Jimmy's Car is Now 50!



Jimmy Thomson is the proud owner of this red Volkswagen Beetle.

It was manufactured on 29th May 1972 at the Wolfsburg Plant in Germany and left the factory on 5th July 1972 to be delivered to Burns' Statue Garage in Ayr. It was promptly purchased on 19th July 1972 with the registration number KSD 110L.

At that time the Road Tax was £25 per annum. As you can see below, the seat belts cost an extra £8.98 and the number plates £4.50.

Jimmy contacted the first owner who kindly sent him the first three years insurance documents (started at £28.80 and went up to £35.60 after three years) and also the original road tax discs.

The original owner sold the car on 11th February 1977 when he traded it in at Shearer Brothers

in Prestwick, this is where Jimmy's brother Ian purchased the Beetle Ian kept the car until 11th July 2002, this was when Jimmy took ownership.

When Jimmy purchased the Beetle, the car had only done 85,777 miles in 30 years and now after 50 years it has only done 118,750 miles.

Jimmy says "Compared to modern vehicles it is a difficult car to drive. There is no power steering, it has drum brakes and the instrumentation on the dashboard only tells you how



much petrol is in the tank and how fast you are going! However, you have to 'drive' the car and this led to my passing of the Advanced Motorist Exam. The car now has the registration WC37 which I purchased in 2016".

So: it started with the registration KSD 110L then was changed to 6565VW and now sports the very noticeable registration WC37.

Jimmy only uses the car from April to October and intends to keep driving his Beetle as long as possible.



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Volunteers Have Been Very Busy

As the weather has improved the volunteers have been very busy helping with two special projects for the Queen's Green Canopy (QGC), a unique tree planting initiative to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee. We helped with preparing and planting the circular bed on the Green and the area of woodland by the Edwardian toilets with a variety of native trees including Wild Cherry, Birch and Rowan. We are pleased that the woodland area has now been added to the QGC map.

We also helped the Town Council with the Eden Street play area project. Assisting the Maintenance Team paint the base coat for the new graffiti wall, creating new shrub beds, selecting appropriate plants and planting them with help from pupils of Solway Community School. The new planting will create a colourful year round display as well as providing a valuable source of food for birds and insects.

Our next project is to create a yellow and blue bedding display in the two oval beds on the Green in support of Ukraine. We are currently raising Sunflowers, the Ukrainian national flower, and bringing on Borage plants in our allotment to fill the two beds.

We are also busy tidying up the raised beds in the Community Garden ready to take a range of new sensory plants. We would like to thank the Silloth on Solway Charity Shop for their kind donation of £1,000 which is going towards buying these new plants.

If you would like to join us as a volunteer, no experience required, just come along on Wednesdays at 10am to the Community Garden, at the junction of Criffel Street and Lawn Terrace, we would love to see you!

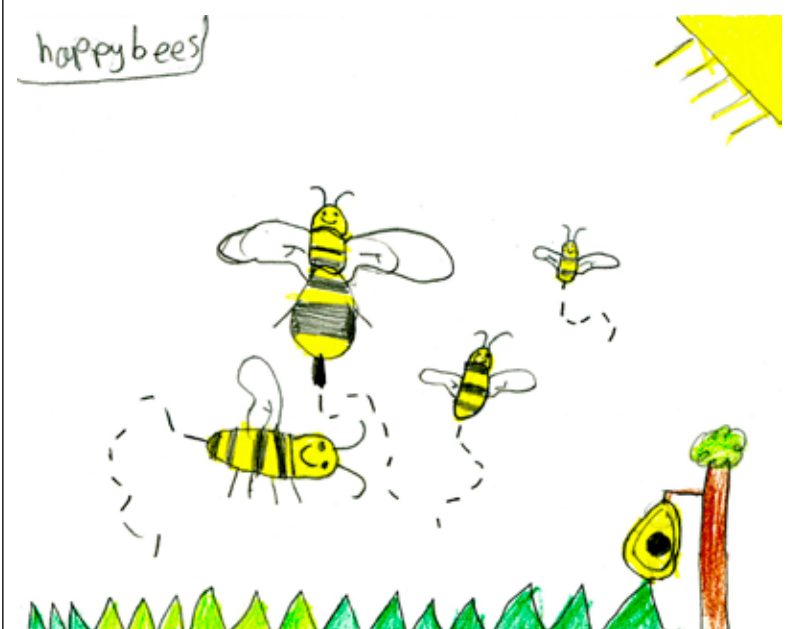
16 Calls in May so far.

