A raffle and tombola completed the afternoon's activities - the first raffle prize being an enormous cake,


Barbara Hepburn who had introduced Pat Martin, thanked her for her very enjoyable talk and also those people helping to organize and run the afternoon.



### **Beware Escrow Fraud**

Fraudsters have been advertising vehicles and machinery for sale on various selling platforms online. The victims, after communicating via email with the fraudster, will receive a bogus email which purports to be from an established escrow provider (a third party who will keep the payment until the buying and selling parties are both happy with the deal).

These emails are designed to persuade victims to pay upfront, via bank transfer, before visiting the seller to collect the goods. The emails also claim that the buyer (victim) has a cooling off period to reclaim the payment if they change their mind. This gives victims the false sense of security that their money is being looked after by this trustworthy third party, when in fact it is not and the money has gone straight to the fraudster.

**Protect yourself:** When making a large purchase such as a new car or

machinery, always meet the seller face to face first and ask to see the goods before transferring any money.

If you receive a suspicious email asking for payment, check for spelling, grammar, or any other errors, and check who sent the email. If in doubt, check feedback online by searching the associated phone numbers or email addresses of the seller.

Contact the third party the fraudsters are purporting to be using to make the transaction. They should be able to confirm whether the email you have received is legitimate or not.

False adverts often offer vehicles or machinery for sale well below market value to entice potential victims; always be cautious. If it looks too good to be true then it probably is.

If you have been affected by this, or any other type of fraud, report it to Action Fraud by visiting www. actionfraud.police.uk, or by calling 0300 123 2040.







### Causewayhead WI Report

The June meeting of Causewayhead WI was held on the 14th.

A demonstration of lace making was made by Barbara Ratcliffe. Barbara showed a selection of lace items she had made over the years showing examples the different types and styles such as Torchon, Bedfordshire, Maltese, Honiton. She also explained how bobbins have been made from lots of different materials. Bone was the most common originally but have also been made from pewter, silver, gold, ivory, brass and wood. Some are engraved to commemorate hangings, weddings and other events. For a basic item such as a bookmark 52 bobbins are required. Lace has been made world wide, and Barbara had books from Russia and Ireland. Its history in this country goes back to at least the 16th century, a first mention of bone lace in historical records was at the execution of Thomas



consuming, to make an average sized frilly garter by hand can take over 100 hours. As a result hand made lace has always been expensive and was originally worn mainly by wealthy men in the 16th century. After George 3rd banned foreign lace to try and protect the lace industry it became heavily smuggled into the country often in coffins with bodies being shipped back to the UK. As a cottage industry it was very hard and intensive labour for those involved. As they were often in a situation where they were given a pattern and sold thread by a middle man who then paid them



a pittance while selling the lace for a much higher sum. Because soot would stain the lace they had to work without fires, if making silk lace this had to be done in damp conditions to keep the thread supple. So many of them suffered from lung diseases

and arthritis/rheumatism. The introduction of machine made lace saw the demise of lace making as a cottage industry.

I'm Tired by Penny Stimson


I'm tired and I'm weary And don't know what to do. I've got a cough and cold And feeling kinda blue.

The sink is full of dishes, There's not a cup that's clean. No food is in the fridge So I'm getting kinda lean.


The sofa is where I spend my day Just sleeping time away. I should get up and do some work, But perhaps another day!

The fish are swimming The bugs are singing Everyone is happy In their own wee world


Me I will continue to lie here My eyes are closed like the animals I am free of fear A slight wind is starting to blow The long grass swaying to and fro

The arrival of CHRISTA caught the attention of families taking the sea air on a sunny Sunday afternoon. The ship was inbound from Sagunto, a Mediterranean port to the north of Valencia. The sailing from Spain had taken ten days at a leisurely speed averaging 6 knots.

Passing through the dock entrance is always a dramatic sight when viewed at close quarters. Ship watchers followed the skilful manoeuvre as the pilot controlled speed and direction to counter the effects of tidal currents which can move the ship off course. Once safely into New Dock the ship was turned and berthed alongside the

unloading quay. The usual busy scene at the quayside was accompanied by the arrival of new members of crew who had flown in and were ready to board to begin their stint of duty.

CHRISTA, built in 1989 bears the flag of Vanuatu, an island in the Pacific to the northeast of Australia. The funnel logo 'W' indicates the London operator 'Wakes' Many ship owners use flags of convenience where the regulations of the flag state offer operational advantages.

The ship is used mainly on short sea routes in the Mediterranean and Black Sea. Silloth has been the most northerly port visited so far this year. Two days after arrival and with her cargo of fertiliser discharged she was ready for departure south to Falmouth.



Cumbria Trading Standards are warning local businesses to be wary of rogue traders cold calling offering tool sharpening services.

They are offering to take a few tools from a business to demonstrate their skill and provide an estimate before returning to take the tools to be sharpened. The traders make misleading claims with regards to how the price is calculated and several days later they return with the tools and demand thousands of pounds from the business. When the businesses, which include engineering and building firms, refuse to pay, the rogue traders make aggressive demands for the money in person, by telephone and email causing serious disruption to the business.


The rogue traders frequently change their business name and telephone numbers, but their modus

operandi rarely changes. The paperwork provided will appear legitimate, however the company is registered abroad.

And if the savings are put back into the local economy, then that's a bonus!"

Households in Allerdale who haven't yet signed up are still able to access the exclusive deals secured through the collective by simply signing up via the website today. They can do this right up until the offer expires on 11 July.



Frost, from iChoosr, comments: "Nationally, households

so far saved over £27 million. This suggests that collective energy switching schemes run by councils are responsible for diverting more than £17 million of households' budgets from their energy bill to their local economies.

"Five of the 'Big 6' suppliers – those which supply most households have increased their standard variable tariffs now, and the 6th is expected to follow suit in August. It came as a surprise when Jonathan said to the Captain "This is my favourite course in the whole of the UK. I live not too far away, so have been over several times over the years."




