# Can You Be A Positive Disruptor And Win £1,000



Called Positive Disruptors, the competition is open to young people living in Allerdale or Copeland and aged between 10 and 25 who want to "positively disrupt" their communities.

Based on a similar initiative run by the Hunter Foundation, the aim of the programme is to empower young people to 'positively disrupt' the status quo, to give them a platform to be heard and to break down the barriers for aspiring young entrepreneurs. It is looking to back young people who have ambition and the courage to take that ambition on.

Developed by Cumbria Community Foundation, Positive Disruptors is funded by Cumbrian property developer, Brain Scowcroft, with match funding from Sellafield Ltd as part of its Transforming West Cumbria programme, LLWR, Well Whitehaven, Morgan Sindall and Kaefer.

Annalee Holliday, Senior Grants & Programmes Officer at Cumbria Community Foundation, said: "It is very encouraging to see more funding allocated to creating opportunities after what has been a very challenging time. Positive Disruptors will have an incredible impact on young people, empowering them to develop their ideas that will benefit their peers, their communities and young people of the future."

Ten successful entrants will each be awarded £1,000 to help them realise their ambition. As well as receiving the grant, the Foundation has teamed up with the Centre for Leadership Performance to provide the young disruptors with six months of support, including a series of workshops, expert advice, mentoring and opportunities to shadow local entrepreneurs to help bring their idea to life.

Catherine Eve, Executive Director, at the Centre for Leadership Performance, said: "We are delighted to be working with Cumbria Community Foundation, the programme promotes self-belief, vision, efficacy, collaboration and resilience; a perfect development platform for young people to develop leadership skills, find their voice and promote ideas that will positively disrupt their community and lead to innovation and improvement."

Any potential positive disruptors now have an eightweek period to develop their ideas and apply by 29th October 2021. An advisory panel will meet to review all entries and winners will be announced in November.

# Accessible Cycling at Watchtree



The cycling industry is enjoying a boom in enthusiasm recently as people dusted off their trusty old steeds for something to do during lockdown. At Watchtree, cycling has been high on the agenda since the launch of the Watchtree Wheelers project in 2009. The project has recently secured funding to replace and improve a large selection of their varied cycle fleet.

The Watchtree Wheelers *s*pecialise in providing adapted equipment for people with disabilities; their fleet boasts bikes of all imaginable shapes and sizes.

Project Leader Matt Watchlree Wind recognised the need to increase NATURE RESERVE and improve the equipment and used

the downtime enforced by Covid 19 to define the project and appeal for charitable grants; most of our existing fleet have been part of the project since we launched in 2009, some of the bikes were second hand then. The popularity of the project and the uniqueness of our service means that all of those bikes have been really well used. We regularly service and maintain all of our bikes but we were undoubtly due a refresh! We started identifying which bikes we would like to replace

cycle technology which might benefit our riders in 2019, but it wasn't until lockdown 2020 that we really had time

to focus on the project and make it happen."

The Watchtree Wheelers have been awarded a total of £33,500 toward the project from Allerdale Sports Fund (£10,000), Reece Foundation (£5,000) and British Cycling (£18,500).

The money will be used to improve the projects range of companion cycles where 2 riders can pedal side by side, recumbent cycles and hand propelled trikes. Matt added:

"We are really grateful to our funders for the opportunity to make these improvements. The companion cycles are a new addition for us, they are great fun for any rider but are particularly useful for accompanying less able or mobile riders who require assistance or support while they ride. The recumbent cycles will replace our popular fleet of KMX

karts, these are trikes with very low centres of gravity making them ideal for any

rider with balance or confidence issues. The new handcycles are much lighter and more adaptable for different sizes than our current models, these will allow a great range of users to benefit."

The team continue to work on future improvements and are currently hosting the Solway Cycle Challenge to raise funds for an additional wheelchair carrying bike called a Veloplus. The existing Veloplus in their fleet is very popular and demand often outweighs availability.

The Watchtree Wheelers Project is part of Watchtree Nature Reserve, visitors can hire cycles to explore the reserve which

features a network of specially constructed trails weaving through meadows, wetlands and woodlands. The reserve also has a café and visitors centre as well as offering education and wellbeing services.

