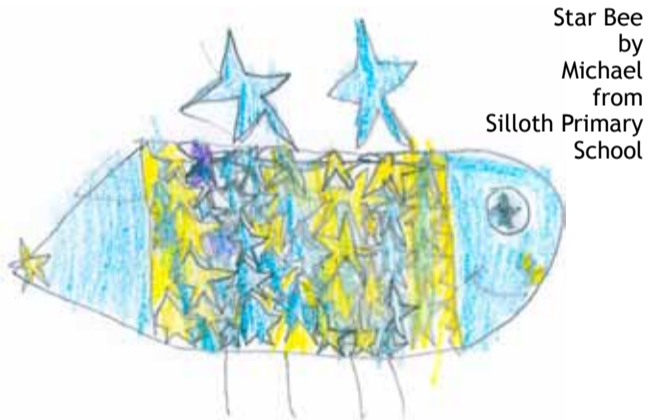
Santa will be in his grotto as usual in Silloth Café, Santa will be there from

Silloth & District Chamber of Trade

A new group has been launched to help boost trade and promote local businesses in Silloth and its inaugural meeting was attended by nearly 25% of the businesses in the town.

Business owners and members of the community have joined forces to launch a Chamber of Trade. The objective is to use their experience and expertise to increase trading opportunities and pull more income and visitors into the town. Don Graham is temporary Chair of the group. He said "One of the obvious roles of a Chamber of Trade is to improve the overall profitability; that has to be a core objective. It is also about promoting loyalty to local businesses."

Initially the idea to form such a group came from the Silloth Tourism Action Group with a view to getting the businesses engaged in working more in partnership with other businesses to increase the local economy. Its main focus will be to give the businesses community

some representation, to give them a voice. There are a lot of changes going on and a recent Government initiative is the creation of coastal community teams. There is funding available for projects that could benefit a coastal town such as ours. However, as always, such funding is dependent on being able to demonstrate the involvement and support of all elements of the local community.

The Chamber of Trade wants to become a point of promotion for business in the town with its own website. One aim identified is to re-establish a manned tourist information centre. Those who attended the meeting resolved to encourage other businesses in the town and surrounding district to become involved in the group.

Meetings will take place on the third Thursday of each month in the Golf Hotel at 7pm.

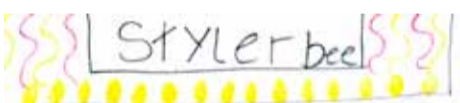

Silloth's Railcar - The Wirksworth Connection

The Ecclesbourne Valley Railway, based at Wirksworth, Derbyshire has a reputation as being the home to a collection of diesel railcars that are used regularly to take leisure passengers from the main line junction at Duffield to the historic market town on the boundaries of the Peak District.

The railcars that run along the Ecclesbourne valley are virtually extinct from the main line, the only exceptions being one or two used for shuttle services between Princes Risborough and Aylesbury. However, two of the EVR's railcars, one in service and the other under restoration, are doubly historical, they are known as Derby Lightweights and were the pioneers of a type of train that, in modern form, is almost universal today.

Origins

Railcars had operated on Britain's railways since the early 1900s when the London & South Western and Great Western railways had introduced steam-powered railcars on various lightly-used lines. Nearly 100 were introduced by the GWR but in the face of competition from road transport, many were converted into railmotors.

At Nationalisation, steam locomotives predominated on non-electrified lines and by 1951, the Railway Executive produced a weighty report. The report dedicated a chapter to railcars and recommended that ...there should be an immediate investigation ... with the object of determining:-

(a) What fast rail-car workings could, with advantage, be introduced into the timetables additional to the existing steam services and on the lines suggested ...

(b) How a series of fast, attractive, comfortable and economical diesel rail - cars for main-line and cross-country services could be constructed in the quickest time possible.

This was the starting pistol for the development and introduction of diesel railcars and by 1954 the first was ready for trials.

The first scheme was in West Yorkshire and the results were encouraging. As a result, authorisation was given to develop a plan for dieselisation of several areas in the north of England and



one of these areas was West Cumbria.

The Silloth Connection

The introduction of diesel railcars to West Cumbria was both a vote of confidence in the future of the counties' railways (it was still Cumberland and Westmorland until 1974) and a bold attempt to improve the finances of a range of services running between Carlisle and the industrial centres of Maryport, Workington and Whitehaven. This network extended from the spectacular Cockermouth, Keswick & Penrith Railway through the heart of the

The Silloth Branch had opened in 1856 and development by the North British Railway led to Silloth being built on a grand scale as a resort town with an active dockyard that remains busy today. Grouping of the railways in 1923 led to the Silloth Branch being owned by the London & North Eastern Railway, an anomaly in an area dominated by the London Midland & Scottish Railway. At Nationalisation in 1948, the line was quickly absorbed into the London Midland Region.

Dieselisation came soon to the Silloth Branch, indeed the line was regarded as the



Cumbrian fells to the Maryport & Carlisle line crossing the plain of the Solway Firth. It was to the coast at Silloth that diesel services were extended in 1954.

