Silloth Flew a Flag for the Commonwealth

Silloth-on-Solway participated in this years' 'Fly a Flag for the Commonwealth' this is our second year of taking part. At 10am on Monday 14th March, a Commonwealth Flag was raised on Silloth Green, at the Community Garden, opposite the Golf Hotel on Criffel Street, Silloth. The event was attended by the staff and pupils of Silloth Primary School and quite a few members of the public.

More than 850 Commonwealth Flags were raised in locations throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man, UK Overseas Territories, and Commonwealth countries.

Heads of State, Prime Ministers; Lord Mayors and Mayors, Lord Provosts; Town Councils and Local Authorities; school children and college students; 'members of Girl guiding' and Scouts from around the UK and Commonwealth; Sea, Army, and Air Cadets; charities and community groups; Commonwealth Ex-Servicemen and major shipping lines and disabled crewman and women manned ships, and many others around the world joined in to raise more than 850 Commonwealth Flags at 10am in a shared celebration of this amazing family of nations that encompasses the globe. This unique initiative, now in its third year, is again catching the imagination of thousands of participants from all walks of life, inspiring them to join with others throughout the Commonwealth. As a

collective public expression of commitment to the Commonwealth, it enables participants to show appreciation for the values the Commonwealth upholds, and the opportunities offered for friendship and cooperation with fellow Commonwealth young and old citizens around the world.

Our Commonwealth theme this year is: 'An Inclusive Commonwealth. This offers possibilities for building on work undertaken in 2015 when the theme was 'A Young Commonwealth, and the principle of inclusiveness could be interpreted in a variety of ways according to context. The theme for 2016 encourages understanding and further explorations of Commonwealth collaboration in fields as gender equality and the post-2015 development goals.

"An inclusive Commonwealth' refers to the values of tolerance, respect and understanding, as well as equity and fairness, set out in the Commonwealth Charter, and the richness of the Commonwealth as a family of nations in which each member state is valued equally and has an equal voice. In uncertain times, the need for the Commonwealth to act as an inclusive network for mutual support and development is a great as ever.

Silloth & District **Pensioners Coffee** Morning Report by Pat Froggatt



Update on the Lack of Coordination of Silloth Bus Service **Timetables**

Silloth Town Council have been trying to achieve better coordination of the bus timetables around Silloth. The following was sent to the Cumbria County Council Scheduled Bus Services Officer:

Dear Mark Hodgkiss, At a recent coffee morning held by MP Sue Hayman, the main subject of discussion was the bus services to West Cumbria and Carlisle.

It has been confirmed that the service 60 will be continued but the main problem that surfaced was the service that Reays run between Skinburness and Silloth, and the service run by Stagecoach from Silloth to Carlisle which do not run in tandem. Many customers travelling from Skinburness miss the bus from Silloth to

The Town Council would like to request that both companies are asked if they could change their timetables to coincide, which would benefit both services.

The reply sent to Silloth Town Council is as follows: Thank you for your

This is an "old chestnut" and we have also been contacted by Sue Hayman's office about it.

Due to the way that the Stagecoach service 400 operates, with no layover time in Silloth, it is in fact not possible to offer good connections between the two

If the 60 was timed to meet the 400 to take passengers to Skinburness, by the time it returned, passengers from Skinburness would have close to a two hour wait for the next bus to Carlisle

If the 60 was timed to meet the 400 for passengers travelling towards Carlisle the opposite would be true and those arriving from Carlisle would have a close to two hour wait for the next bus to Skinburness.

Both services are also co-ordinated with other services which would further complicate any change in times. The 60 with Reay's 58 to offer a clock-face hourly service between Maryport and Workington, and the Stagecoach 400 with their 300 and 600 to offer a half hourly timetable between Carlisle and Wigton. This means operating a nonclockface timetable to benefit Skinburness would cause problems elsewhere on the

Whilst connections between the two services from Skinburness are poor, they are much better for those travelling from points South of Silloth such as Blitterlees, and Allonby, so again any change to the timetable would effect these connections.

I am sorry that it is not possible to offer a better solution to this problem..

It beggars belief to think that the Highway Agency just allowed the Gas Board to completely close the main road for four weeks at Saltpans without any consideration for road users. It lets you see that by fighting, alternatives can be found that make life bearable, but shows how this vital route is viewed by some in authority.

From the well supported meeting in Culterham Village Hall on Friday 8th April various points were raised.

Highway Officials seem to be oblivious to the fact that it was their mess that was repeatedly washed onto the road causing the road closures. I was rather surprised to learn that large lumps of broken concrete simply wash up from the seabed according to them.

