Bicycle Treasure Hunt

A new cycling challenge that mixes cycling with orienteering, known as 'Bike O', will be taking place in Workington and at Watchtree Nature Reserve.

The challenge has been organised by Watchtree and the Allerdale Bike Challenge group in partnership with Allerdale Borough Council, aims to get people who have been inspired by the Tour of Britain on their bikes for something a bit more unusual. The treasure hunt will last from 90 to 120 minutes, and participants will navigate between a number of control points marked on a map. There will be prizes and certificates to be won at the end.

The first event takes place on Wednesday 12th September at the Watchtree Nature Reserve in Wiggonby from 4pm until 6pm. Get Your School Clothing **Vouchers & Free School Meals**

Cumbria County Council is urging parents of children beginning or returning to school in September to apply for school clothing vouchers and free school meals.

Since 2014, all children in reception and years 1 and 2 have been automatically entitled to free school meals, but many parents miss out on a free school clothing grant provided by the council worth £25 (or £35 for secondary pupils). Their child's school could also miss out on a Pupil Premium payment from the government of up to £1,320. These payments enable schools to provide extra support to pupils to help them achieve their potential.

Parents may be eligible if they are in receipt of income support, Job Seekers Allowance, Child Tax Credits or Universal

Credit. Applying online is quick and simple – the whole process takes around five minutes. Once approved, the council sends parents a voucher which they can redeem for cash at the Post Office, giving them the choice of where to buy school clothing.

Councillor Sue Sanderson, Cabinet Member for Schools and Learning, said: "It's so important that eligible parents continue to apply for free school meals even though all infants now automatically get one. If they don't apply, not only are they missing out on help with the cost of school uniforms, but their child's school could also miss out on thousands of pounds.

'We know many families really benefit from subsidised school clothing and that is why the council continues to fund

school clothing grants despite the cuts to our budget – we have a commitment to helping children and families who really need it. The application process is so quick and straightforward, don't miss out!"

Cumbria Remains a Safe County

Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner has received an update from the Chief Constable about the increase levels of reported crime in the county.

Overall, crime has increased by 15.9% over the last 12 months to 31 May 2018 this is in line with the national figures. In Cumbria, this equates to 4,091 more crimes being reported and classified appropriately. There are two categories that have seen significant increases:

• Violence against the person rose by 33.7%, a proportion of this relates to domestic abuse and an increase in violence without injury

 Sexual Offences (rape and other sexual offences) reporting has increased by 43% a 128 offences For the same period anti-social

behaviour has dropped by 13%. Temporary Assistant Chief Constable Andrew Slattery

said: "The statistics show that the number of crimes recorded in Cumbria for the 12 months ending May 2018, have increased by 15.9%, which is in line with the national trend. The two main contributory factors to the increase are, firstly, the continued increase in confidence from members of the public to report what has happened and, secondly, changes to the way some offences are now classified and recorded. We have undertaken significant training to our officers and staff so that they understand recent crime recording changes and to ensure this is accurate - this has had an impact and has resulted in some of the increases mentioned. One area where we have seen an increase is violence against the person. This crime type covers a wide range of offences, including Violence without injury - which has seen a 45% increase which shows people have the confidence to report early - before violence has taken place. Domestic abuse accounts for almost a third of all violence against the person offences. The statistics are certainly impacted by greater compliance by officers with crime recording practices, something which has been recognised nationally by the Office of National Statistics, which can give reassurance that Cumbria remains a safe place. There has been a slight increase in domestic abuse offences, which is encouraging that victims have the confidence to report to us, a great deal of work continues to be undertaken by the Constabulary to encourage victims of domestic abuse to report what is happening to them. It is important to note that the Constabulary has a high conviction rate for these type of offences that reach court. All victims can be assured of a thorough investigation and will

receive the support they require to safeguard them. There is no significant increase in theft offences, and the small increase in burglary offences recorded is reflected across the country. We will continue to work closely with our communities in order to prevent such offences. Robbery offences remain low and is well below the national average increase

of 23%? "Reports of Rape and other sexual offences continue to rise, again this is in line with the national trend. Almost half of rape offences recorded in Cumbria are non-recent which can attributed to high-profile cases both in this county and elsewhere in the country. The increase in sexual offences can be partly attributed to an increase in online offences such as indecent images and grooming. We have also seen a number of sexting incidents where crimes have been recorded for incidents involving child victims and offenders. This is another area that the Constabulary has focussed on to encourage any victim of a sexual offence, recent or non-recent, to report the incident. Anti-social behaviour, something that many members of the public feel strongly about, continues to see a significant year-on-year decrease with offences such as criminal damage and arson remaining static."

"Hate crime, which is historically under-reported, has increased. This can be attributed to an increased confidence in victims to come forward and compliance in crime recording. The Constabulary continues to work closely with all minority groups to ensure that those who are victims of hate crime can feel confident to report what has happened. The number of people who have died on the county's roads, during the reporting period, has reduced, we will continue to work with partner agencies in order to ensure the county's roads are safe for all road users. I am confident that across many different crime types we are seeing earlier intervention by officers and staff, as well as earlier reporting by victims so further incidents can be prevented." "I am also reassured that when



we ask those who have been victims of crime for their feedback that we still have high levels of satisfaction in the service they receive which is 88% for victims of crime and 81% for victims of ASB – this is a testament to the hard work of officers and staff who, despite

the number of crimes recorded increasing, they continue to deliver a good service. The Office for National Statistics publishes data from the British Crime Survey of England and Wales that does not rely on victims coming forward to the police. This data shows that many crime types are underreported which is why we strive to increase public confidence to tell us what is happening in the community. From the analysis of our own and national data we can reassure people that Cumbria remains an exceptionally safe place to live, work and visit."

