

Allerdale Borough Council for arranging for the rubbish to be taken away afterwards and to Silloth Town Council for organising the event.





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RNLI Car Roof Rescue

Silloth RNLI, Maryport Rescue, Maryport Coastguard and Cumbria police were requested by Belfast Coastguard at 10:41am on 3rd February to reports of a women stranded in a submerged vehicle on the beach between Beckfoot and Mawbray. Silloth crew launched at 10:46am and made way to the scene. Upon arrival, the crew could see the casualty on top of a vehicle, they quickly established a safe route around the car in order to rescue the casualty. Crew members entered the water to reposition the casualty in order for the lifeboat to recover the lady, who could not swim. Shore crew who were on scene at the beach requested North West Ambulance service through Belfast Coastguard. The casualty had been treated for mild hypothermia by crew and fortunately she had no other injuries. The casualty was returned to Silloth RNLI station to await the ambulance who checked her over and gave her the all clear.

Senior Helmsman, Steve Henderson said "The lady was very lucky, especially with the fast incoming tide. If it had been a few minutes later we could have been looking at a different outcome. Definitely a life saved by all involved."

Relief Boat for Silloth



On Tuesday 6th March 2018, Silloth lifeboat, the "Elaine and Don Wilkinson" (B.828) was sent away to Cowes on the Isle of Wight for her final refit! She was exchanged for the relief lifeboat "Malcolm and Mona Bennett-Williams (B.865) and will be away for about 10 weeks.

The refit will include an upgraded navigation system known as "SIMS" and will also be fitted with an Automatic Identification System (AIS). The AIS is an automatic tracking system used by shipping and provides current movement data such as course, speed and position. Anyone can view this data on solwayshipping.com or marinetraffic.com.

The lifeboat crew have already been trained to use the new systems which are currently fitted to the new relief lifeboat.

Bag It or Bin It!

Dog faeces can contain a parasitic worm called Toxocara.

If transferred to

humans this can cause an illness called Toxocariasis, which can lead to visual impairment and even blindness. It is thought that young children are at a higher risk of developing Toxocariasis, as they are

more likely to come into contact with soil or sand that contains faeces.

Dog's mess can be disposed of in a standard public litter bin.

Those that fail to pick up after their dog can be issued a Fixed Penalty Notice for £80 by a Police Community Support Officer or a Street Scene Officer. Those that bag the mess but don't bin it (for example they dispose of the bag in a hedge, a tree or a garden) and by doing so are littering, can also be issued with a fixed penalty fine of £80.

Allerdale Borough Council needs your help to target offenders.

When You See Someone Not Picking Up After Their Dog Fouls?

Take their picture and send it to Allerdale Borough Council using the free app myAllerdale on your phone or go to: www.allerdale.gov.uk/reportdogfouling

Allerdale Borough Council provide free bags at all their offices. There are many litter bins across Allerdale in which you can get rid of scooped poop. If you can't find a litter bin whilst you're out, take the mess home and put it in your bin. If you don't clean up after your pet you may well be fined or have to go to Magistrates Court.

- Remember to wash your hands after your walk. Dog faeces may contain worms that can be a threat to human health. For advice about treating your dog against worms, contact your vet.

Leave if behind and you could get fixed? By not sicking up your dog's mms you're committing an offence. If you are caught you could be prosecuted and fined up to £1000.

The winning team was Hayton Orient with 66 points closely followed by Central Terrace with 60 points. The final place was closely contested with Popeye's girls taking the place.



Causewayhead WI

Mary and Lynn, to the group. The speaker was Norman Godfrey who had brought slides of Wasdale in Winter. Norman explained that these were the results of numerous visits to the area

in February, March, October

and November 2006. Wasdale is the deepest and least visited of the lakes. It is surrounded by Scafell,Scafell Pike, Great Gable and Kirkfell. There is a non religious remembrance service each year on Great Gable to remember members of the Mountain Rescue Teams who lost their lives in service to their country.

