


World War II food rationing was introduced in January 1940 and ran until June 1954.

Meat was rationed by cost rather than weight, which meant that it could be a large portion, if not all, of a weekly ration. By the end of the 1940s, part of the meat ration had to be taken in the form of slices of canned corned beef.

During World War 2 offal, sausages and rabbit were not rationed. People were encouraged to keep rabbits for their meat and fur. Other sources of meat were also recommended and recipes included rook, crow, thrushes and sparrows!

Haybox cookery was recommended during World War II to save fuel and cope with cooking interrupted by air raids. Food such as soups, stews and porridge are brought to boiling point on the stove, buried in a box full of hay and left for several hours

Birding Without Binoculars

The trouble with a lot of bird watching is that so much of the time it's hard going without a half decent pair of binoculars. But I'm sure lots of you won't have a pair to hand or won't be putting them at the top of your birthday or Christmas gift list any time soon. So, this month we thought we'd tell you about two of our favourite birds that are inquisitive, friendly wee things, easy to pick out and great to watch in the spring and summer without binoculars.

Since both birds are easily recognized by their orangey red breasts, we'll call them the Robin Red Breasts of the garden and the dunes, or simply garden Robins and seaside Stonechats.

Most of us are familiar with garden Robins for no other reason than their appearance on hundreds of Christmas cards and the fact that there are over six million of them in the UK. They are plump, round little things, with bright black eyes, a sharp beak, and a lovely red-orange face and breast. They are a familiar sight in our gardens, bobbing and bouncing around, often sitting on prominent branches or the tops of hedges singing their hearts out.

They seem to have a homing instinct for anyone who heads into the garden with a spade or fork to do a bit of digging especially in spring and summer. They're often found perched on garden tools with a beady eye on the fresh dug soil looking out for a juicy worm or bug if you stop for a cuppa or to stand back to admire your handywork.

They are friendly and fearless without the timidity of most

garden birds so, easy to watch and happy to stick around as you continue to dig. Their lovely song is all about protecting their patch and despite their cute fluffy appearance they will often get into nasty fisty cuffs with another bird who crosses into their territory.

Like Robins, Stonechats also have a lovely orange-red breast and they too like to perch on prominent branches. What sets them apart from a Robin is that you are most likely to see them in the dunes along the Solway. They like nothing better than finding themselves a perch at the top of a prickly gorse bush, amongst the yellow flowers (if you're prepared to risk the prickles do take a sniff of those flowers, they smell like a warm melting Bounty bar on a sunny day), a solitary stem sticking up amongst the waving grasses, or a strand of old barbed wire.

If you approach slowly, they'll often stay on their lookout post for some time and you may get near enough to catch a better sight of their markings. The male birds have a distinctive black head and what looks like a rather cool white collar or scarf wrapped round

their necks. The female birds don't stand out so well and have much less fancy markings. Their white scarf is thinner and they have a lighter, brown head, their orangeyred breast is also paler. Stonechats are often seen in pairs so catch sight of a male with his black head and scarf and you may also see his mate nearby.

Once again thank you for reading. We do hope that you are still enjoying our column and that we have inspired a few of you to take a second look at birds you see on the shore or in your garden.





Holme Low Parish's Longest Serving Chairman Steps Down

Councillor John Graham of Longcummercattiff, stepped down as Chairman of Holme Low Parish Council at the annual meeting on Tuesday 8th April 2025, after 36 years at the helm. John said he had enjoyed his time as Chairman and hopes to enjoy many more years as a councillor.

Councillor Graham is the longest serving member of the Parish Council. When John became Chairman in 1989, you could buy a pint of beer for £1.08, a litre of diesel for 36.18p and the average price for a detached three bed property was £54,034. A lot has changed since then.

Paying tribute, Councillor Duncan Findlay, newly elected Chairman for Holme Low said: "I've known John for over 40 years and been on many committees with him. It has been an honour to have known him. His wit and sense of humour has always shone through. I have served as a councillor with John for 25 years and have enjoyed every minute with him as Chairman and I am pleased he is staying on as a councillor.

