Christine thanked everyone who helped last Friday, we raised over £167 and also gave the Church £20.



We hope to plan a trip somewhere next year if that is the wish of our supporters.


After a very wet start to the day most of our supporters who came to the Coffee Morning on Saturday 2nd July, managed to arrive dry.



Silloth Primary School Headteacher Retires

The closing of the school doors for the summer holidays, marks the beginning of a new adventure for our lovely Mrs Ingrams from Silloth Primary School, as she begins her well-deserved retirement.

Mrs Ingrams began her career as a teacher in Maryport Junior School and has gone onto shape the futures of many hundreds of children, as well mentoring countless educators of the future.

Mrs Ingrams came to Silloth Primary in January 2012, where a week later she faced an Ofsted inspection. From this inadequate judgement we saw just what an exceptional leader Mrs Ingrams truly is. Her drive to not accept anything less than the best outcomes for the children of the school has seen her work tirelessly to get the school to where it is today.

By March 2013, a mere eighteen months later, Ofsted visited again, and Mrs Ingrams had raised the standards, so Silloth was a Good School. Ofsted's comment of "The headteacher has high expectations of staff and pupils and has focussed everyone's attention on improving the school further" and "she galvanised and empowered staff to develop their skills as teachers and their roles as leaders and managers" really shows just exactly what she did and has continued to do ever since.

In October 2013 Silloth Primary School won The Golden Apple Award for best Primary School in Cumbria. These awards are there to recognise and reward excellence in education and learning in Cumbria, and this really highlighted the changes and difference Mrs Ingrams had made to Silloth Primary School in such a short space of time. In 2016 the school was in the top 3% of schools in England in terms of the progress pupils make between KS1 and KS2 for English reading, writing and maths, which was a fantastic achievement. Silloth Primary by now had a real buzz to the atmosphere and people were starting to take notice.

Of course, we must mention the Ofsted inspection from June 2017. The culmination of all the hard work from all staff and pupils, led by Mrs Ingrams saw Silloth Primary gain the rightful recognition of an Outstanding in ALL area's of judgement. What a milestone in the life of the school, and something the whole community was rightly proud of.

Throughout the unprecedented events of 2020 and 2021 of Covid-19, once again Mrs Ingrams rose to the challenge, quickly establishing online learning and opening the doors as a hub school. Her relentless energy kept everyone going, despite it being the toughest time teaching has seen in recent history. She instinctively knows what is best and led all pupils through the holistic, nurturing approach on returning to school, so all pupils were in the right mind-set to be ready to learn. She has always put the children rightly at the forefront of all her decisions. Ofsted captured this perfectly well in 2017 saying "The headteacher is an inspirational leader who works hard to ensure pupils are at the centre of everything the school does".

All these achievements, however, do not capture the true essence of Mrs Ingrams. Although none of this would have been



possible without her leadership, her energy, and her drive. What makes Mrs Ingrams so special is her warm, engaging personality felt by all staff, children and parents.

Some comments from parents and colleagues.

"Mrs Ingrams isn't just a head teacher, she helped us beyond measure when our son was struggling through lockdown. She welcomed him back into school with open arms and she will never know what that little gesture means to us as a family. We will be forever grateful for her kindness. The children at Silloth primary are at the forefront of everything she does. For us, Mrs Ingrams will always hold a very special place in our hearts. She truly has a heart of gold."

"I will be forever grateful for everything you have supported me with throughout the time my babies have been with you at Silloth Primary. The support, care and determination you have given will never leave me! Thank you for everything, you truly are one in a million and will never be replaced. You are amazing, thank you!



Allerdale GDF Partnership



Four new members have been welcomed onto the Allerdale GDF Community Partnership to help broaden discussions with local people about the potential siting of a Geological Disposal Facility (GDF) in the area.

A GDF is a highly engineered facility designed to safely and securely dispose of 'higher activity' radioactive waste, deep underground.

The Allerdale GDF Community Partnership is a group of local people and organisations, the GDF developer and Allerdale Borough Council which exists to look at the possibilities of hosting a GDF within an identified area of consideration, or 'Search Area'

Together they are taking forward discussions as to whether Allerdale is the right place to host a GDF by listening to the views of local people, sharing information and answering questions on geological disposal, the siting process and how the community could benefit.

This work runs in parallel to investigations carried out by the GDF developer, Nuclear Waste Services, to better understand the suitability of local geology and infrastructure to establish whether

siting a GDF in Allerdale would be in fact possible.