Ryan Dobson is manager of the reserve and added:

"Watchtree is a wonderful, unique place for all ages and abilities to enjoy. We pride ourselves on our accessibility and these upgrades to our Wheelers project will allow even more people to enjoy nature by bike! 2020 was a terrible year for many including us, but through focusing on what we can do and not what we can't, we have been able to make some huge improvements which help to secure our future."

### Appeal to Stay Safe on Rural Roads

Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner, Peter McCall, is urging motorists to drive safely on the county's rural roads. Although the roads are becoming quieter following the summer holidays, rural roads can still be dangerous if motorists do not drive safely to the highway code.

Speaking on the rural roads, PCC Peter McCall, said: "Cumbria is a rural county, and we have lots



of roads that are single lanes, tight corners and many blind spots many of which were not originally built to hold motorised vehicles. We have over 500 C roads in Cumbria, in comparison to only 31 A roads and 73 B roads, plus many unclassified roads, we can clearly see just how rural we really are. Many of us that live and grew up in Cumbria will be used to these roads but being comfortable can lead us to be negligent of the fact that, if we are not cautious and follow the speed limits, we could cause an accident. With the summer coming to an end and the dark nights becoming noticeably longer it is essential that we all remain vigilant when driving on rural roads.

We never know what is just around the corner, so I am urging all drivers to drive responsibly, stick to the speed limits and take your time – nothing is worth risking your life for. We know that speeding, use of mobile phones, not wearing a seatbelt and drink/drug driving are the biggest killers on



the roads nationally however one of the biggest causes of accidents is not paying attention to the road.

It's far too easy for us to get distracted so please stay focused on our rural roads and please get home safely. 

# Junior Golf Coaching at Silloth | Fantastic Sunflowers

There will be three different types of coaching available: Individual Coaching Group Observed Training Group Coaching for children in School years 2 and below.

These sessions will either be carried out by Simon Williamson or Tom. For those of you who might not have met Tom since he started last year, he will be creating a video presentation introducing himself which will be sent out in the coming days.

The individual coaching will be starting once this email has been sent. Juniors will receive one free half an hour lesson with either Simon or Tom each month; any further lessons that month will be: £12 with Simon; or £8 with Tom. These will be on a 1 to 1 basis and will have golf balls provided



although you will need to bring your own equipment and lessons can be arranged by calling the proshop.

Group Observed Training will commence from Thursday the 16th of

September and will take place from 4:30- 6:30 costing £5 per child. These sessions will be run exclusively by Tom, and will consist of multiple stations being set out for various areas of the game. There will be prizes for attendance as well as prizes for attitude and achievements.

## Silloth Lifeboat on Special Duty

On Sunday 22nd August Silloth RNLI Lifeboat was invited to accompany four skiffs across the Solway; two skiffs were from Annan, one from Stranraer and one from Bowness on Solway.

The skiffs also had their own safety boats who escorted them as they set off from Annan in Scotland to row across the Solway Firth to Bowness-on-Solway in England, following the exploits of a raid by the Scottish on the English in 1626, when they followed the same route and plundered the Bowness on Solway church bell.

The boat then was very light, the bell very heavy and a quantity of alcohol had been imbibed, resulting in the bell being lost at sea. It has never been found.

This event though, caused considerable insult to the people

of Bowness on Solway and in return they went to Dornoch and Middlebie in Southern Scotland and stole their church bells. These bells still hang in Bowness on Solway's church today. The minister from Middlebie asks every year for their bell to be returned. The request is always politely declined.

Silloth RNLI Lifeboat saw the skiffs safely across the water where the boats disembarked and everyone was treated to a very pleasant and welcome lunch by the organisers and the good people of Bowness on Solway, before returning to Annan.

The weather was extremely kind on the day which made rowing across the Solway Firth a real pleasure, there was no wind, the sea state was flat calm and an excellent day was had by all involved.

## Lifeboat Searches for Missing Swimmer at Mawbray

The lifeboat had to launch from West Beach due to low water; they made excellent time and launched the lifeboat at 4:56pm and arrived on scene very quickly. Maryport and Burgh Coastguard were also tasked.

