## Riding C2C for Hospice at Home



David Allen have put a team together to take part in Hospice at Home (Carlisle and North Lakeland)'s Coast to Coast cycle challenge this June.

On 5th June the team will be dipping their bike tyres into the Irish Sea at Whitehaven and setting off to cycle across the breadth and backbone of England. Over three days the team will cycle the 150 mile journey through the beautiful Lake District, over the roof of England and the Northern Pennines and on to their destination of Tynemouth on the East Coast.

The team consists of Kerrie Allison from Silloth, Alison Allen, Vicky Johnston, Robert Nordon and Lisa Irving who are aiming to raise £4,000 for the charity Hospice at Home Carlisle and North Lakeland. Hospice at Home are a truly worthwhile cause, they provide a free trained nursing service at home for people suffering from cancer and other

life threatening illnesses supporting their families and carers. Sometimes as little as simply talking to someone who understands can make a real difference to someone suffering. For just £20 Hospice at Home can provide a counselling session, free of charge, to someone in our local area among many other meaningful activities.

SSW is an indoor festival that features fifty of the world's leading House and Soul DJ's and artistes, more akin to the kind of line-ups you see on the golden Isle of Ibiza, not sunny Silloth. In fact, amazingly, Café Del Mar's legendary resident DJ Jose Padilla will be flying in from Ibiza to host the eight hour outdoor pool party at SSW on Saturday afternoon right here in Silloth.

Joining Padilla at this musical maelstrom in the indoor arenas will be a host of famous, international House Music, Jazz,

Northern/60's Soul, Modern Soul and rare Disco and Funk DJ's and live acts such as the legendary Latin Soul king Joe Bataan, who is flying in from New York to perform and Robert Owens from Chicago will be in attendance also. Owens has

Late Nite Tuff Guy, the current darling of the festival scene, including Reading and Wickerman, Keb Darge, Japan's favourite DJ, Shur I Kan and the two original resident DJ's from Studio 54, Kenny Carpenter and Nicky Siano. Also DJ'ing is a former member of Snow Patrol, Tom Simpson, who is a self-confessed "vinyl Junkie"; he joins the Rhumba team at the pool party.

Don't expect to hear well known Motown and Disco tracks at SSW though; tracks such as 'Heard It Through



'The Grapevine' or Sister Sledge's 'We Are Family' are not on the playlist. These guys pay up to £30,000 for ONE seven inch single and so collectors from all around the world will descend on Silloth to follow their DJ idols and hear these almost mythical "slates of vinyl".

Promoter Yogi Haughton, who runs the five year old event along with Caroline Jessop said, "we literally have folk travel from Australia, America, Japan and all over Europe to attend the event, it's an annual pilgrimage for many". When the Solway Buzz asked Yogi what a novice might expect at SSW he said, "we dress the venue throughout to make all the rooms very different from the normal discotheque look, we bring in state of the art sound systems, I can guarantee there will NEVER have been sound in Silloth like the Void Incubus rigs we use, it's all about high end production. There is a real family feel to the event also, everybody follows the event around the country and we have outgrown two previous towns now, so we hope to settle in Silloth for a good few years".

The benefits to the area are obvious; Yogi calculated almost £750,000 was injected in Dumfries's coffers when SSW was residing there. As was the case in Dumfries, all the local Silloth hotels are sold out and local businesses can look forward to some visitors from far and wide popping into their shops, Yogi promised.

The event runs for three days and three nights from mid-afternoon until 7am Friday and Saturday and 7pm close on Sunday, with an after party at 11pm through until 4:30am Monday. The event is looking forward to welcoming locals to come and see what it's all about and joining in the marathon dance-athon and becoming part of the SSW family.

Security is tight and entry is by passes only, which can be purchased at Stanwix Holiday Park, Greenrow, Silloth or online at www. sswevents.com where you can also see the staggering full line up. Passes are £99 per person in advance or walk up on the day £120. The Sunday night after party tickets are £12. For more info call Caroline on 07540 112220.