The new Community Partnership Members are:

- Becky Wolstenholme who is representing Cumbria Youth Alliance the lead organisation for the development and quality assurance of youth provision where all young people in Cumbria can thrive to achieve a sustainable and positive future.
- Adrian Davis-Johnston is a West Cumbria based businessman who has delivered research, development and innovation programmes over the past 18 years, most recently leading innovation projects at NUVIA UK. He is currently a Parish Councillor, and has previously been a District Councillor, School Governor, a member of both Cockermouth and Maryport Round Tables and a member of local amateur operatic groups.
- Phil Davies spent 20 years in civil engineering construction and consultancy before joining the nuclear industry with senior roles at Nirex, Nuclear Decommissioning Authority and NuGen. Since 2011 he has operated independently on strategic and radioactive waste management

consultancy activities in UK and internationally. He is also active in activities centring around Lake District geology and Rotary. Phil is an advocate for deep-rooted community involvement in any prospective geological disposal initiative based on a long-term socio-economic vision.

• John Coughlan is CEO at Workington based firm TSP Engineering and has previously held senior positions across other industries including nuclear, civil, defence and manufacturing. He currently serves on the Cumbria Local Enterprise Partnership Board and Chairs the Advanced Manufacturing Sector Panel. He is also the Chair of Workington Towns Board securing £23 million for the Town, Cumbria County Council Infrastructure Recovery Programme (IRP) and Shadow Board IRP. He has lived and worked in Asia, USA, Mexico, the UK and Ireland.

The Community Partnership's Chair, Mary Bradley, said: "I'm delighted to announce the four new members who have been brought onto the Community Partnership following a very successful recruitment campaign back in April. Their collective experience and local knowledge will strengthen the Community Partnership and help us broaden our conversations with the community about whether or not Allerdale is the right place to host a GDF."





Electrical products:

Electrical products should always be bought from reputable retailers and consumers should always sign up to the national product safety alerts and recalls so you are notified of any faulty products.

Online home fire safety check: By using Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service's online home safety tool, people can explore whether they - along with loved ones or neighbours - could be at greater risk from fire. This innovative tool offers help and advice for you. Home fire safety visits:

Older relatives and neighbours could be vulnerable and at a higher

risk in the home and would benefit from a 'safe and well' visit from Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service. These can unlock vital safety help, advice, and solutions, while offering help from a range of organisations. You can find out more about

the visits by calling 0800 358 4777, emailing hart@cumbria.gov.uk or visiting Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service's website.

It is estimated one in four UK households are in fuel poverty and it is reported that the current cost of living issues could push more households into fuel poverty, leading to more fire

> risks. People are

encouraged to ensure they have smoke and carbon monoxide alarms fitted. As many people look to reduce heating bills, Fire and Rescue Services want to ensure

people are keeping warm safely. Products such as portable heaters and electric blankets must be in good working order, not subject to any recalls and used correctly.

Group Manager Angela Opie, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service's Prevention Lead, said: "As the cost of living increases across the entire UK, we are offering help and advice to help people stay safer in their homes. This ranges from simple steps such as smoke detection and checking electrical items to how Fire and Rescue Services can assist people who are more vulnerable. While we understand the pressures people are currently facing and affordability is a major factor for many, I am hoping that by giving practical help and advice, we can raise awareness and offer useful assistance. Prevention work is at the heart of all Fire and Rescue Services work, and we are here to help."


THE OPENING DAY.

Sitting in the pretty verandah, which is used as a band stand, this morning, one could not but be struck with the beauty of the scene which was to be witnessed. To the extreme right were the hills to the north of the Solway and more to the front the noted Repentance Tower. Caerlaverock Castle could not be made out, nor yet Sweetheart Abbey, but the Waterloo Monument, on the hills could be seen very distinctly. Criffel and Ben Cairn reared their heads almost to the clouds, and further away to the front rose a mass of rugged heights whose names we know not. For miles this beautiful panorama extended till sea and sky appeared to meet together and shut out a further view. Across the water the Isle of Man was not in sight, the mists not having sufficiently cleared away to make Snea Fell visible through the sixty. six miles which intervened between Silloth and theisland. Skiddaw, Whiteside, Grasmoor, Melbreak and the other mountains in the lake district were very plain. The fertile Holme led the eye back to the town, with its gaily decorated streets and houses. At an early hour visitors began to arrive in the place from the surrounding towns and villages. Some came in wagonettes, others in gigs and dog carts, while one or two did not despise the more humble pony and cart. Many reached the town through the medium of Shank's mare. The Grace, of Workington, and the Florence from Maryport conveyed large numbers of passengers, their accommodation being taxed to the utmost. Two heavily laden special trains were run from Carlisle. Most of the visitors had time to take a stroll through the town or on to the beach before proseciling to the side of the dock to witness the opening ceremony. The Steamer Silloth, under the command of Captain Douglas, was berthed in the Marshall Dock, and by the courtesy of the authorities a number of ladies and gentlemen were able to board her, and thus participate more particularly in the ceremonial. THE DECORATIONS.

