





Maryport Crewman Rescued off Workington

Workington RNLI allweather lifeboat Sir John Fisher was launched at 16:20 on Sunday 17th July with Coxswain John Stobbart in charge and a crew of seven to rescue a crew member from the Maryport fishing boat Bruno about 1 mile off the coast from Workington.

The fisherman who had sustained a serious injury

when his hand became trapped in the anchor chain was given first aid by a volunteer member of the Workington RNLI crew, brought back safely to Workington in the lifeboat and transferred by ambulance to Carlisle Infirmary.

The wind farm service vessel Solway Challenger and Maryport Coastguard also attended the incident.



RNLI Minecraft Game

This summer, the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) is launching year two of the charity's Beach Builder Challenge using the interactive video game, Minecraft, which allows children to create and build virtual worlds.

The Beach Builder Challenge, available to play from 1 August, has been created by the RNLI to teach children about beach and water safety at a time when many young people will be visiting the coast during school summer holidays.

New for this year, the RNLI has expanded the virtual world to include a Beach Island Adventure, which means as well as being able to create epic beaches, this year creative youngsters are also tasked with completing four levels in the Beach Island Adventure. The four levels are based on the charity's Stay SAFE acronym: Spot the dangers, Take Advice, Stay close to a Friend or family member, Learn what to do in an Emergency.

The RNLI's Community Safety Product Manager, Bridie Appleby-Gunnill says: "This is a fun and interactive game for 7–14 year olds to play during the summer holidays. We really hope the challenges will help Minecraft users visiting the beach this summer put their newly acquired beach safety knowledge into reality, and have fun while staying SAFE.'



Last year's Beach Builder Challenge was a huge success with more than 8,000 children participating from all over the world, including Canada, Australia and the USA. It also proved successful in helping to reach a high number of children living in inland communities across the UK and Republic of Ireland.

Feedback from 2015 suggests the game is an excellent education platform particularly as results found that 97% of participants, after playing the game, knew to go to a lifeguarded beach; and there was a 20% increase in the number of children who knew to dial 999 and ask for the coastguard if they saw someone in trouble at the beach.

Bridie adds: 'We've created a fun, educational experience where a young person can engage and learn about water safety in a self-organised way and where academic ability does not limit learning. Research

suggests that children learn and retain more when they can organise their own learning. Last year's feedback has shown Minecraft to be a fantastic enabler in allowing this to happen.

'I'm really hopeful the results of this year's challenge will be just as encouraging. We'll be looking for participants to take part in research, to help us further develop ways to enable water safety learning in this age group?

This year, children using different platforms will be able to talk to one another while taking part in the challenge, to register your child's involvement email gaming@rnli.org.uk. The RNLI (in

conjunction with ASA) runs an annual programme of outdoor swimming and water safety sessions for all 7–14 year olds at beaches and lakes across UK locations during the summer holidays. 
They certainly know how to put on a party at Pennine View, and with Queen Joan attending they pulled out all the stops to make it something special.

Beware the Fake Letter Box Scam

The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) has noticed an increase in reports of fraudsters placing fake letter boxes on residential properties in an attempt to harvest the mail. **Residents are sometimes** unaware of the fake letterbox as the fraudsters will periodically remove the item, which may leave notable markings. The mail is then used to open various lines of credit with financial providers in the name of the

innocent resident.

Protect Yourself. Be vigilant and check for any suspicious activity, tampering of your post/letterbox or for suspicious glue markings on the wall. Check all post received from financial institutions, even if it appears unsolicited. Consider reporting theft of mail to your local police force and any cases of identity fraud to Action Fraud.

Joanne Thomlinson of Blennerhasset has been appointed as a new trustee to the board of a local trust.

The Joyce Wilkinson Trust was created by Joyce Wilkinson who died in 2005. Joyce lived in Westward, near Wigton. She enjoyed rural life and did much in her local community. On her death she left much of her estate to create an endowed charitable trust to support community activities in and around her home.

Joyce was a farmer's widow and her charitable trust fund, which amounted to £1.2 million when she died, was predominantly invested in farm properties and became the Joyce Wilkinson Charitable Trust. It is now valued at more than £3 million, partly due to the rise in farmland prices over the last 11 years.

