MacBeth: How to Entertain

Great fun was had by all who went to see Wigton Theatre Club performing "The Scottish Play" at the John Peel Theatre in November. Their own writer, director and actor David Ross had imagined Shakespeare writing "Macbeth" not as a tragedy but "something closer to a pantomime or a farce." The result was a crazy dash through the basic story as the Bard told it but with jokes, visual gags, aggressive feminism and squabbling kids thrown in. The major change from the original was that everybody died but no character did the killing. (Don't ask!).

There were plenty of speeches from the original play plus quotes from eight other Shakespeare works (the programme claimed) and more than a nod at vintage American comedians with the witches as Three Stooges ripping off an Abbott and Costello sketch.

The cast were from all generations – I think the most ruthless would-be murderers may have been the youngest – and acted their socks off. Even the scene-shifters got plenty of laughs. Lots of energy and humour and clever characterisations. The scenery was inventive, the props, especially a bubbling cauldron, deserved their own round of applause. In every way the show was just the thing to get us into the mood for Christmas celebrations. The club's next big homegrown production is their pantomime "Robin Hood" in February. I know they'd like to have more men join them, merry or not.

In October 1963 Jean Graham came home from visiting her parents and handed her four month old daughter to husband John and said "She is all yours tonight, I have been invited to the WI". (The baby survived!). Jean felt

really welcome so the next month, November 1963, Jean paid her first subscription to Causewayhead WI and has been a member ever since.

Many of the members in those days were connected to the farming community but there were a few people from Silloth who were members.

Silloth WI and Abbeytown WI both had many more members than Causewayhead, but both of them closed a few years ago. Jean believes the maximum at Causewayhead was 45-50 members. During her sixty years Causewayhead

has held its meetings in eight different venues and there have been eleven presidents, including Jean herself. She has been a committee member

for over thirty years and has held all of the officers jobs except secretary.

There have been speakers on many diverse subjects ranging from how to bone a chicken to talks and slides featuring many different countries and cultures and Jean remembers many educational visits.

Jean has represented the WI

in the Royal Albert Hall, London on two occasions (a wonderful experience) and many times at our own county annual meetings, and was in the darts team for many years.

Jean was also part of the team who recorded all of the inscriptions on the headstones in Causewayhead Churchyard and also part of the beach cleaning team.

Causewayhead WI had a reputation for performing for the general public in the 1990's to the 2000's, including shows like 'Stars in Their Eyes,' Floppertunity Knocks' and 'Keep it in the Family.' there are still some current members who appeared in those shows.

Jean said "There have been some 'characters' over the years and memories of them will stay with her forever, she is very proud to be the first person to achieve sixty years as a member of Causewayhead Women's Institute".

Well done Jean Graham, world record or not this will be hard to beat!

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A quiet month for ship enthusiasts at Silloth so an opportunity to look back at busier times.

May and June provided plenty of activity including visits from two ships of the 'Wilson' fleet, WILSON GDYNIA and PLATO. The Norwegian company has a reputation for high standards in the maintenance of its ships and training of its crews. Photographers weren't disappointed as the wellturned-out vessels approached the port in fine weather.

PLATO is one of a small number of the large fleet of 130 ships without the 'Wilson' prefix. It was built in 1989 and has retained the same name throughout. This is in contrast to WILSON GDYNIA which is of a similar age but was only acquired by 'Wilson' in 2005. On first sight, it might be expected that PLATO is the smaller vessel, but both are of similar length and have the same cargo capacity.

Both vessels were carrying raw materials for the local 'Origin Fertilisers' unit at Silloth. The port receives fertiliser from across mainland Europe and North Africa.

On this occasion PLATO arrived after *s*pending ten days at sea sailing from Lithuania in the Baltic. The route had taken the ship via the North Sea to the far north of Scotland before heading south. WILSON GDYNIA had a less arduous sailing once it had departed the Belgian port of Ghent. It took just four days to reach Silloth after sailing along the Channel and up the Irish Sea.

After discharging their cargos both ships departed for different ports in Northern Ireland to load for their onward sailings. 'Wilson' ships always get a warm reception from local enthusiasts and it is hoped the fleet will continue to be regular callers at the port.





