Silloth Town Council Report

At the recent Silloth-on-Solway Town Council Annual town meeting, held in the Community Hall on May 26th 2015, it was decided that:

1. Regular updates of Town Council news would appear in the Solway Buzz

2. That the Council would look into possible ways of deterring visitors/local residents from parking on the green. Also when events are taking place in the centre of town that the possible overspill car parks, such as the hollow green area near the school, be highlighted.

3. Following the recent Craft Trail event, some of the volunteers felt that the event had been slightly overlooked and that in future all events should be publicised equally. STAG are always looking for volunteers to help with all events whether they can spare a few days or just a couple of hours, they are always welcome.

4. The footpath leading from West Silloth to the main town, as well as grassed area near the Community Hall, be tidied up in the next few weeks.

5. It was pointed out that the possible new Silloth Trade and Chamber of Commerce, would be open to all businesses in the area and its main aim would be to promote Silloth and the surrounding area.

The Silloth-on-Solway Town Council monthly meeting for June was held in the Community Hall. Items of interest were:

1. It may have to be necessary in the future, to look into employing an enforcement officer, as the levels of dog fouling are now excessive, they would have the power to approach owners and impose fines accordingly.

2. The Council are to contact Cumbria County Council to find out about reducing the speed limit in the main town from 30 to 20 mph, a full decision would be taken after relevant costs and opinions of the public were taken into consideration.

3. A public meeting will take place in West Silloth to discuss the future of the area which was formally the playing field, in the meantime the football club have kindly donated a set of goal posts for the area.

4. With the likelihood that the Tour of Britain Cycle Race will be coming through Silloth town centre, the Council are to write to Allerdale Borough Council and Cumbria County Council to say that they are willing to discuss any plans they have for the event and hope they can use the facilities within the town. They would also be willing to discuss any ideas local businesses, organisations etc may have.

5. The Community Asset Transfer has now taken place with all relevant documentations signed. The council would like to take this opportunity to thank Town Mayor, Tony Markley, and Town Clerk, Wendy Jameson, for all their work on this project which has resulted in the town taking control of its own future.

All residents of Silloth are welcome to attend the

monthly town council meetings which take place on the first Monday of every month in the Community Hall. If you have any issues which you wish to be raised please contact the Town Clerk, details available on the Silloth-on-Solway Town Council website.

The Peatbog Faeries

Cumbria's brightest and best music and arts festival, Solfest is back after a year's sabbatical with a new more compact and bijou approach. It's the same old Solfest experience refreshed and revitalised. Some of the biggest names in folk and traditional music will take to the stage at the new, revamped Solfest.

The Unthanks, Kathryn Tickell & The Side, The Sam Kelly Trio and Peatbog Faeries and The Lancashire Hotpots are just a tiny sample of the dazzling array of artists appearing at Solfest.

They will be joined by cult electronica ambient dance band Banco De Gaia. Also lined up are festival favourites and Solfest old hands including some of the best of the UK's punk, roots, ska and singer-songwriter scenes including The Baghdaddies, Pikey Beatz, The Skints, Bombskare, Young Rebel Set, Holy Moly And The Crackers, Emma And The Professor, Stark, The Talks, Bridie Jackson And The Arbour and of course many, many more.

Also Solfest's famed Love Shack and Electric Village will host the very best in dance, dub-step, trance, reggae, electronic and a whole range of experimental sounds with 8:58, DJ Templehead, RoomFull Of Mirrors, Radioactive Man (live), The Hobo (aka DJ TurtleWax), Age Of Glass, Werkha, Shocon, Silverclub, Gella, Projekt Dataline,

Gemma Furbank and many, many more.

As ever Solfest offers a dazzling array of entertainment across practically every musical genre. If you don't hear something that you like move along to another venue and try another taste of the Solfest experience.

Multi-award-winning and Mercury Music Prize nominees The Unthanks are among the most highly-regarded of all traditional acts. Their reputation reaches far beyond the folk genre. Kathryn Tickell is the foremost exponent of the Northumbrian pipes, a composer, performer and successful recording artist whose work is deeply rooted in the landscape and people of Northumbria. Singer, songwriter and multi-instrumentalist Sam Kelly was runner up in Britain's Got Talent in 2012 but has gone on to make a name for himself in folk and roots music. He forged his links with the music through the Gaelic songs that his Irish grandfather taught him. Peatbog Faeries have built a reputation over two decades with their dazzling and hugely infectious fusion of Celtic traditional music and dance music bringing elements of jazz, hip hop and reggae to their musical table. The Lancashire Hotpots return to Solfest by popular demand with their wonderfully self-deprecating blend of folk rock comedy

that lovingly pokes fun at their own culture and the modern world.

The organisers of Solfest wanted to "return to our roots" with a more intimate event, but retaining the key features that has made it so popular.

Solfest marketing officer Tom Kay explains: "We made a conscious decision to distance our festival from more commercial events, moving away from big headline names in order to put our resources into giving people the best festival experience over a full weekend rather than just a couple of hours each evening. As always we aim to keep prices down, avoiding hidden extras like over the top booking fees, extra charges for vehicles and camping. We'll still allow you to bring your own booze and still charge sensible prices at our bars, which means that you get a fantastic weekend without breaking the bank. This year's Solfest will look and feel different, we've made some big decisions like, losing what was the main stage in favour of more venues offering an even wider range of music to tantalise your ears."

Solfest takes place at Tarns, near Aspatria, over the bank holiday weekend August 28-30.

Guns with a History

These 15" (381mm) guns are to be seen at the Imperial War Museum in London.

Made by Vickers Armstrong at Newcastle, they were taken by rail to Silloth-on-Solway for testing.