Councillor Graham has worked with five different Parish Clerks in the time he has been Chairman. Wendy Jameson, the current

Parish Clerk added: "Having worked with John for almost 23 vears, he has been an absolute pleasure to work with. A parish council chairman is elected for a one-year term of office but to have been elected 36 times is quite some achievement and pays testament to how well thought of he is by his fellow councillors."

Councillor John Graham has made an enormous contribution to the council and to his local community. On behalf of the Parish Council and the residents of Holme Low, we would like to say a

huge thank you. Holme Low is a small rural parish in the north of Cumbria, with a population of 353 [2021 census] scattered around various small hamlets; Barracks Bridge, Blackdyke, Blitterlees, Calvo, Causewayhead, Greenrow, Seaville and Wolsty.



In Action Fraud's new campaign, we are urging people planning to buy tickets or attend this summer's events and concerts to stay vigilant to criminals.

According to new data, £9.7 million was lost to ticket fraud in 2024 in the UK alone. Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a new ticket fraud awareness campaign, warning people to be alert to fraudsters trying to catch out people planning for popular and sold-out

Follow our top tips to avoid falling victim to ticket fraud.

Only buy tickets from the venue's box office, official promoter or agent, or a wellknown ticketing website.

Avoid paying for tickets by bank transfer, especially if buying from someone unknown. Credit card or payment services such as PayPal give you a better chance of recovering the money if you become a victim of fraud.

The password you use for your email account, as well as any other accounts you use to purchase tickets, should be different from all your other passwords. Use three random words to create a strong and memorable password, and enable 2-step verification (2SV).

Be wary of unsolicited emails, texts or adverts offering unbelievably good deals on tickets.

Is the vendor a member of STAR? If they are, the company has signed up to their strict governing standards. STAR also offers an approved Alternative Dispute Resolution service to help customers with outstanding complaints. For more information visit star.org.uk/buy_safe.

Can You Support the RNLI Mayday Mile Appeal?



The Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) has today released its rescue figures for 2024, which show the charity's lifeboats in the North West launched over 333 times last year, saving 18 lives.

Across the UK and Ireland the charity's lifeboats were launched over 9,100 times in 2024, making it the fourth-busiest year in the charity's 201-year history.

Although the number of launches, people aided and lives saved by North West RNLI lifeboats were down this year in comparison with 2023, the demand for its lifesaving services remain high. The charity is putting out its own 'Mayday' call, and urging the public to get involved with its biggest national fundraising event, the Mayday Mile .

Participants are challenged to cover a mile a day for the month of May, with every penny raised helping to make sure that the charity's lifesavers have everything they need to keep people safe this summer and beyond. Running a 24/7 lifesaving service is expensive and costs are rising - in 2023, it cost over £190M to run the RNLI.

RNLI volunteers across the North West of England are set to take on their own challenges to raise money for the lifesaving charity.

St Bees Lifeboat Station in Cumbria are hosting a collective Mayday Mile Challenge on Monday 5th May. Volunteer Crew Member Joe Raymond says: "The idea behind our event is to get as many people as possible to walk, run, jog or push a pram along a course starting at the lifeboat station and looping along the promenade. The aim will be to collectively travel 505 miles, resembling 'SOS' and raising as much money as possible so we can continue saving lives at sea."

Hoylake RNLI are raising funds by holding a car wash. Volunteers from the lifeboat station will be offering their cleaning services on Sunday 11th May.

Lytham St Annes RNLI are holding a 'Walk to the Wall' event on 25th May. This event encourages the community to come together for a walk, whilst raising funds for the lifesaving charity.

Kerry-Beth Quinn, a fellow volunteer Crew Member with St Bees RNLI says: "Usually it's our crew heading out to respond to Mayday calls, but now we're the ones asking for help. Thousands of people get into danger on and around the water each year and need our help, but everything we do is only possible thanks to the generosity of our supporters."

Whether you choose to walk, jog, hop or skip, a mile every day in May will help raise vital funds for RNLI lifesavers, so that they can continue to keep people safe at sea.

