



New Community Fund

Solway Firth Partnership (SFP) is now running the Robin Rigg Community Fund.

The Robin Rigg Community Fund is available to community groups and organisations in the Solway area undertaking activities that contribute to the reduction of the effects of climate change or otherwise benefit the local community. The fund is now open to any organisation within the specified geographical area. They can apply for a grant of £1,000 to £15,000 (only once in each year of the fund).

The first deadline for applications to the Robin Rigg Community Fund will be 5pm on Thursday 12 December 2019. Further applications may be invited during 2020 if funds are available. Clair McFarlan, Solway Firth Partnership Manager, said: "We are now inviting applications from communities around the Solway coast for projects that will provide benefit to the local community in the areas of Environment; Renewable energy; Energy efficiency; Sustainable development; Charity; Education; Community; and General community amenity schemes or projects."

This involved mixing various colours, together with drops of silicone and Floetrol, which caused the paint to bubble and speckle when heated with either a hair dryer or culinary blowtorch. When the colours were mixed


in a small cup, the paint was either poured slowly on to a prepared canvas, or the cup was inverted on to the canvas and then removed, allowing the paint to spread and run all over the canvas, encouraged by the canvas being tilted in different directions. The resulting patterns were very effective and interesting.

The Blencogo Art Group is now into it's fourth week of the present session after having had the summer recess. We're awaiting the start of our annual "Big Picture" activity where any of the members who wish to take part are given sections of a picture which has been copied, enlarged and cut into pieces which we each paint according to what our section shows. When all the sections are completed, Janet - one of our founder members – assembles them all to make a very large

Lifeboat launched to unidentified objects in sea

On Sunday 29th September Silloth RNLI lifeboat was tasked to search for three large unidentified objects that were floating in the sea, to the south of Silloth. Due to the ebbing tide the lifeboat had to be launched from the West Beach at Silloth.

Maryport Coastguard were involved with the search and advised the lifeboat to launch and ascertain that there was nothing that needed help.

Silloth lifeboat was able to confirm that amongst other debris there was part of a massive fir tree with broken branches.

The lifeboat was subsequently recovered from West Beach and returned to station.

Silloth RNLI lifeboat and the Coastguard rescue helicopter from Prestwick, had a joint exercise on Sunday afternoon 29th September.

This involved the helicopter winching some of their crew onto the lifeboat, as would be done if the lifeboat and helicopter were deployed on a real emergency. The helicopter and lifeboat worked closely with each other for an hour in excellent conditions.

Maryport Coastguard was also involved with the exercise and based themselves at Silloth RNLI boathouse where they were able to see the whole event take place.



Cllr Deborah Earl, Cumbria County Council's Cabinet Member for Local Communities, said: "I'm pleased that libraries across Allerdale are supporting this campaign, helping some of the vulnerable and homeless people in our communities to stay warmer this winter. I'd urge anyone that may have a spare or unused heavy jacket to consider donating it to this very important cause."



Unfortunately due to the inclement weather we were unable to have a practical demonstration by farrier Nathan Studholme at our October meeting. However Nathan gave a very interesting talk on the subject.

Unlike other countries, in the UK you have to be a registered farrier to shoe horses. This involves a $4\frac{1}{2}$ year apprenticeship. Between 16-19 this is free to the employer, at 19 the employer pays £3,000 towards college fees. Over 25 you have to pay for the course yourself and this is £30,000 over the $4\frac{1}{2}$ years.

Once qualified the annual registration is £240.

To ensure the welfare of the horse, the course involves the anatomy of the horse and all the different types and uses of shoes. Although most farriers do not now make shoes from scratch a set has to be made and fitted as part of the exam.

The Romans used leather pads to protect hooves and it is believed the Celts were the first to nail shoes.

Nathan explained that the main reason for shoeing is to protect the foot on roads. It is not really necessary to shoe horses in fields, in dryer areas the ground is hard enough to keep the hoof worn down but in wetter areas it is necessary to trim the hoof.

As the hoof is growing all the time the shoe moves forward and should be checked at least every four weeks. Foals are not normally shod until they are three years as it can stop the proper development, although they can be shod to help proper development but must be checked a minimum of every two weeks.

Nathan circulated different types of shoes and explained how they were used.

At our November meeting Mike Cowen came to tell us about his journey from Curthwaite to Beijing on a motorbike.

