Beware of Cheap Tarmac!

Cumbria Trading Standards are warning both the farming community and local residents to look out for doorstep callers.

Individuals are visiting farms and offering tarmac for sale stating that they have "left overs" after working on the local highway.

Trading Standards advice is to always say 'NO' to any cold callers and we ask that you look out for elderly or vulnerable family, friends and neighbours.

Consumers should be extremely cautious when approached by any doorstep callers offering to sell goods or conduct work on their property. These types of

callers often use persuasive or aggressive tactics to get people to agree to have work carried out and then charge far more than was quoted for poor quality work or goods.

They often fail to provide a legally required cancellation notice which enables the householder to cancel the work within a statutory fourteen day cooling off period.



Grange-over-Sands to Holme Cultram Abbey

Some 54 people, including Revd Andrew Norman, mainly from Grange-over-Sands but also with a few guests from other Churches, travelled by coach to Holme Cultram Abbey. After a pleasant drive of just under two hours they arrived at St Mary's Church to a very warm welcome by the Rev'd Canon Bryan Rothwell and members of his congregation.

After a short introduction to the Church and its history by the Rev'd Rothwell, we had the opportunity to explore the Church for a few minutes before lunch

Holme Cultram Abbey was established by Cistercian monks in 1150 AD and it became quite wealthy, owning large tracts of land on both sides of the Solway Firth, but it suffered from fairly frequent attacks from Scottish raiders throughout the middle ages. It was eventually destroyed by Henry VIII in 1538 during his dissolution of the monasteries. Like Cartmel Priory, the Abbey Church was allowed to remain intact as a parish Church for the village. Unlike Cartmel Priory however, St Mary's Church building was not well maintained and in 1703 it was decided to considerably reduce the size of the Church by shortening the nave and removing the side aisles.

In 2006 the Church was badly damaged by fire. The roof was completely



destroyed as were many of its contents including irreplaceable medieval documents. The Church was not opened again for regular services until 2015. The Church today is an absolute credit to the parishioners, architects and builders who obviously have worked so hard to restore it. They have succeeded in creating a modern, open and flexible space for worship and social activities, whilst at the same time sympathetically restoring the medieval stone work and stained glass which survived the fire. The result is breath-taking and has to be seen to be fully appreciated.

After some time admiring


the church building we then sat down to a delicious lunch of ham salad followed by a trio of sweets which were simply to die for. The meal was prepared and served by our hosts.

After lunch we were treated to a very special Eucharist. It was special because it was the feast day of the Blessed Virgin Mary where we celebrated her love, care and support for Jesus throughout his whole life and where we were actually in St Mary's Church. It was also special because it was the first time Andrew had

Church. In fact the service was something of a Norman family affair. Andrew led the service, his sister Sarah read the first lesson and his mum Anita officiated with the chalice, while in the congregation were his father and grandparents.

After the service we we all enjoyed immensely.



Better Cycling Skills

Thousands of school children in Cumbria are to get expert training in how to ride their bikes safely over the next three years.

Cumbria County Council has awarded a contract to Cumbria-based Cyclewise Ltd to deliver 'Bikeability' safe cycling training in the county's primary and secondary schools until 2020. The three-year contract is available following the council's success in securing £600,000 for cycle training from the Department for Transport. Cyclewise Ltd is now expected to deliver training to 5,000 Cumbrian youngsters each year.


Each year, over 1,000 Primary School children in Years 3 and 4 will learn basic playground cycle skills, and in Years 5 and 6 they will learn how to ride their bikes safely on roads and cycle lanes, helping them to start cycling to school. More intensive and advanced training will be offered to 150 secondary school students in Years 7 and 8 who already regularly cycle to school.

Councillor Keith Little, Cumbria County Council Cabinet member for transport, said: "I'm really pleased the council is continuing to provide Bikeability training in Cumbria to teach essential cycling and road safety skills and help young people stay safe on their bikes. This important work will also support the Cumbria Cycling Strategy, which aims to get more people cycling more often throughout Cumbria.

Richard Martin of Cyclewise Ltd, said: "After a lengthy tendering process, we are delighted to announce that Cumbria County Council has once again successfully awarded the Bikeability contract and delivery partnership status to Cyclewise. This 3 year contract provides the opportunity for another

14,000 Cumbrian young people to be trained in the national standards of Bikeability. Having so far trained over 36,000 children to Level 1 & 2 standards with our 15 super qualified and experienced Instructors, we look forward to having 50,000 trained safer riders on our Cumbrian roads by 2020."

Cumbria County Council has organised Bikeability cycle training with Department for Transport funding support for more than 40,000 Cumbrian school pupils since 2007.







It was a fine summer's afternoon to watch the general cargo vessel VELOX set sail for Wicklow, Ireland. The skill of the Silloth pilot could be appreciated as the ship manoeuvred carefully through the dock entrance.

