# Silloth Town Council - The Facts & Figures

### How is Silloth-on-Solway Town Council Funded and What Does It Do?

Many people are surprised to learn how Town and Parish Councils are funded and what services they provide. Below are some of the most common questions asked, along with clear answers.

### What is the difference between Council Tax and Business Rates?

Both are local property taxes, but they differ in the type of property they apply to, who pays them, and how they are calculated.

- Council Tax is paid on domestic properties (houses, flats etc).
- Business Rates are paid on commercial properties (shops, offices, warehouses etc).

Both taxes help fund local services such as police, fire, and waste collection.

# Does the Town Council receive any income from Business Rates?

No. Business Rates are collected by Cumberland Council and shared between them and central government. Town and Parish Councils do not receive any of this money.

### How is the Town Council funded?

The main sources of income for the Town Council are:

- The Precept this is the largest part of our income. Each year the Council works out how much money it needs to run services and asks Cumberland Council to collect this as part of your Council Tax bill.
- Grants the Council can apply for external funding for specific projects, although sources of funding are limited.
- Local income smaller amounts are raised from renting allotments, community hall hire, use of the Green and concessions such as the fairground and ice cream pitches etc.

### What is the Precept?

The Precept is the part of your Council Tax that is collected for the Town Council. Although it appears on your Council Tax bill, it is calculated and set by the Town Council, not Cumberland Council.

The Town Council carefully budgets each year to ensure it can deliver its services, provide improvements where needed and be realistic about its financial position and responsibilities over the coming year. When carrying out the budgeting process, the Council must consider the expenditures it must make, such as overheads (staffing costs, building running costs etc) and maintenance costs, and the expenditure it wishes to undertake, for example towards the delivery of a project. This is then offset with the expected income for the coming year, for example through rents received and external funding. Income and the use of reserves cover a percentage of the expenditure over the year, but the vast majority is met by the annual Precept.

For 2025/26, the precept raised for Silloth-on-Solway is £209,148. Based on the town's tax

base of 913.76 Band D equivalent properties, this results in a charge of £228.84 per year for a Band D household. This is actually a decrease of £11.19 (4.66%) compared with last year.

### How is the Precept calculated?

The calculation is simple: Budget required  $\div$  Tax base = Band D charge. So, for 2025/26: £209,148  $\div$  913.76 = £228.84

Properties in other bands pay proportionately less (e.g. Band A) or more (e.g. Band H).

### What does the Town Council provide for Silloth?

Your Town Council is directly responsible for many of the facilities and services that people value most in our town, including:

- Public open spaces including Silloth Green, land at New Street and West Silloth.
- Events support allowing the use of the Green and providing facilities such as railings, electricity, and bins for events that boost our town's economy and enjoyment.
- Concessions managing sites for the fairground, land train, ice cream pitches, and food pitch.

• Public conveniences – providing three toilet facilities and a Changing Places facility.

- Sports and recreation maintaining Eden Street sports fields, changing rooms, tennis courts, and the former squash court building.
- Playgrounds including the Water Splash Park, Pirate Ship play area, BMX track, Woodland play area, Eden Street playground, and West Silloth play area.
- Street furniture benches, bins, and noticeboards.
- Bus shelters across several parts of the town.
- Silloth Community Hall available for community use, as well as providing the Council's office and meeting room.
- Allotments situated at Eden Street.

All these facilities are managed

and maintained by the Town Council and its staff and are regularly inspected for safety and cleanliness.

### Why does this matter?

The Town Council plays a key role in maintaining and improving the

quality of life in Silloth. Although our budget is modest compared to Cumberland Council, the services we provide are visible, local, and directly benefit the community.

The vast majority of the cost falls on the ratepayers of Silloth and the Town Council is always mindful of this when reviewing its budget. The Town Council's aim is to ease the pressure on residents' council tax, look at ways for visitors to contribute fairly, cut running costs through efficiency and protect and improve the facilities people value the most.

# **Local Scouts Visit Denmark!**

1st Wigton Baden-Powell Scouts have just returned from summer camp in Denmark. Eighteen Scouts and four leaders flew to Copenhagen, whilst two other leaders drove to Denmark, taking a lot of the kit with them. The camp was to let the Scouts see the log cabin, which the Wigton Group wants to build.

1st Wigton Baden-Powell Scouts meet at Blencogo Village Hall for half of the year and have children in our Group from Abbeytown, Silloth, Port Carlisle, Bothel, Blengogo, Kirkbride and more.

