keep matches, lighters and pan handles where children can't reach them. Fit a child safety catch to the oven door.

By educating people about fire dangers and promoting prevention rather than cure, CFRS has brought about a major decrease in fire incidents across Cumbria in the last six years – a 47 per cent reduction between 2007-08 and 2012-13.

# Money Advice Service

Advice on managing money, benefits and other finance-related issues is just a mouse click away thanks to Cumbria County Council's library service.

The new online resource is a one-stop-shop for links to tried and tested websites that contain a wealth of information relevant to work, welfare and finances, and can be accessed by following the 'Business, Welfare and Lifestyle Information' link at www. cumbria.gov.uk/libraries.

Statistics show that one in six Cumbrian households have an annual income of less than £10,000, over 42,000 people of working age claim benefits, and 16 per cent of children live in poverty.

For those in work, wages and salaries in Cumbria are relativity low with earning in some parts of the county significantly lower than national and regional averages.

The new online resource from the county council's library service is intended to provide more information in one place for people who need help and advice.

#### Gainsborough Showers Electric Shower

#### **HP Chromebook 11**

HP say you may continue to use any other certified micro-USB charger, for example one provided with a tablet or smartphone.

What Should You Do If You Have An Affected HP Chromebook 11? If you have one of the affected HP Chromebook 11's you should stop using the charger supplied with it. You can register your HP Chromebook 11 for a charger replacement at Charger Replacement Request. HP say that it may take up to 6 weeks to get your replacement charger.

Mogwai's Stuart Braithwaite said: "The drowned village poetry competition really appealed to us on many levels. I think that inspiring people to write poetry is wonderful and the opportunity to accompany it with my music was too good to pass by. I also feel that supporting libraries is absolutely essential. They are vital for our communities and have to be cherished and protected."

# We Didn't Have This 'Green Thing' In Our Day!

This arrived by email, author unknown, but very true for all of us oldies. We know that it's not all our fault.

Checking out at the supermarket, the young cashier suggested to the much older woman, that she should bring her own grocery bags because plastic bags weren't good for the environment.

The woman apologised and explained, "We didn't have this 'green thing' back in my earlier days."

The young cashier responded, "That's our problem today - your generation did not care enough to save our environment for future generations."

She was right - our generation didn't have the 'green thing' in its day.

Back then, we returned milk bottles, lemonade bottles and beer bottles to the shop. The shop sent them back to the plant to be washed and sterilised and refilled, so it could use the same bottles over and over. So they really were recycled.

But we didn't have the "green thing" back in our day.

Grocery shops bagged our groceries in brown paper bags, that we reused for numerous things, most memorable besides household bags for rubbish, was the use of brown paper bags as book covers for our schoolbooks. This was to ensure that public property (the books provided for our use by the school), was not defaced by our scribblings. Then we were able to personalise our books on the brown paper bags.

But too bad we didn't do the "green thing" back then.

We walked up stairs, because we didn't have a lift in every supermarket, shop and office building. We walked to the local shop and didn't climb into a 100 horsepower machine every time we had to go half a mile.

But she was right. We didn't have the "green thing" in our day.

Back then, we washed the baby's Terry Towel nappies because we didn't have the throwaway kind. When we packaged a fragile item to send in the mail, we used wadded up old newspapers to cushion it, not Styrofoam or plastic bubble wrap. Back then, we didn't fire up an engine and burn petrol just to cut the lawn. We pushed the mower that ran on human power. We exercised by working so we didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity.

But she's right; we didn't have the "green thing" back

We drank from a tap or fountain when we were thirsty instead of using a cup or a plastic bottle every time we had a drink of water. We refilled writing pens with ink instead of buying a new pen, and we replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull.

But we didn't have the "green thing" back then.

Back then, people took the bus and kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their Mums into a 24-hour taxi service in the family's £30,000 'People Carrier' which cost the same as a whole house did before the "green thing." We had one electrical outlet in a room, not an entire bank of sockets to power a dozen appliances and we didn't need a computerised gadget to receive a signal beamed from satellites 23,000 miles out in space in order to find the nearest Pub!

