Silloth Town Council have kindly agreed to the installation of a fairy trail through the pines from the Lifeboat Station and RNLI shop to the Edwardian toilets passing the arcade and the wonderful bee garden and onwards to the RAFA Club and through all the businesses and attractions in the town.

A map is available from the Fairydust Emporium and other shops in the town such as Winters Newsagents, the Kandy Shop and Silloth Cafe as well as the Tourist Office at the Discovery Centre. If you would like to make a donation towards the running of the trail all money donated will go towards the map production and ongoing upkeep of the trail.

Silloth Lifeboat Tows Cabin Cruiser

A concerned member of Silloth RNLI Lifeboat crew was monitoring a small cabin cruiser's progress as it drifted for three miles on an ebbing Spring tide and a strong North Easterly breeze. It was apparent that the main engine had failed and had left them with only a low powered auxiliary engine with which to return to their launching point; difficult conditions for a small vessel.

Silloth RNLI Lifeboat was subsequently tasked to attend the small boat, approximately one mile

off shore from the RNLI slipway.

The VHF had also failed on the cabin cruiser.

Steven Henderson, Senior Helmsman; Stewart Henderson; Andrew Stanley and Ant Keeling, followed the vessel back safely to Silloth RNLI slipway, where Stewart Henderson and two of our volunteer shore crew assisted with the recovery of the vessel.

The three female youngsters and one adult male, although safe, were not wearing their Lifejackets, which were in the cabin. They were made aware of the necessity of wearing their Lifejackets at all times.


It has been brought to our attention that a few people were unhappy about last year's route.


of the parade!

Solway Nature Networks Walks



Searching for Solway's Natural History

Eleven people have taken part in the Solway Nature Networks walks and talks since the project was launched in mid April and the project is looking for more people to join in.

The next nature walk will be at 10am on the 17th July in Silloth.

The group have searched for plants, animals and insects at Crosscanonby Carr, Thornhill Moss (Abbeytown), Silloth, Mawbray and Maryport. The sites are specially chosen to show people the range of different things that live in different habitats.

Stuart Colgate, Cumbria Biodiversity Data Centre Recording Officer told us "The aim of the project is to get people telling CBDC about the common plants and animals they see when they are out and about such as sky

larks, field voles, sea kale and sea holly – anything they see really. The volunteers are getting more confident as they get their eye in and are spotting interesting species such as the common snout hoverfly, *Rhingia campestris*, found at Crosscanonby. CBDC has a few records for Silloth and the North Solway, so this was a first for Crosscanonby. The volunteers who came to Maryport watched the rare small blue butterfly and larva feeding on the kidney vetch. A real treat! One of sessions session focused on the bluebell. Our native bluebell is under threat from the Spanish bluebell which has escaped from gardens. The two plants hybridise very easily with the result that native populations are increasingly rare. This motivated one of the volunteers to map and record where




to find native bluebells on the Solway plain."



Beware Courier Fraud

The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has identified an increasing number of reports submitted to Action Fraud from the public concerning courier fraud.

Fraudsters are contacting victims by telephone and purporting to be a police officer or bank official. To substantiate this claim, the caller might be able to confirm some easily obtainable basic details about the victim such as their full name and address. They may also offer a telephone number for the victim to call to check that they are genuine; this number is not genuine and simply redirects to the fraudster who pretends to be a different person. After some trust has been established, the fraudster will then, for example, suggest:

- Some money has been removed from a victim's bank account and staff at their local bank branch are responsible.

- Suspects have already been arrested but the "police" need money for evidence.

- A business such as a jewellers or currency exchange is operating fraudulently and they require assistance to help secure evidence.

Victims are then asked to cooperate in an investigation by attending their bank and withdrawing money, withdrawing foreign currency from an exchange or purchasing an expensive item to hand over to a courier for

examination who will also be a fraudster. Again, to reassure the victim, a safe word might be communicated to the victim so the courier appears genuine.

At the time of handover, unsuspecting victims are promised the money they've handed over or spent will be reimbursed but in reality there is no further contact and the money is never seen again.