Mike explained that for the 12,500 mile journey a special motor bike was required. This had heated seats and grips and a cage to protect the engine from damage caused by falling on bad

roads. There were two panniers, one for parts and one for spares, no other luggage could be taken. Fully laden the bikes weigh around a quarter of a ton. The equipment included electric heated suits that plug into the motorbike, special boots to protect ankles and lower leg in falls. There was a 4WD van containing tools and spares driven by a mechanic.

Before being accepted for the trip prospective riders have to attend a session in South Wales to ensure they are competent riders and that they will fit in with the rest of the group. Very important with a small group who will be together for three months. There was a cross section of ages among the 17 in Mike's group. The first section of the journey

The first section of the journey was from London to Istanbul, travelling approximately 400 miles a day. The group stayed in hotels and met each evening to plan the next day and set their satnavs. In the mornings they set off individually sometimes meeting for lunch.

Travelling through France, Germany and Austria, Bulgaria, the former Yugoslavia to Istanbul. Mike and a companion had booked a cabin on a ferry across the Caspian Sea but the weather was so bad they slept on deck. From Turkey they followed the old silk route to China. This time travelling as a group as they had to have compulsory guides. Each of these states had required a visa which had taken nearly six months to acquire. This route took them through the former USSR states and it was noticeable the further east they travelled how much

> poorer these people are. The power and water supplies are erratic and the roads and sanitation are very bad. They were also camping in two person tents rather than using hotels. During this part of the trip the food was often scarce and they all suffered from sickness. During the trip Mike lost a stone and a half.

The customs in these countries were often corrupt, Mike had a shirt stolen at one, and food was often confiscated from the locals. The group had taken US dollars as this currency was accepted everywhere but had to keep it well hidden.

As some of this journey was at high altitude the group took tablets to protect against this. Their electric suits also proved their worth.

Once into Tibet it was very cold, the roads were even worse and as they were near the Afghanistan border they found the people and the landscape very inhospitable. In Tibet they all had to have an eye test to get a driving licence, as locals often cannot read and write the eye chart also contained pictures of animals. Travelling into Tibet from the north the road contains 84 hairpin bends.

Mike's impression of China was that it was a country of very big streams, a very rich and very poor country whose aim is to clothe, feed and house its people. At the end of the trip they flew home and the motorbikes were shipped back to the UK in a container ship.

Elsie Foster 1925-2019

It is with great sadness that we report that after a short stay in Carlisle hospital Elsie Foster (nee Lightfoot) passed away peacefully on 5th September 2019.

Elsie who was born at Hayton (Aspatria) post office on the 15th October 1925 was well known by many people in the area due to her involvement with so many local organisations Elsie was the third daughter to Matt

and Hannah Lightfoot, sister to Florence, Nellie and Harry. Matt was the local joiner and wheelwright in Hayton and together with Hannah ran the post office at Havton. Elsie attended school at Hayton and then on leaving school secured a job at Mortons at Cummersdale, Carlisle, biking to Aspatria each day to catch the train to Carlisle and then making the return journey at night after a hard days' work. As a young girl Elsie enjoyed the local dances and it was at the local dance at Hayton when she met Donald the love of her life; Donald having cycled from Abbeytown to attend the dance. Unfortunately War broke out in 1939 and Donald went off to serve his country in North Africa, Greece and Italy, this would do nothing to weaken their love for each other, Donald spending much of any free time he had writing letters home to Elsie who obviously replied to each letter she received. Eventually the war ended and Donald was able to return home; arriving back at Carlisle station on 2nd April 1946 to be met there by Elsie and his sister Audrey.

On the 25th May 1946 Elsie and Donald were married at St James Church, Hayton and they would go on to enjoy 72 years of married life together. They lived firstly at Oughterside, then moving to 29 Friars Garth, Abbeytown in 1955 with their three children Maureen, Stanley and Irene their fourth child Norman being born in Abbeytown in 1956. Elsie along with her husband Donald would go on to be involved with many organisations in the area.

While working as the post lady in Abbeytown and at the same time a dinner lady at Abbeytown school Elsie would also be bringing up her four children, but also found time to be involved in many organisations. At a time when Abbeytown Women's Institute would have up to 100 members Elsie carried out the role as secretary for several years, giving her time; to ensure other people could enjoy themselves. This was at a time when the WI Flower show



was a big event in the Abbeytown calendar, Elsie was busy helping to organise the event while at the same time winning awards for her baking and handicraft skills, Donald winning awards for his garden produce, encouraged to enter by Elsie. The Mothers Union also played an important part in Elsie's life; with Elsie involving herself in all that was going on.