November Shipping at the Port of Silloth

November was one of those months that promised a lot and ended up with nothing. The Runner came back again with further Clinker Ash from Kilroot Power Station, this will be one of the last ones from that port as the power station is now being converted to Gas powered as a supposedly cleaner and cheaper fuel.

In future we hope to pick up some cargo of this type from Londonderry as that power station will continue to be run on coal.

Following a couple of months of good traffic from the fertiliser side of things, this has suddenly stopped, warehouses full, or more coming in by road than by ship! We have been removing sand and silt from the port entrance for almost two weeks now, somewhere around 7,500 tonnes in all, this we simply move into the sluice channel utilising one of Harrison's diggers, and wash away with sea water from the dock, back into the river flow so that it is dispersed naturally.

We have a couple of ships due in December, but overall, we expect it to be a quiet month as well.

Hopefully very soon we will complete and agree on heads of terms for the new parking area which will be maintained by the town council, with easier access to and from it, more space, and a choice of routes to West Beach either scenic or following the coastal path...not as pretty.

Hope you all have an excellent Christmas and look forward to a prosperous New Year.

Rural Crime Team Crack Down on Dog Owners

Cumbria's Deputy Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner (DPFCC), Mike Johnson, Cumbria Constabulary's Rural Crime Team and National Farmers Union (NFU) are working together to raise awareness around livestock worrying and theft in Cumbria.

Since the

introduction of the Rural Crime Team in Cumbria on 19th September 2023, Cumbria Constabulary have received nine reports of dogs worrying livestock where the dog owner was present. Within these nine reports, there were five incidents resulting in the injury of the animal and four resulting in a livestock death. In the same period, seven livestock thefts have taken place across the county.

Recently, the Rural Crime Team have been dealing with incidents of sheep worrying in the Coniston area and at Burghby-Sands. To combat these issues, alongside the wider rural concerns, the Rural Crime Team have worked with the Neighbourhood teams and reached out to the public on social media and by installing signage in areas targeted. This message has also been shared by the Lake District National Park. Cumbria Police recognise that a lot of people out with dogs in the County are there as visitors.

Dog owners who are found by police allowing their dog to be off lead and worrying animals can face a fine up to £1,000 and farmers are legally entitled to shoot dogs that are endangering their livestock.

There are some steps that farmers can take to reduce the likelihood of their livestock being stolen as well as increase the chance or return of livestock if they are stolen. These steps include: Making regular checks to fields to check on livestock and ensure perimeters are secure. In addition to ear tags, use branding or horn marking to make the livestock more identifiable. Secure gates and hinges to minimize access to fields and yards. Report suspicious behaviour to Police.

DPFCC Mike Johnson said: "Livestock is an incredible asset to farmers across Cumbria and the loss of animals can have a tremendous effect on their livelihoods. Farmers put a lot a care into ensuring that their livestock are healthy to keep their business viable and having



these animals stolen from them or carelessly killed due to a thoughtless dog owner really can impact them financially and psychologically. Cumbria is a mainly rural county which is why we introduced a dedicated Rural Crime Team to help tackle rural crime which includes livestock theft and worrying. The specialist, highly trained group of officers will support officers across the force responding to rural crimes. In addition to the Rural Crime Team, there is further dedicated training taking place across the Constabulary to ensure that when you make initial contact to report a crime that you receive the appropriate response. I would urge any dog walkers to follow the countryside code and make sure that their dog is on a lead when in a field with livestock – we don't want any animals to be put at risk unnecessarily. I would also urge all farmers to report anything suspicious to the Police on 101 or 999 in an emergency. They know their land and area more than anyone and can spot suspicious activity much easier and can be the eyes and ears for the Police. Together we can make Cumbria a safer place to live, work and visit."

Sergeant Amanda McKirdy, Cumbria Constabulary's Rural Crime Team, said: "Our Rural Crime Team work closely with the NFU and our farming communities, so we know only too well the impact which livestock worrying and theft can have on the farming industry in Cumbria. We do not tolerate criminals targeting livestock and we will do everything we can to identify offenders and hold people accountable for their actions. To assist us in preventing livestock theft, we need information from our rural communities. If you see something suspicious, please report it to us via 101 or for advice email us atruralcrimeteam@ cumbria.police.uk so we can assess and investigate. Farming communities can also take steps to protect themselves by following the crime prevention advice we promote which includes ensuring