Protect Yourself

Your bank or the police will never:

- Phone and ask you for your PIN or full banking password.
- Ask you to withdraw money to hand over to them for safe-keeping, or send someone to your home to collect cash, PIN, cards or cheque books if you are a victim of fraud.

Don't assume an email or phone call is authentic

Just because someone knows your basic details (such as your name and address or even your mother's maiden name), it doesn't mean they are genuine. Be mindful of who you trust – criminals may try and trick you into their confidence by telling you that you've been a victim of fraud

Stay in control

If something feels wrong then it is usually right to question it. Have the confidence to refuse unusual requests for personal or financial information.

Fraudsters Lose Out on Over £20k

June is scams Awareness Month and the annual campaign aims to create a network of confident, alert consumers who 'don't miss a trick' when it comes to scams.

Cumbria Trading Standards warns that scams are a growing problem and is encouraging consumers to be vigilant and report and talk about scams. The service is currently working in partnership with the National Scams Team and has recently returned cheques to Cumbrian consumers including over £20,000 to one victim who was targeted by fraudsters. This was as a result of post being intercepted by Royal Mail.

People need to be on their guard against financial and legal scams following a rise in cases reported to the Citizens Advice consumer service.

A total of 1,200 financial and legal scams were reported in the year ending April 2018 - a 6% increase on the year before. The average loss for these scams was £330.

It is estimated that 48% of people in the UK have been targeted by a scam, however only 5% are reported. Scams are a crime - report them every time.

victims of these types of scams, Cumbria Trading Standards is sharing tips on how to spot them: Be suspicious if you're contacted out of the blue, even if it's from a name you recognise

Don't be rushed – you never need to make a decision straight away

If it sounds too good to be true it probably is

Never send money to someone you have never met

Never give out your bank details unless you are certain you can trust the person contacting you

Walk away from job ads that ask for money in advance

Genuine computer firms do not make unsolicited phone calls to help you fix your computer

Suspect a scam? Hang up, wait five minutes to clear the line or use another phone to call Persuasive

sales patter? Just say: "No Thank You"

Don't suffer in silence – speak out about scams

Cllr Celia Tibble, Cabinet

Member for Trading Standards said: "The stakes are high with financial and legal scams as you can end up losing your life savings or pension fund. I am delighted that Cumbria Trading Standards have been

able to return a substantial amount of money to our residents. While there might be new scams cropping up all the time, the tactics of scammers remain the same. When you get approached about any investment, don't rush into anything without making sure it's legitimate first, particularly when you're contacted out of the blue."

Septic Tank Tips

Thousands of septic tanks in the North West may be leaking into our rivers and seas. But looking after your septic tank is much easier than you think!

Call of Nature are asking everyone who owns a septic tank to take a few simple steps to maintain their system in order to protect our rivers, seas and wildlife.

Here are Call of Nature's top tips for looking after your sewage system:


- DO get your tank emptied by an Environment Agency licensed company every 12 months
- DO check your system regularly for issues like dark, smelly pipe discharge or slowly clearing drains
- DO flush only the 3P's - pee, poo and paper
- DO use natural cleaning products

or those labelled 'suitable for septic tanks' or 'low phosphate' to help the useful bacteria in your system.

Taking the time to check, maintain and empty your system not only saves you money in the long run, but also helps prevent sewage leaking into our natural environment. Sewage-polluted waterways can have huge impacts on wildlife and aquatic species; and also spread illnesses and harmful bacteria that affect humans.

You should also be aware that in 2020 new regulations are coming into force for certain septic tank owners. If your property uses a septic tank that discharges directly into a ditch or local watercourse (eg a stream) you MUST upgrade your system by January 1st 2020. If you are planning to sell your property before this date, you must still upgrade your system. Properties with a soakaway system or drainage field are unaffected by these changes.



Port of Silloth is now the Greenest in England



The Port of Silloth has officially opened its new solar farm facility on Marshall Dock, representing an investment of £250,000 in port infrastructure.

As part of the project, a total of 960 solar panels were installed on the northern side of Marshall Dock, adjacent to Carr's Flour Mill. The annual generation of the site is set to average 220,000 kWh per annum.