The Sea Wall at Dubmill has been there for over 100 years and will be there 100 years from now if they look after it instead of just neglecting and saying they are going to build a new road.

Our coastline is classified as one of 'Managed Retreat'. Tell this to a Dutchman


and he would laugh his socks off. 'Managed Retreat' a definition given to us by people in the South of England who think that Liverpool and Preston are on the Scottish border.

Thanks again to Stella for organising our usual cheese nibbles and the draw. The prize, given by Judith Wood, was won by Sue Russell.







The Solway Buzz Loves These Aerial Photographs

Unfortunately, not everyone does, some people are understandably worried that the camera may be intruding on their privacy.

Undoubtedly, some drone owners do not fly by the rules and try to intrude, but, be assured that James Smith who very kindly supplies the Solway Buzz with aerial photographs does not do that. The Buzz would not be here without the freely given support and help of many and we are grateful.

A careful inspection of both the images on this page will show that should anyone have been walking at the end of Grune Point or in Abbeytown on the days these photos were taken, they would be hard to see, never mind identified.

Following a recent unsubstantiated complaint James has given the Buzz a statement which will hopefully alleviate some concerns and fears.

My name is James Smith and I own and operate a professional DJI Inspire Pro multirotor camera drone. I am a professional photographer and use the drone mainly for producing high quality aerial video and still images. It is not a toy.

This aircraft is registered with the authorities and I am in possession of a Pilots Licence. It is flown at all times to meet the requirements of the Air Navigation Order and CAP1202 as set out by the Civil Aviation Authority.

The aircraft is inspected and maintained to Certificate of Airworthiness requirements and is checked before each flight.

Each flights course, speed, and height is recorded electronically and is automatically saved for inspection, if required, by the authorities.

Unfortunately the media have negatively reported on drones, mainly because of a small number of Morons flying toy ones illegally and without respect of the regulations.

I am also fully compliant with the law regarding privacy.

I get a lot of pleasure from hearing a lot of positive comments about the aerial images I supply without any fee to the Buzz.

I regret that a number of people do make negative comments about my drone, and it is a pity that they do not speak to me directly so I can explain exactly what I am doing and that I operate totally within the regulations, instead of involving the Police Community Support Officer unnecessarily.

Young Carers Project

The West Cumbria Carers Young Carers Project supports children and young people from the age of 5 years and up who are caring for someone at home that couldn't manage without their help. They might care for a parent, a sibling or another family member who has a disability, physical or mental illness or drug/ alcohol issues.

The role of a young carer varies, they may provide emotional support; they may cook, do some household chores or pick up shopping. They may help to wash or dress the person they care for or administer medication.

They may keep an eye on the person they care for or look after younger siblings when their parent isn't well.

We can help young carers by offering one to one support with a dedicated support worker. We also offer an Art Programme where young carers can work on art projects and chat at the same time in a safe, relaxed environment. We regularly run groups, trips and activities to give young carers some time out from their caring role and the opportunity to meet other children and young people in similar situations.

Working with young

carers is very rewarding, we get to meet and work with some amazing children and young people who have responsibilities well beyond their years. Young carers tell us that caring for someone can be tiring and stressful but they want to continue to do it, they don't see it as out of the ordinary or unusual they love the person they care for and want to help



Due to the recent damage which has occurred twice in the last three months, the Council has now made the decision to install security measures to protect the building against further attacks.


The majority of the Council's income is funded



Dear Buzz,

Thank you for publishing mv mum's 'Easter Memories' in the April issue, I hope your readers found it interesting. There were two photographs in that issue which fascinated me. The one of the Convalescent platform reminded me of walks with the family to the West beach. I think that the lairage referred to would be the same as the one that existed in the late 1950's, in which case it was a single, large building, not a series of sheds as stated. The roof was made up of many east-west ridges fitted with 'northern lights', so that the sun didn't shine in directly. My uncle and his friends took me inside and tried to convince me that snakes lived in there! I have no idea how we got in but in those days children had the run of the dockside.

The hydraulic tower next to Carr's mill powered the cranes on the west side of the dock and various capstans in the goods yard, as well as the dock gates. As children we would check to see if any of the capstans were still turned on so as to sneak a quick spin! The capstans were used to pull wagons around the yard, saving the use of a shunting engine.