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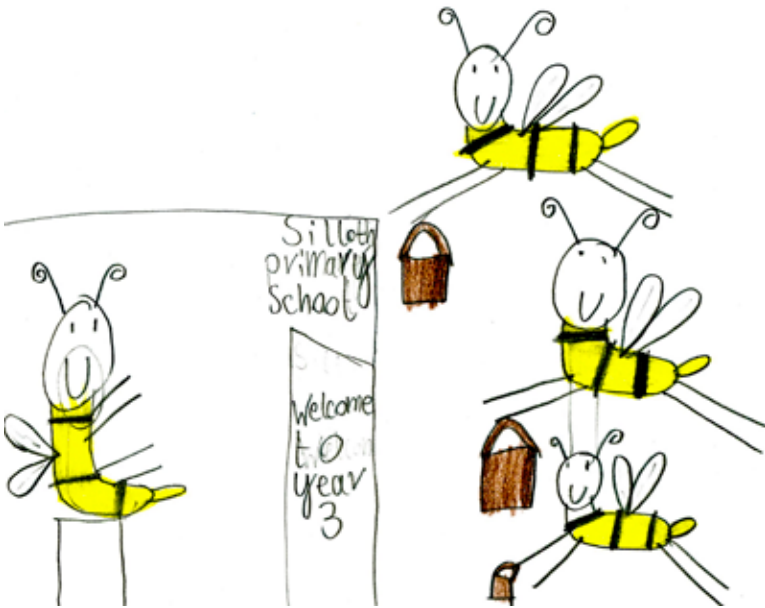

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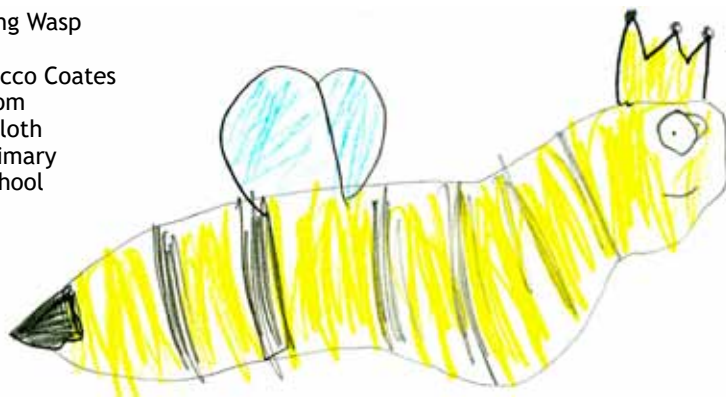

A History of Silloth Published in the Cumberland News on 1st July 1885 part 4

Discovered by David Edwards in an old family scrap book and reproduced on the Silloth History Group facebook page

machinery, as well as the pipes laid round and about the dock to supply the water to the cranes and gates, have been supplied and fitted by Sir William Armstrong, Mitchell and Company, Limited, Newcastle. Rapid transit of goods from and to all parts of the dock has been assured by the laying down of 4,000 lineal yards of new sidings, which form an effective combination of railway communications. On the west side of the dock there is an unloading shed, 540 feet long, 40 feet wide, and 50 feet to the ridge of the roof, through which three lines of rails will be carried from the main line. The contract for the shed was let to Messrs W. Scott and Company. It is formed of iron girders, 60 feet long, supported upon iron columns 60 feet apart in the front and 30 feet from each other at the back, and covered with a timber and slated roof. The shed will be fitted with hydraulic capstans for hauling the wagons along the lines of rails. Four travelling hydraulic cranes, each capable of lifting two tons, have been re-erected in the shed, and close to the side of the dock. Proceeding to the south side of the dock we find a hydraulic coal hoist for loading vessels which was used at the old dock, with the exception of the framework, which is of iron instead of wood, supplied by Sir W. Armstrong, Mitchell, and Company. This hurry will coal with considerable despatch steamers of every capacity. It is estimated that at this hurry the workmen could ship about 30 small wagons of coal per hour, provided the trimming could be done so rapidly. A short distance from the coal hurry the foundations for a 25-ton steam crane have been prepared. In connection with this crane, which will be used for lifting heavy weights, there will be a cradle for loading vessels with coal, lime, and materials in bulk. A stationary hydraulic crane has been erected on the east side and it is intended to provide a weighing machine and several offices in connection with the coal depot and goods shed. As the plan contains a provision for a site for Messrs Seatree's corn mill it is considered more than probable that the well-known firm in question may erect a grain warehouse in connection with the dock. On the north-east side there is a stationary hydraulic crane with two ton lift, and a shed 60 by 30 feet, intended to accommodate various classes of commodities. Another stationary hydraulic crane, with six ton lift, is in course of erection on the north-west side. On each of these sides is being erected a large capstan to be used with either hand or hydraulic power in assisting vessels into the dock and for other purposes.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

