It was good to be back for our first Coffee Morning on 4th February, and it was lovely to see lots of our regular supporters.



Dorren Donates £165 to Silloth First Responders



Pictures of a "docking nail" were seen, which was a metal disc with nail like projections which pinched the top of the biscuit to prevent it rising too much.

The story of family grocer John Dobson Carr and his foresight in

moving to Carlisle to mass produce biscuits is legendary but never fails to impress as does his care for his workers.

Call Out to Allonby Bay



WOW! New Disabled Facilities on the Green are Fabulous

Saturday 18th March 2023 was a proud day for Silloth-on-Solway, as we opened our first Changing Places facility on Silloth Green, adjacent to the Criffel Street public conveniences.

Jim Snaith, former Town Councillor, and member of the Accessibility Committee carried out the official opening of the building. A wooden plaque in memory of Margaret Snaith, a former Town Councillor and Mayor of Silloth has been placed at the new Changing Places facility to acknowledge everything that she did for the town

The opening ceremony was well attended. Mark Jenkinson MP and Councillor Allan Daniels, the Mayor of Allerdale were in attendance, along with representatives from the various organisations involved with the project.

The Town Council's Accessibility Committee began researching the possibility of a Changing Places facility back in 2021 and are pleased to see the proposal finally come to fruition. This is one of several projects they have been working on. The Committee is made up of a fantastic team of Councillors who are committed to Silloth becoming a leading Town for inclusivity for all. Meetings are always productive, and ideas driven with a willingness to listen to anyone from within the Community

The facility has been made possible following a successful bid submitted by Allerdale Borough

aret Ann Snaith

Council on behalf of Silloth-on-Solway, for a share of the £30 million Government fund to install lifeenhancing Changing Places toilets in public places and tourist attractions. The Town Council also managed to secure a grant of £5,000 from the Hellrigg Community Benefit Fund which is administered by the Cumbria Community Foundation and £10,000 from the National Lottery Awards for All, for which we are grateful.

Our modular Changing Places facility was constructed by Rise Adaptations Limited who are based in Doncaster and are the market leader in the provision of Changing Places. Each modular facility is built





offsite and once the groundworks have been completed, can be installed within a matter of days.

The new facility will make such a difference to so many – creating

an inclusive environment which disabled people and their carers can use to meet their personal care needs. Changing Places are more than a standard accessible toilet because they offer more specialist equipment such as a hoist and changing bench, etc, to meet the needs of individuals with profound and complex disabilities.

The feature wall in the facility of a sunset view over the Solway was taken by local photographer Gordon Akitt, who kindly allowed us to use



one of his photographs.

The facility can be accessed using a radar key and will be open on a daily basis between the hours of 8am and 6pm. The exterior of the building will be monitored by CCTV to deter vandalism. In addition to the Changing Places facility, the toilets at the RNLI car park are also wheelchair accessible. The gents at the Edwardian toilets is wheelchair accessible and there is also a disabled toilet at Skinburness. accessed with a radar key which are to be re-opened at Easter for the summer season.

The Town Council would like to thank everyone involved with this

project - from start to finish - with a lot of the work involved having been done behind the scenes but it has been a team effort and a great achievement for the town.

Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC), Peter McCall, is urging the public to protect themselves from online holiday scams as new research revealed an increase in fraud.

Recent findings from Get Safe Online and Airbnb shows how the cost-of-living crisis is creating conditions for fraudsters to thrive. Their research suggests that 71% of people living in Britain admit

has been a victim of fraud or a scam, and that victims of holiday scams, lose an average of £1,397 each. The survey revealed that 78% of respondents agree that there are more scams than ever before, and 70% of people agree that scams are becoming more convincing.

Holiday-goers can reduce their risk of falling victim to a scam by: Never clicking on links that

you are not

expecting -Learn how to spot fake emails, websites, texts, and social media posts as bogus links may take you to a fake website designed to look like websites you are familiar with. Being wary of unusually cheap deals or high deposits – If a deal or offer seems too good to be true, it could be a scammer and it is best to end all communication immediately. Paying by credit card,

where possible, and avoid making bank transfers – Paying by credit card often offers better protection, and a higher chance of getting your money back.

PCC Peter McCall "As more money is set aside for increasing living costs, including energy bills and mortgage payments, finding a good price on a holiday can seem too good to be true. People may think that they won't be able to afford a holiday if they can't get a good deal and this makes it an ideal time for scammers to take advantage of those looking to find a reduced-price holiday online. Get Safe Online's holiday fraudster guide on how to stay safe when booking a holiday online, contains some really useful advice and simple tips on how to avoid being a victim to online holiday scams. Holiday fraudsters lure people into paying by bank transfer via fake but convincing ads, websites and phone calls. People can be drawn into booking impulsively, as soon as they see the price, if it means paying less. I would urge the public to double-check that the deals they are viewing are on a legitimate website or source, to avoid being scammed. It essential that we don't take risks, are more vigilant and take our time when booking that well deserved trip. If you have been the victim of a scam or receive a suspicious email or text, please report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 and the Police on 101."



Bulk Grain Delivery Arrives at Silloth Dock

A sunny morning greeted the first ship to arrive at Silloth in 2023. Despite a bitingly cold wind the sight of EASTERN VANQUISH manoeuvring in the Solway attracted winter ramblers to stop and witness the arrival. Regular ship spotters were also waiting with their cameras primed. The ship has been seen at Silloth with a variety of cargos in recent years. On this occasion she was bringing grain from Vierow, a German port in the Baltic Sea.

