
The tour arrives in early September.

John Cook - Man of the Year!

John Cook loses to become 'Man of the Year'

"I was very nervous walking into the group for the first time, everyone was so friendly though and I soon realised we were all there for the same reason. I haven't looked back since and, at

over 4 st lighter, I definitely don't have any regrets. I recommend Slimming World to everyone now – men and women!"

On joining the group John began following Slimming World's Food Optimising eating plan and was delighted to discover he could eat hearty meals without worrying about portion sizes and still lose weight. He says: "The great thing is you don't go hungry. It's about healthy eating and man-sized, satisfying helpings of healthy food too - not fads and gimmicks. Now I regularly cook for my Family and make my favourite meals in a low-fat way, such as using low calorie cooking spray instead of oil and choosing lean cuts of meat. The general rule is 'if it looks too good to be true then it probably is. Designer products sold at heavily discounted prices are an immediate sign that something isn't quite right.

What can you do to protect yourself?

Where possible, buy from well-known, High Street retailers. If you've never heard of a firm, or it is based overseas, be sceptical.

Avoid paying by cheque or bank transfer. Use PayPal or a credit card as they will give you additional protection.

Search the internet. Type the website you are buying from and look for reviews of what others customers are saying about the company. Bad customer service feedback usually finds their way online quite quickly.

Sue Hayman MP, Member of Parliament for Workington constituency, has pledged her support for the Port of Silloth.


Sue met senior representatives from the owners of the port, Associated British Ports, in Westminster recently.



Dear Buzz,

An open letter to Silloth Town Council

Dear Councillors,

DECC and the Office for Nuclear Development have sent out a call for evidence with a view to encouraging local communities to volunteer to host the geological disposal facility for the Nation's nuclear waste. In short, The Dump is back; in fact it never went away. The Government remains resolute in achieving its objective of building an underground Nuclear Waste Dump and, despite what Ministers claim, West Cumbria is likely to be their favoured option. Once again Allerdale Council Executive and Copeland Council are probably the only councils in England likely to volunteer to bury the nation's waste under the feet of their communities. It is therefore vitally important that Silloth Town Council strongly reaffirms its opposition to a dump in West Cumbria, for all the reasons that have been rehearsed time and

time again. We have two Councillors representing Silloth on Allerdale Council, one of whom is an Executive Member. We should remind both councillors that the people of Silloth remain opposed to the dump and that we expect them to fight our corner robustly in the forthcoming debates. We should let our Allerdale executive member know that we expect him to fight on the executive committee to prevent them from volunteering Allerdale as a host community for the Dump. We are not a "willing community." DECC and the Office for Nuclear Development display impeccable timing in announcing the latest Call for Evidence. It was publicised recently and closes on 4th September. This is timed perfectly to coincide with summer recess for local councils and the holiday season.

Once again the motives of the Government for this odd timing are auestionable and are not helpful in eliciting well-considered responses from local and Parish Councils. The call for evidence is asking a series of questions, centred on the issues of community representation, community investment and the test of public support. The Council, and in fact the whole community, needs to provide a robust response to influence these important considerations. We need to take every opportunity to prevent our communities being herded down the path towards a Nuclear dump under West Cumbria. Perhaps the Council should consider an emergency Council meeting to keep abreast of the situation and prepare a formal

response to contribute to the debate.





Novak Djokovic: The Sporting Statesman by Chris Bowers






At the end of the second World War, there was a huge surplus tonnage of British bombs and munitions which had to be disposed of. Dumping at sea was the accepted method of disposal and one of the allocated dumping areas was in the Beaufort Dyke, a relatively deep trench located in the North Channel, between Northern Ireland and the Mull of Galloway, Scotland.

On 27th November 1945, No. 275 Maintenance Unit RAF was formed at the then Military Port of Cairnryan, tasked with the supervision of disposal of excess RAF munitions from air bases in Great Britain. This unit consisting of 160 personnel commanded by an RAF Squadron Leader, was based in the former Army quarters at Leffnol, near Cairnryan. The Army had a similar disposal task for this area, which was reportedly co-ordinated from their base at Longtown, near Carlisle. The port of Silloth was used for the loading into ships and disposal of unwanted RAF and Army munitions at sea.

Army munitions were brought to Silloth by rail from Longtown and occasionally from an ordinance experimental establishment at Camberley in Surrey. On arrival at Silloth Docks, the covered munition trucks were usually left in sidings, to be guarded by the local LNER railway police. Loading of the dumping vessels was carried out on the south side of New Dock, which was at that time sheltered by a long wooden transit shed.

As a security precaution, ex Admiralty 'Isle Class' trawlers retained by the War Department and manned by RASC civilians, were employed to escort the bomb-dumping vessels to and from the dump site. The escort trawlers used at Silloth were the 'Prospect,' 'Copinsay,' 'Inchcolm' and the 'Mull'. The 'Mull' was also called on to undertake dumping duties herself, due to her suitability for the task.

At the July meeting of Silloth Town Council items of interest were:

- 1. Due to a heavy schedule of events and workload, the Town Council will hold a meeting in August instead of having its usual summer sabbatical.
- 2. The monthly police report revealed that the main HQ is now Workington and there is only one main officer per area for Wigton, Keswick, Silloth/Aspatria and Maryport. They are being supported by PCSO's. Pete Nichol, PCSO, pointed out that it was important that all crimes are reported, whether large or small, to ensure a continued service.
- 3. The Tour of Britain cycle race, stage 3, will be coming through Silloth on September 8th. Locals are already becoming involved and the schools are at present being approached for their input. It is hoped that there will be a large screen on the Green for spectators to enjoy the full stage which begins in Cockermouth, before going onto Maryport, through Allonby, then reaching Silloth and on to its conclusion at Floors Castle, Kelso. The cost of the screen would be co-funded by the Town Council and Allerdale Borough Council.
- 4. Allerdale Borough Council's markets, including the town's Thursday

market, are now being run on their behalf by Geraud Markets. It has been suggested that the market move from Criffel Street onto the Green. Traders would not be interested in any other location in the town. Barbecue Safely

Barbecues are beginning to sizzle across Cumbria. But behind the bangers and burgers summer fun has a serious side. Cumbria Fire & Rescue Service, as part of the Fire Kills campaign, is asking everyone to take extra care when cooking al fresco, especially when lighting barbecues or dealing with bad weather.

We all know how tempting it can be to give stubborn coals a helping hand, but, please be patient and make sure you use the right tools for the job. If you've planned a barbecue and the weather lets you down, don't take the barbecue indoors or into a tent. Some people have sadly succumbed to carbon monoxide poisoning as a result.

By following the Fire

Kills campaign's top tips you can ensure your barbecue is a safe, enjoyable event.

- Never leave a lit barbecue unattended.
- Follow the safety instructions provided with disposable barbecues.
- Make sure your barbecue is well away from sheds, fences, trees, shrubs or garden waste.
- Use enough charcoal to cover the base of the barbecue, but not more.
- Keep children, pets and garden games away from the cooking area.
- After cooking, make sure the barbecue is cool before moving it.
- Empty ashes onto bare garden soil, not into dustbins or wheelie bins. If they're hot, they can melt the plastic and cause a fire.
- Always keep a bucket of water, sand or a garden hose nearby for emergencies.
- Never use a barbecue indoors.

By far the biggest danger is the use of flammable liquids to light the barbecue. People have poured petrol onto the charcoal in an effort to get it going and the reaction has, not surprisingly, been violent and highly dangerous.