Police and Crime Commissioner, Peter McCall: "Any rise in crime needs careful scrutiny. It is important that we are honest about the statistics and give the continued improvements made by the Constabulary in the way that they investigate, record and support victims that we are likely to see crime increase and we mustn't shy away from this. Today, the Chief Constable has provided a detail explanation of why the crime statistics have increased. The public need to be reassured that they are no more at risk despite the increase in recorded crime. I will continue to monitor closely. I welcome that people have more confidence to come forward to report crimes especially domestic abuse and sexual offences. I am really pleased that the message is being heard by victims and vulnerable people that is why I am supporting projects to reduce repeat victimisation and early intervention. People must not suffer in silence which relates to crimes today or historic crimes and I encourage people to continue to come forward."

'We are fortunate in Cumbria to have some of the lowest crime levels in the country and it is important that we all continue to work together to keep each other safe especially as the nature of crime is changing at a quick pace."

From a young age he was associated with St. Paul's when his mother was the church cleaner. Since then he has rarely missed a service in the church and served alongside seven vicars.

The Parochial Church Council commissioned Mrs Kay Ritchie, a local artist, to paint a picture of the church and it was presented to Ernest by Revd Bryan Rothwell, along with a letter from the Bishop of Carlisle thanking Ernest for his record-breaking service to the church over the years.

Revd Rothwell said "we are immensely grateful to Ernest for his dedication and commitment to his role as the churchwarden of St Paul's and also to those who have served alongside him".

A thanksgiving service was held in St Paul's in May 2016 before finally being declared redundant in December 2017. The church is currently on the market looking for a new owner.

Register to Vote

Don't lose vour voice residents in Allerdale urged to look out for their voter registration details in the post

Local residents are being warned not to lose their voice on matters that affect them by completing their annual canvass form and returning it to their local authority as soon as possible.

With local borough elections taking place in Allerdale in May 2019, this is an important opportunity for residents to make sure they can take part.

The form ensures that Allerdale Borough Council can keep the electoral register up to date and identify any residents who are not registered so that they can be encouraged to do so. This will mean that residents will be able take part in any future elections.

Andrew Seekings, Electoral Registration Officer at the Council, said: "It's important that residents respond as soon as possible, so we can make sure we have the right details on the electoral register for every address in Allerdale. To make sure you are able to have your say at next year's elections, simply check the form when it arrives and respond as soon as you can. If you're not currently registered, your name will not appear on the form. If you want to register, the easiest

way is online at www.gov.uk/ register-to-vote, or we'll send you information explaining how to do this in the post. In any case, you will still need to complete the form and send it back to us."

People who have moved address recently are particularly encouraged to keep an eye out for the form and check the details. Research by the independent Electoral Commission indicates that recent home movers are far less likely to be registered than those that have lived at the same address for a long time. Across Great Britain, 94% of people who have been at their property for more than sixteen years will be registered, compared to 40% of people who have lived at an address for less than one year.

Melanie Davidson, Head of Support and Improvement at the Electoral Commission, said: "It's really important that everyone who is entitled to vote is able to do so; checking the form that will arrive through the post is one of the easiest ways to find out if you are already registered. There's lots of helpful information about registering to vote on our website www.vourvotematters.co.uk."

It's all Happening these Days at Silloth Docks

Another interesting month for ship enthusiasts with a variety of vessels visiting the port. As is often the case, several came and went during the night, to the frustration of photographers, meaning only dockside shots were available. One of the nighttime arrivals, BEAUMONT, was more cooperative and departed on an afternoon tide. It was a blustery day resulting in some good action shots as she made her exit. The ship's engines were still warming up as she set off producing a temporary plume of black smoke as she accelerated away. The ship is one of ten owned by 'Faversham Shipping' based on the Isle of Wight. All their newer vessels are registered in UK ports, for example, BEAUMONT's port of registry is Faversham.

AMADEUS AQUAMARIJN was seen arriving on 10th July, on what was the first cooler morning of this exceptional summer. Her low profile appearance is a characteristic of this type of ship which is designed to navigate inland waterways. The unusual bridge can be lowered hydraulically to further reduce height. This together with a shallow draft gives her the look of a seagoing barge.



She must have been dwarfed by nearby vessels when loading for Silloth in Rotterdam, Europe's largest port.

ELBETOR was seen arriving from Belgium, a short three day

sailing to Silloth. The sunny afternoon had attracted spectators to share a fine view across the Solway. The ship itself doesn't have very elegant lines, but despite this has been a workhorse for four different owners since 1990. Her arrival went smoothly and she was soon at her berth being tied up by the crew. Her original name PORT FARO is embossed on the bridge and still visible under layers of paint; this ship was built to last. Twenty four hours later she was in demand again as she set sail for Belfast.

Doonhamer to carry out 4th dredging works around the port. Amadeus Aquamarijn 10th with salt from Rotterdam. 10th Fri Langesund with wheat from La Pallice. 14th Ptarmigan, a trawler in dock for repair and maintenance. 16th Elbetor with fertiliser from Ghent 24th Hendrik S with fertiliser from Ghent. 29th Zapadnyy with molasses from Amsterdam. 30th Beaumont with wheat from La Pallice. Now that the dock has been dredged we are hoping to have more larger vessels visiting.