Around the dock iron bollards of a somewhat peculiar pattern have been placed at distances of fifty feet along the coping, into which they are built to a good depth. These will be used in mooring vessels, and for a similar purpose four large iron buoys have been anchored at intervals in the dock, and they float with the tide. Granite staircases, five feet wide, lead into the dock from the south-east and north-west corners, and on each side of the dock an iron ladder has been fixed. The depth of water in the dock at high water of ordinary spring tides will be 26 feet. The bulk of the iron material used in connection with the works is the manufacture of Sir W. Armstrong, Mitchell, and Co., and Messrs Dock-

chitt Brothers of Carlisle. The goods and coal yard, which were formerly in front of the railway station, have been removed to the east side of the new dock.

INTERESTING STATISTICS.

It is estimated that about 550,000 cubic yards of earth were excavated from the dock, and another 50,000 feet had to be excavated for the formation of the new sidings. As may be imagined the material used in the building of the dock has been something enormous. An idea of this may be gained when we say that in the entrance alone there is upwards of 14,000 cubic yards of concrete, and about 40,000 cubic yards in the remainder of the dock. For the copings 12,000 cubic feet of granite was required, and an additional 50,000 cubic feet for the entrance. There have been 40,000 cubic feet of pitchpine used in the dock, besides the large quantities of other kinds of timber used in the dock gates and sheds. There will be 43,000,000 gallons of water in the dock with an ordinary spring tide, the weight of it being 200,000 tons.

THE LIST OF ACCIDENTS.

The lists of accidents in making a dock is often of pretty considerable dimensions. In works of that character and of such dimensions it is all but impossible that no casualties should occur. Silloth has been no exception to the rule, but it is not a long list. From our file we find that in all there have been two men and one boy fatally injured, seven men whose injuries were described as severe (the sufferers usually requiring to be conveyed to the Carlisle Infirmary), and four less severely. One horse was also injured. Six of the accidents occurred in 1882, seven in 1883, and two in 1884.

INTERESTING DISCOVERIES OF MAMMALIAN RELICS

During the excavation some rather valuable "finds" were made. In the early part of 1883 some interesting relics of the fauna that inhabited the land and seas of Great Britain soon after the termination of the glacial epoch in these latitudes were brought to light. For the first lift, or so of the excavations, nothing but blown sand, gravel, sand, and shingle were met with; but about 16ft. from the surface, and about 20ft. above the level of the water at ordinary spring tides, a shell beach was exposed, which, as the works advanced, could be traced across the entire breadth of the dock. The shells which represents this "world of life, destroyed" were remarkably perfect, and belonged to species which still exist, such as the mussel, cockle, oyster, and whelk. Mussel shells were particularly abundant, but they had generally lost their bluish black colour, and became blanched; while their texture had become so friable that they crumbled down when pressed by the fingers. From the regular way in which this beach was laid down, and from the perfect condition of the shells, it seemed pretty certain that it was arranged in sea water, then submerged, and ultimately upheaved by internal forces into the position which it occupied when discovered. About 17 feet from the surface, and 13 feet above the boulder clay the first mammalian relic was found, lying amongst the gravel. This was an antler of the red deer. It measured 26 inches in length, and possessed five tines or branches, which were in a fair state of preservation. Near the point of

one of them was a deformity, the result, no doubt of an injury sustained in fighting and while the horn was yet in the velvet stage. The next discovery was one which astonished every one who saw it. It was an enormous humerus—the upper bone of the fore leg—and must have belonged to some animal of gigantic proportions. It, like the