The lifeboat carried out a shoreline search until Maryport Coastguard confirmed that they had the casualty safely in their vehicle.

The lifeboat was stood down at 5:10pm and returned to station. It was recovered from the West Beach and made ready for service again by 5:35pm

David Beeby, High Sheriff of Cumbria, launched a new initiative. Better Tomorrow is a three-year programme encouraging people within Cumbria to become accredited in youth work and substantially increase the number of young people having access to support from youth workers to help them reach their full potential.

This unique initiative will provide accredited training to more than a hundred people as well as offer grants of up to £25,000 to community organisations setting up or providing new youth work opportunities for local people.

David said: "Many young people have had their lives turned upside down by the pandemic and are facing unprecedented challenges caused by interrupted education, uncertainty about the future and anxiety exacerbated by increases in poverty and family ill health. High-quality youth work has a crucial role to play helping many young people to achieve their full potential. Through participation in youth work, young people gain confidence and competence."

The wedding couple were delighted that their long wait was over and wedding guests added to the celebrations by donating the cash after the performance at the wedding reception.



I have just looked at the following report: RWM - INITIAL EVALUATION **REPORT:** Allerdale (workinginpartnership.org.uk) I have copied below a section from page 12 of 30: "Some of the clay-rich rocks in this area contain a series of evaporite units containing rock salt (halite) layers. Although only a single salt bed 6 metres thick was recorded in a deep borehole at Silloth in these rocks, it is possible that thicker salt layers may be present where they thicken and deepen off the coast to the south." I am aware of the previous Council posts on Facebook in April 2019 but have not seen any recent comment or discussion in the press or social media so I am writing just to make sure the Council have this on their radar.

# Banking scheme stops fraud worth £250,000

A scheme that sees banks, building societies and Post Offices work with police stopped fraud worth more than  $\pounds 250,000$  in Cumbria in the first half of this year.

The Banking Protocol led to nearly 60 emergency calls being made in the county between January and July, protecting customers from losing an average of £5,710 to criminals.

This is a UK-wide scheme, launched by UK Finance, National Trading Standards and local police forces.

Branch staff are trained to spot the warning signs that suggest a customer may be falling victim to a scam, before alerting their local police force to intervene and investigate.

Real life national case studies from the first half of the year are included at the bottom of this release.

The Banking Protocol was rolled out by Cumbria Constabulary in August 2017.

Since March 2018, the scheme has been implemented by all 45 police forces across the UK.

It is often used to prevent impersonation scams, in which criminals imitate police or bank staff and convince people to visit their bank and withdraw or transfer large sums of money. It is also used to prevent romance fraud, in which fraudsters use fake online dating profiles to trick victims into transferring money - and to catch rogue traders who demand cash for unnecessary work on properties.

Customers assisted by the scheme are offered ongoing support to help prevent them from falling victim to scams in the future, including referrals to social services, expert fraud prevention advice and additional checks on future transactions.

Detective Inspector Duncan Brooker, of Cumbria's economic crime unit, said: "Fraud is big business for criminals. "It's an area of criminality that is notoriously difficult to prevent and detect, because there are just so many different types of scams in existence and because those who commit fraud can do so from anywhere in the world. The Banking Protocol plays a vital role in trying to prevent people from becoming victims of potential fraud".

Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner, Peter McCall, said: "Online and phone scams are prevalent in today's society, where criminals no longer need to leave their home to pick a victim. Fraud can have a serious impact on a victim, not only financially but

mentally and socially as well so it's great to see that branch staff are

> being trained to spot the signs and prevent crimes taking place. Education and prevention really is key to avoid becoming a victim of fraud and I would encourage everyone to look on the Get Safe Online website to learn how to protect themselves as best as possible. "I would also encourage anyone who has fallen for a scam to come forward and report it to the police and Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040."

> Katy Worobec, managing director of economic crime, UK Finance, said: "Fraud has a devastating impact on victims so partnerships like the Banking Protocol are not only crucial in helping vulnerable people, but it also stops stolen money from going on to fund other illicit activities including drug smuggling, humantrafficking and terrorism. Criminals have continued to capitalise on the pandemic to commit fraud, callously targeting victims through impersonation, romance, courier and rogue trader scams".