The testing area was south of the 5th green on Silloth golf course and near to Battery House, now demolished.

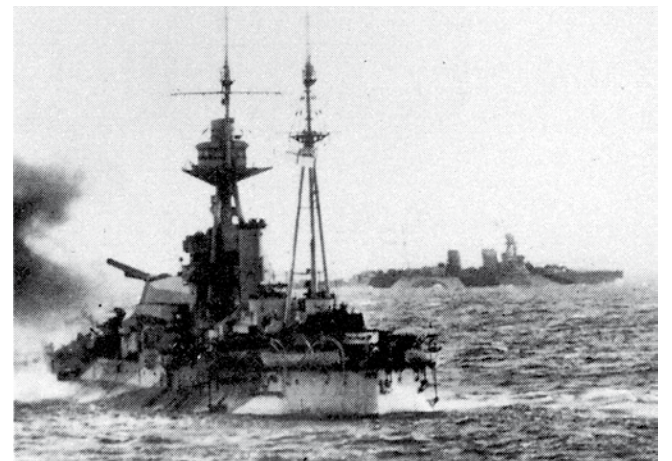
Occasionally, practice shells from this operation are exposed by the shifting sands on the beach down from Beckfoot.

Not used in WWI, they were fitted to HMS Roberts a monitor vessel for WWII. The monitors were flat bottomed to enable them to get closer to the shore for bombarding inland and the ship was in action following the D-Day landings.

The photo shows Russell Haynes and his son Alex. Russell's father was on the crew of HMS Roberts and having a game of golf recently they crossed the track where his fathers guns had gone to be tested many years before.

This year a new committee was formed, alongside some of the original members. The new Chairman Tony Markley would like to thank the dedication given by this new committee. Those who attended the meeting resolved to encourage other businesses in the town and surrounding district to become involved in the group.

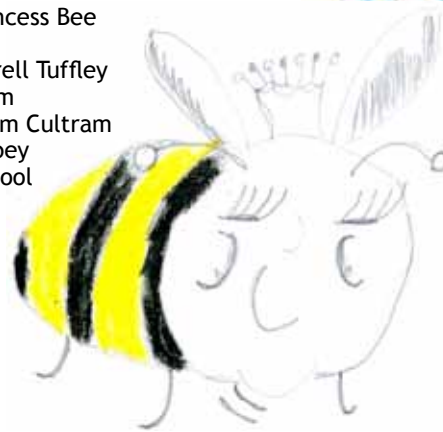

The Rise and Fall of Silloth Pier

Parliamentary approval to build a railway to Silloth Bay and there to construct a dock and a pier, or jetty, extending into the Bay on the south side of the said dock entrance, was given in 'The Silloth Dock Act', dated 16th July 1855. The Act stated that all construction work had to be completed within seven years of the passing of the 'Act'. In fact, this was achieved well within the allocated time, taking just four years and one month!

Work on constructing the new 11 mile branch railway began almost immediately, starting from Drumburgh on the Carlisle to Port Carlisle line on 31st August 1855, crossing two rivers (Wampool and Waver) and reaching the coast at Silloth Bay on 28th August 1856.

The completed railway brought heavy machinery and materials to the coast, allowing construction work to begin on the pier and the dock.

Without delay, work then commenced on building the 20 feet wide, open pile, timber pier, which when completed, would reach out 1,000 feet into the fast flowing waters of Silloth Bay. The large, heavy piles supporting the timber decked pier were made of pitch pine, a slow growing timber native

to North America, favoured at that time for shipbuilding, mine working and railway sleepers, because of its high resin content, which greatly slowed the decaying process.

The pier was sufficiently complete by May 1857, to allow ships to berth alongside to transfer passengers and cargo. It was fully completed in August 1857, for a total cost of £24,027. A railway side-line extended along the pier to facilitate movement of cargo and an attractive pagoda-shaped lighthouse was established at the pier head. The dock itself, would not be completed and ready to accept ships for a further two years.

For the next 50 years or so the pier stood firm, despite the occasional damage from wayward and unwieldy ships, attempting to enter the dock.

But from around 1909, photographs suggest that the outer 100 feet was beginning to subside. This became more evident in the 1920's and was probably due to the deep water channel moving gradually towards the shore, loosening the pile foundations. Access to the subsiding area was prohibited and a new light beacon was established at the outer end of the safe structure.

The outer 100 feet of the pier was accidentally burnt down around 1942. It was suggested that an overturned

used by RAF air-sea rescue crews caused the fire, although no evidence has been uncovered to support this claim. A further 80 feet collapsed sometime shortly afterwards, leaving a pier of approximately 820 feet in length.

A catastrophic failure occurred on the evening of 26th and during 27th March 1959, when a central 140ft long section of the pier collapsed and tilted northwards. By 29th March, this section had collapsed completely into the sea and drifted with the ebb tide, south for about 5 miles. On the following flood tide it was

carried north, past Silloth, almost to Annan Waterfoot. A maritime navigational warning was broadcasted, warning of this mobile hazard to shipping in the area. Once again, this destruction is thought to have been caused by the moving deep-water channel.

This sudden structural failure in March 1959, was the first of several other major collapses through to the end of July that year, which resulted in the pier being shortened to just 300ft. By 1968 it had been reduced by more minor collapses, to approximately 180ft long.

By 1971, the remaining pier decking was removed and it was in 1973, that the last sad remains of the once magnificent Silloth Pier were demolished. It had been a structure which afforded sightseers a fantastic view from seaward, of the town and harbour of Silloth, along with wide panoramic views of the Solway Firth and the surrounding countryside.