other specimens, was found lying in gravel, and near and at the same level as the antler. It weighed 5lbs. 12ozs., and measured 18 inches in length. From the bone being twisted on itself in a very remarkable manner, its circumference could not be taken precisely, but it proportionately very much exceeded the length, thus indicating the enormous mass it had to support. The specimens were submitted to Professor Turner, of Edinburgh University, and he pronounced this bone as belonging to the extinct gigantic ox of Great Britain—the *bos primigenius*. This species, which lives in pre-historic times in these islands, no longer exists upon the earth. Along with it lived a smaller species of ox—the *bos longifrons*—which lived into historic times, and gave origin to the domesticated breed used by the Celts, before the Roman invasion. The bones of the *bos primigenius* have been found in British caves, along with those of the mammoth, red deer, rhinoceros, &c., and with palæolithic flints, the implements of pre-historic man. Just as the interested excited by the discovery of the last bone was beginning to die away, the steam navy exhumed another, at a depth 10 feet lower, and just about three feet above the clay. This was a vertebra, and was at first thought to belong to the *bos*. It weighed about 4lbs., and was in a very good state of preservation, the concentric rings indicating the attachments of the inter-vertebral cartilages being particularly well marked. It was pronounced by Professor Turner to be one of the tall vertebrae of a fin-whale (*balænoptera*), and to belong to a species probably still in existence. From the fact that these bones belonged to different species of animals, and were imbedded in sand and gravel, it was presumed that they were loose bones which had been carried to the spot by water and deposited where they were found.

THE ELSWICK GUN RANGE.

Sir William Armstrong, Mitchell and Company, of Elswick, have recently introduced a new establishment near Silloth, which is likely, at no distant date, to prove of considerable importance to the town. As will have been gathered from the numerous paragraphs on the subject which have appeared in our columns, the eminent firm of ordnance makers have lately acquired facilities for providing an artillery range for the trial of some of their large guns. The site selected is some distance past the Convalescent Institution, and it has already been laid out for the purposes required. The main platform from which the guns will be fired is of great strength. Unlike most other platforms there will be no elevation towards the rear, as hydraulic power will be used to neutralise the recoil of the cannon after firing. Besides being adapted for the purposes of the owners it is expected the battery will be available for the practice of the Silloth and Carlisle Artillery Corps. Another benefit which is likely to accrue is that in future it will be eligible for the encampment of artillery volunteers, who are not allowed to encamp at places which do not possess

