

Work has begun to create a new cycleway along the Solway Coast.

The 'Solway Coaster' project will see a 14.1km route between Allonby and Silloth created and join onto the already successful cycleway from Maryport to Allonby. The link between the coastal towns will form part of the National Cycle Network Route 72 (Hadrian's Cycleway), which runs from Ravenglass, Cumbria, to South Shields in Tyne and Wear. Work on the scheme is being carried out by the Eric Wright Civil Engineering following a tender process earlier this year with the project officially getting underway on Tuesday, September 8th. It is hoped the track will be complete by the end of the current financial year.

Allerdale Borough Council has taken the lead on delivering the project on behalf of the Silloth-on-Solway Coastal Community Team (CCT), a mix of public, private and community partners. The project has been supported by professional services firm WYG who are acting as contract managers for the Council, assisting with design, ecological surveys, planning applications and common land applications.

To fund the project the CCT secured £1m from the Department for Communities and Local Government's Coastal Communities Fund and a further £250,000 from DEFRA's Rural Development Programme for England (RDPE), which is part of the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development.

The path is aimed predominantly at cyclists, but the off-road sections will be multi-functional and accommodate pedestrians and cyclists. A total of 4.63km of the new route will be 'off road' and 9.47km 'on road'.

On Bank Holiday Monday 31st August, Silloth RNLI lifeboat crew were given an allotted day and authorised to launch on exercise.

Due to the ever-changing environment of the Solway Firth it has been extremely difficult for the crew to keep up their considerable expertise in local knowledge, along

with their practical skills during this pandemic and they therefore welcomed the opportunity to go out. Coronavirus restrictions, put in place by the RNLI, has meant that the lifeboat has had to curtail their twice weekly exercises to two a month.

The tide was favourable for a morning launch and early afternoon recovery from the slipway in front of the lifeboat station and the weather was kind.

The RNLI lifeboat crew decided that they would hone their skills in towing; working with flares and casualty recovery, along with updating their local knowledge.








James Richards Circus Visit



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Get Ready for the Flu Vaccine

GPs and health leaders across Cumbria urge eligible people to get ready for the flu vaccine

If you are eligible for the flu vaccine this year - get ready to get it - that is the advice from family doctors and Cumbria's director of public health.

Cumbria's flu vaccination programme is a vital part of keeping people in our communities safe this winter; having a flu jab doesn't just protect you; it also protects those around you.

Dr Mandy Boardman, lead GP at NHS North Cumbria Clinical Commissioning Group, said: "If you get your flu jab every year

new groups who are receiving the vaccine for the first time, including members of households where people were shielding and pupils in Year 7 at secondary school. Later in the year we'll also be looking to extend the vaccine to the over 50s, but it is important we concentrate our initial efforts on those who are most clinically vulnerable. Please don't delay taking up the offer of a free flu vaccine. Every year the annual flu vaccination programme supports those most at risk. While flu can cause mild illness in most people, some people are more likely to develop potentially serious complications such as bronchitis

may have been shielding • later in the year the age range will extend to those aged 50-64"

Mr Cox added: "We are expecting to see an increase in the number of people who are eligible taking up the offer of the free vaccine. This will reduce their chances of picking up flu and provide protection throughout winter. Although the vaccine won't stop all flu viruses, and the level of protection may vary from person to person, if you do get flu after vaccination it is likely to be milder and shorter-lived than it otherwise might have been. For most children the flu vaccine is a quick and easy nasal spray. Children aged 2 and 3 receive the vaccine through their GP and those at school from Reception to Year 7 will receive it in school. If you have a child who is of the eligible age, make sure you sign the consent form allowing them to have the flu vaccine at school. The nasal spray may also be available for some people with learning disabilities.

Dr Jolliffe added: "Having your child vaccinated against flu protects your child, your family and your friends. There is no scary injection needed as it is done with a nasal spray and it is far less hassle than having the flu. We know that children pass around bugs and viruses really easily - and even with the COVID restrictions in place this year, there will still be opportunities for our children to catch the flu. On top of everything else that is going on and the valuable time in school that has already been lost, avoiding further time off is more important than ever - that's why we're really keen to make sure as many children as possible have the vaccine this year."