The townspeople had evidently spent a good deal of pains and money in their endeavours to make a brave show on the occasion. It would be almost impossible to mention every place where flags were exhibited, as doing this would simply mean printing a directory of Silloth, nearly every house showing in some way or other the interest which was felt by the inhabitants. Those driving into the town from the direction of Maryport found pretty flags displayed at the Green Row Gardens and School, and at the Cumberland Hotel at West Silloth. At Captain Orabb's chemical works about half-a-dozen large flags-American and various kinds of Englishand a long row of streamers, on the roof, extending the whole breadth of the works. At Mrs Strong's (Albion Hotel) were exhibited some flags, and at Mr John Robinson's was a row of streamers across the road, (one flag bearing the words "Saccess to the Silloth New Dock"), as well as sundry flags displayed about the premises. Most of the other shopkeepers in Eden Street had their shop fronts decorated with banners. Mrs Bell, the Waverley Hotel, had hung from the top storey a huge blue flag bearing a crown, and several Union Jacks were displayed at the same establishment. Mr John Stronach had a selection of uncommonly fine flags, including several foreign ones. Mr M. H. Pastinson and Mr Jobson each put out some large flags of various nationalities, and at the Solway Hotel (Captain Thompson's) and Mr G. Mundell's was shown a big ship made up of flags








A regular visitor to Cumbrian waters, EASTERN VANQUISH, recently called at Silloth with grain for the mill. The London registered ship arrived on a night tide from the Baltic port of Vierow in the far north of Germany. Luckily for enthusiasts who wanted photographs, the ship departed during daylight hours the following day. It was a bright and blustery afternoon as the ship could be seen preparing to depart.

A group of passers-by walking along the road to the beach spotted activity from the crew as the ship prepared to leave. On their first visit to the town, they were curious as to the cargo and the workings of the port. They were amazed that a ship the size of VANQUISH could be turned around in the confines of the dock. The mini loader parked at the quayside, which had been used to empty the last of the cargo, also caught

their attention. The visitors declared they were landlubbers from the Midlands and decided to wait and watch the departure at close quarters, a new experience for them.

As high water approached, the Silloth Pilot made his way onto the ship. The crew welcomed him aboard before lifting the gangway and stowing it away securely. With the engine running and radar antenna rotating it would only be a few minutes before the ship was untied and eased away from the quayside to begin its sailing. VANQUISH belongs to the fleet of 'Eastern Shipping' whose logo was prominent on the funnel. It operates on charter to 'Scotline' which accounts for their flag to be flying from the bow mast.

The empty ship, high in the water, made an impressive sight as it was carefully guided through the dock entrance. Everyone watching

the departure suddenly became a ship photographer, as mobile phones were aimed at the passing vessel. The friendly crew were happy to give a wave as the ship powered away into the Solway. After dropping the pilot off at Workington, the next stop would be South Wales to load more cargo.

The first-time ship photographers seemed happy to have witnessed the departure and would have pictures on their mobiles as a permanent record.

June Shipping at the Port of Silloth

15th Eastern Vanguish with a cargo of Wheat from Vierow then to sea for orders.

Zapadnyy with a cargo of Molasses from Bremen the on to Amsterdam.

A poor month overall for Silloth in June, with just two vessel calls and one trawler in for repairs.

Both vessels have called in Silloth before, the Eastern Vanquish on several occasions with both Grain and Fertiliser, this time it was with German Wheat for Carrs Mill. Our old favourite, Zapadnyy was back again with more molasses and I hear is off to dry dock for a

refurb over the next two months.

Camm Alert was in with some mechanical issues which they seem to have been able to fix and she has now gone back out to fish again.

During this month not a lot has happened at the port, a new water meter was fitted alongside the office access road, our dredge license has finally been agreed after waiting for eight months and we have arranged for the dredger to attend around the 13th of July to carry out Water Injection Dredging (WID).

WID is a method of pumping high volumes of water into the mud at moderate to low pressure and allowing the natural suspension of those solids to then flow out of the dock/area dredged with the natural flow of water.

As our dock is enclosed with no river or other source, we will be holding water in the dock and then allowing it out once there is sufficient height difference between the sea level and dock level to give us good flow. Our other option is to leave the dock gates open and allow the mud suspension to flow out with the tide as the sea level

Summer hasn't yet arrived on the Solway coast, we keep being battered by strong South westerly winds causing additional silt in the entrance to the docks, which we have been digging away recently, more still needs to be done, however we will be getting to this during early July.

Here's to the weather warming up a bit and the wind slowing down too!


