Newly engaged Nurse Murdoch was thoroughly told off when Sister saw her kissing her fiancee outside the Nurses Home. In her second year, Mrs Tiddy volunteered to nurse in a T.B. Hospital outside Edinburgh housed in wartime Nissen huts, and was very upset by the death at only 29 of a quiet gentlemanly Ukrainian, called Michel.

Slides taken at a special baby unit were then shown by Mrs Tiddy followed by 'A Day in the Life of a District Nurse'. Mrs Tiddy summed

up nursing in the words: Cure - sometimes Relieve - often

Comfort - always

Mrs Margaret Peach thanked Mrs Tiddy for a fascinating insight into a life spent caring for others.