The other picture that I liked was 'Silloth in the snow'. As mainly summertime visitors we always wondered if sand and snow could co-exist! Mum would insist that it could snow in Silloth and would show us the attached photo. This is of my uncle Peter playing on

Skiddaw street in about 1949. In the background is the gas works that my great-grandfather managed until he died there in 1926. My nana couldn't abide fish bones in the house so she would send Peter with the fish waste to the gas works to put in their fire. On the right there is a tree from which the bark has been



On the Water Front

Silloth to Ireland Services (Part 2)

As I mentioned in Part 1 of this topic, there had been shipping services from the Solway Firth to Ireland since the late 1830's, beginning with the steamer 'Solway' in 1838. A number of vessels since then were employed over the years, with varying degrees of success, but also involving a couple of disasters. Many of those sailings between the upper Solway ports and the ports of Dublin and Belfast, called at the Isle of Man en-route.

It was in 1893, that a purpose built vessel was constructed for the Silloth to Dublin service. She was an iron hulled steamship called the 'Yarrow,' built at Govan by R. Napier & Sons, for the Glasgow ship owner W. Sloan & Co. This proud new vessel, initially under the command of Captain Archibald McCallum, entered service and arrived at Silloth in June of that year, following her delivery voyage from Greenock, via the ports of Oban, Larne and Douglas

With a Lloyds Official Number of 102591, the 'Yarrow' had a Gross Registered Tonnage of 972 tons, later reduced to 959 tons. She was 230' (70.1m) long, had a beam of 32' (9.75 m) and a draft of 15' (4.6m). Built with a triple expansion compound steam engine that drove a single propeller, she achieved a service speed of 13 knots. Her small crew consisted of a mix of seamen, engine-room and cabin staff from both Silloth and Dublin. From 1921 and following the Wireless Act of 1920, she also carried a radio officer.

The 'Yarrow' was a good looking ship and a typical small cargopassenger vessel of her day. Her main accommodation area, advertised as 'lit by electricity, had cabin space and a well-appointed saloon for the use of seventy-five 1st Class passengers, whilst a further four hundred passengers could be carried on the open decks. The accommodation was topped at the forward end by an open navigation bridge. Behind the bridge stood her tall raked funnel, taking the engine exhaust gasses and smoke clear of her decks.

The two cargo holds were located forward of and behind the accommodation area. Both holds were serviced by a cargo derrick, one mounted on the

foremast and the other on her mainmast. Within these holds, the ship carried general cargo in both directions. In addition, a large number of Irish cattle and barrels of Guinness were shipped from Dublin to Silloth.

The 'Yarrow' maintained

a twice weekly service

between Silloth and Dublin, via Douglas IoM, sailing from Silloth on Tuesdays and Saturdays. Her return passages, again via Douglas, sailed from Dublin on Mondays and Thursdays. Each leg of the voyage, ie Silloth to Douglas and Douglas to Dublin, would take about six hours and eight hours respectively, in reasonable weather. Considerably longer if the weather was poor, which must have meant a rough and unpleasant trip for those passengers travelling on deck! With Silloth being a tidal port, the arrivals and departures here had to be timed to coincide with high water, which no doubt complicated the schedule throughout. In the summer season and when the weather permitted, the 'Yarrow' would stop off Whitehaven to land and embark passengers from a local tender. If this was not possible, the Whitehaven passengers from Dublin would have to disembark at Silloth and then make their own way down the coast to Whitehaven. Likewise, if the weather was unfavourable at Douglas, the ship would attempt to land those passengers at Peel or Port

At Silloth, the 'Yarrow' secured, discharged and loaded at what was known as the 'Dublin Berth,' located on the south side of New Dock, at the western end nearest the dock entrance. (The other berth on that side of the dock was the 'Liverpool Berth,' used regularly by the 'Kittiwake' and the 'Albatross'). In those days, both the Dublin and the Liverpool berths and the quayside were sheltered from the prevailing southwesterly weather by a long timber built transit shed, which extended for almost the whole length of the dock. The livestock lairage was located conveniently nearby and the berth was serviced by hydraulic quayside cranes, fitting of new boilers and the estimated cost at that time was in the region of £5,000. She was also considered to be a costly vessel to run. As the Board of Trade rules did not apply to Irish vessels, she escaped that costly modification.

The 'A searce' continued.

The 'Assaroe' continued on her regular service from Silloth to Douglas and Dublin until the outbreak of the 2nd World War in 1939. Passenger services were discontinued, but she maintained regular freight crossings to Ireland up until 1943, but not without incident. During a crossing in 1941, and despite flying the neutral Irish tricolour and wartime neutrality markings, she was reportedly attacked and strafed by a German aircraft. Fortunately, no serious damage was sustained.

After fifty years of crossing back and forth across the Irish Sea between Silloth and Dublin, she was moved in 1943 onto a route between the neutral countries of Ireland and Spain. The 'Assaroe' was finally taken out of service in 1947 and broken up for scrap in Belgium.