Attending the event, Short Sea Ports Director Andrew Harston spoke about the great milestone represented by the completion of this project, which will further strengthen ABP's position as one of the largest corporate solar power generators in the UK. The Mayor of Silloth-on-Solway, Tony Markley and ABP customers also attended the ceremony.

Short Sea Ports Director, Andrew Harston said: "We're delighted to be able to celebrate this important milestone and the successful completion of the solar farm, which will make operations at the port even more environmentally sustainable. The nineteenth Silloth Vintage Rally took place over the weekend of 9th and 10th June 2018, which proved to be a fantastic event, with lots of exhibits on show and thousands of visitors making the most of the wonderful weather we were blessed with.

Everywhere you looked there were Vintage vehicles and machinery on display. The exhibits included vintage steam engines, stationary engines, commercial vehicles, buses, military vehicles, classic and vintage cars, motorbikes, push bikes and various vintage tractors and agricultural machinery. It was good to see a few more car clubs at the rally this year.

On the Saturday, there was a children's football tournament which was popular with the kids and their families, with some very talented and determined youngsters taking part. Entertainment was provided by Greg Chapman who gave an enjoyable entertaining display of escapology, juggling, storytelling and witty banter. On Sunday the Xtreme Stunt Team did two performances in the main arena. The team provided a unique and exciting display, with the different riders boasting multiple championship titles and other accomplishments. Ichabod Steam and his Steampunk Submarine was also at the Rally on the Sunday. Ichabod Steam's (aka Paul Snook) robotic band came together as a natural progression of Paul's music and his interest in tinkering with engineering and certainly caught the interest of people passing by. Paul also did a few performances on the stage.

Our thanks go to Carr's Flour, Silloth for having a Museum Open Day on Saturday from 11am to 3pm in support of the Vintage Rally, with all profits being split between the Silloth First Responders and the RNLI. Members of the public had an opportunity to investigate the rare 'Carel' steam engine with giant flywheel that once powered the giant Carr's flour mill plant at Silloth-on-Solway. The museum also contains artefacts reflecting the company's history of flour, bread and biscuit manufacture over the years.



The Mayor of Allerdale, John Crouch attended the rally on Sunday and picked the overall winner, which in his opinion was best in the show. Mr Bill Abbott from Lazonby was presented with the 'Overall Winner' plaque, with his stationary engine – an immaculate 1913 Amanco Hired Hand stationary engine which was powering a butter churn.

Funding to put this annual event on is often hard to find and this year we were unable to secure any grant funding. A big thank you to our programme advertisers and everyone who bought the programme, which almost sold out, with only a handful left. Thanks also to those who popped along to our tent and gave a donation. We can't charge for admission to the event

due to the nature of the Green, so any financial support received is always appreciated. If every person who attended the Rally gave just a £1, we could do so much more. The other way we generate funds is by charging stallholders and food concessions. We had a good mix of stalls this year, who seemed to have a successful weekend, with some of the food traders actually selling out.

In addition to enjoying the Vintage Rally, visitors were able to enjoy what the Green has to offer, the gardens, the Fairy trail, the woodland play area and of course the Water Splash Park. The shrieks of enjoyment from the children at the Water Splash Park could be heard over the top of the 'put put' noises of the stationary engines. We are so lucky to have the Green



The Active 10 Campaign



Last year, Public Health England launched the One You 'Active 10' campaign to encourage adults to build more physical activity into their life, starting with a daily brisk ten-minute walk.

The sedentary nature of modern, busy lives makes it difficult for many to find the time for enough physical activity and research found that four out of 10 (40%) adults in England walk less than ten minutes continuously each month at a brisk pace.

There are a number of short and long-term health benefits to taking at least one brisk continuous 10 minute walk a day; it can lower your risk of type 2 diabetes (by 40%), cardiovascular disease (by 35%), dementia (by 30%) and some cancers (by 20%). It can also reduce the risk of early death by 15%.

