More Places to Pay the Council

More choice of places to pay Council bills **Residents and business**

owners in Allerdale will soon be able to pay their Council related bills at more than 27,000 places across the UK and around 60 places in the borough when a new payment system takes effect this spring.

From 1st April 2014, cash payments including Council Tax and Allerdale invoices can be made at any shop, business or post office accepting Paypoint payments, giving people more than 10 times more places to pay than at present.

At the same time, the Council's five existing offices will stop taking cash payments. People currently using the offices for these services are being advised to sign up to direct debit to make payments and arrange to receive any payments from the Council directly into their bank or building society current accounts.

A previous survey carried out among visitors to Council offices revealed that as many as 80 per cent of people said it would be useful to have more places to pay. These new places not only

open outside typical working hours making it much more convenient for residents who work full time.

Councillor Philip Tibble, Executive Member for Customer and Regulatory Services, said: "Straight away this new service offers much more choice and flexibility to residents who will now have the option to pay their bills in places like garages, which have extended opening hours and not be restricted to the 9-5 working day. They will also have less distance to travel to reach a payment facility making the whole process quicker, easier and much more convenient. Although the majority of people currently make their council tax payments by direct debit, we appreciate that some people do still value face-to-face contact and we want to make sure that everyone can access our services, whether they choose to do so online, over the phone, or face-to-face."



We were left feeling how very lucky we are in this country not to have the depth of poverty Lynne witnessed on her journeys and we are encouraged to pray for our fellow members throughout the World.



a party and cheer on the PJ Paraders when they return to the racecourse.







Solway Shore Walks

Ann Lingard, who writes the Solway Shore Stories, www.solwayshorestories. co.uk – about the people who live and work along the coast and on the Firth – will again be running her informal guided shore walks on the English side of the Firth.

Depending on weather and tide, walks usually take in the submerged forest, the Sabellaria reefs, and look at the animals that live in the sand, in the pools, and cling onto hard surfaces – or that end up on the tide lines. Burrowing sea-anemones, mussel spat, green sponges, Roman 'loom-stones', even alien animals that have been cast up by the sea – you never know what you will find!



Dear Buzz,

Its hard to believe that Cumbria has just earned the unenviable status of most obese County in the UK and fluoridated Copeland that of most obese borough. The fluoridated North East is rated most obese region. Obesity is a public health concern for Cumbria County Council and they are right to have to have it as priority issue to tackle. Whilst poor diet and over indulgence are factors in weight gain there are many Cumbrian's, some 70,000 people on the West Coast who are disadvantaged in attempting to control their weight by the presence of fluoride in their water. Fluoride displaces iodine in the thyroid gland and contributes to poor functioning of the thyroid. If the thyroid is underactive the metabolism suffers and the ability to burn fat diminishes. There are many health concerns connected to water fluoridation. Cumbrian's against Fluoride formed to oppose water fluoridation in Cumbria and has information on its website www. cumbriansagainstfluoride. com. 



The role of a Harbour Master is wide and varied, simply because no two ports in the world are the same. So whilst the core duties will be common to most ports, the peripheral responsibilities will vary from port to port.

In very general terms, the Harbour Master is that principal person who normally exercises jurisdiction over the waters of a port and/or the port approaches. In exercising that jurisdiction, he possesses an authority conferred on him by national law, which can only be over-ridden in this country by the Secretary of State.

The Harbour Master's core duties encompass

the Harbour Master is a person who has a professional maritime background and who has an understanding of the business of ship-masters and ship handling. That will include the practical difficulties to be encountered in bringing vessels in and out of his harbour. Whereas the ship-master is always responsible for the safety of his ship, the Harbour Master has the responsibility for the safety of the harbour and at no time should he knowingly invite a ship into danger. The Harbour Master will, if necessary, provide a pilotage service to guide ships safely in and out of his harbour, supported by a port based 'vessel traffic information service, to relay up to date safety information to the ship-master and his pilot.

In order to provide a safe haven for shipping, the Harbour Master will also need to install and maintain, in a cost effective manner, adequate aids for safe navigation within his area of jurisdiction, such as lights and buoys, whilst maintaining an adequate depth of water for the size of vessel invited to use the port. The maintenance of the necessary depth of water will probably involve provision of an efficient hydrographic survey system, to monitor any changes in approach channels and the inevitable siltation of the port area. This will be backed up if necessary by effective dredging activities from time to time. All dredging activities are carefully monitored by the national Marine Management Organisation (MMO), a government agency which ensures that dredged material does not contain toxic or harmful substances and that it is not dumped in any area which may be harmful to the marine habitat. Of ever increasing importance are the Harbour Master's duties to protect the marine environment from pollution, so as to be fully compliant with current EU environmental legislation. These duties include the provision at his port for the reception and safe disposal of accumulated solid and liquid waste products from shipping arriving at and using the port. Stringent rules must be in place in the port for the handling and transfer of bulk liquids, including fuel oils, to prevent their accidental spillage into the dock waters. The Harbour Master must have a quick response mechanism in place, approved by the

Any port activity involves an element of risk and Harbour Masters must plan a response to all foreseeable accidents or incidents. On the basis of risk assessments he will endeavour to ensure that all activities undertaken within the port area are as safe as reasonably possible. He will liaise closely with the emergency services to produce a 'Port Emergency Plan, to facilitate the safe evacuation of port workers, visitors and ship's personnel from a dangerous area and for the mobilisation of all appropriate emergency services. In small ports, such as Silloth, the Harbour Master may well be one of the marine pilots, and have additional roles to play, that would be undertaken by other senior staff in a larger port. Examples include liaison with existing customers, to ensure that their requirements are met in a mutually economical manner. He may also be involved in the promotion of

the port within the business community, with a view to attracting new customers. The Harbour Master may have to work closely with associated port users, such as stevedores, shipping agents and other shipping services, to ensure an efficient turnaround of vessels using the port. He could well be the only local point of contact for several shipping related organisations, such as Trinity House and the DfT. His responsibilities will include maintaining good relations with the local community and the port's neighbours. In conclusion, the Harbour Master is expected by the Board of his own Port Authority, to have an accurate and comprehensive knowledge of ships, shipping practice, shipping law and maritime matters in general, including an understanding of the marine environment. So, in a constantly evolving world, where costs must be minimised, the Harbour Master and especially one at a small successful port, needs to be a 'Jack of all trades' and a master of pretty well most of them!

a legal and operational responsibility for the movement of shipping and more significantly, to ensure that those shipping movements within his jurisdiction are carried out safely. He will be responsible for the marine department within his particular port organisation, which controls the activities and operation of many facets including all port craft, dock-gate or lock movements, tugs, linehandlers, surveyors, dredgers, berth allocation, pollution countermeasures, etc.

In most ports, although not all, (some marinas or fishing ports for example),