She had arrived three days earlier from La Pallice on the French Atlantic coast with a cargo of wheat. Silloth receives regular deliveries from the French port which is a major grain exporter. La Pallice serves the fertile region of central France and is the only deep-water port on its Atlantic coast. Turnaround at Silloth is normally less than three days but on this occasion summer showers had delayed unloading of the moisture sensitive cargo.

Many photographers prefer to see empty vessels

rather than fully laden ones. Contrasting colours of the hull above and below the Plimsoll Line together with the bulbous bow protruding out of the water make for some interesting photos. As the ship passed through Marshall Dock the crew gave a wave, no doubt happy to be on their way. There was just time for a few more shots before the ship powered away into the Solway towards Workington where the pilot would disembark.

The ship is owned by UK company 'Faversham Ships' based on the Isle of Wight. The company owns just ten vessels and describes itself as a "friendly little fish in a very big pond". VELOX, built in 2000 was acquired by Faversham in 2013 and, like other recent additions to their fleet, is registered in Peel on the Isle of Man. The fleet is often seen in UK waters and on routes between France and Spain but this was the first visit for VELOX.

Causewayhead WI

Our September meeting got off to a rousing start with the singing of "Jerusalem."

President Margaret welcomed everybody and gave apologies for those members absent. The Draw then took place for the three lucky prize-winners of our Name the Meals Quiz from a total of eight correct answers were: 1st £20 - Susan Donachy from Mawbray; 2nd £10 - Kathleen Kirkpatrick from Allonby; 3rd £5 - J. Hindley from Carlisle

Our thanks go to the Cumberland Building Society for helping us sell the Quiz Sheets.

We were then in for a treat, Shirley and Susan, our programme secretaries, had once again found us a fascinating speaker for

the evening. Margaret introduced Helen Elvin, who gave us an excellent talk about Coppice working and a demonstration of Basket

Making. After a career change from primary teaching, Helen began coppicing and making baskets. She brought along several baskets, also trellis; a lovely 3-legged stool, carved on the seat; some bowls made, using a foot operated lathe: and various other items including a basket made from oak that was strong enough to stand on if turned upside down.

Different woods are coppiced at varying intervals depending how quickly it grows. Willow and Hazel are among the fastest growing and can be coppiced at one to two year intervals; Oak however, being a hard wood, takes up to eight years to

regrow. Woodlands for coppicing are divided up into sections so there is a constant supply to coppice each year. It is cut in winter the wood and sorted into various thicknesses and taken to dry. Prior to weaving into baskets, it is soaked again to soften it. A good coppicer always leaves a small quantity of wood behind, in a tidy pile, for wild life to inhabit.

Helen was thanked for giving us such a wonderful insight into her craft by Frances Jackson.

After a brief discussion and vote, Margaret was asked to book the Golf Hotel for our Christmas Lunch again this year on Monday 11th December. Items in the County News were then read out before the end of a very enjoyable meeting.

in the final few minutes of the match. Ellis got his second when he met a Dale Gebbie (man of the match) cross with a powerful header and it looked like an equaliser was on the cards when an Aspatria defender headed the ball towards his own net in the 90th minute. However it struck the underside of the bar and bounced away to safety thus leaving the score at 4-3 and second defeat for the Seagulls.

A trip to the Lillyhall 4G pitch to play two time reigning Premier League champions Workington Athletic is never an easy proposition at the best of times but when you only have eight first team players available from a squad of 28 it becomes an almost impossible task. It is a testament to the dedication and commitment he has for the club that manager Colin Baty was still able to raise a squad of 15 players for the fixture but such a makeshift side were always in for a tough afternoon and so it proved to be. You could not fault the effort and work rate of any of the Silloth players, with fullback Jack Taylor starring as man of the match in his debut for the club, but against the best passing side in the league and on such a fast pitch this was a one sided affair with Athletic running out 9-1 winners. The Seagulls' only goal was scored by Alan Sim a last minute addition to the squad and a former player of arch rivals Mirehouse!

Silloth's last game in August, and the fourth in twelve days, was another midweek local derby as Wigton Harriers were the visitors to the Eden Street Bastion. Games against Wigton always prove to be feisty affairs and this was no different. With no points from their first three games the Seagulls were desperate to get their season kick started with a victory but once again the failure to take their chances whilst on top would cost them dear. Both teams lost a man early to injury before Wigton took the lead with a free header in the six yard box. Silloth always looked threatening every time they went forward and got their just rewards soon after. Andrew Trestianu's thunderous strike from 25 yards struck the woodwork but central midfield man Calum Casson (man of the

match) was on hand to stroke the rebound into the empty net and claim the reward for all his tireless running. The Seagulls looked to press home their advantage but at the end of 45 minutes the scores were locked at one apiece. The longer the second half went on without a goal the more direct Silloth's play became and this played into the hands of the opposition. Wigton took the lead from a rapid counter-attack and suddenly the game erupted. Emotions were running high and the tackles started flying in with Wigton being temporarily reduced to ten as they lost a man to the sin bin for ten minutes (a new rule which the County League is trialling). The Seagulls looked to press home their numerical advantage and went very close when Ellis Gardhouse saw his header beat the keeper only to be cleared of the line by a defender. It was heartbreak once again for Silloth at the final whistle as the game ended 2-1 to Wigton.