# **Airfield Project Celebration was Full to Capacity**

On Friday 24th April, Silloth Tourism Action Group (STAG) held a celebration evening to mark the end of their year long 'Silloth Airfield' project, which was funded by Heritage Lottery

During the evening, which was introduced by the group's Chairman John Cook and the Town's Mayor, Tony Markley, STAG showcased what they have achieved over the past year. Outcomes include:

• A website tracing the history of the airfield and highlighting memories of the men and women who were based there during WWII - at https://sillothairfield. wordpress.com/ (designed and administered by Anna Malina, Project Coordinator)

• A documentary film about the airfield and its memories (script Anna Malina, voiceover Tim Barker, recorded by Geoff Betsworth and edited by professional film-maker John Hamlett of Lunar.co.uk)

• A diorama of the airfield, complete with buildings, hangars, runways and planes



replicating the aerodrome as it was during WWII (Designed and built by Brian Irwin)

A Simulator for landing a WWII Beaufighter on Runway 21 Silloth Airfield (by Open Source **Programmer Stuart** Buchanan)

A Simulator loaned by the team from the Solway Aviation Museum An Exhibition of information and WWII artefacts (Pop-up displays designed by Mike Hughes and printed by John Cook Signs; artefacts relating to the airfield loaned by a number of local people, the Solway Aviation Museum and Dumfries and Galloway Aviation Museum) • A vintage stall set up by Kirsten Johnson • A WWII table display made by the pupils at Silloth Primary School • A stall with artefacts set up by the Solway Aviation Museum

The evening was a roaring success with youngsters from the Solway Community Technology College involved in a performance drama. Coached by Jonny Sunter with script by Veronica Perrins, the youngsters put on a brilliant performance, illustrating their indepth knowledge and understanding of their local airfield's proud role during WWII.

A documentary-style film about the airfield was shown after the drama. The story covered many aspects of the airfield's history. Much thanks is due to Rex Morris, a former aero engineer at the airfield, for first hand stories about his time there. Gratitude also to Pamela Coates for photos and memoirs of her parents, George and Elsie Doughty (nee Pattinson). George was an aero engineer on the airfield at 22MU and a lifelong friend of Rex's, while Elsie was an armourer, responsible for loading the guns and ammunition on the fighter planes at Silloth Aerodrome. Local man, Lawrence Marshall recalled his earliest memories of the airfield, and a few of George

and Rex's stories were also told. These accounts in particular touched members of the audience, many of whom were in tears by the end, especially after Tim Barker's reading of the lyrics he'd written for a song about 'Hudson Bay' many years ago. The song, with Tim's lyrics, has also been recorded for the project. Tim's words are sung by Cumbrian folk singer, Craig Duggon, accompanied by local guitar teacher Geoff Bettsworth, who plays several instruments in the piece. The song will be available in due course on the Airfield website. Geoff Betsworth also did a great job of recording the voiceover for the film in his home studio.

During WWII, air crews at RAF Silloth's Operational Training Unit were trained using the 'Silloth Trainer,' a type of familiarisation 'simulator' for learning drills and the handling of malfunctions. Developed by Wing Commander Isles at RAF Silloth, and built from the fuselage of a Halifax Bomber, the trainer taught basic flying behaviour.

In addition, all the engine, electric and hydraulic systems were emulated. It was said that many of the parts inside the trainer were made from piano parts. There must have been many pianos with bits missing in Silloth, since fourteen Silloth Trainers were built for use by

other Operational Training Units in the UK. Emulating the Silloth Trainer, 'open source' programmer Stuart Buchanan wrote a programme for special computer simulator or SIM, allowing people at the event to land a WWII plane on Runway 21, Silloth Airfield. Young and old 'trainee pilots' at the celebration enjoyed sitting in a real Spitfire cockpit, loaned by Niall Paterson, to land the plane (or not).

A leaflet about the airfield, designed by mikehughescreative.com and a souvenir programme by Yvonne Parkes was given to each member of the audience. Jennifer Rowlands, Judith Schafer, James and the other helpful staff at Solway Community Technology College deserve special mention. The school did an impressive job of hosting and providing the buffet, not to mention their skills in crowd control. Thanks also to Sheona Nichols from the RAFA Club in Silloth, who did an equally impressive job providing a welcome selection of refreshments.

Jazz Band, The Cumberland Hot Shots (npenninemusic.co.uk), led the audience down memory lane with their reminiscent rendition of WWII music and songs. Band member Chris Perrins saved the day when he wired up the band's sound system for the film show after the school system hit a problem.

Anna Malina, Silloth Green's Community Engagement Officer, worked with the STAG Team, and co-ordinated the project on their behalf. Thanks to Silloth Town Council, who lent their support too. A great team effort for a fantastic project that has re-energised pride in the local airfield and the men and women - civilians and aircrew - who were based there.