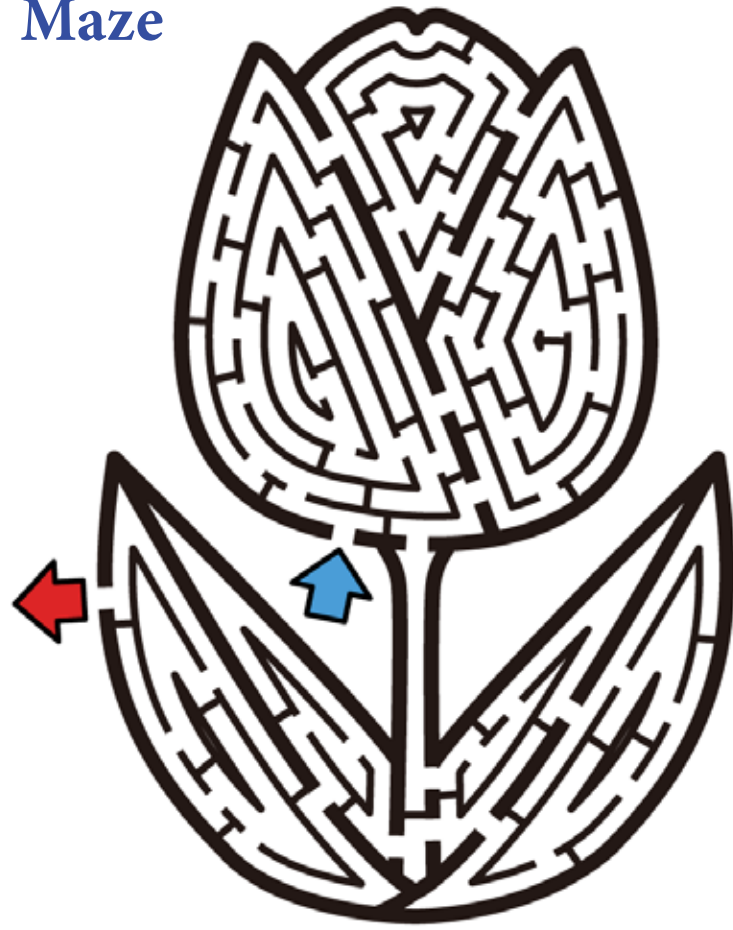

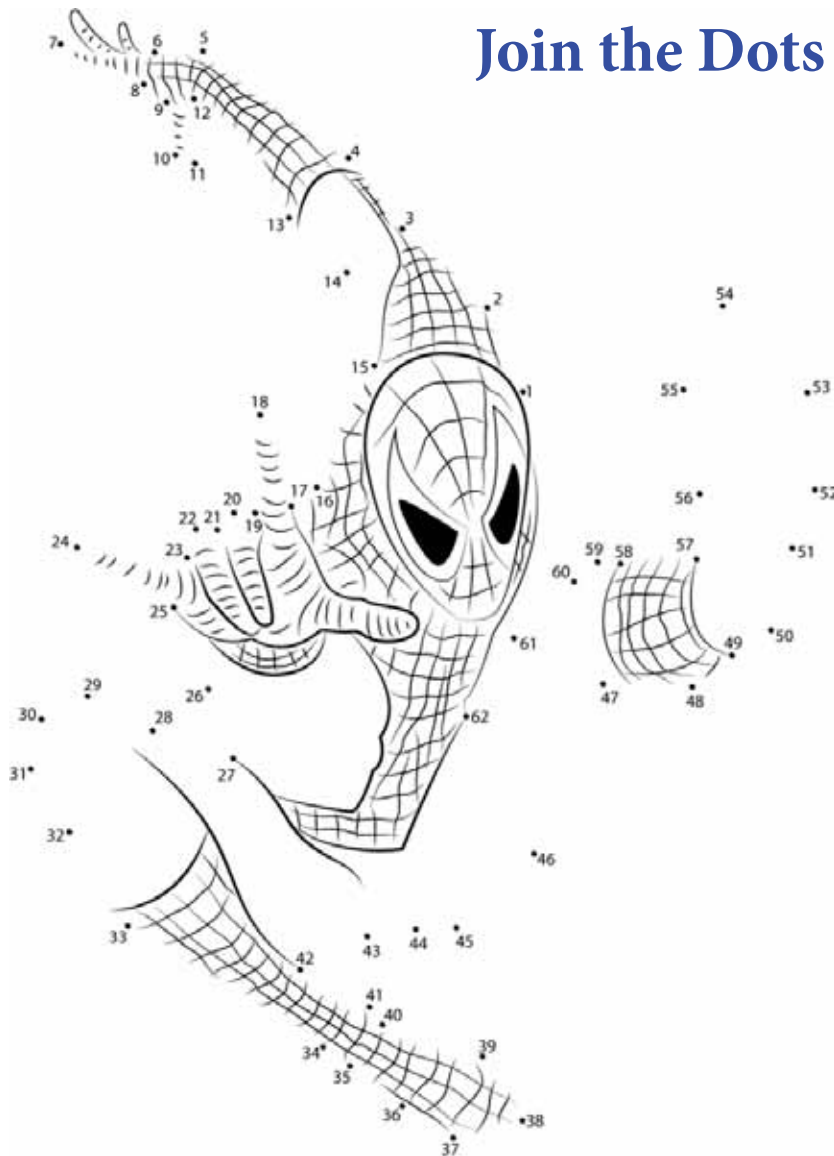

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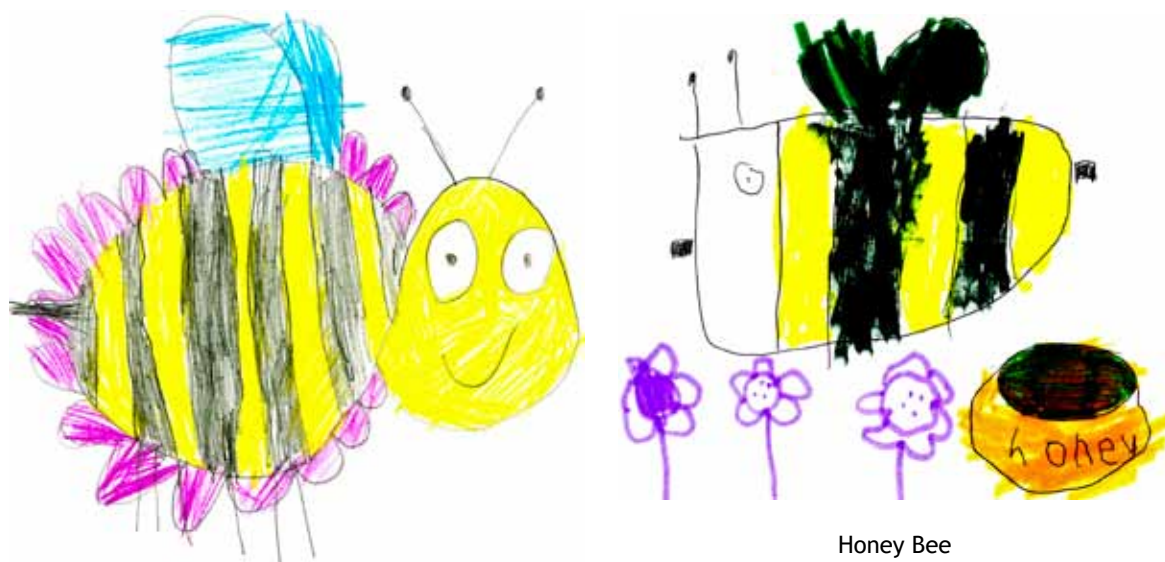

At our May meeting Eve Mulholland from the Cumberland Wild Life Trust came to talk about Dynamic Dunescapes.

There is a National Project over 34 sites involving lots of different organisations and volunteers. The aim is to reclaim dunes and protect the wildlife that live there as over 80% of bare sand dunes have been lost. The Cumberland Wild Life Trust cover from Lancashire to Grune Point.

Dunes have been over stabilised by too much vegetation and many species need bare sand.

Work is being done at Mawbray which may look overly destructive but is clearing the excess vegetation. A pond has been created to help natterjack toads as 50% of their breeding sites are in Cumbria. There used to be a large rabbit warren that kept the vegetation down, but myxomatosis had reduced rabbit numbers drastically. The rabbits are slowly increasing again which will help. There are also Belted Galloways who have collars on fitted with GPS that give a mild electric buzz if they try to go in areas they shouldn't.

Work done at South Walney between 2015 and 2020 has brought a large area back to Dune which is helping over 600 plant species.

