John Raises £1,300 for Silloth Lifeboat

In the late 1960s I came to Silloth to start rod fishing on the Solway Firth. Over the years I got to know a lot of people in Silloth, when I was fishing, I sometimes saw the Lifeboat going out to rescue people who had got into difficulties.

When I moved to Silloth I often heard the maroon going off to summon the crew to man the Lifeboat. Two years ago I had saved a Demijohn bottle full of 1, 2, 5, 10 and 20 pence coins. I came up with idea of raising funds for Silloth Lifeboat Station.

I think I have the gift of the gab, so I asked people to guess how much was in the bottle and to donate a pound a guess. The total amount in the bottle was £365.74p and I was able to donate £715 to Silloth Lifeboat Station.

This year I filled another Demijohn full of 1, 2, 5, 10 and 20 pence coins and asked



people to guess how many coins in the bottle. Good friends Mr &

Mrs Atkinson of Caldew Kitchens, Millhouse, Hesket Newmarket kindly donated the £50 prize for the competition.

The total number of coins in the bottle was 4,487. The winner was Mrs Barkley from Wigan, her guess was 4,485. This time the total amount raised was £1,300. It gave me great pleasure

Thanks to David Heath and Michael Humphrey for helping me to count the coins.





I have done various foot patrols in the town and I have spoken to many local people who have ALL been very welcoming and friendly and I am looking forward to working in Silloth in the coming months and years.





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

Claim Your Free Childcare

Another call is being issued to parents and guardians across Cumbria reminding them to apply for free child care as new rules mean more will qualify. Currently 20% of two-yearolds are eligible for free child care places, but that figure is set to rise to 40% from September 2014.

Cumbria County Council is again writing to families who may be eligible inviting them to submit applications.

Free child care helps parents with child care costs and gives them more time to access work and training opportunities. Children also get the chance to experience new activities and make new friends as well as enhance their development in preparation for school.

Eligible children are entitled to 570 hours annually - equating to 15 hours a week or three hours a day during term time, although this can be child care provider. The Department for Education has forecast



around 1,850 families in Cumbria will be eligible for places in September 2014.

Families may be eligible to apply if:

• the family annual income is less than £16,190

• the child is looked after by the local authority or has left care through special guardianship or an adoption or residence order

• a current statement of special educational needs (SEN) or an education, health and care plan is in place.

• the child is in receipt of disability allowance

Allerdale Borough Council is once again offering children the opportunity to enjoy summer swimming for just a 10p entry charge to swimming pools across the area.

Last year, more than 5,000 children aged 16 and under took part in the popular scheme at councilowned pools in Workington, Cockermouth, and Keswick as well as Wigton Pool and Maryport's Netherhall Pool.

Jointly supported by Allerdale Borough Council and Cumbria County Council, the 10p entry offer will run throughout the summer holidays from Saturday 19th July to Wednesday 3rd September. Selected sessions will vary between the pools taking part so people are advised to check with their local pool for timetable details.

Encouraging young



people to be more active is a key priority for Allerdale Borough Council and it has joined forces with its sport and leisure partner, Carlisle Leisure Ltd, to run the scheme in a bid to get more children using the local swimming pools during the summer school holidays.

Councillor Alan Smith, Leader of Allerdale Borough Council said, "This scheme has proved to be extremely popular among local children so we're really pleased to be

re-launching it again this year. With obesity issues in the UK recently hitting the headlines, it is important for this Council to ensure that all children are firstly able to access sport and leisure facilities to then be able to keep fit, active and healthy. Hopefully this scheme will once again encourage local children to make the most of the attractions and activities we have available in Allerdale and enjoy an active, fun filled summer."

Be Careful with Garden Waste

Allerdale Borough Council is reminding residents across the borough that only garden waste material should be placed in garden bins for collection.

There have been some recent instances of garden waste material being contaminated by incorrectly disposed of non-garden waste items. Non-garden waste includes contents like dog faeces and cat litter, kitchen waste, rubble, bricks and soil.