Members and guests were welcomed by President,

Margaret Durham, and after singing 'Jerusalem' she introduced our speaker for the evening Olga Hetherington (one of our own members). Olga gave a talk and demonstration on 'The History of Costume'.

Olga began her talk by going back to the beginning

when people began to wear clothes which she explained originated from the earliest times when man started to migrate from the hot countries to the colder north. The first type of clothing were animal furs which until tanning was invented were not very comfortable. From this period she explained the various stages of how clothing developed through the ages and particularly Roman times when she showed a picture of the earliest bikini worn by Roman women, and the toga and other items. In the Medieval era fashion became more popular and women demanded more spectacular dresses. This was achieved by dresses being applied by dressmakers who pinned these garments together so that they could be refashioned into a different style but using the same material - quite an eye opener. Particularly during

the 12th Century designs became more fitted with additional embellishments such as head dresses, shortened sleeves and also tightly laced to show off the figure.

During the French



Institute

Revolution a simpler form of dress was adopted and for women a mop cap was also worn. For men shirts were first straight and then trends changed

and they became full. The poorer classes wore much plainer styles - this

was a trend which went on throughout the ages. Only the rich could afford the finery. For many women the laced corsets caused many problems as they were pulled in so tight and in some cases death occurred.

Members of Causewayhead were on hand to demonstrate some of the designs. The whole evening was a delight and very informative.

After the first week of health and safety, a tour of the lifeboat station and the carrot of "It will get better we promise" we wondered if any would be back for week two. Much to our delight all eight students turned up for the second week and right through to the end of the course.

The group learned knots and lines, navigation, radio procedure, boat and tractor marshalling, launch and recovery of the lifeboat, safety procedures, life ring and line throwing and became fully qualified first aid practitioners gaining an 'Emergency First Aid at Work Certificate'.

The final week of the course saw a culmination of skills learned by the students come together as they successfully took control of launching and recovering the




lifeboat along with a demonstration of the skills learned in the eight weeks.

The eight apprehensive students from week one had turned into confident individuals working successfully as a team able to organise and control situations they never thought possible.

It has been an interesting and



Phone Upgrade Fraud

Fraudsters are impersonating telephone service providers and contacting their clients offering a phone upgrade on a low monthly payment contract. The fraudsters will glean all your personal and financial details which will then be used to contact the genuine phone provider and order a new mobile phone handset. The fraudsters will either intercept the delivery before it reaches the victim's address or order the handset to a different address. Protect yourself





Inheritance Fraud

Inheritance fraud usually occurs when you are told that someone very rich has died and you are in line to receive a huge inheritance. A fraudster who claims to be a Business Relations Manager from an overseas bank or legal official contacts you through email or a letter stating that a person sharing your family name has died and left behind a vast amount of money. The fraudster suggests that as you share the same family name as the deceased, you can be the beneficiary of the estate and rather than handing any 'Inheritance Tax' over to the government you can split the inheritance with the fraudster.

The fraudster will emphasise the need for secrecy and warn you not to tell anyone else about the deal. To hurry you into making a hasty decision, they will also stress the need to act quickly.

If you respond to the fraudster, they will ask you to pay various fees – for example: taxes, legal fees, banking fees etc. – so they can release your non-existent inheritance. Each time you make a payment, the fraudsters will come up with a reason why the inheritance cannot be paid out unless you make another payment. If you ask, they will also give you reasons why the fees cannot be taken from your inheritance and have to be paid up front.

If you become reluctant to pay a fee or suggest you cannot afford it, the fraudsters will put pressure on you by reminding you how close you are to receiving a sum of money much greater than the fees you've already handed over, and of how much you've already paid out. The fraudsters may also ask for your bank details so they can pay the inheritance directly into your bank account. If you hand over your bank details, the fraudsters can use them to empty your account. You could be a victim of inheritance fraud if:

You've received an email or letter informing you that someone you may be related to has died without leaving a will and you may be in line to inherit.

You've paid fees to 'research specialists' who offer to sell you an estate report that includes information on the inheritance and how you can claim it.

What should you do if you're a victim of inheritance fraud?