Group Leader Julie Bryceson said "We weren't sure we were going to be able to fly out on our scheduled early evening flight, as it was the day Storm Floris hit. Fortunately, despite some turbulence, the flight took to the skies and it was an interesting experience going as high as possible, in as short a time as possible, in order to avoid as much of the winds as possible."

Whilst on camp, the Scouts cooked over open fires, used axes and saws to prepare firewood and built tables and benches using pioneering poles.

Several hikes took place, with Will, Alana, William and Ariel, completing their First Class hike, with an overnight hike through the local area, definitely a memorable experience. Younger Scouts hiked in the area around a lake, as well as through a forest to test navigation skills.

There was time for sightseeing, with a trip to a Viking boat museum, the Planetarium in Copenhagen and a boat trip to see the main sights of Copenhagen.

The final outing was to a local castle, on the evening before the Scouts left to return to England.

Julie said "We've talked about the log cabin and shown the Scouts photos but nothing can prepare them for the real thing. We were able to use the cabin and camp outside in the forest. Scouts were in awe of every aspect of the cabin, with the individual Patrol rooms being one of the most popular likes."

The Scouts are now keen to raise funds towards the costs of building their own headquarters on land they



own, with a fundraising meeting scheduled for when meetings resume in September.



# Chichester Hall Summer Fayre





Chichester Hall's Summer Fayre, which took place on Saturday - a happy gathering of Residents and their families, friends, neighbours, and some of our most talented craft workers - a lovely way to bring the community together. My neighbours this time were a lady making jams and preserves, and one with a display of splendid woolly hats; it was a delight also to see a display of crafts created by the Residents themselves.

My own contribution was a display and demonstration of Corn Dolly making. The tradition goes back some 8,000 years, to the Middle East, and the invention of farming: it was the custom to make a big corn dolly out of the last sheaf of corn, arranged in the shape of a maiden, where the Corn

Spirit might rest in the winter; and everyone made little corn dollies, often in heart shapes, for everyone else, and they were hung in the kitchen to bless the family.

The custom spread to most areas where grain is grown - my collection includes examples from China to Mexico, Norway to Morocco - but I am one of the very few people making them now. As well as workshops for WI and other local groups, I am asked to run corn dolly workshops all over the country - the latest was for the Canal Festival in Leighton Buzzard, the next ones are in Exeter and then Glasgow. So it was a real treat to be invited to share them with the Residents and visitors at Chichester Hall, a five-minute stroll for me here in Skinburness, and I didn't get lost on the way!

Braedon Greig is looking forward to going to 6th form to study Maths and Chemistry having received a Grade 7 in Science and Grade





And, last but definitely not least all the great people of Silloth who visited our Plant stalls through the Summer and our wonderful volunteers who keep the Community Garden looking so colourful and tidy!

Now is a good time to plant bulbs, so why not have a go at planting a Bulb Lasagne? It will give you a lovely succession of colour through the Spring.

All you need is a largish pot with a drainage hole, some gritty free draining compost, bulbs hate to sit in wet soil, and the bulbs of your choice. Put some crocks and gravel in the bottom of the pot to increase the drainage, cover with compost and then add your first

bulb layer, these should be the biggest bulbs and the last to flower. Add a little more compost, just enough to cover the bulbs, and then add your next layer of mid season bulbs. Your top layer should be the smallest bulbs and the first to flower. Finally top off the pot with Winter Pansies or Violas and water. Don't let the pot dry out but be careful not to over water as bulbs don't like being soggy. Place your pot near the house or in a frost free location to give it some protection and look forward to a colourful Spring.



Their great grandfather, was born and raised in Silloth on Wampool Street and better known as Jimmy "Pongo" Wareing who played rugby union for Silloth, Cumberland and Westmorland, Sandhurst Royal Military College and was selected to play for the England Services XV at Cardiff Arms Park in 1943.

In 1946 he signed professional rugby league forms for Workington Town under Gus Risman and went on to win the Championship Cup in 1951 at Maine Road, Manchester, and the Challenge Cup at Wembley in 1953.

Their great, great, great grandfather was one Samuel Maskell a sailor from St Osyth, Essex, who was shipwrecked off Silloth and consequently met and married Marta Brough in 1865. Martha Brough's nephew is the renown James Wasdale Brough of the "Jim Brough Rugby Park" rugby internationalist, golfer, journalist and a famous "Sillothian".

Samuel and Martha had seven children and the Maskell name was prominent in Silloth throughout the 1900's.