September could not come soon enough for the Seagulls with the opportunity to get their season well and truly started. With midweek fixtures out of the way Silloth were refreshed and raring to go as they entertained Cockermouth. This wasn't the prettiest game of football every witnessed on the Bastion but thanks to their determination and strength of will the Seagulls were able to claim a much needed three points. Once again the squad was depleted and there were call ups for veterans Gareth Lewis and Robbie Carter as well as youngsters Dan Dobson and Nathan Gray from Silloth's Sunday team Silloth Albion. They all acquitted themselves admirably especially Robbie

display in the heart of the midfield. The Seagulls took the initiative early on as Andy Hardman curled a free-kick into the top corner from all of 30 yards but were soon pegged back to 1-1 when Cockermouth sprung the offside trap. Silloth pressed on once more and when left-back Nathan Gray intercepted a pass he wasted no time in driving into the heart of the Cockermouth defence before delivering a pinpoint through ball for Ellis Gardhouse who restored the lead with a clinical finish. The Seagulls looked the more composed team in the second half and seemed to be cruising to their first win of the season but then came the body blow of a Cockermouth equaliser. The players could've let their heads go down, but no, and leading by example captain Shaun 'the Sheep' Clark fired home the winner only a minute later. Unfortunately the game had to be abandoned on 85 minutes due to a serious leg injury to Cockermouth's Matthew Holliday. Away from league duty Silloth's next fixture was in the Cumberland Cup. Last season they reached the quarterfinal stage and were extremely unlucky to be knocked out on penalties by Penrith. It was a visit to another Penrith side Wetheriggs that was the first round prospect for the Seagulls but unfortunately they would once again came up short. Silloth made a very slow start and found themselves two down after only twenty minutes. This jolted the players into action though and they began to take control of the play. Calum Casson was unfortunate to have a goal disallowed due to a marginal offside decision before Reece Blake (man of the match) used his trademark pace to cut in from the left and fire a low shot that beat the keeper at his near post. The equaliser came soon after when Andy Hardman latched onto a peach of a

sweep home from close range. Just as it looked like the momentum had swung the Seagulls' way Wetheriggs scored a third just before half time. Silloth were still in the ascendancy possession wise and looked to go on and win the tie in the second half but the Wetheriggs defence was resolute and could not be breached. As the Seagulls pushed more men forward they were caught on the counter-attack and when the Wetheriggs centre forward went down in the box the assistant referee had no hesitation in awarding what looked to the neutrals like a very soft penalty (Wetheriggs second of the game). The spot kick was duly converted and Silloth's Cumberland Cup ambitions were over for another season. A special mention has to go to the Seagulls' Shaun Clark who played the entire 90 minutes with a broken jaw which he had unknowingly sustained in an exhibition boxing match (in memory of William Richardson of Maryport) the day before. What a warrior the Sheep is and we hope to have him back to full fitness

With only three points on the board after five games the chances of league title glory are now remote for the Seagulls but not out of reach. With that goal still to aim for and with four cup competitions still to be contested there is ample opportunity for Silloth to end this season like the last with silverware in the trophy cabinet. It has been a tough start to the season for the club especially manager Colin Baty who has never had anywhere near a full squad to pick from due to injuries, suspensions and absence. The players know though they will have to redouble their efforts both at training and on match days in the coming weeks and months if they are to turn this season around. A big thank you to excellent level of support the team has been getting for their home fixtures and the lads hope to give you more to cheer about soon. 

Silloth AFC headed into their 2017/18 Cumberland County League season full of confidence after a preseason in which positive performances against three of the top amateur sides in the county (Penrith, Northbank and Carlisle City) were followed up by three victories against Silloth Albion, Borough and Pirelli. The Seagulls were looking to improve upon their Benevolent Cup triumph and third place in the table (the highest ever Premier League finish for the club) from last season by mounting a serious challenge for the Premier League title. However a string of poor results in August has left Silloth with a mountain to climb if they wish to reach the heady heights of championship glory this season.

A packed early season schedule saw the games come thick and fast for the Seagulls, with four matches in twelve days to be precise. Next up was the

Wednesday evening visit of Aspatria for the local derby where excitement is almost a guarantee and this was no exception. Still smarting from the defeat at Celtic, the Seagulls started like a house on fire and took the lead after just five minutes thanks to a cool finish from Adam Carr. Silloth were dominating the early exchanges but could not press home their advantage with more goals and paid the price when a drop in tempo allowed Aspatria to take a 2-1 lead into the break. Once again the Seagulls came out strong at the restart with Andy Hardman hitting the woodwork and then only minutes later Ellis Gardhouse bundled the equaliser over the line from close range. It was Aspatria that seized the initiative though and with two more goals took control of the game. The Silloth players were not quite finished yet and poured on the pressure