Kerry-Beth added: "It's clear from these new figures that demand for our services remains high, with our lifesavers dropping everything to run to the lifeboat station when the call comes. We're now heading towards our busiest time of year, so we're putting out our call for help to raise the funds which will help keep our lifesaving service going today, and allow us to be there when we're needed most."

Check Your Recycling & Waste Collection Dates Online

On the build-up to changes to waste collection arrangements in the former Allerdale area from week commencing 26th May, Cumberland Council is reminding residents to check their collection dates.

Updated collection date information will be available at www.cumberland.gov.uk/ wastechanges from early May.

Due to the changes that are taking place over the coming months, the council is unable to provide an annual calendar and is asking residents to continue to check their website for collection information as some collections dates may change for a small number of residents.

Up until Thursday 8th May 2025, residents can request a replacement 180 litre bin if they currently have a 120 or 140 litre bin. They can apply online at www.cumberland.gov.uk/ wastechanges or by contacting Cumberland Council's Customer Services team.

As part of the bin request process, residents will be asked to provide an email address. If this is provided, the council will contact them to confirm the delivery date.



Householders may also be eligible for an even larger or extra bin if they have a large household, young children in nappies or your household produces extra waste due to medical needs. Find out if you qualify online.

Cardboard/paper collections will increase from monthly to fortnightly from September 2025.

The council has reviewed their collection service, and the changes provide a more efficient service.

Cumberland residents who want additional garden waste collections are also being urged to sign up soon as new collection arrangements are now in place.

All householders in the Cumberland area with garden waste bins continue to have one bin collected every fortnight.

There is now a yearly charge of £40 per additional garden

waste bin that residents request to be collected. This is consistent with the approach in the former Copeland area.

Residents can make a payment for extra garden waste bin collections at www.cumberland. gov.uk/wastechanges or by contacting Cumberland Council's customer services team.

Collections are fortnightly between March and November each year.

Residents can sign up to a maximum of three additional garden bin collections per fortnight, per household.

Stickers will be supplied for the additional bins once the payment has been processed. Residents are being advised to place the sticker on the back of the bin and when putting out for collection, put the bin handle side to the road/pavement -this will help the collection crew and ensure that stickers are visible.

T.U.R.D. Targets Dog Fouling

Cumberland Council is launching Operation T.U.R.D (Together, United for Responsible Dog Ownership)—a bold new campaign aimed at tackling the persistent issue of dog fouling in our communities.

This initiative brings together education, engagement, and enforcement to encourage responsible dog ownership and protect public spaces.

Dog fouling is more than just an unpleasant nuisance—it poses health risks, damages public spaces, and affects the quality of life for residents. Through this campaign, the council will work alongside community groups, responsible dog owners, and enforcement teams to create cleaner, safer environments for everyone.

The campaign name is deliberately bold and humorous to grab attention, spark conversations, and increase public engagement. By using creativity to highlight a serious issue, the council aims to make responsible dog ownership a topic of discussion and action.

As part of the initiative, enforcement officers will also promote the Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) and highlight the dangers of dog fouling.

Cumberland Council has a zero-tolerance policy on dog fouling, and clear enforcement measures will hold offenders accountable. Poo Bag Checkpoints will be set up at key locations, where staff will engage with dog walkers, check if they have waste bags, and provide them if needed—reinforcing that officers are present, watching, and taking action.

Cumberland Councillor Denise Rollo, Executive Member for Sustainable, Resilient and Connected Places, said: "Dog fouling is an issue that affects everyone—it's unsightly, unhygienic, and completely unacceptable. Through Operation T.U.R.D, we're taking a bold and proactive approach to tackle this problem head-on. We have a zero-tolerance policy, and our enforcement teams will be issuing Fixed Penalty Notices (FPNs) to those who fail to clean up after their pets, reinforcing the council's commitment to tackling this issue. By combining education, engagement, and enforcement, we're making it clear that failing to clean up after your dog will not be tolerated. We want residents to

feel proud of their communities, and this campaign is just one of the many ways we're working to create cleaner, safer public spaces for everyone.