To build on the success of the scheme, banks and building societies are continuing to work with local police forces on expanding the process to cover attempted bank transfers made by customers through telephone and online banking.

#### Courier scam

A woman in her eighties received a telephone call from a man claiming to be from her bank. The man claimed there was an issue with the victim's account and in order to help her with this he needed her to withdraw money (£2,000) from her account. The victim was told to attend the bank to do so and call back when home for further instructions.

The victim attended the branch and staff confirmed to the victim that this man had not been in contact with them, and it was in fact a scam. The staff refused the withdrawal and invoked the Banking Protocol, alerting local police. Officers attended and offered fraud advice to the victim. The bank also put measures in place to further safeguard the victim from any future frauds.

#### Investment scam

31553

A man in his nineties visited his local bank branch as an international payment he had attempted to make online had been stopped. He had been contacted by a company who wanted to sell shares that he held in America, saying he could get a return of £60,000 but had to send \$7,000 dollars which he would get back. Bank branch staff invoked the Banking Protocol and the police visited him at home. No money was lost and the police are investigating this company further. **Rogue trader scam** 


### A woman in her eighties had

builders explaining that they had been working on her neighbour's roof and noticed that her roof also needed repairing. The victim offered to show the builders her property and they told the victim it was an urgent issue which needed to be fixed.

The builders quoted the work  $(\pounds 1,500)$  and told the victim that they needed to take the payment in cash only. The victim explained that she would need to attend the bank to withdraw this.

At her local bank, the victim explained to bank staff what the money was for which made staff concerned it was a scam. Bank staff invoked the Banking Protocol, alerting the local police force and refused the transaction.

Officers attended and were able to offer the victim advice and ensured no suspects were still on the scene. Officers were also able to enquire with neighbours and ensure they were supporting the victim in future. A fraud caseworker has offered her ongoing support.







Ship enthusiasts were blessed with plenty of action during August with a record number of arrivals. All ships were new to the port except for ZAPADNYY which made one of her regular calls with molasses. Other cargos covered the full range of agricultural materials handled at the port. Most arrivals were during daylight hours, and even better, the sun shone for many. Two of the visiting ships are described below. Dutch freighter

BEAUMOTION provided one highlight arriving with a cargo of wheat from Rouen. Sailing from the French inland port involved an initial 75 miles along the twisting River Seine before heading west along the Channel to the Irish Sea. The ship then made its way to Silloth for entry on a midday tide, however, in gusty conditions the arrival didn't go to plan. The notoriously unpredictable currents at the port entrance caused the ship to drift off course towards the south beach. This resulted in some dramatic photos, but thankfully the ship was in safe hands and the situation recovered. Full reverse thrust was applied to bring the ship in line to enable a safe dock entry.

Passing into Marshall Dock, onlookers had a close-up view of the well-maintained ship. A full set of flags was on display including the Red Ensign, a gesture of courtesy when entering an English port, and the company flag of Dutch owners 'Vertom'. In addition, the 'Yellow Jack' was flying at the bow. This flag is rarely seen and indicates the ship to have a clean bill of health. To know that the ship was free from contagious disease was reassuring, and perhaps this practice should be more widely adopted in the current climate!

Another visitor, THOPAS, had a longer sailing to reach Silloth with its cargo of fertiliser from Poland. After five days at sea, fine weather greeted the ship as it approached Silloth. On this occasion, entry to the port proceeded without incident and the ship was soon brought alongside the unloading quay. The ship belongs to Cypriot company 'Unibaltic,' and is their only dry cargo vessel amongst a fleet of tankers. This looked another well-maintained ship, however, with the Saltire flying at the bow, there seemed to be some confusion amongst the crew as to which side of the Solway they were.

### August Shipping at the Port of Silloth

Report by: Capt Tim Riley, Harbour Master, Short Sea Pilot

August at the port was a busy month, with seven vessel calls, from various points of the compass.

We saw the return of French wheat again, due to an early crop in France being ready before any UK supplies have become available and also further German wheat, used at the Mill for flour to supply the various baking trades and home users.

Fertiliser was at a lower level than usual, however, topped up with the addition of Salt and Potash bringing our tonnages up to a good level.