GP Practices will contact eligible patients and advise them of how they will be delivering the flu vaccine this year, there will also be information on your Practice's website and social media channels.

there are three key things we are urging you to do: Look out for the plans from your surgery - they'll be getting in touch to tell you when and where to go for your jab. Once you know when and where to go - get prepared - be sure you know where to go, any specific timings and remember your face covering and any letters you have to show. Get the jab - do your bit to protect yourself and others. Lots of thought and care has been put into planning this year's vaccination programme by our primary care teams. If you are contacted by your surgery you will be given instructions on the infection prevention measures each practice has put in place to keep everyone safe. It's going to look and feel different getting your flu vaccine this year so make sure you are ready to act when your practice gets in touch."





Lookout for Cannabis Factories

Although this took place in West Cumbria, the same thing could take place in any of our communities.

Two men have each been jailed for more than three years after police uncovered a large-scale cannabis factory packed with 1,300 plants in west Cumbria.

Detective Chief Inspector Matt Scott, speaking after the sentencing, said: "This was a very professional set-up, with no outward signs that anything untoward was going on. The location in the town itself meant they were almost hiding in plain sight, but good proactive policing led to this discovery, in that a single officer saw something suspicious and acted on it immediately. Our investigations into drugs crime relies on intelligence and information and we would urge

anyone who has seen or knows of anything suspicious to contact us."

Officers are calling for the public to play their part and report anything suspicious. DI Scott added:

"People should be

under no illusion that serious and organised crime groups operate in Cumbria. It is these groups who are behind the industrial levels of cannabis growth grown in the sort

. Be informed

We should always be educating ourselves. We can't teach our kids about online privacy if we don't know about it! Here's a list of basic online privacy terms we should all

be familiar with: Phishing, App permissions, Location tracking, VPN, Public Wi-Fi, Metadata, Anti-virus, Sexting, Social media privacy settings, Cybersecurity and Malware.

Lead by example

As with anything else with parenting, our actions speak louder than our words. Take a parental timeout to really assess your own online habits. Where can you be better about privacy? Maybe it's time to update your passwords or review your privacy settings on social media sites like Facebook and Instagram.

Install anti-virus programs on all devices

A lot of the items on this list focus on talking with our kids about actions they can take, but there are actions we can take behind the scenes as well. Install an anti-virus program on all of your devices, from phones to tablets to

up to date! Give your kids their own accounts

computers, and make sure they're



If you regularly hand over your phone or tablet to your child, create an account specifically for them. This allows you to make sure all of the privacy settings are correct, without having to

deal with them yourself. It also protects your personal stuff from texts to photos to emails from any curious eyes.

Utilise screen pinning Did you know that you can lock in an app so that your kid can't move away from it? So, for example, if there's a game that your 7-year-old really loves, you can "screen pin" it on Android or activate "Guided Access" on iOS. Once you have that feature activated, they won't be able to move away from the game - it will be pinned to their screen. On Android, go to Settings > Security > Screen pinning. You also need to make sure that "Ask for PIN before unpinning" is enabled, or else your kid will be able to navigate away. On iOs, go to Settings > General > Accessibility > Guided Access.

Let your kids know they can always come to you

Finally, make it really clear that they can come to you with anything related to online privacy and won't get in trouble - even if they broke the rules. You are your child's first line of defense and in order for them to stay safe they have to know they can come to you, always.

Our cosy little theatre is becoming even more comfortable. We can't wait to welcome you all back








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Mawbray Film Club First Night





What is phishing and how does it work? You wouldn't let a thief enter your home, but what if the thief was masquerading as someone familiar, such as a postman, and tricked you into opening the door?

Phishing works in a similar way - criminals use legitimate looking messages and websites to trick people into opening the doors to their personal data, giving up logins, passwords or even payment details. That information can then be used to commit fraud and cyber crime.

How big is the problem? Phishing attacks are a common security challenge that both individuals and businesses across the UK face on a regular basis. The National Cyber Security Centre's Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS) received over 1.7M reports from the public between April and August 2020, with the most commonly faked brands being TV Licensing, HMRC and GOV.UK.

How can you protect yourself from phishing scams? Many phishing scams started

with a message out of the blue. Whether it's an email asking you to "verify" account information, or a text message claiming to be from your bank, the goal of a phishing attack is usually the same - to trick you into revealing personal and financial information.

Criminals are experts at impersonation and they're constantly getting better at creating fake emails and texts that look like the real thing. Here's some simple advice you can follow when it comes to dealing with phishing scams:

1. Your bank, or any other official organisation, won't ask you to share personal information over email or text. If you need to

check that it's a genuine message, call them directly. Don't use the contact details in the email, but visit the official website instead.
2. If you have received an email which you're not quite sure about, forward it to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS): report@phishing.gov.uk.
3. Received a text message you're not quite sure about? Maybe it's asking you to "verify" personal or financial details, such as a banking password? You can

forwarding them to 7726.4. If you've lost money or provided personal information as a result of a phishing email, notify your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud:

What is a Bonfire?