If garden waste sent for composting is found to be contaminated, it could end up costing the Council hundreds of pounds for each contaminated load.

The only items that should be placed in garden waste bins are grass, leaves, dead plants, hedge clippings, fruit, weeds, and flowers. Anything else should be disposed of through normal household waste bins, recycled in purple bags, or taken to a household waste recycling site.

Councillor Michael Heaslip, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive Member for Locality Services, said: "It costs the Council valuable time and money each year

to separate incorrectly disposed of waste, which could be put to much better use. Something like dog mess being thrown in one bin can contaminate the entire load but can easily be avoided by people taking a little more care and attention with their waste. Garden bins should be used for garden waste only and anyone found to be incorrectly using these bins may face having their bin removed. We appreciate the ongoing co-operation of the public with this issue."

New Speed Limits Proposed for Allerdale Roads

A number of roads in Allerdale could see their speed limits changed under proposals put forward by Cumbria County Council.

The proposals, which have been drawn up following a comprehensive review of speed limits on every stretch of the A and B road network in the borough under the control of Cumbria County Council.

The review has been undertaken in line with Department for Transport guidance and seeks to ensure speed limits are evidence led, clear and reinforce public perception of a safe speed to travel.

Road accident figures and traffic speed and volume figures were considered as part of the review, which also took account of the needs of all road users, including pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders as well as all vehicle drivers.


The review also considered requests for changes to speed limits on other parts of the road network, including C and Unclassified roads. Following the comprehensive review, changes are being proposed to 15 speed limits throughout Allerdale which could see the existing restrictions either raised or lowered, depending on what conditions dictate.

Thursday 17 July (3.30pm-5.45pm) – Maryport Library Tuesday 22 July (2pm-5pm) – Keswick Town Hall

All consultation responses must be submitted to the council by Friday 22nd August, and the proposals will then be considered by the county council's Allerdale Local Committee later this year.

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

Dear Buzz,

Having recently visited Wigton and Maryport cemeteries, I have been impressed at how tidy they are and the good facilities for obtaining water and flowers.

At Causewayhead there has been no mains water for about two years and the outer building has not seen a coat of paint for a long time.



Marshall Dock Celebrations 1859 and 2009

FREE ENTR

amongst us who were not here in 1859, let me give you a taste of what went on back then.

It was one hundred and fifty five years ago. The big day, 3rd August 1859, had started out breezy but fair, with several ships lying in the dock. The dock itself had been receiving the occasional ship from early July, whilst finishing works were still being undertaken around the dock entrance. Prior to that and since its completion in 1857, shipping had been restricted to utilising the new timber piled pier, extending 1,000ft out into the Solway. There was considerable interest in

Dock Opening Celebrations - 3rd August 1859

Houses and conspicuous points were liberally decorated with bunting. The royal standard was hung from Silloth's railway bridge, whilst national and foreign ensigns were flown from numerous flagpoles. On their arrival at Silloth station, the Mayor of Carlisle, his Corporation and other VIP's, followed the Yeomanry Cavalry Band in procession to the dock, to board the steamship 'Silloth' lying alongside the pier.

All the other ships in dock and on the pier, which had arrived from Dumfries, Annan, Maryport, Liverpool and other ports, were smartly turned out, packed with spectators and decorated with bunting. Shortly before 4pm, just before high water and with a choppy sea running, 'The 'Silloth' left the pier and made a graceful sweeping turn off the town to the occasional sound of booming cannons, before aligning herself again with the dock entrance. As she passed through the entrance gates, the crowd began cheering non-stop. The 'Silloth' manoeuvred to take up a position in the centre of the dock, whereupon the

Dock Company Chairman and Carlisle industrialist Mr J.P. Dixon stepped up to the bow stating, "I declare that this 'Marshall Dock' is now open for traffic". (the dock being named after Mr William Marshall, the local MP and influential supporter of the whole dock and railway undertaking). Three hearty cheers resounded around the dock and from the ships, followed by prayers to complete the inauguration ceremony. 'The 'Silloth' was brought alongside to disembark her passengers and the steamers on the pier joined those already in the dock. Some 400 VIP's were entertained within a marquee, erected on the Green outside the Queen's Hotel. Numerous speeches followed the meal, whilst outside the crowds ate their picnics and took full advantage of the local hostelries, under the watchful eyes of officers from the Cumberland & Westmorland police force! Happily no incidents were reported either on that particular day, nor were there 150 years later at the Dock Anniversary Celebrations in 2009.

