#### SILLOTH COURTS GET A NEW LEASE OF LIFE AS DAWN HITS THE COUNTY SCENE





# Memories

We used to have the Solway Lightship, which was anchored between Silloth and Maryport. It broke adrift during a gale and was tied up in the dock for a long time, between the gates and the mill corner. It was later sold privately and then taken down to the Skinburness beach and run ashore, a platform gangway was fixed to let passengers aboard as it was used for catering and making meals. At one time we had a pier 1,000 feet long and 24 feet across with a railway line to load and unload sailing ships which tied up alongside, but that was before I was born. I do remember it being washed away during some rough seas.