The slide show accompanied by music from Litolff's Concerto Sinfonique No 4 showed the spectacular scenery of the area. It is a very harsh environment in winter and Norman's slides showing the ice formation on the streams and rocks were stunning.

At our March meeting the speaker was Paul Heslop and his subject was Grace Darling and the Northumberland Coast. This was very interesting and I have tried to give a taster of his talk.

As Paul reminded us Grace was born in 1815 at Bamburgh. Until the Longstones lighthouse was built in 1826 her father was light keeper on Brownsman Island, this involved the lighting of a bonfire to warn the shipping.

By 1938 Grace and her father and younger brother were the only occupants of the lighthouse although on the night of 7 September 1938 only she and her father were there.

The SS Forfarshire a paddle steamer and rigging regularly plied her trade between Hull and Dundee. As Dundee was her home port when a problem arose






unable to do so and the ship was forced by the storm onto the Big Harca reef and broke in two. Of the 62 passengers on board only nine survived. Some of the crew used the lifeboat and escaped.

storm they were

The lighthouse was a mile from the reef and in the morning Grace saw there were people clinging to the reef. She convinced her father that despite the still stormy seas that they should row to the reef and rescue these people. She and her father brought four men and a woman back to the lighthouse. After a rest two of the rescued men rowed over and brought back the other four.

Wordsworth wrote a poem in her honour and even in those days Grace Darling souvenirs were produced. Unfortunately Grace died in 1842 at the age of 26 from TB.

As well as this Paul showed us many slides and pictures showing how the coast of Northumberland has changed over the years. Tynemouth Longsands used to be a very popular holiday destination, in the 1950's Paul can remember the beach being extremely crowded, one mining town used to have an annual trip organised by the Working Men's Club whereby twenty



were built so that wagons could drop their load onto a chute that led straight to the hold of the ships. With the decline of the coal industry these became derelict but have been rebuilt as a monument to the mining industry. Blyth also used to have an aluminium plant and power station but these have also gone.

At Calcott there is a 14th century Hermitage which was carved out from sandstone.

Holy Island (Lindisfarne) can be reached by a tidal causeway. St Cuthbert is known as the Bishop who merged the two forms of Catholicism; Celtic (Irish Catholics) and Roman in practice at the time. He became a saint after his body was dug up eleven years after his death and was found not to have decayed.

In AD793 Holy Island was the first place to be attacked by the Vikings.







Cold Caller Warning

Cumbria Trading Standards are continuing to warn both the farming community and local residents to look out for doorstep callers after further reports have been received across the County.

Individuals are visiting farms and offering tarmac for sale stating that they have "left overs" after working on the local highway. Trading Standards advice is to always say 'NO' to any cold callers and we ask that you look out for elderly or vulnerable family, friends and neighbours.

Consumers should be extremely cautious when approached by any doorstep callers offering to sell goods or conduct work on their property. These types of callers often use persuasive or aggressive tactics to get people to agree to have work carried out and then charge



far more than was quoted for poor quality work or goods.

They often fail to provide a legally required cancellation notice which enables the householder to cancel the work within a statutory fourteen day cooling off period.

TPS Scam

Cumbria Trading Standards are warning local residents be aware of any unsolicited telephone callers asking for the banking details, following reports of residents being cold called by a company claiming to be from the Telephone Preference Service (TPS).

The service/device they are offering is unlikely to exist and it is simply an attempt to obtain credit card, sort code and bank account details or other financial information from consumers.

Cumbria Trading Standards and Cumbria Police advice is simple; don't give personal or financial information to any cold callers. Often these sellers prey on the most vulnerable. For all your goods and services it is better to deal with reputable traders

operating out of fixed premises who you know and trust.

Consumers can register their details with the **Telephone Preference** Service (TPS) to reduce the number of unsolicited sales and marketing calls. More details can be found at www. tpsonline.org.uk or contact the TPS registration line on 0345 070 0707.

Once Upon a Time - on Concorde



Concorde is the most graceful and the fastest commercial passenger plane ever built

On Sunday 19th February 1984 Lawrence Marshall decided to go on a Supersonic Concorde pleasure flight. It was a very satisfying experience. These flights were offered to the public to bring in some much wanted finance. The cost was £330 (1984) for the two hour experience.