In the United Kingdom and some Commonwealth countries, bonfires are lit on Guy Fawkes Night, a yearly celebration held on the evening of 5th November to mark the failure of the Gunpowder Plot of 5th November 1605, in which a number of Catholic conspirators, including Guy Fawkes, attempted to destroy the House of Lords in London.

The name originally was a bone fire, that is, a fire made of bones, especially a ceremonial one in midsummer. Possibly carried over from the cremation of the dead on outdoor fires, (sometimes as part of a celebration), also one for burning heretics or proscribed literature.

From the late 15th century it was known as "large open-air fire for public amusement or celebration". From the 17th century as "large fire from any material." Original sense is now obsolete and was forgotten by the 18th century.

The annual Rotary bonfire held at Halloween on the airfield has been cancelled this year due to the covid restrictions.

Bonfire Safety Tips

A bonfire or beacon are great ways to celebrate Bonfire Night and other events, but do follow these safety tips:

You cannot get rid of household waste on the bonfire - it can cause pollution or harm people's health.

You should always burn dry material as it produces less smoke.

Never burn treated wood, rubber, plastic, foam or paint.

Build your bonfire well clear of buildings, roads, garden sheds, fences, trees and hedges and, if possible, choose somewhere sheltered from the wind to minimise the risk of the bonfire being blown out of control or smoke restricting the vision of road users.

Check there are no cables -

like telephone wires - above the bonfire.

Before you light the bonfire, check whether any pets, wildlife or small children have

crawled inside. Always keep a bucket of water or a working hosepipe nearby.

Never use flammable liquids to start a bonfire and never throw on

fireworks or burn dangerous items such as aerosol cans, paint tins, foam furniture or batteries. **Don't leave** bonfires


unattended and keep children and pets away. A responsible adult should supervise the bonfire until it has burnt out.

Once the bonfire has died down, pour water on the embers to stop it reigniting.

Fostering Event



A fostering family from Carlisle are urging local people to attend an upcoming information event and find out more about fostering, as part of Cumbria County Council's latest campaign to find more foster carers for vulnerable children.

The council's network of 200 carers provide an essential service keeping children safe, loved and cared for. They are ordinary people, doing something extraordinary - ensuring children have the best possible childhood and are able to reach their potential.

But with around 750 children in care across the county, the council urgently needs more people to join Cumbria's biggest family. If your circumstances have changed due to the covid-19 pandemic or you feel ready for a change of career and would like to help change children's lives, then we'd love to hear from you.

Ann-Marie Mutter, from Carlisle, has been a foster carer for four years, along with her husband Dave and two sons Thomas and George. Ann-Marie, who is a short term carer for children up to the age of four, says: "I have always worked in child care right from leaving college. When I moved to Carlisle, after meeting Dave, I continued to work in nurseries but when I had the two boys I decided to stay at home and bring them up. After the boys started school I went for an interview for a job in a nursery and realised that actually I didn't want to go back to that kind of role. Then I saw an advert for foster carers and thought it could work really well for me, allowing me to work from home but still doing what I love, caring for children, the best of both worlds!

I mentioned the idea to Dave and he agreed that fostering ticked all the boxes for us as a family, as he loves children too and we had plenty of room in our home. I called Cumbria County Council Fostering Service in June and we

started out training in October and we qualified in December - so it all went very smoothly for us. Since then we have fostered four children and it has been even more rewarding than we expected it to be; just to see the huge difference you can make in such a short time. We have a lovely social worker who is just on the end of the phone and also my mum lives nearby and is an amazing support - I think it is her support that has really helped us to be such a good fostering family. I would definitely encourage anyone who has been thinking about fostering to get in touch; it is lovely to know that you can make such a difference to children's lives and to give them the start in life they deserve."

While there is a need for foster carers for children of all ages, we would particularly like to hear from those who could offer long term homes for slightly older children and teenagers. In return we offer excellent training and a full package of support to foster carers, including initial Skills to Foster Training, generous allowances, regular support groups, peer mentors for new carers and a dedicated support social worker.

Cllr Anne Burns, Cabinet Member for Children's Services, said: "Our amazing foster carers come from all kinds of backgrounds, and have had varied life experiences, but they all wish to make a difference to children's lives. It only takes one carer to change a child's life and we are asking local people, could that be you?

