Causewayhead WI

Causewayhead WI had a night time July meeting and welcomed Catherine Smith who is a Cold Water Enthusiast and Forest Bather and an advocate for Trees.

She came to us glowing with good health from a swim in Crummock.

Catherine says the experience of being in cold water improves physical and mental well-being and that before taking up the activity she was a little lost, having raised her children to the point where they didn't need her so much, she lacked direction and was struggling with low selfesteem and not keen to meet new people.

A friend managed to persuade her go into cold water to paddle and she felt invigorated. She told her husband she would be taking up cold water swimming within the year but within a week she was up to her neck in water of 4 or 5 degrees and she felt alive and energised. Within a fortnight she was hooked.

If Catherine can't get out to immerse herself in a lake or river, she has a plunge barrel in her garden and in winter she will happily break the ice and get in the cold water. It gives her a sense of euphoria and a real buzz.

She says a dip in the cold sets her up for the rest of the day and fills her with self-confidence and self-belief, if she can do that, she can do anything. Catherine has a friend who doesn't swim but who still finds benefits in simply standing in cold water. Simply putting your feet in a bowl of ice cubes can have a positive effect.

Catherine talked of the Oyster Diving ladies in Japan who are a group of ladies in their 70's and 80's who keep themselves healthy and active by swimming.



Catherine has been feeling the benefits of cold-water immersion for three years come March and feels as though she knows her body so well. She advocates taking no risks and being aware of your own body should you decide to have a go.

Catherine then went on to talk about the positive effects of Forest Bathing and how it can help with the quest for better health. Learning to "deep breath' properly, amongst the trees and to listen to and immerse yourself in the sounds of the wood or forest can help you relax and bring about a sense of calm. In Japan "Forest Bathing' has become a form of treatment for stress, anxiety and illness and the economy has moved away from pharmaceutical commitments and is now helping

to replenish and maintain forests, so that people can benefit from being in them, and of course air quality outside them is also greatly improved.

Catherine then went on to say that Cumbria was once 97% deciduous forest with Rowans and Oaks amongst other native trees, now there is only a seven per cent coverage and that the benefits of re-foresting long term far outweigh the ones for growing for speed to feed the shorter-term manufacturing needs.

We would like to thank Catherine for giving her time to inspire us and if you see a group of ladies, from 50 to 90 plus, trousers rolled up and dipping their toes in the Solway from the shore of the West Beach, feel free to give us a wave or come and paddle with us.



Gardening Folklore

The essence of a cottage garden is an appearance of free and easy planting, a lack of formality with the flowers, but not so in the vegetable garden where neat rows are prominent.

I volunteer with Friends of the Green and have been investigating some of the many traditions and folklores that surround the growing of vegetables and flowers which have been passed down from gardener to gardener, many of which are still used today...

Plants were and still are grown adjacent to each other, to ward off pests, for example Marigolds between Carrots and under Tomatoes, their pungent smell helping to keep Carrot and White







Cabbages were planted with Sage, Thyme or Rosemary and Mint was added to water and sprayed on vegetables to disguise their natural aroma. Garlic

planted next to Roses was said to deter aphids and one old tale said planting garlic around your vegetable plot kept Rabbits out!

My father kept soot from his fireplace and put it around his

brassicas to deter pests, it seemed to work, and he also fed them with beer! He was tee-total so we didn't have to worry about him drinking

Roses will reward your efforts if you plant them with lard underneath. I can vouch for this one it works. Don't waste left over tea, add it to Azaleas and Camellias as a feed, it maintains the acidity of the soil and keeps the plants growing strongly.

The ship had set sail for Silloth a week earlier with a cargo of wheat from the German port of Vierow. The port has a specialist grain handling facility which is run as a small family business. The busy single quay is located in a rural setting and

served by dedicated road and rail connections. The route for the grain ship took her from the Baltic into the North Sea and up to the far north of Scotland before heading down the west coast to Cumbria.

Interestingly, a photo of FRI KVAM en route to Silloth appeared on social media. Enquiries revealed the photographer to be a truck driver aboard the Heysham to Belfast ferry. The keen photographer had captured his image while passing the cliffs of the Mull of Galloway. The photo is courtesy of Rob Wicks.

The ship's strange name, FRI KVAM, is derived from the old Norse for 'small valley'.

company, the ship is one of a fleet of seventeen similar vessels. Silloth stevedores made an early start on unloading the new arrival. The job was completed efficiently and the full cargo transported to local storage, enabling the ship to depart for Rotterdam with a twenty-four hour turnaround, again under the cover of darkness.

On the same day, molasses

tanker ZAPADNYY was seen preparing to depart after unloading a cargo of the syrupy liquid brought from Liverpool. Deliveries are usually sourced from mainland Europe so this had been an unusually short sailing to Silloth. ZAPADNYÝ had taken advantage of loading by ship-to ship transfer from a bulk carrier which had docked in Liverpool with molasses from India.

The empty tanker, high in the

water, was photographed being lined up to exit the dock. With reduced visibility from the bridge, and with crew positioned at the bow as lookouts, the ship was carefully steered through the narrow entrance. The manoeuvre was completed successfully and the ship headed out to sea, next stop Poland.

We were scheduled to take a couple more Fertiliser boats this month, but they are arriving late due to shipping charters being more difficult to get on this side of the UK at the moment.

Around the port we have completed works on the Copings in the entrance to Marshall dock and also at the entrance to the lock gates on the south side. Fencing has arrived at the port ready to cordon off the Eastcote lighthouse ready for works to begin once we have a contractor booked.