While the funding period for the current project has now ended, STAG will be working in partnership with Silloth Town Council to continue their endeavours to preserve the heritage of the airfield and the memories of the men and women who were based there.

Silloth Tourism Action Group said "We offer our sincere thanks to the many airmen and civilian personnel who came from all over the UK and other allied countries to serve at Silloth Aerodrome during WWII. We are very proud and forever grateful for the service you gave, and we will support ongoing efforts to preserve your memories and stories of the airfield into the future."

### Silloth Given Land Worth £75,000

Cumbria County Council's Cabinet has agreed to hand over the ownership of land and property with a total value of nearly half a million pounds to two local communities.

The former Workington Sixth Form Centre at Moorclose will be transferred to the Moorclose Community Centre. The transfer of the asset, which has a total market value in the region of £400,000, will secure its future.

In addition, four plots of land worth an estimated £75,000 in Silloth, including the Railway Playing Fields, will be transferred to Silloth Town Council. This will allow the town council to provide improved sports facilities, new dedicated green spaces and a new pedestrian access between the town centre and a new housing development.

Both transfers have been made possible as a result of Cumbria County Council's Community Asset Transfer scheme and they are the result of months of work between the two communities and Cumbria County Council.

A county council spokesperson said: "We are committed to securing the best use for our assets and, even in the current financial climate, this may mean the transfer of a property as opposed to its sale. By transferring assets to the local community we are securing their future and ensuring that we are doing all that we can to support our communities."

# Trekking along the Inca Trail

In April Margaret English and Tim Barker along with thirteen other explorers set off for Peru taking Paddington Bear for a trip to his homeland and Miles Bear from the Great North Air Ambulance as many people have sponsored them by giving money to this worthy cause.

The adventure was incredible starting in the lovely city of Lima the capital of Peru. They visited the desert to the south and flew over the Nazca lines which are the enormous etchings in the desert sand, which form one of the world's great archaeological mysteries. Such fun viewed from the air in their little 4 seater plane.

After lots of road travel they arrived in Cuzco and having explored the area began their trek to Machu Picchu. It was astonishing and impossible to imagine without being there. Four days of basic camping taking all supplies with us with the help of Peruvian porters carrying everything, food, tents etc. Surprisingly the altitude only upset their tummies, though they were at anything between 2,500 meters and 4,200 metres up and had to walk slowly in the thin air. Elation on the second day to trek from 3,000 up to 4,215 metres to dead woman's pass and to happily start downhill after. Unfortunately, camp was further than envisaged, this left them feeling very exhausted as it was getting dark, it was a very frightening experience until the porters appeared from the campsite. The next day they had time to visit Inca ruins on the way and to understand more about the amazing building techniques the Incas developed. That night the vista from camp at 3,800 metres was incredible, especially watching the sun come up on the distant mountain glaciers and over the other peaks of the Andes. The next day was a little less tough but they wondered how the Incas, such small people, were able to climb some of the enormous steps on the trail. Mid-afternoon they came through the Sun

Gate to see Machu Picchu 200 metres below in all its glory. Not a dry eye in the group, such emotion that they had all made it. Climbing slowly down into the city was so moving a totally unforgettable experience.

Tim and Margaret camped overnight in the nearby fascinating town of Aguas Calientes, like an old mining town in the Rockies, and enjoyed a well-earned celebration beer, returning the next day to explore Machu Picchu and appreciate its glory. Later on, back to Cuzco by train, a great ride through the Andes to collect the rest of our gear and to enjoy a much looked forward to hot shower. From here they travelled to Puno on the shores of Lake Titicaca and spent the next day on the Lake visiting the floating islands where the Uros people live and the island of Taquille. The lake at 3,800 metres high

is enormous, more like a sea

than a lake and forms the border with Bolivia. From there they flew back to Lima and after investigating the city returned home.

#### **On the Water Front** 'The 'Spirit of Cumbria'

Report by: Captain Slog April 2015.

