Cold Caller Warning




Cumbria Trading Standards are warning householders to be on their guard after a resident was 'cold called' by a person claiming to be from Trading Standards.

The caller, who gave a name and a telephone number, stated that Trading Standards had taken banks to court and obtained refunds for secret and unlawful charges which banks had allegedly made. The caller then asked for the victim's bank account details in order for the money to be repaid. In such cases when personal details are handed over money is usually withdrawn from the victim's

However, should you want some help our team are here to answer your questions and support you through the process. Our team cannot offer legal advice.

West Cumbria Carers LPA Team offer a range of services which can be tailored to suit your individual needs.

Bronze Service Similar to a passport checking service for £25 per LPA our team can check your completed paperwork is filled in correctly so it won't be rejected by the Office of the Public Guardian, which can

be costly. Silver Service We also offer the popular Silver Service; here our team support you by telephone and post to complete and submit your LPA to the Office of the Public

Guardian. The price for this service is £150 per LPA.

Gold Service If you want to talk things through you can make a one hour appointment to meet with the LPA Team in our Cockermouth office. If you come to this meeting with all required names and addresses you can leave with the typed LPA ready for signature. This service is £180 per LPA.

In addition to the above prices each LPA will also require a payment of £82 to the Office of the Public Guardian.

Silloth RNLI Lifeboat was paged by Belfast Coastguard at 10:13am on Saturday 6th May, to a mayday call from a local fishing vessel "Jaana B -BN78".

The 12m fishing vessel was reported to be taking on water with danger of sinking, there were two crew on board, uninjured. The original location of the casualty vessel was reported West of Silloth but was located North of Silloth. Silloth RNLI arrived

on scene at approximately 10:30am, a local fishing boat attempted to tow the vessel however the tow parted and Silloth RNLI took over the tow heading towards Silloth docks.

While under tow the crew of the casualty vessel managed to fix the engine problem, the vessel continued on back to port unaided but with escort from Silloth RNLI.

What should you do if you hear a neighbour's smoke alarm?

Smoke alarms can be lifesavers, if they're working. In fact, you are seven times more likely to die in a fire in the home if you don't have any working smoke alarms.

If one starts bleeping in your home, chances are you would know about it and do something – turn the cooker off, open a window, check the toaster or, if there's a fire, get out, stay out and call 999.


But what would you do if you heard a neighbour's alarm going off? It might be tempting to ignore the annoying noise or even grumble about it. But the Fire Kills campaign and Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service are calling upon us all not to ignore it, but to check it out. If there's a fire, or if you're not sure, call 999 and ask for the fire and rescue service. It could save a life.

Mark Ducie, Community Safety Manager, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service

said: "If you heard a smoke alarm in your own home, you wouldn't ignore it, so we're asking people to remain vigilant even when they're out and about. If you hear a neighbour's smoke alarm, check if there's a fire. Perhaps ring the doorbell or see if there are any obvious signs that a fire may have started. Make sure you don't put yourself in any danger."

While we're talking about smoke alarms, it is important that you make sure that you have at least one on every level in your home and that you test them monthly to ensure they are working. And make sure you know what to do if one goes off in your home – have an escape plan, make sure everyone in the home knows it and practise it.





Not Just the NHS at Risk



Following the ransomware cyber attack on Friday 12th May which affected the NHS and is believed to have affected other organisations globally, the City of London Police's National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has issued an alert urging both individuals and businesses to follow protection advice immediately and in the coming days.

Ransomware is a form of malicious software (Malware) that enables cyber criminals to remotely lock down files on your computer or mobile device. Criminals will use ransomware to extort money from you (a ransom), before they restore access to your files. There are many ways that ransomware can infect your device, whether it be a link to a malicious website in an unsolicited email, or through a security vulnerability in a piece of software you use.

Key Protect messages for businesses to protect themselves from ransomware:

Install system and application updates on all devices as soon as they become available.

Install anti-virus software

on all devices and keep it updated.

Create regular backups of your important files to a device that isn't left connected to your network as any malware infection could spread to that too.

The National Cyber Security Centre's technical guidance includes specific software patches to use that will prevent un-infected computers on your network from becoming infected with the "WannaCry" Ransomware: https://www. ncsc.gov.uk/guidance/ ransomware-latest-ncscguidance.





As part of the Fire Kills campaign, Cumbria Fire & Rescue Service is asking people to clear the clutter that may be blocking escape routes and to make sure their family, guests and loved ones know how to get out, stay out, and call 999 in the event of a fire.

But blocked exits, locked doors or unfamiliar surroundings can shave vital seconds from the chance to escape.

This week make time for

vour home and take some simple steps to help keep your loved ones safe:

Think about how you'd all get out in case of a fire making an escape plan and practising it will help ensure that everyone can get out, stay out and call 999.

Fit at least one smoke alarm on every level of your home so smoke can reach the alarms more quickly giving you more warning time.

Test your smoke alarms monthly - smoke alarms can save your life, but only if they work.

Clear your escape routes - make sure vou're able to escape without tripping over to ensure a speedy exit.


Keep your door and window keys in a known and accessible place - make sure everyone knows where the door and window keys are kept so they can reach them easily and get out more quickly in case of a fire.