"We encourage all responsible dog owners, community groups, and local representatives to get involved and support this important initiative. Everyone has a role to play in keeping Cumberland clean and welcoming. Through education, engagement, and enforcement, this campaign will:



Be Wary of Phone Fraudsters

Police are issuing a warning to people to be on their guard against scam phone calls after a number were reported to police in recent days.

The report was of the victim receiving a scam call from someone claiming to be a police officer and that the victims bank card has been used by someone.

The scam can differ slightly from call to call.

But the fraudsters often request bank details, money to be sent electronically, cash to be withdrawn at the bank for collection or expensive items to be bought for collection at a later time.

Police and other agencies would never request this.

If you have any concern that the person on the phone may be a fraudster, put the phone down and call the police from a different phone on 101 for advice and guidance.

Officers are asking anyone who has been victim to such a scam to come forward.

If you receive a call you're not expecting, you should be suspicious.

The vital things to remember are that your bank, other agencies and the police would:

Never ask you for your bank account details or PIN number over the phone.

Never ask you to withdraw money and send it to them via a courier, taxi, bank transfer or by any other means. The suspect might refer to a safe account, and that the money will be moved there.

Never ask you to send your bank cards or any other personal property to them via courier, taxi or by any other means.


If an officer contacts you in person, they will show you their warrant card.

This is proof of their identify and authority.

If someone has called you and you are unsure if they are a genuine police officer, you can hang up and call police on 101 to check their identity.

If you think you have been the victim of a fraud you can report this to police on 101 and to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 – or by visiting their website at www. actionfraud.police.uk.

Families had to re-adjust to a new life. Homes had been bombed, children evacuated and men and women had served their country in many ways.



Food and clothing rationing

government and [·]Make Do and Mend' and 'Waste Not Want Not' became the key words in many homes. Wartime parachutes were turned into party dresses and curtains made into children's clothing. Old jumpers were unpicked and re-knitted - even young children were taught to knit hats and mittens.

There are many who still remember those days, when most people were just relieved they had survived and communities all pulled together to rebuild lives.

- 1 cup water
- 1 cup raisins 2 tablespoons oil or 2 tablespoons margarine
- l teaspoon cinnamon, ground 1/2 teaspoon clove, ground
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda

DIRECTIONS

Place the brown sugar, water, raisins, oil, cinnamon, and cloves in a heavy-bottomed saucepan and bring to a boil.

Cook gently for 5 minutes, then remove from the heat and let cool until the mixture is comfortably warm to your finger.

While the mixture is cooling, preheat the oven to 350F. Grease and flour an 8x4-inch

baking pan. Sift together the flour, salt,

baking powder, and baking soda.

Add them to the cooled sugar mixture, beating until no drifts of flour are visible and the batter is

Stir in the walnuts.

Spread evenly in the baking pan and bake for 25-30 minutes, or until a broomstraw inserted in the center of the cake comes out

Let cool in the pan for 10 minutes, then turn onto a rack to cool completely.

Notes: For a good glaze, even if it is a new addition, save back a bit of the hot spiced water.

Mix with confectioner's sugar, a drop of vanilla, and a pinch salt. Glaze the cake while hot




The Pink Bike by Sophia Lodhi



Over 35,000 Accounts Hacked

Over 35,000 account hackings were reported in 2024.

Protect your online accounts from hackers and enable 2-Step Verification: Action Fraud issue new warning about social media and email account hacking as new data is revealed.

This year Action Fraud and Meta are encouraging the public to protect their social media and email accounts as data shows there were more than 35,000 reports made last year. Data shows there was a rise of social media and email account hacking reported in 2024, with a total of 35,434 reports made to Action Fraud, compared to 22,530 reports made in 2023.

Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a campaign, supported by Meta, to encourage people to take an extra step of online protection by enabling 2-Step Verification for each online account they have. The warning comes as reporting shows nearly £1 million was lost to hackers last year.

The most common motives for social media hacking were either investment fraud, ticket fraud or theft of the targeted account, reporting insights revealed.