We assembled at Heathrow in the Concorde lounge which was decked out with plants of all description. Those of us on the flight were taken to the aircraft leaving relations and friends in the lounge. The seating capacity was 100 in rows of four with a central isle. There was a crew of three: The Captain (whose signature we cannot be sure of). First Officer Brian Holland and Flight Engineer Bill Brown. At the front of the passenger area is a large digital display showing the speed of the aircraft. It showed the speed using the Mach system. Mach 1 is the speed of sound which is 670 mph.

After boarding we took off. The runway take off speed is 250 mph, similar to the top speed of a F1 car. Concorde is fitted with a nose cone which can be lowered to allow the crew to have a better view of

taken four at a time to the flight-deck where the crew of three were surrounded by a mass of instruments. We were also served with a glass of champagne by the rather smart stewardess. The plane flies at an altitude of 60,000 feet, which is 11 miles high. Modern airliners fly at 35,000 feet at a speed of up to 600mph. Compare the Concorde figures with a trip I took to the IOM TT races in 1958 on a De Haviland

Rapide with a seating

capacity of eight and top speed of 160mph. This flight was from Silloth airfield. During the Concorde flight the Captain announced that if we concentrated we would feel a slight bump as the plane

went through the sound barrier. On our return to

Heathrow we went back to the Concorde lounge which was rather crowded. At first



I could not see Mary (my late wife), I finally located her examining an exotic plant with a gentleman who turned out to be the husband of the lady I was seated next to on

the flight. Mary did not like flying at all.

We were issued with our certificates confirming the Supersonic flight. I believe supersonic flight will again be available in the future. This was one of the most rewarding days of my life.

Dear Buzz,

(Solway Plain Against Nuclear Dump). As you will know the Government issued an 'invitation to express an interest" into having a Nuclear Disposal Facility in your area, at the end of January.

This matter was discussed at Silloth Town Council meeting on Monday 5th March. The Council kindly allowed me to speak on the matter.

I expressed the feeling that it was no surprise this matter had raised it's head again. The Government has to deal with this material and dumping it in a large hole in the ground seems to be their preferred way of doing it. However, as many on the Council would remember this matter had been exhaustively discussed and examined when this last raised it's head in 2012/13. And the Solway Plain was found to be totally unsuitable because the geology was unsound. Siting it here would be unsafe. The heat and contamination would eventually break through to the surface.

I also drew Councils attention to the difference in the nature of the new proposals to the previous set. Previously an area could withdraw its involvement at any stage. Under the new proposals once an area has expressed an interest then, the relationship would be better described as a 'partnership'. Between the area and Government. Which needs both sides to agree for it to end. I asked Council to decide to not express any interest.

Councillor Cook reminded the meeting that in the previous round the promises of employment and extra income for the region had been shown to be insubstantial and lacked credibility. The meeting decided unanimously to not express an interest in having the dump on the Solway Plain.



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A Busy Morning at Silloth Dock

A grey winter's morning saw the departure of general cargo vessel FRI TIDE.

Visibility was poor with occasional snow flurries, not the best of conditions for the ship photographer. Nevertheless, passage through the dock entrance and acceleration into the Solway is always an impressive sight.

The regular Silloth molasses tanker ZAPADNYY had arrived earlier on the same tide leaving just enough time for the departure of FRI TIDE. She was bound for Riga having arrived the previous day from the same Latvian

port with fertiliser. Her arrival had been affected by one of the endless series of winter storms. She had almost completed the seven day sailing without incident, but having reached southwest Scotland needed to seek shelter off the Isle of Whithorn for 24 hours. Conditions soon eased & she was able to proceed to the pilot pick-up point at Workington.

This was the first visit of the Norwegian owned vessel to the port; she trades regularly between the UK and Eastern Europe. There are sixteen other vessels in the company's fleet all of which include the 'FRI' prefix in their name, presumably an abbreviation of 'Friborg,' the ship agency arm of the company.