Tourist Scam ActionFraud Fraud & Cyber Crime 0300 123 2040

There has been a series of recent incidents reported to Action Fraud where a lone fraudster has approached victims whom they believe to be unfamiliar with the local area. They make an excuse to talk to the victims such as enquiring about directions or offering a recommendation for a good hotel.

After this interaction, several other fraudsters will intervene purporting to be police officers in plain clothes and will sometimes present false identification as proof. The fake officers will then give a reason to examine the victims' wallet, purse or personal items. They may also examine the first fraudster's items or try to tell victims that the first fraudster is suspicious in order to gain victim trust and appear more realistic in their guise.

After all the fake police

'checks' are finished, victims have then reported being handed back their personal items only to later realise that a quantity of money or valuables were missing.

How to protect yourself: If an individual claims to be a police officer ask for their name and rank, force, and examine any identification presented; this is always good practice but especially important if they are not wearing a uniform.

The Police will never ask for your passwords or PIN details. Do not give this information to anyone.

The Police will never request that you withdraw/ transfer any money to them or to a 'safe' account.



Cumbrian Children Vote for Their **Favourite Book**



Silloth was looking at its best on a bright April morning for the arrival of WILSON AMSTERDAM, a new visitor to the port. Photographers and sightseers witnessed the approach whilst enjoying clear views across the Solway with Criffel looking particularly attractive in the morning sunshine.

It had been a six day sailing for the general cargo vessel from Klaipeda on the Baltic coast of Lithuania. The northerly route was taken via the Danish Straits, North Sea and West of Scotland. On reaching Cumbria local tides were not in the ship's favour. A wait of two days off Workington was required for the next tide of sufficient depth to allow entry to Silloth.

Finally, on the Sunday morning conditions were right for the short 90 minute sailing north to Silloth. The prevailing calm seas meant the pilot had a straightforward approach and entry to Marshall Dock.

Then once inside New Dock the ship was turned and manoeuvred towards the unloading quay. It was about 30 minute from the initial approach to the vessel being tied-up at the quayside.

After her brief two day visit, and with the cargo of fertiliser unloaded, she was ready to depart for the next destination in Norway.

WILSON AMSTERDAM belongs to Wilson Shipping's fleet of 120 vessels, one of the largest serving Europe's coastal routes. The ships are regular visitors to the port and easily recognisable by the prominent company name along the hull. Many of the vessels are named after rivers and ports; the nearest to Cumbria being 'Garston' and 'Liverpool'. Our Scottish neighbour WILSON AYR was included until its sale five years ago when the name was shortened to 'Ayr'. It's tempting to suggest 'Silloth' should be a contender for future additions to the Wilson fleet.

Peters First Year as PCC

Peter McCall is marking his first year in Office as Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner.

As Police and Crime Commissioner, Peter is elected to be the voice of the people of Cumbria and hold the Chief Constable to account for policing in the county. He is also responsible for commissioning and supporting victims of crime.

A key part of the role is bringing together community safety and criminal justice partners to make sure local priorities are joined up.

Police and Crime Commissioner, Peter McCall said: "I am immensely proud and privileged to be your Police and Crime Commissioner. During my first year I have been extremely impressed by the dedication and hard work that goes into making Cumbria the safe place that we have all come to expect. With your help, I have set the Police and Crime Plan which lays out the policing objectives for Cumbria Constabulary. There are eight main priorities from tackling crime and anti-social behaviour to supporting victims. Some of our achievements to date include: I do believe in action over talk and; I have launched my Youth Commission which gives young people in the county the opportunity to have their voice heard as well as influence policing of the future. Securing £3million of Home Office funding to improve police, health, and social care providers support to people in mental health crisis."

"I have been able to

difference to people's lives and where they live.

"For example: Funding to Appleby Heritage to deliver free training to young people focusing on road safety, speed awareness and the effect of criminal records on life choices;

"Age UK funding to

deliver a project aimed at raising awareness of domestic abuse in older people;

Mirehouse Residents Group awarded funding to provide a community based youth provision for young people aged between 11 and 18 years aimed at building positive relations and selfesteem;

Triple A project have been funded to develop an awareness training film of risks of people with autism becoming victims and/ or perpetrators of crime through vulnerability and exploitation.

Cybercrime is an issue in the county and I will be launching in the next few weeks a project that will enable us all to help to keep ourselves safe when we go online. The project will be rolled out across the county.

Neighbourhood policing is critical in how the county is policed and I've been able to further boost this by an additional three inspectors dedicated to developing better links with communities. These posts will also work closely to increase the number of

how we can ensure that Blue Light Services work together to deliver the best possible service particularly the synergies between police and fire. We will also see where we can collaborate with other agencies to reduce costs as a critical issue for me is to protect the number of officers in our County. I am conscious that every penny of public money must be well spent. I am pro-actively looking at ways to reduce my office costs at a time when there is still some uncertainty over police funding due to potential changes to the Funding Formula. I am a great believer in 'we - not they' and this is clearly evident here in Cumbria where it really is a team effort from members of the public, partners to the police in keeping us all safe. I hope you'll agree we have made a good start but I am not complacent there is much more to come."




Silloth Seagulls Win the Benevolent Cup