At our June meeting following a call from our booked speaker early on Wednesday to say they were unwell we were extremely

grateful to Tim Riley, Silloth Harbour Master for stepping in at a couple of hours notice to give us a very interesting talk about the port at Silloth.

Tim said he had been involved with the sea from the age of 18, from working on Oil Tankers and the Merchant Navy, he has visited over 85 countries and dealt with all types of cargoes.

The port at Silloth came into being when Port Carlisle became too shallow. It first opened in 1859 and at that time employed over 150 people, when the railway closed there were 40 and now the port has just 4 staff. The reduction in the number of 500 ton ships is down from 1 a day to 1 a week on average.

It was the first port to use steam to dig out the harbour and initially all cranes were steam operated. The original dock is the Marshall Dock and the New Dock was opened in 1885. The mud from this is what was used to create the mound on the Green.

There were over 5½ miles of railway within the Port area with

16 trains, and ferries to Dublin & Liverpool from a 1,000 foot pier which is no longer there.

Carr's Mill was opened in 1887 and the waste from the grain is used by Caltech who mix it with molasses to make cattle food.

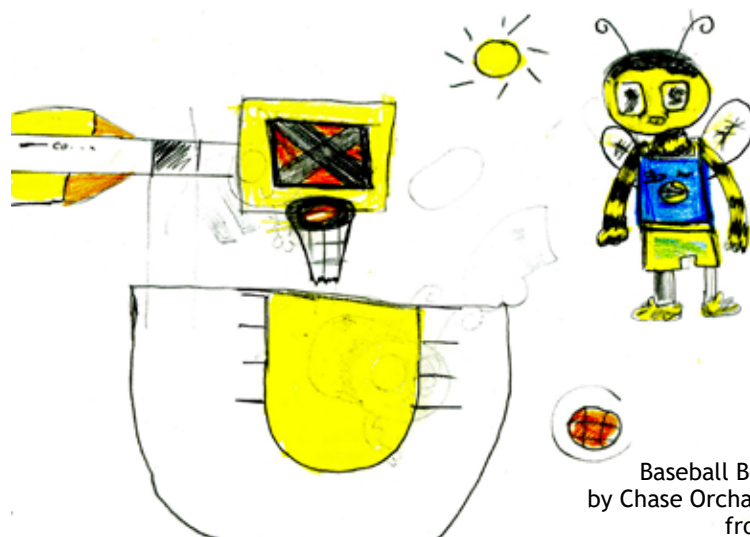
Wood pulp is imported for Futurama at Wigton for the making of money.