The sailing had taken two weeks to complete, much longer than would be expected for this route. Normally, the ship would take a shortcut through the Kiel Canal but this was closed due to an oil spillage which meant a diversion to the north of Denmark. Further on, the ship seemed to be in no hurry to reach its destination. In the English Channel it was moored in Torbay for two days, and in the Irish Sea as New Year approached, the ship dropped anchor in the shelter of Wicklow Bay.

On arrival off Silloth, the ship's position was carefully adjusted



before making an entry at high water. Crew could be seen busy on deck unlocking the hatch covers in readiness to begin unloading. Being registered in London, EASTERN VANQUISH is one of the few ships calling at Silloth to fly the Red Ensign. Flags of 'Scotline', the ship's contract operator, and 'Eastern Shipping,' its owner were also flying from the mast. The cargo of three thousand tons of grain was promptly unloaded into wagons waiting at the quayside. It was a brief stay with the ship departing to make the short crossing of the Irish Sea to Kilroot on the following midnight tide.

January & February Shipping at the Port of Silloth

Report by: Capt Tim Riley, Harbour Master, Short Sea Pilot January

6th Eastern Vanquish with a cargo of Wheat from Vierow then on to Kilroot.

January was set to be a busy month, however a small hiccup in Kilroot caused a delay to two calls for the MV Runner who didn't make it this month.

One of our regular customers, the Eastern Vanquish did arrive, early in the month carrying Grain from Germany.

Our normal fishing fleet continues to call on a regular basis, partly for maintenance and partly with small catches of Scallops.

Around the port due to the very strong south westerly winds we have experienced over the months of December and January had caused a significant 5 metre high sand bank across the entrance to the port. With costs for dredgers now reaching over £3k a day, we have been trialling new methods for us in terms of clearing the bank and with a final plan to maintain the entrance sand free from now on.

We arranged for portable pumps and hoses to wash the sand away from the entrance, which, in conjunction with a digger has resulted in removing some 8,500 tons of material from the port entrance in the most natural way we can think of doing it.

Now the bank is mostly gone we are looking to install a more permanent arrangement so that we can flush the sand and shingle away on an almost daily basis. We hope to have our second trial of the fixed version in place in February and then will be costing up for the actual installation at the end of an appropriate trial period. The picture attached shows the result after five hours of trials.

We have also held a further meeting over formalising the car parking arrangements for West Beach at Silloth.

The current facility is an old dump that contains the remains of an old railway station, sidings and various buildings. This is an unofficial car park, which ABP have allowed to continue in use for several years without control. We now propose to allow an area of land for the Town Council to make a formal agreement with ABP, for the public to park on and provide access via the Coastal footpath to West Beach and the foreshore beyond.

It should be noted that all of the land surrounding the port and Silloth Care Home is listed as SSSI and should be treated as such, please see the signs around the area. The land is now monitored by CCTV and we request the public to notify us should they see people using quad bikes, tractors or motor bikes on the dunes and surrounding areas.

February

3rd Runner with a cargo of Bottom Ash from Kilroot then on to Belfast.

11th Zapadnyy with a cargo of Molasses from Amsterdam then on to Gdansk.

February saw the arrival of our first Bottom Ash (Clinker Ash) of the year on the MV Runner, managed by our colleagues up in Ayr and Troon on behalf of ABP. Followed by our normal run of fishing vessels and the old faithful, Zapadnyy bringing Molasses once again for our farming community.

Not much else has transpired shipping-wise at the port, we are still suffering from the effects of freight rate increases in the maritime industry and very high fertiliser costs due to several interlinked reasons to do with Ukraine and Russia.

Our local inhabitants may have noticed us pumping water onto the beach over the last few weeks, this has been a trial run at creating an environmentally friendly way of dredging the port entrance.

Instead of using a dredger, a digger or a bulldozer/digger



combination, we have worked on using water to flush away the silt and shingle brought in by tidal flow and wave action. This has actually been very successful in removing approximately 10,000 tonnes of sand and silt built up during late last year and the January gales. We have not as yet been successful in removing the shingle pile left by the digger, however are looking to attempt a further trial using a significantly larger pump on the shingle and see if we can "wash" that away as well.

This months trip down memory lane takes us back to the 1964-5 Carlisle League Div 2 (West) season.

It was a period of rebuilding for the club after a couple of horrific years.

The previous campaign saw them finish next to bottom following relegation after the infamous season from hell, every match in a 26 match league and four match cup programme was lost, most by disappointing score lines.

Things began to improve albeit very slowly, but it was another three years before promotion back to the first division was attained.

Footnote: Alex, along with Ernie Bell

and Joe Graham, all from West Silloth came up through the ranks in the 1950's when they were schoolboys.

Silloth FC's youth structure in those days was quite simple. Comprising the weekly Saturday morning Silloth v West Silloth youth matches prior to Lonsdale Cup (U18) selection, followed by reserves and senior appearances.

Alex and Ernie were members of the 1960-61 Div 2 (West) championship winning squad.

When work commitments saw them move to Carlisle they both won another Carlisle District League winner medal with DHCC, a Denton Holme outfit.

Ernie also saw Northern Premier semi pro action with Lancaster City.