Lifeboat Institution In 1979, Silloth Lifeboat Station took delivery, for a trial period, of one of the new 'Atlantic 21' inshore lifeboats, which had been developed for the RNLI at the Atlantic College in South Wales. They were to be known as the 'B-Class,' the boat delivered to Silloth was B505 – 'Major Osman Gabriel'. This innovative design of lifeboat, had a rigid glass-fibre 'V' shaped hull and keel, instead of the flat waterproof sheet that formed the bottom of the smaller 'D Class' boats. The 'Atlantic 21' inshore lifeboat, (the prototype was 21feet long), was powered by two 50hp outboard engines, giving a speed of 30 knots. By 1980, the trials had proved so successful that Silloth Lifeboat Station was equipped with its own Atlantic 21, B545 - 'Amelia Gregory Armstrong. This was an improved version of the trial boat and fitted with a roll-bar at the aft end, carrying an inflatable bag enabling the boat to be righted in the event of a capsize. The outboard engines were specially modified by the RNLI to make them immersion proof and able to be restarted after a capsize.

A new trailer was built locally, to enable the lifeboat to be hauled up and down the steep slipway using the old electric winch in the boathouse.

In 1980, the RNLI built a garage on the back of the boathouse to accommodate a tractor, which could more easily push the lifeboat and trailer out to the water's edge and pull them back up the slipway after a launch. It could also take the lifeboat to an alternative launch site if necessary.

By 1993, the RNLI had developed an improved 'B Class' inshore lifeboat, called an Atlantic 75

(approximately 7.5 metres long), with the intention of gradually taking the ageing Atlantic 21's out of service. Silloth was going to be allocated one of these new lifeboats if the cost of

the boat, £61,000, could be raised locally. Anticipating a successful appeal, the RNLI began demolishing the old boathouse in 1994 and built a new, larger boathouse with better facilities, a souvenir shop and room to take the larger lifeboat and its sophisticated launching trailer and tractor. During this rebuild period, the 'Amelia Gregory Armstrong' was housed at Silloth Docks

formally opened the new Silloth Boathouse. After 15 years of service at Silloth, the 'Spirit of Cumbria' was retired in 2010 and replaced by a new and slightly larger RNLI development of the inshore rigid-inflatable lifeboat.

This is the Atlantic 85 (approximately 8.5 metres in length). Silloth's current lifeboat is named 'Elaine & Donald Wilkinson, after their substantial bequest to the RNLI and carries a side number of B828. She is powered by two 115hp outboard engines, giving her a speed of 34 knots. With a crew of four, she has improved navigational instruments, including GPS, a radar and direction finding

# Triumphant Tigers Win Cumbria Cup & League

With the Cumbria League title now secured all eyes were on preparations for the Cumbria League Cup Final.

There were two league games left to play first up was away to Cup Final opponents Moresby who like Silloth were unbeaten on home soil all season. Silloth's players did what they have done all season and eventually ran out 31-10 winners and in doing so confirmed Silloth as the only team in Cumbria with an unbeaten home record.

Next up was away to local rival Wigton and with the cup final getting closer Coach Mark Orchard rested several key players, Silloth dominated the game start to finish and romped to victory 72-0. That victory took Silloth scoring points over the 1,000 barrier and confirmed them as the county's highest points scorers.

Silloth now had fourteen days to prepare for the cup final and arranged a cross code rugby match with local rugby league team Aspatria Hornets. The Tigers won the first half beating the Hornets at their own game 28-0 and won the second half 24-0 (52-0). With all the preparations out the way the players were treated to a pre final meal at Silloth Golf Club where

There was only one final thing to do and that was for Coach Mark Orchard name his Cup final twenty man squad, and present each player with a match day polo shirt sponsored by Hunter & Guthrie, The Dirty Dozen Golf Society and Protege Security.

Silloth made the perfect start with and an early lead through winger Ricki Sutcliffe, and soon doubled their lead through Lee Tinkler. Steven Stoddart converted both 14-0. Moresby hit back making it 14-5, two penalties from Stoddart and two further tries by Moresby gave Silloth a slender 20-19 lead. The second half started with Silloth again scoring through the boot of Stoddart and then a outstanding Ellis Nixon try, Moresby fought back to 28-24 but with minutes left Sutcliffe raced clear to put the game out of reach 35-24 and Silloth claimed a Historic League and Cup double. Mark said "this is a very proud day and the reward for an outstanding season. The club have never won the Cumbria League and never been in a position to achieve the double. Now, for the first time in the clubs 135 year history we can play our rugby outside of Cumbria. We will start the 2015/16 season in the North Lancs/Cumbria League and we all look forward to the challenge ahead"