From 1943, there was no direct passenger service from Silloth to Ireland. That was until 1950, when on 11th January, a small, 46-year-old ship called 'St Fintan, restarted a service from Silloth to Douglas and Dublin. However, the service was short-lived, when in November of that same year, the ship and crew were arrested by Customs and Excise officers in Douglas, for smuggling contraband that consisted of large quantities of cigarettes and nylon stockings! Shortly afterwards the service terminated and so ended the trading link between the ports of the Solway Firth and Dublin, that had endured despite numerous difficulties and mixed fortunes, since 1838.



Beware: Email Fraud

This alert is a reminder to be aware of emails that appear to have been sent from a legitimate organisation. Fraudsters often use fake email addresses designed to encourage recipients to open attachments or links.

You are advised that if you are in any doubt as to the origin of an email, do not open it. Consider that emails can be spoofed and used to generate spam to recipients far and wide. If you receive a spam email, you MUST NOT open it. Instead, delete it from your email system to avoid infecting your device. If you have opened an attachment from a spam email, you should get your device checked over by a professional and change the passwords for all your bank, email and online shopping accounts.

Protect yourself:
Do not click or open
unfamiliar links in emails or

on websites.

Make sure you install



and use up-to-date anti-virus software.

Have a pop-up blocker running in the background of your web browser.

If you have opened an attachment and 'enabled macros' it is very likely that all your personal data will have been breached. You MUST change all your passwords for personal accounts, including your bank accounts.

Ensure Adobe, Flash and any similar software is up to date on your computer.

If you think you have been a victim of this type of email you should report the email to Action Fraud, the UK's national fraud and cyber crime reporting centre: www.actionfraud.police.uk.

If you do make a report please provide as much detail as you can about the email and any effects it has had on your computer. Additionally if your Anti-Virus software detects any issues in relation to this email please provide us with the details.

Action Fraud is not an emergency service dial 999 if you are in immediate danger.

GOV.UK site is used for such enquires and applications.

Silloth Fire Station Needs You!

Cumbria County Council's Fire and Rescue Service is recruiting to find additional on-call firefighters.

Around 50 on-call firefighters are needed at a total of 22 fire stations across the county including Silloth fire station.

An on-call firefighter could be the person delivering your post, your hair stylist, a housewife/ husband, a farmer and the list goes on. Anyone could be an on-call firefighter, ready at a moment's notice, to leave their place of work, family get together or day off at home and dash off to deal

with any type of emergency situation.

We need enthusiastic, outgoing people to join our dedicated Fire and Rescue Service. We are looking for on-call firefighters to deliver lifesaving capabilities across the county.

In many parts of the county these are the people who will be first on scene at a house fire, car crash or flooding incident. By having the fire appliance available in your community you're ensuring that your loved ones and neighbours have the resources available, should an incident occur. Without



your local fire appliance you would have to wait for one from further afield.

On-call firefighters have a range of skills from Advanced First Aid to HGV Driver which are gained during training and courses and can be transferred to your employment, home life and social activities.

Being an on-call firefighter is hugely rewarding and will alter your life in ways you can't imagine. Your crew will become your second family and some of your best friends. These people will always be there to support

This is not just a job but something you will be extremely proud of.

Call rates vary from fire station to fire station, with some of Cumbria's on-call stations responding to over 200 calls a year and others as few as 15. The fire service is looking for men and women from all different backgrounds who are fit, healthy, up for a challenge and prepared to commit to the role. The pay scales for an on-call firefighter are:

- A retainer of £2,158 £2,877 dependent on the cover provided
- An hourly rate of £13.14 when competent in your role
- An on-call firefighter can

earn on average £6,000 a year

If successful, the new on-call firefighters will be expected to attend a twohour training session at their fire station each week plus additional core training courses in order to maintain operational skills.

The nature of the on-call duty system also requires firefighters to live or work within five minutes of their station so they can respond to emergency calls. On-call firefighters are contracted to provide an agreed number of 'availability' hours and only attend the fire station when they have received an emergency callout. Each on-call firefighter carries a pocket alerter, which is activated when they are needed and they subsequently report to the fire station and mobilise the necessary fire appliance(s). On most stations weekday 'day cover' between 8am – 6pm in addition to weekend cover is required.

To apply people will need to complete an application form; carry out a number of nationally recognised tests and have an interview and medical check.

A series of open days are being held so people interested in becoming on-call firefighters can visit their local station to chat to the crews, have a go at some of the tests and find out more about what this lifesaving role entails. 