Elsie along with Donald served on the Holme Cultram Abbey Church council for many years, working away to ensure that everything ran smoothly. She also took on the role of organising the flower rota at the Church, producing some lovely flower displays herself. The Church opened a shop, this was housed in what is currently the tea rooms, Elsie volunteered to help to run it, spending many hours ordering stock, arranging the shop, organising a rota and serving in the shop herself, more recently being helped by her granddaughters. It was a proud moment for Elsie and her family when she was chosen to be presented to Princess Margaret who visited the Abbey in 1973 to open the Arts centre.

Elsie along with Donald also served on the village Hall committee and was a keen member of the indoor Bowling club for many years. Elsie also delivered the Church magazines for many years and was a "Solway Buzz paper girl" in her 80's! In the Funeral service at Holme Cultram Abbey, Canon Bryan Rothwell made a very kind and fitting tribute to Elsie focussing on her service to family, friends and community. The final Hymn was Jerusalem, a fitting hymn for a stalwart of the Womens Institute. Many thanks to the Holme Cultram Ladies who provided refreshments after the service.

The collection was divided between Holme Cultram Abbey and the Childrens Society a cause which Donald and Elsie had supported through their lives

As friends stated in their sympathy card "Elsie and Donald were stalwarts of the village and of the many organisations-their like we feel we'll never see again."

An interesting few weeks at the dock featuring a variety of ships, some making their first visit while others were familiar faces. Ships were photographed arriving from Northern Ireland, mainland Europe, and one from much further afield.

Firstly, BURGTOR arrived on a bright September afternoon with furnace bottom ash from Londonderry. This material is the valuable residue from burning fossil fuels in power stations and finds use in the construction industry. The ship was photographed manoeuvring off the port before making her entrance. Another familiar ship, VERITY, made two visits during September. A daytime arrival from France made for some dramatic shots as she completed the tight turn around the outer dock wall into Marshall Dock. Once in calm water she was soon brought alongside ready to begin unloading a cargo of wheat.


Another repeat visitor, MARIE B, attempted to cause confusion with a livery change from green to blue and a minor name change from MARIE-B, losing the hyphen. However, shipping authorities have safeguards in place to overcome any confusion as every ship is assigned a unique identification number which is carried throughout their lifetime. The sailing from Lithuania via the Baltic Sea and Kiel Canal should have been straightforward however she encountered unseasonably strong westerlies in the English Channel which delayed her arrival.

The most notable visitor was the ELKE, a new ship for Silloth, which had made the 3,700 mile sailing from the Georgian port of Poti in the Black Sea. This epic 20 day journey took her through the Bosphorus, passing Istanbul, into the Aegean Sea and onward into the Mediterranean. This route would have made an attractive summer holiday cruise! This was the second delivery of the year from this distant port which is becoming an important regional centre for the export of fertiliser. ELKE was only in dock for 24 hours before she set sail again for Germany - a ship in high demand.

September was a busy month at Silloth once again, not the busiest in terms of shipping, but with the dock gate!

We are now set on our course to meet the same cargo levels as last year and hopefully exceed them slightly, subject as ever to the omnipresent threat of something called Brexit, which most people have never heard of..... or have they?

Not so much fertiliser this month, but a welcome return of FBA (Furness Bottom Ash) and logs. Keeping us in line for a good month.

This month also saw the return of wheat produced within our own borders for a change, reducing the number of trucks on the road by 75 with just this one small ship. Hopefully this will allow the residents of Silloth to see that the local businesses are working to reduce traffic here within our town.

Work on our dock gate proceeds according to plan with a lot of overtime and weekend work being done behind the scenes. Hopefully we will have the gates back in use within the week ending 12th October and be able to accommodate our old faithful, Zapadnyy a little later in the month.

October was another good month for Silloth port as we have again exceeded our budget planning for vessel calls.

With cargoes coming from the Baltic, the Black Sea, Ireland and France, we work around Europe, but also with countries not in the EU, Brexit will make little difference to the operations in the port, but may make substantial differences to our clients and customers.

With further delays on the horizon to any Brexit decision, we all have our fingers crossed here in the Port of Silloth that something happens soon and hopefully in the favour of all our customers.

School Lane Parking Safety Campaign



PCSO Peter Nichol attended Silloth Primary School and along with head teacher Rachel Ingrams and pupils from year six they displayed road safety signs supplied by the Police and Crime Commissioner to educate drivers about how they drive and park on the entry to the school.