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Dock 150th Anniversary Celebrations, 8th & 9th August 2009

I was recently looking through a folder from the port archive, of photographs, posters, articles and notes, of the Dock's 150th Anniversary Weekend, which took place back in August 2009. Engrossed in that album of memorabilia, it occurred to me that it is now just about five years since it took place. Is there someone around here that is fast-forwarding the clocks and if not, then where has all that time gone?

It was, from my point of view, a great 150th birthday party for both the port and the town and well worth celebrating. In addition to the unveiling on Silloth Green of a specially carved Anniversary Board and an exhibition of artefacts at the town's Heritage Centre, we had a 'bit of a do' at the docks, with lots of vessels, aircraft and other attractions, much as there was when the port was officially opened in 1859, (except for the aircraft of course! Powered flight didn't begin until 44 years later, in 1903). For those

both in Carlisle, (for whose commercial benefit the dock had been built) and in the surrounding district. A public holiday had been declared in Carlisle from 10am that day, where various dignitaries, marching bands and a huge crowd had been assembling for the rail journey to Silloth. Specially decorated extra trains had been laid on from Carlisle station, but the huge crowd far exceeded expectations. An engine breakdown at Carlisle created major problems and delays, so open cattle trucks were pressed into service to convey many of the people to the coast. As the day progressed, the weather became less clement, with heavy rain showers rattling through on the wind. Eventually the throng from Carlisle joined the crowds already at Silloth, the total



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£200,000 for Local Sport

Allerdale Borough Council receives more than £200,000 to give local sport a boost

Allerdale Borough Council is set to help more local people get into sport thanks to £203,485 of National Lottery funding from Sport England's **Community Sport** Activation Fund.

Allerdale Borough Council is among 88 projects to receive a share of £15 million of funding to support grass roots sport activity across the country.

The funding will allow Allerdale Borough Council to develop a new 3-year programme of sporting activities aimed at adults aged from 14 and upwards, of all sporting abilities, emphasising it is never too late to get involved in sport and physical activity. It will also allow for further development of existing schemes like the Friday Night Projects, which currently run at six venues across the area.

Additional funding contributions have come from Allerdale Borough Council, Carlisle Leisure, St Joseph's School, Inspira, Cumbrian SPAA, Yours and Impact Housing Associations, all of which have contributed time and money.

In line with the Council Plan, part of the funding will also be used to support and develop a number of mass participation events, starting with GOTRI - the first of a series of family-friendly triathlons to take place in the county - on Saturday 30th August.

Councillor Mark Fryer,

Allerdale Borough Council's Executive Member for Economic Growth said: "As a keen sports fan myself, who is passionate about improving access to sports in Allerdale and West Cumbria, I am absolutely delighted to receive funding from the Community Sport Activation Fund. It will allow us to develop our sports provision and build on the strong tradition of sporting excellence in this area. Designed in response to local demand, the Community Sport Activation Fund allows local authorities, charities and other organisations to apply for funding for innovative projects that will get more people playing sport.

Mike Diaper, Sport England Director of Community Sport, said: "It's great to be working with innovative projects, like Allerdale Borough Council to offer people the chance to get into sport in a way that best suits them. The investment being made through the Community Sport Activation Fund is making a real difference at a very local level. I'm particularly pleased that more than half the funding is going into projects in deprived areas, helping more people develop a lifelong sporting habit."

The Community Sport Activation Fund is investing a total of £47.5 million of funding over five funding rounds. Already 156 projects have shared in £27.2 million of funding over three rounds, receiving grants of between £50,000 and £250,000 to provide grass roots sport at a very local level.