To residents of Carlisle and industrial towns of the far North West, the railway to Silloth was known as The Holiday Line. Leaving the main line just north of Carlisle station, the railway initially took a winding course which followed the formation of the Carlisle Canal. However, beyond Drumburgh, it took a more direct route across the Solway Plain through Kirkbride and Abbeytown. Between these two points, the line had shared a path with the Caledonian Railway's route from Brayton, near Aspatria, to Annan, crossing the mile-long Solway Viaduct at Bowness which had closed in 1921 and was demolished in 1935.

first line to be dieselised. This is a slight exaggeration as steam featured regularly on the line until the very end and, indeed, the final train was indeed steam-hauled.

Lightly-engineered, the track would have benefitted from the light touch of a diesel railcar, while the frequency of the service (five return trips on weekdays, seven on summer Saturdays and just three on Sundays) allowed for a pretty sharp turnaround at Silloth. The finances of the Silloth Branch also received a turnaround. The Lightweight Trains Committee of the LMR reported a 10% increase in revenue for the first four weeks of railcar operation in December 1954 which led to an increase in service frequency and, the following year, an increase in the speed limit for railcars.

The experiment was a success and for the next decade, Silloth enjoyed a frequent diesel service to Carlisle.

Unfortunately, it was not to last.

The battle is over - it's always worthwhile.

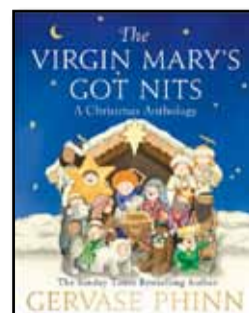

On the Water Front

Solway / Liverpool Shipping Services - Part 1

In the days before railway links reached the city of Carlisle, access to the sea which gave unlimited trade routes for Carlisle businesses was of vital importance. In 1823, this led to the opening of a canal from Carlisle, to the coast at a point called Fishers Cross. This location, which became known as Port Carlisle, was little more than an entrance lock for the canal and a short stretch of quay wall, sheltered by a rudimentary breakwater. The area outside the canal entrance remained tidal and any vessel at the so called 'port', would be stranded soon after each high water.

However, in 1825, a regular weekly shipping, or 'packet' service was established between Port Carlisle and Liverpool. (A 'Packet' or 'Pacquet', was a vessel that carried domestic mail, passengers and freight on a fixed short route between ports). The newly formed Carlisle & Liverpool Steam Navigation Company (C&LSNCo) began operating a small paddle-steamer called the 'Solway', which plied between Port Carlisle and Liverpool, calling off Annan, Maryport and Whitehaven en-route. ('Calling off' - presumably meaning that the steamer did not actually go into those ports, but stopped briefly, allowing passengers and freight to be transferred into or from a small local tender, a risky business even on a calm day!). Arrivals and departures at Port Carlisle were timed to coincide with high waters, to allow the steamers to navigate the upper Solway Firth access channel and secure briefly alongside the port quayside. Business was good for the C&LSNCo, such that in 1827 the 'Solway' was joined by the paddle steamer 'Cumberland', which enabled the company to operate a twice weekly service to Liverpool.

In 1834 and in competition with the C&LSNCo for the Liverpool trade, a second shipping company was formed, known as the Carlisle & Annan Steam Navigation Company (C&ASNCo). Their ship was the new paddle steamer 'City of Carlisle'. In response to this emerging competition, the C&LSNCo introduced a new paddle steamer 'Newcastle', which was reportedly faster

than the 'City of Carlisle'.

In 1836, the C&ASNCo changed its name to the grander Carlisle, Annan & Liverpool Steam Navigation Company (CA&LSNCo), bringing into service their latest paddle steamer 'Royal Victoria'. Competition for business on this lucrative route was fierce!

In 1837, the C&LSNCo paddle steamers 'Solway' and 'Cumberland' were transferred to a new service, opened up between Port Carlisle and the Irish ports of

Dublin and Belfast, leaving their vessel 'Newcastle' to compete on the Liverpool service with the 'City of Carlisle' and 'Royal Victoria', both of the CA&LSNCo.

To bring the size of all these afore mentioned ships into perspective, they were all in the region of 150' in length (approximately 46 metres), which is slightly smaller than the 'Ben Maye' or 'Ben Ellan' - both very small coasting ships of more recent times that traded to Silloth! The paddle steamers offered, for those who could afford it, a small number of cabins with steward service. Others settled down on deck, sheltering where they could for the sea journey of 115 nautical miles, which in good weather took roughly twelve hours. Refreshments "of all kinds" were available to the passengers for a moderate charge.

But commercially, all was not well. By the early 1850's, Port Carlisle was struggling to remain viable, due to a combination of siltation at the port and its approaches, plus competition with new railway links established and connecting Carlisle to the rest of the UK, including a line to the port of Maryport. Taking advantage of the popularity of this rail line, the cost of using the facilities at Maryport was raised, becoming excessive, so businessmen in Carlisle

where a small tender carried passengers and freight destined for Carlisle and Cumberland, the short distance across the Solway Firth to the quay and railway link at Port Carlisle.

In 1857, the newly completed pier and the soon to be completed dock at Silloth regenerated the Solway to Liverpool maritime services, details of which will feature in a future edition of 'Waterfront'.