More Coppers on the Beat



Cumbria Constabulary has recruited all 51 of the new officers in the first phase of Operation Uplift ahead of the deadline in March 2021. Operation Uplift is the initiative to fulfil the Government's promise of an extra 20,000 police officers across the country. Cumbria was one of the first constabularies in the UK to begin recruitment to fulfil the quota.

Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner, Peter McCall, said: "It's fantastic news that Cumbria has now completed recruiting the 51 officers we were allocated in the first phase of Operation Uplift. This has been a huge effort to recruit and train the new officers. We took a risk back in August to begin recruitment for Uplift early and it has worked out in our favour as we are now ahead of the deadline of March 2021 by over six months. These additional police officers will be dedicated to our frontline and will be out in our communities fighting crime and have already been a significant boost to rural areas seeing officers deployed back into some of our

smaller towns, with more to come, which means that our urban officers can focus on their communities providing a much better response to all communities. I have had the opportunity to meet some of the new officers and it is clear that they are very eager, talented people who are keen to serve and protect the people of Cumbria. I wish all 51 recruits the best for their future careers and I look forward to see them grow in to well-rounded, experienced officers. In the meantime we remain engaged with the Home Office to secure yet more officers for Cumbria in phase 2 and 3 of Op Uplift."

Chief Constable Michelle Skeer, Cumbria Constabulary, said: "In Cumbria, we made the decision to move quickly to ensure we could maximise the benefits of introducing additional officers into our communities. We are proud to be one of the first forces in the country to have recruited our full allocation from the Government's recruitment drive and that these officers are now protecting people across our county. The role of a police officer remains a challenging one, particularly given the unprecedented circumstances we continue to face due to the coronavirus outbreak. Pleasingly, we have seen that our recent recruits have all shown the desire to meet such challenges and make a real difference to all of our communities."

August saw an impressive visitor to Silloth Dock. The cargo vessel KATRIN, weighing in at almost five thousand tons and a length of ninety-nine metres is the largest ship seen at Silloth in recent years. Word had spread and there were plenty of onlookers keen to witness the arrival, despite some unseasonable weather. Thankfully, just as the ship reached Silloth a torrential downpour eased and the sky brightened.

The ship had made the five day sailing from the Baltic with a cargo of German wheat. Once in UK waters she encountered storm Ellen off the West of Scotland, but this made little impact on progress heading south towards Cumbria. The ship waited at anchor off Workington before sailing up to Silloth in daylight hours supervised by the local pilot. By high water the pilot had made his final adjustments to the ship's position and was ready to begin the approach. Photographers were rewarded with some dramatic close-up shots as the ship was skilfully guided past the dock walls in blustery conditions.

Once in the shelter of the outer dock the ship headed towards the gated dock entrance. Views of the stern showed the Maltese cross flag



and the port of registry Valletta. At close quarters the ship looked to be kept in good order by her Estonian owners, 'Hansa Shipping,' whose name was prominently displayed on the superstructure, as was their funnel logo. KATRIN is one of thirty ships owned by the Eastern European company and, like KATRIN, many are ladies with names beginning with the letter 'K'. Considering the size of the ship, it was highly manoeuvrable when turning in the confined space of the dock, taking only fifteen minutes to be brought safely alongside. By this time, the skies had opened

afternoon's efforts.

August was a helpful month for Silloth, we achieved our target of four vessels and an appropriate cargo volume across the quay.

Our old faithful Zapadnyy returned once more with Molasses for animal feedstocks and we have received the first of several European grain imports for the mill. Fertiliser as always for our local farming community has played a large part in keeping us occupied here in Silloth and we look forward to further cargoes through September and into the latter quarter of the year.

Our visitor, Katrin was a new one for us, she is 99m long and is the largest vessel we have had in for a while.

Tommy Nicholsons' Trawlers have been absent for several months now, however we expect their return in the coming months ready for their short winter break over Christmas.

We have recently mentioned progressing some works on land here in the port and have had discussions with the local Town Council and local businesses in the vicinity about potential opportunities to develop some of the land, improve access to West Beach for the public, improve parking facilities and improve the safety of access to the beach for pedestrians. If these plans all go ahead, there will be additional parking for the beach, better access to the beach and improved safety in the vicinity of Solway Logistics whilst they are loading and discharging trucks and vans.

Our smaller project in conjunction with local people with mobility or other issues is now beginning to progress in that we have leased a small area in the dunes to create an area for sitting and viewing the beach for people with restricted movement. These people will be accompanied and have direct access by vehicle to the area.

We are looking forward to a fuller port through the coming months.