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More Foster Carers Needed Carers Fees Doubled!

In recognition of the lifechanging work foster carers do with local children, in its budget, Cumbria County Council agreed to double the fees it pays to carers.

The decision is intended to make becoming a foster carer a financially viable option for more people in Cumbria and brings Cumbria in line with the fees paid by neighbouring local authorities and independent fostering agencies.

The increased fees, when combined with the weekly allowance which foster carers receive for each child in their care, means that newly approved foster carers can expect to receive up to £282 a week for each child they care for, and experienced carers up to £479. (See Notes for Editors for full details)

The increase in fees will be implemented from 2 April 2018.

Cllr Anne Burns, Cabinet Member for Children's Services, said: "We know people don't become foster carers because of the money, but providing the right financial support is important. I hope that this decision demonstrates how much we value our existing carers and attracts new carers to come forward. We need more local carers so we can meet the needs of children in Cumbria, in their own communities. While there will always be a need to place children with independent fostering agencies, our aim is to ensure as many of our young people as possible are well-matched with Cumbria's own foster carers and can

benefit from the excellent support networks we provide. There is agreement within the council that this is the right thing to do - both for our foster carers and for the children in our care."

Penrith's Rob Mason and his wife Christine have been fostering a brother and sister (aged 9 and 13) since they were approved to foster 18 months ago.

Rob said: "Whilst as carers, we are not in it for the money, we do regard ourselves as professionals and this increase is recognition on the part of the council of the hugely important role that carers provide. Going forward, if the increased fees are a trigger for those who had previously considered looking after children to take that step then hopefully in the not too distant future we can expect more carers to qualify which can only be a good thing for children in Cumbria."

While in the short term the increase in fees will be an additional cost to the council of £1.3m a year, it is forecast that by 2022/23 there will be a reduction in costs of around £600,000 a year as a result of reduced reliance on placing children with independent fostering agencies or in residential care which tends to be higher cost. The savings assume an increase of 15 fostering households each year.

The fee increase is part of a package of measures intended to improve our ability to provide the right care for children in the county, which includes: Investment in the Homestays scheme for children over 16, which gives them an option to transition from fostering or residential care into a supportive home environment where they can stay safe and learn the skills needed for future independent living.

Investment in a new targeted fostering scheme specifically to support carers to take on teenagers with complex needs. This will allow care to be provided closer to home and reduce costs associated with expensive residential care.

Overall, all changes taken together are forecast to reduce costs by £1.5m by 2022/23 while also improving the availability of appropriate care options in the county.

Cllr Anne Burns added: "I'm delighted we've been able to make these changes. They put us in the best possible position to meet the needs of the most vulnerable children in Cumbria and work with our carers to encourage more people to join Cumbria's biggest family."

Phantom Debt Fraud

Action Fraud has recently experienced an increase in the number of calls to members of the public by fraudsters requesting payments for a "phantom" debt. The fraud involves being cold-called by someone purporting to be a debt collector, bailiff or other type of enforcement agent. The fraudster may claim to be working under instruction of a court, business or other body and suggest they are recovering funds for a nonexistent debt.

The fraudsters are requesting payment, sometimes by bank transfer and if refused, they threaten to visit homes or workplaces in order to recover the supposed debt that is owed. In some cases, the victim is also threatened with arrest. Protect Yourself

• Make vigorous checks if you ever get a cold call. Bailiffs for example, should always be able to provide you with a case number and warrant number, along with their name and the court they are calling from; make a note of all details provided to you.

• If you receive a visit from a bailiff, they must always identify themselves as a Court Bailiff at the earliest possible opportunity. Ask to see their identity card which they must carry to prove who they are, this card shows their photograph and identity number. They will also carry the physical warrant showing the debt and endorsed with a court seal.

• If you work for a business and receive a call or visit, be sure to speak with your manager or business owner first.

• Exercise caution believing someone is genuine because you've found something on the internet; fraudsters could easily create fake online profiles to make you believe them.