Adam Mercer, Deputy Director of Action Fraud, said: "As social media and email account hacking remains the most reported cybercrime this year, this Action Fraud campaign marks a critical issue for everyone who has online accounts. That's why we're raising awareness of the ways people can protect themselves online. "Follow Stop! Think Fraud advice and protect yourself online: enable 2-Step Verification on each online account you have - this will help prove your identity and stop fraudsters trying to steal or access your valuable information. Secure your social media and email accounts by ensuring each password is strong and uses three random words. Remember to never share your passwords with anyone else."

David Agranovich, Security

Policy Director, Meta, said: "Scammers are relentless and continuously evolving their tactics

to try and evade detection, which is why we're constantly working on new ways to keep people safe while keeping bad actors out. Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) is one crucial example of how people can add an extra layer of security to their Meta accounts, to help reduce the risk of scammers accessing your accounts. We've also started rolling out facial recognition technology to help

people get back into compromised

or hacked accounts and are always

working on new ways to stay ahead

of scammers."

On-platform chain hacking This is when a fraudster gains control of an account and begins to impersonate the legitimate owner. The goal is to convince people to reveal authentication codes, including one-time passcodes, that are sent to them via text. Many victims of this type of hacking believe it's a friend messaging them, however the shared code was associated with their own account and the impersonator can now use it to access their account. Usually when an account is taken over, fraudsters monetise control of the account via the promotion of various fraudulent schemes, like fake tickets or crypto investment schemes, while impersonating the original account owner.

Leaked passwords and phishing The other common method of hacking is when account details are gained via phishing scams,

or the use of leaked information used from data breaches, such as leaked passwords. This becomes prevalent as people often use the same password for multiple accounts, so a leaked password from one website can leave many of their online accounts vulnerable to hacking.

What can you do to avoid being a victim?

2-step verification (2SV) will keep criminals out of your account – even if they know your password. Turning on 2SV gives your most important accounts an extra level of protection, especially your email and social media accounts. It can be turned on in a matter of minutes – time well spent to keep the fraudsters out. Find out how to enable it here.

Email and social media passwords should be strong and different to all of your other passwords. A good way to make sure your passwords are 'long enough and strong enough' is to combine three random words to create a unique password which is easy to remember. Find out more here.

The operation has been made possible thanks to £1 million of extra funding secured by Cumbria's Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner from the Government's Hotspot Response Fund to target anti-social behaviour (ASB) and serious violence in hotspot areas across the county.

If only ship spotters were in charge of ship movements! That's the dream of Silloth photographers keen on snapping visiting ships, as recently, the most interesting ones have arrived either during the night or on days with grey skies. Nevertheless, it's good to know Silloth Dock continues to be busy, and we'll just have to learn to cope with the variable weather.

This month's article features HELEN ANNA, a general cargo vessel last seen at Silloth twelve years ago. The ship was

bringing fertiliser from the Lithuanian port of Klaipeda, a seven-day sailing away. The route from the Baltic had taken the ship into the North Sea towards the far north of Scotland before heading south for Cumbria. The ship arrived off our coast three days ahead of schedule. This coincided with a series of low tides meaning it couldn't take advantage of its early arrival and had to wait at anchor for a higher tide before completing the final leg up to Silloth.

On a blustery morning

HELEN ANNA made her way up the Solway, a strong southwesterly making life tricky as she lined up at the entrance to the dock. She took a buffeting on the approach; however, the Silloth pilot's local knowledge enabled the ship to complete the manoeuvre successfully. It just remained for the ship to be


turned and brought alongside the unloading quay before making her secure. Observing the ship's crew manhandling ropes to be hooked around the mooring bollards completed the action for onlookers.

HELEN ANNA is operated by the German company 'Hermann Lohmann, a family-run business

whose ships are often seen at Silloth. This was the second of their fleet to visit this year. With blustery conditions strengthening during her stay, it would take a little longer than normal for HELEN ANNA to be able to depart, the next destination being a short hop down to Neath in South Wales.