The Active 10 app was created to help adults get more physical

activity into their lives and is the only free app of its kind which combines intensity and time, rather than just distance or steps. The app helps people gradually introduce more activity into their daily routine, with goal setting advice and motivational tips. It is also designed to help those who do walk relatively regularly, but not at a high enough intensity for it to count towards significant health benefits.

From PHE Fingertips, the percentage of physically active adults in Cumbria overall is improving and is currently higher at 69.5% than the national average (66%) and the North West region average (65.1%).

Grant Funding for Land Based Qualifications



Applications are being encouraged from students studying for qualifications in the farming, forestry and horticulture industry.

The Swales Trust, administered by Cumbria Community Foundation, offers grants of up to £1,000 towards the cost of land-based qualifications and the funding can be used to purchase study materials, specialist equipment or towards travel costs.

Priority will be given to students studying in Cumbria but is also available to people who live in Cumbria but are studying outside the county.

Carol Douglas (above), 48, from Sedbergh in South Lakeland, received £250 towards the cost of a Woodland Ecology Course at the Green Wood Centre near Telford. Working part-time at the Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust and a parent of two teenage children, Carol was unable to afford all the costs involved in attending courses to further her professional development within the forestry industry. Ineligible for funding for a Foundation Degree in Forestry, she decided short courses were another way to get the skills and experience she



needed.


Carol said, "I have gained a breadth of knowledge that will be useful in my workplace. This has given me greater confidence in my role as Woodland Officer at the Millennium Trust. The grant gave me the motivation to look into available woodland courses and encouraged my employer to support me in this process. It has also spurred me very much into wanting to learn more."

Ellen Clements, Grants & Donor Services Officer at Cumbria Community Foundation

said: "As Cumbria is such a rural county it is so important that we invest in the future of its farmers, foresters and horticulturalists.

The Swales Trust aims to level the educational playing field and support people of all ages who are looking to pursue land-based qualifications but need a bit of money to help them along the way."

Cycle the Solway for Charity

Wartime Memories of the Disappearing Lockheed Hudson

I was crossing the Green to have a look at the sea, when I heard a shout. "there is an aircraft on a sandbank".

I ran forward and at a point near to today's treatment plant beside the Pines, I saw that a Lockheed Hudson had made an emergency wheels up landing in a north-easterly direction. This sandbank would be about half a mile out from North House. As I watched the crew were stepping out and walking across to where a local fishing boat and crew had seen what had happened and the airmen were soon safely onboard and heading for Silloth dock.

The tide was coming in and I

decided to come back later when it had gone out. But no Hudson. It had been taken by the shifting sands of the Solway and was never seen again, no doubt pushed into a hollow and sanded over. The crew were fortunate to escape as many others weren't as lucky.

The Lockheed Hudson, a twin engined American aircraft was a familiar sight in the early days of the war and became a part of Silloth's aviation history. Made in Burbark California the Hudson was used in Europe, Africa and Pacific war zones.

Used in training at Silloth quite a number ended up in the Solway, which became known as Hudson Bay.

Seven Day Sailing To Silloth

A calm Spring morning saw the arrival of the general cargo vessel ELKE W off the port in bright sunshine. The light was almost too bright, slightly reducing the view across to a cloud covered Criffel summit.

The ship had set sail from the Estonian port of Sillamae seven days earlier with a cargo of fertiliser. The Baltic port is a new source of the raw material for Silloth. Sillamae is the closest EU port to Russia and has benefited from recent investment to expand its capabilities. Silloth is not alone amongst UK ports importing fertiliser from such distant countries. Several deliveries have already been made this year from Latvia, Lithuania and Russia.

The privately owned ELKE W bears a registration of St. John's, the capital of the Caribbean island of Antigua. As is often the case, day-to-day activities are managed by a larger shipping company, in this case 'Wagenborg' of the Netherlands.

The ship appeared well maintained, in fact crew were busy painting during the arrival. The vessel passed into Marshall Dock where wagons were waiting to receive the cargo. A quick turnaround was achieved allowing a departure to Belfast on the following tide.



May Shipping at the Port of Silloth

Zapadnyy arrived in April but didn't complete cargo until May had begun, so she counts as a May Ship.