• Double check with the court, company or public body they claim to work

for to confirm whether the call is legitimate; if you use a landline make sure you hear the dialling tone prior to dialling as the caller could still be on the line and you could potentially speak to the fraudster(s) to confirm the non-existent debt. Also be sure to independently search for a telephone number to call; never use a number provided by the caller. • Do not feel rushed or intimidated to make a decision based on a phone call. Take five and listen to your instincts.

Silloth Seagulls Struggling On

After finishing 2017 on a high with a superb victory at Netherhall the Seagulls were looking to carry on this momentum but the new year has not been kind to a side which has struggled all season. Unfortunately five defeats out of five has left Silloth out of all cup competitions and with their Premier League survival chances hanging by a thread.

First up was the visit of Carlisle City to the Eden Street Bastion. City had been the early season strugglers but a run of good form has seen them rise to the relative safety of mid-table. The less said about this 8-0 defeat the better! The only positive note for Silloth came from the man of the match performance from talented youngster Eddie Mullins.

A trip to unbeaten Aspatria was up next for the Seagulls and another heavy defeat was on the cards but as is always the case with a local derby the form book goes out of the window and this was a pulsating affair which would ultimately end in heartbreak for Silloth. The home side got the equaliser and in what has been Silloth's Achilles heal all season, once they concede one goal more quickly follow. So it was to be here as Aspatria soon added two more to their

tally to lead 3-1. Dan Foster was named man of the match with the skipper being a rock at the heart of the Seagulls' defence.

Silloth had hoped to be the main challengers to Workington Athletic's crown but after this 10-1 league defeat, it meant that their three meetings this season (two league, one cup) had all resulted in heavy defeats for the Seagulls. Skipper Dan Foster was Silloth's goalscorer and once again man of the match.

Next up was the final cup competition of the season and the visit of local rivals Wigton in the second round of the Whitehaven Cup. Wigton looked menacing on the counter-attack and this tactic paid off as they took a 1-0 lead. The tie was still firmly in the balance when early in the second half Wigton lost a man to a straight red card. However Silloth could not make the numerical advantage pay and as they threw more men forward in a desperate attempt to make the breakthrough they left

themselves vulnerable at the back. Wigton were quick to pounce and scored twice more to seal the victory and passage into the quarter-final stage. Man of the match yet again was skipper Dan Foster who put on another textbook display at centre-half.

The two teams would clash again the following week for what would be the Seagulls penultimate league game of the season. Due to the poor winter weather Wigton had been playing their home fixtures on the 3G pitch at Harraby and the fast playing surface was a great fit for Silloth's passing football. Wigton stuck to their counter-attacking style from the previous week but the combination of Dan Foster and Dean Barton were

rock solid in the heart of the Silloth defence with keeper Luke Stockdale dealing confidently with any high balls coming his way. It was the Seagulls who were looking the most likely to opening the scoring with the pace of young wingers Spencer Irving and Eddie

Mullins causing their fullbacks all sort of problems. With that and the fluid combination play between Andy Hardman, Ellis Gardhouse and Kieran Little numerous chances were being created by Silloth but as has been the way this season they all went begging. When Wigton took the lead then it was against the run of play but there is little that can be done to stop a twenty yard free-kick curled into the top corner. Wigton's second goal was another matter entirely as the Seagulls failed to deal adequately with a corner in first half stoppage time and allowed an easy finish from point blank range. The narrative of the second period was the same as the first with the Seagulls

looking dangerous going forward without finding the back of the net. The game began to open up as time wore on with Silloth committing more men into attack thus affording Wigton the chance to hit them on the break. Custodian Luke Stockdale had to be at his very best to deny the Wigton centre forward with a superb save when he was clean through on goal. Still it was the Seagulls creating the majority of the chances and Kieran Little headed a much deserved goal in the 89th minute which raised the hopes that a point could still be rescued in injury time. It was not to be though and this was yet another fantastic performance in a local derby from which Silloth came away with nothing. Skipper Dan Foster was once again man of the match in what has been a standout season for the talented centre-half. The Seagulls have one

league fixture remaining against fellow strugglers Cockermouth. Both sides are level on points but