End all further contact with the fraudsters. Don't send them any more money. Don't give them your bank details.

If you have already given the fraudsters your bank account details, alert your bank immediately.

If you receive any threats from the fraudsters once you have stopped co-operating with them, alert the police immediately.

Be aware that you're now likely to be a target for other frauds. Fraudsters often share details about people they have successfully targeted or approached, using different identities to commit further frauds. People who have already fallen victim to fraudsters are particularly vulnerable to the fraud recovery fraud. This is when fraudsters contact people who've already lost money through fraud and claim to be law enforcement officers or lawyers. They'll advise the victim that they can help them recover their lost money – but request a fee.

Protect yourself against inheritance fraud

Although there are legitimate companies who make a living by tracking down heirs, they do not do it in this way. If you are asked for a fee for a report, it is very likely to be bogus. Letters/documents

Visiting Super-Yacht Michaela Rose

On Wednesday 15th June and for just 24 hours, the port received an unusual and very 'up-market' visitor, the chartered motor yacht 'Michaela Rose'.

This beautiful 30 year old vessel regularly visits the ABP port and yacht haven of Troon, located on the scenic Clyde estuary, allowing its well-heeled passengers to enjoy the views and excellent golf courses in the area. Following a visit to Troon earlier in June this year, the vessel was planned to proceed to and sail up the Manchester Ship Canal where the American passengers would disembark at Salford Quays and fly home from Manchester Airport.

Unusually, and due to a problem with one of the bridges over the canal, this transit was not possible and so the vessels captain was looking for an alternative port. The ABP Harbour Master of Ayr and Troon contacted Silloth's Deputy Harbour Master, Ian MacPherson to ask if the vessel could call here - and Ian had no hesitation in saying yes. With our close location to Hadrian's Wall, the City of Carlisle, the Lake District National Park and Silloth's own charm and excellent golf course, it seemed an attractive option for the American passengers, who could also easily reach Manchester Airport from here. The passengers all

agreed and chose to visit Hadrian's Wall for a day before heading south to the airport and on to the United

States the next day. Whilst in Silloth, the captain of the British registered 'Michaela Rose,' (an ex RN officer and hence the Blue Ensign that the vessel was flying), took the opportunity to have an exploratory bike ride. Finding our area attractive, he suggested that we might possibly see his vessel again in the future.

This chance visit by the 'Michaela Rose' could indeed see further visits of similar luxury motor yachts, as the ABP ports of Silloth and

Troon are now discussing marketing options for attracting that type of vessel, possibly during neap tides when larger cargo vessel tend not to call.

Let the Bells Ring

The bells at St Mary's Church, Wigton are very special because until 2000 this church had no bells (other than the clock bell) and it was the only one in Britain which got a full set of eight newly cast bells for the Millennium. Each bell was sponsored by a local family or organisation and, apart from the seventh (Emmanuel), each is named after a saint. Wigton ringers are very proud that every Sunday morning this century (except one when the ringers all rang at Liverpool Cathedral instead) the bells have rung out, calling the people of Wigton to church. However, this fine record cannot continue unless more people come forward to learn how to ring them. Bellringing is a traditional

British pastime. Forget the cartoons of monks flying upward on ropes; taught properly - and Wigton has some very experienced ringers well able to "show the ropes" to recruits – it is less dangerous than gardening. Almost anyone, aged 10-100, can learn. It is a very sociable pursuit. All Wigton ringers belong to the Carlisle Diocesan Guild which holds a great many training sessions, for all

levels, as well as outings to other towers for fun ringing, coffee mornings and an annual dinner. Once a ringer has become competent enough to ring for services, he or she will be welcome to join in at almost any other church in the country with bells. Many ringers are keen to learn more complicated forms of ringing - and there's enough to last a lifetime - while others are happy sticking to the simpler stuff. Some ringers become so enthusiastic they attend a practice nearly every night of the week and take part in regional or national activities, others just ring for the Sunday morning service. The choice is entirely up to the individual. It is important for Wigton ringers to attend the weekly practice on a Monday night as often as possible and to ring on Sunday morning regularly. Staying on for the service - or being a church-goer at all – is not a requirement although most of our ringers do attend church.


An American Evening