Due to Neap tides and issues with Workington Pilot boat being off station for a week during May, two vessel calls ended up being diverted into Workington and Ayr to discharge part cargoes before arriving here in Silloth, a loss to the port and the community. Fri Marlin was the first diverted to Workington followed by Wilson Leith being diverted to Ayr with immediate following calls here in Silloth. Due to lack of water in the Dock we are looking to commence dredging on or around the 11th June and hope to increase the water in the dock by a good few centimetres to enable us to bring deeper draft vessels in more often and on slightly lower tides.

So overall we had six Cargo vessel calls, Molasses, two lots of French Wheat and three lots of fertiliser. The survey boat, Furness Abbey attended for a few days to carry out a pre dredge survey, just so we can see where we need to dig

out the most mud.

George Lou-N called four times, Philomena three times, Noordzee two times, Ptarmigan popped out for a quick trial at sea and is now back in port again, still trying to make her fishing gear resilient enough for the job to be done.

We shipped in over 14,800 tonnes of cargo this month and many tonnes of Scallops too. This was another good month for the port and the associated businesses around us.

12th Elke W with CAN Fertiliser from Sillamae then to Belfast.

14th Furness Abbey on Survey from Barrow then to Whitehaven.

25th Merit FR with FR Wheat from La Pallice then to Drogheda.

Darius Oliver (Planet Golf) includes it in his Top 100 in the World ranking, and I wholeheartedly agree. In fact, I rate it higher than Darius does and would strongly

Fergal was introduced to me as being 'the most travelled man in golf' and at the time Silloth was the highest rated course in the world he was yet to play. His review of the course is amazing and comes from someone who has played all of the top golf courses all over the world.

For him to rate Silloth as being comfortably in the top 100 golf courses in the world is fantastic for the golf club and can only help us to attract more people to Silloth.

suggest that Silloth is banging down the door for being included in the top 12 courses.

There is an incredible eye-opening abundance of beautiful turbulent fairways, sunken Dell greens, sensational scenery of the Firth and some of the most attractive yellow gorse in golf. I was so impressed right from the first tee all the way to the last green. The course keeps you in suspension with exciting sand dunes that hide the splendour that lies behind them without being too penal.

I thoroughly enjoyed the quirky challenge of blind tee shots, thrilling approach shots and

especially how the yellow gorse frames the precious fairways and greens. There is a blind shot on each of the first 3 incredible holes which gives you a sense for the rest of the thrilling layout. The club should count its blessing with the volume of fantastic gorse they have at their fingertips. This gorse should be celebrated and never Silloth on Solway Golf Course removed!

This golf course has more unique features than any other I can remember. Silloth is less conformist and full of hidden greens, blind driving zones, large central hills that obscure targets on par fives and small plateau greens on long downwind par threes. I particularly enjoyed the fun of blind greens hidden away from view by dunes or sunken punchbowls below the fairways. Davy Grant and Willy Park Jnr couldn't have routed the course any better than what we play today. The awareness of the prevailing wind at this majestic links helps with longer holes and challenges with the shorter holes.

The playing conditions were

world class, the change in elevation offers glorious vistas, birdies are plentiful and the hospitality alone is worth the long drive to get there. After experiencing the best holes Silloth on Solway Golf Course it is hard to believe that this charming golf club still manages to exist in relative anonymity. The abundance of appeal, strategy and architectural genius makes this course stand head and shoulders above the British Links that the world is familiar with.

I'd like to end this with a very strong opinion I personally hold as follows. I get so frustrated when people say "if X course was located closer to Y city/region, then it would be rated so much higher".

This lazy attitude is insulting to the course and the club should never suffer in the rankings just because of its location. If the course is worthy of merit and is architecturally superior to a list of overrated courses, then give credit when credit is due! Making the extra effort to find the best courses on earth is the exciting part! We frequently rank courses in Tasmania that are essentially at the end of the earth, so don't tell me the northwest of England is too far out of the way.

PLEASE GO TO SILLOTH!
You'll be immensely rewarded!
I will forever vote this course comfortably within the Top 100 courses in the World.