The war in Ukraine has affected cargo volumes and prices, fertiliser for example has risen from £250 to over £1,000 a ton.

The Associated British Ports have a £4.5 million plan to create a road to divert lorries from the town centre and out to a junction near Harrison Concrete Plant. There are about 100 lorries for each cargo.

The ABP are also improving the coastal path adjacent to the Port area.

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Varied Cargos for Silloth Dock

Shipping during May illustrated the wide variety of cargos handled by Silloth Dock.

Ships arrived from European ports carrying salt, potash, fertiliser and wood pulp. ASHLEY and RMS

TWISTEDEN had visited before, whilst GERDA was a new visitor, and the most interesting to ship enthusiasts. Some archive photos of previous visits are included in the article.

The Dutch owned and registered ASHLEY was making her third call at the port. On this occasion a cargo of salt had been sourced from the Borth Mine in Germany. The mine is situated along the River Rhine, an eleven-hour sailing from Rotterdam on the coast. ASHLEY is designed for this type of work being part of a fleet specialising in transport along inland waterways. After leaving the mainland at the Hook of Holland, the ship made its way along the English Channel and Irish Sea, with an early morning arrival at Silloth four days later.

RMS TWISTEDEN made

a brief visit at the beginning of the month with potash from Hamburg. Arriving under the cover of darkness, and departing twenty-four hours later, the ship escaped the attention of our cameras. Fortunately, she had been photographed last year on a bright summer's afternoon. The ninety-metre long vessel is typical of the size of ship calling at the port. The German-based owner 'Rhenus Maritime' has more than a century of shipping experience with its fleet being regular visitors to Silloth over the years. The coasters are full of character with the masters often having a stake in their vessel and keen to maintain them to high standards.

Our third ship, GERDA, at sixty metres in length was an example of the smaller vessels serving Silloth. She was bringing

a cargo of wood pulp from Brake on the River Weser in Germany. Built more than thirty years ago, this class of ship is still popular for carrying cargos of timber products. In the past, deliveries of wood pulp have been distributed to manufacturers within the county as well as further afield. Having had several owners and name changes, GERDA is now Latvian owned. The ship had made her way towards Silloth via the North Sea at a leisurely pace of seven knots, reaching her destination after five days. It was an afternoon of sunshine and showers when she arrived, not ideal conditions for photography. As the ship made a graceful entry to the dock it looked in good order. Unloading was completed the following day and the ship set sail for another five days at sea heading for Rotterdam.

3rd RMS Twisteden with a cargo of Potash from Hamburg then on to Rouen.

22nd Gerda with a cargo of Wood Pulp from Brake then on to Rotterdam.

24th Ashley with a cargo of Salt from Wesel then on to Greenore.

31st Lisa with a cargo of Fertiliser from Antwerp then to sea for orders.

Not a very busy month for the port, cargo volumes down on average due to lower fertiliser imports than expected. Price increases have put some farmers off the purchase of fertiliser as it has now almost trebled in price

in less than a year. It was good to see a small parcel of wood pulp for Futamura in Wigton, this was a short notice cargo, and then the vessel got delayed in France for a week or so whilst some maintenance was carried out. All went well though and she was discharged in a morning.

Our fishing fleet has left for the east and south coasts most likely back in November or just before.

Sillothians will have noticed some blocking off of land outside the port office, this is to stop people parking on what was leased land. We will shortly be tidying this up a little and planting shrubs/bushes along the edge of the roadway. If you see us working in that area, please park on the corner before the bend in the road

and walk to the beach via the convalescent home path, I think it is a nicer walk!

Eventually, Natural England and Cumbria County Council will be assisting in formalising this stretch of the coastal footpath at which time the bit we will be working on for the next few weeks should look a little neater and have some growth on it.