But isn't it sad that the current generation laments how wasteful we old folks were just because we didn't have the "green thing" back

Please forward this on to another selfish old person who needs a lesson in conservation from a smartarse young person...

Here endeth the lesson!



It is with much regret and sadness that I have to report the demise of the Ramsey Steamship Company, (RSSCo), which occurred on 28th November 2013. This well-known and respected shipping company, based at Ramsey on the Isle of Man, was formed just over 100 years ago, in April 1913 and traded mainly to and from ports around the Irish Sea, including Silloth. My report in the January 2013 edition of the Solway Buzz detailed the company history. The downfall of the RSSCo was reportedly due to unfavourable trading conditions and the overwhelming burden of company pension obligations.

The last remaining ships owned by the company were the Ben Varrey (4) 997GT and the Ben Maye (2), 548GT, both of which have now been sold to the Kent based ship owner, Angel Shipping Co. Ltd and will be managed and operated by its wholly owned subsidiary Absolute Shipping Co. Ltd, incorporated on 30th April 2013. Both these ships have been frequent visitors to Silloth and will continue to do so under the new management company, retaining their existing names for the time being, but ship spotters will notice that, whilst the hull colour

Goodbye to RSSCo and hello to Angel Shipping



On a totally different topic, you may remember that back in the September 2013 edition of the Solway Buzz, I wrote about the opening of a new branch of the Mission to Seafarers, here at Silloth. Also about what you could personally do, along with a small team of knitters, to make life a little easier for the seafarers visiting Silloth. Liz Elliott, who runs the local branch, has received a very nice email from the 2nd Officer of a ship called 'Scot Venture,' which has called both at Silloth and Workington in recent months. Liz Elliott

visited the ship and handed over some Christmas parcels for the crew, which included a few woollen hats knitted by local people. The email from the ship stated, "The 'Scot Venture'

is one of a small fleet that plies between the UK and Northern European ports. It can get pretty cold in that area, especially in the Baltic Sea, with the sea being frozen over for much of the winter. The Scot Line crews, (along with many other crews visiting Silloth), are nearly all from the Philippines and when joining their ships in Europe they experience a considerable drop in temperature from 30 degrees Celsius at home, to whatever it is in their new area of operation. Even in the spring

and occasionally the summer months, it will be a huge shock and acclimatization can take some time. The crew would not bring their own hats with them, because where could you get, or possibly need, a woollen hat in the Philippines? On arrival at Silloth or Workington, to be presented with a warm, woolly hat is a Godsend. Heartfelt thanks go to all the knitters, from seafarers across the world. Sterling work ladies and please keep it up".

So there you are, an example of how the work of local volunteer knitters, in association with the Mission to Seafarers, is really appreciated by those who's working life takes them far from home.

# Go Green

Coming soon - chance for households to become greener.

Households looking to become even greener in the New Year will be able to get heavily discounted home food waste digesters, thanks to a new initiative by Cumbria County Council.



Residents in Allerdale, Barrow and Eden will be able to start ordering the units in February 2014 after the council successfully bid for funding from the Department for Communities and Local Government's Weekly Collection Support Scheme.

The three districts chosen are being targeted specifically in the £606,000 project as they still operate a weekly waste collection. The food digesters will reduce the need to collect and treat up to 1,300 tonnes of waste per year, and will reduce carbon emissions by approximately 4,600 tonnes per year.

Around 6,500 households will have the opportunity to receive a food digester. There are two types of units, one producing a rich compost and the other a minimal residue, which can handle all types of food waste (including cooked or uncooked meat, fish and dairy). They will be available for households to purchase at a discount of 75% approximately £15-£20 each.

Following a procurement exercise, the council has appointed Great Green Systems Ltd to carry out order fulfilment and delivery of the units to properties.

Councillor Clare Feeney-Johnson, Cumbria County Council Cabinet member for Environment, said: "I'm delighted we have secured funding for this exciting initiative, which will offer fantastic savings for households looking to compost all their food waste at home. I would encourage residents to take advantage of this scheme, which will have a really positive impact on the environment and also help reduce the council's waste treatment costs."

Full details of how to apply for discounted units will be made available when the scheme is officially launched in the New Year.




