We had no plans to make changes during the 17th year of producing the Solway Buzz, but circumstances have forced us to do this.

The first issue was issued for August 2001 and was a simple black and white eight page A4 publication. Thanks to your enthusiasm and support, demand for the Buzz just kept increasing, so we had to move to a much larger (almost A3) size for the August 2003 issue, although still in black and white.

For January 2004 we moved to having colour in the Buzz for the very first time, and we were informed that you loved it, so for the past fourteen years the format has stayed the same, with almost every issue being sixteen pages.

So, why the change to a new size now? For many years the Buzz has been printed in Carlisle at CN Newsprint, part of the Cumberland News, just recently the Cumberland News Group was sold to Newsquest. Newsquest are the largest newspaper publishers in the UK and also the largest newspaper publishers in the USA. They already have seven printing plants spread across the UK and had no use for the relatively small plant in Carlisle, so at very short notice they decided it would close on 4th May and all forty-seven staff were made redundant. We were lucky to have the April

issue printed just after the staff were informed, so we have had a chance to find an alternative supplier. After discussions with several print plants we have now committed to having the Buzz printed at the Glasgow plant of Newsquest, but

we found that most printers do not use the size of paper we are used to. As a result the June issue is now slightly narrower than before and quite a bit shorter as well, it is also a slightly heavier grade of paper.

This has forced us to change from six columns per page to five columns. Our advertisers will notice that the adverts are now a different shape, they are wider and not so tall, however all advertisers now have slightly larger adverts than before when they check the paper area involved.

This has involved a lot of work re-setting every advert and we ask our advertisers to please be understanding that there has been no time to discuss this before going to print. No doubt some will think the smaller tabloid format is better, and many will consider it much worse, but let's all be happy that the Solway Buzz is still going strong with your continued support.

Beware TV Providers Discount Fraud

The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) have noticed an increase in Action Fraud reports where fraudsters are offering a discount on Television service provider subscriptions. Fraudsters are cold-calling victims, purporting to be from a Television (TV) provider offering a discount on their monthly subscription. Victims have been told the following: their subscription needs to be renewed; that part or all, of the TV equipment has expired and they are due an upgrade on the equipment/subscription. In order to falsely process the discount, the fraudster asks victims to confirm or provide their bank account details. The scammers may also request the victim's identification documents,

such as scanned copies of passports. The fraudsters are using the

following telephone numbers: "08447111444", "02035190197' and "08001514141". The fraudster's voices are reported to sound feminine and have an Asian accent.

Silloth Primary School had a very exciting assembly on Friday 11th May, when two members of Silloth RNLI Lifeboat Crew Andrew Stanley and Stewart Henderson, gave a presentation on the work that they do.

Three short videos on the dangers of inflatables at sea and falling into cold water were shown, followed by a video of the life saved when earlier this year, Silloth Lifeboat went to rescue someone who was on top of their car surrounded by sea.

The highlight of the morning came when Stewart from the lifeboat crew put on his waterproof gear, under timed conditions. The children quickly joined in cheering him on and he was completely kitted up in one minute fourteen seconds - a very good time for someone under such pressure and scrutiny.

The assembly ended with the children asking some very pertinent questions which they put to the lifeboat crew.

The children were extremely attentive and interested throughout and it was a great pleasure for the RNLI to go into such a welcoming and hospitable environment. Thank you Silloth Primary School for your reception.

The report on furniture dumped near Skinburness in May's Solway Buzz reminded me of unexpected things which volunteers have found on recent local beach cleans. We have removed two fridges, two vacuum cleaners, a freezer, a rusty bicycle, half a wheelbarrow, wheely bins, many traffic cones, over twenty tyres and several toys. At our first event in August last year we dragged a burnt-out motorbike off the shore at Bowness on Solway.

How do these things get onto beaches? We'll never know and to dwell on that puzzle can be depressing. It's better to think about where they go to: the Hespin

Work to the Eden Street Play Area it is now complete and the park is ready for youngsters to enjoy. Let's hope we get lots more sunshine now!

Cllr. Tony Markley, Mayor of Silloth said "We are grateful to Allerdale Borough Council for providing us with some funding which the Town Council chose to spend on the Eden Street play area, for the benefit of our local residents. The park has always been very popular and the new equipment and safety surfacing means it can be enjoyed for many years to come.

A memory swing seat has been installed which is designed to allow eye-to-eye contact between a toddler and their parent/carer. The Jupiter roundabout has seating and in addition, youngsters are able to control their speed by varying the strength of the disc's rotation. One of the existing sets of swings has been replaced with an exciting new Mega Swing which allows kids to swing together, to get as high as they can.

New safety surfacing and bins have been installed and gives the park a bright new look. £15,000 from Allerdale Borough Council and also £3,000 from the Town Council's budget was used to fund the project.

Town Clerk, Wendy Jameson said "A big thank you to our grounds maintenance team who have done a considerable amount of work over the last few weeks. They are a real asset to the town and take pride in what they do. If we'd had to get outside contractors in to do all the work, it would have cost considerably more."

In addition to the Eden Street play area, Silloth also has the woodland play area in the pines, the Water Splash park and the BMX track on Silloth Green. There are also plans for a small children's play area over by the Splash park, aimed at younger kids of 0–5 years. Designs are being obtained and funding sought.

- A fraudulent website or operator offering non-existent flights or other transport to host cities. - An accommodation booking service, hotel or operator, offering seemingly convenient accommodation in one of the host cities for the duration of the game. - Lottery or competition organisers claiming that you've won a prize or cash related to the tournament. Action Fraud received over six hundred reports and intelligence submissions in relation to the previous World Cup so it's vital

Having unloaded her cargo of wheat, general cargo vessel ALDEBARAN was moved forward to make room the new arrival WILSON LIVERPOOL to be berthed at her stern. It was a cautious manoeuvre using only the ship's ropes and winches. Dock staff man-handled the ropes whilst the crew operated onboard winches. The vessel was carefully inched along the quayside. The whole operation took about 30 minutes until she was made secure in her new position.

Meanwhile, WILSON LIVERPOOL was making her way up the Solway for entry to the port at high water. On arrival off Silloth the ship made the usual pirouette manoeuvre before lining up to pass through the outer dock entrance. Once in New Dock she was turned and tucked in behind ALDEBARAN ready to start unloading.

WILSON LIVERPOOL was inbound from Klaipeda with fertiliser. The Lithuanian port is a regular source of raw materials for the town's fertiliser business. The six day sailing from the Baltic port was via the North Sea and West of Scotland. This was the first visit of the ship which had recently been acquired and renamed by Wilson Shipping; she was built in 2011 as RMS ROTT'ERDAM.