### Restoring a Rare Habitat

Ecological Management on the Silloth Sand Dunes at Silloth on Solway Golf Club

The shore side of the golf course is not only part of a beautiful coastal landscape, but also a home to some of the country's rarest and most threatened wildlife. Over the years, this area has quietly supported a range

of specialist plants and animals that depend on open, low-nutrient habitats—some of which are now disappearing across the UK. This includes one of the UK's rarest amphibians, the natterjack toad, which breeds in shallow pools and needs carefully managed ground conditions to survive.

This Autumn/Winter, wrong permanent livestock fencing will be erected as part of a conservation

of a conservation grazing programme. This is being actively driven by Natural England. The aim is to protect and restore this rare and declining habitat,

which has been identified as a national conservation priority.

Almost all of the land owned by the golf club is designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), and as land managers, we are legally required to maintain and improve its ecological condition. All work carried out on site is subject to agreement with Natural England This project is the result of several years of dialogue, planning, and ecological assessment.

Historically, natural grazers such as wild rabbits and roe deer would have helped maintain open conditions across the dunes and grasslands. However, their populations have significantly declined in recent years, meaning the site no longer benefits from the natural grazing pressures it once did, causing natural succession

to speedup, take over and reduce the ecological value of the site. Without active intervention,

the landscape is becoming overgrown and less suitable for the unique species it supports.

Parts of the land have historically been used by local residents for informal dog

walking.

However, we must be clear: this is private land, and while access is tolerated, it has never been a public right. If you do use the land you need to be very careful and aware of golfers. There have been a few near misses with the public walking in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Once the fencing is installed,

we are asking people not to enter the fenced areas, to help protect the sensitive habitat, the wildlife that lives there and the grazing animals.

We have worked closely with the

appropriate local authorities to confirm all legal rights of way, and these will remain fully open and undisturbed by the new fencing.

The reason for this change is both clear and urgent. The area supports rare coastal habitats and is home to species of national and international importance—including the natterjack toad, a globally endangered amphibian found at only a handful of sites across the UK. Its survival depends on active, targeted land management.

Natural England has made it clear that conservation grazing is essential to reverse the habitat decline. Grazing helps restore the natural balance of the site by reducing invasive vegetation, encouraging a wider range of plant species, and creating the bare-ground conditions needed by species like the natterjack toad.

### £1,000 for Solway Red Squirrel Group



Solway Red Squirrel Group has received £1,000 of funding through SPAR's Community Cashback initiative.

The group is a voluntary organisation set up in 2012 to try and protect local endangered red squirrels from extinction and its work feeds into overarching conservation work carried out by Red Squirrels Northern England.

The red squirrel is an iconic native species, and working across the Solway area, the group's ambition is to preserve the status of the red squirrel for the benefit of local communities and future generations.

Martyn Richardson, Managing Director of M&L Richardson & Sons Ltd, has eleven SPAR stores across Cumbria and Northumberland, and was on hand to meet members of the Solway Red Squirrel Group outside his SPAR store at Cardewlees.

Stephen Kirk, representing

Solway Red Squirrel Group, said: "The SPAR Community Cashback grant will help enormously to sustain our conservation efforts which are currently based around protecting an established red squirrel stronghold. This is in the hope this will allow population numbers to build further and, in time, gradually disperse to other areas.

"Our volunteers are engaged in a year-round programme of woodland surveys, camera monitoring, supplementary feeding, recorded sightings and grey squirrel control, alongside various public engagement events to promote our conservation message.

"The funding from SPAR specifically will help provide feeding boxes, supplies of feed, and some better quality, more expensive trail cameras and batteries that can monitor red squirrel activity and populations remotely, enabling volunteers

to be more hands on with other group tasks."

SPAR Community Cashback returned more popular than ever in its fourth consecutive year and James Hall & Co. Ltd, SPAR's primary retailer, wholesaler and distributor for the North of England, received 1,400 applications from charities and organisations across the North.

Nationally, more than 65 charities and local groups have shared a £100,000 grant fund this year, and since Community Cashback launched in 2021, grants have been awarded to nearly 200 organisations, highlighting SPAR's long-term commitment in supporting local communities.

Martyn Richardson said: "It was a pleasure to hand over the cheque to the Solway Red Squirrel Group who are a lovely organisation and are committed to preserving one of the North of England's best-known species."







Firstly, I want to thank everyone who took the time to complete our Libraries Fit for the Future survey which ran throughout the spring and early part of this summer. More than 1,500 of you got in touch and gave us your views on Cumberland's Library Service, with many more taking part in workshops with our staff.

While the project team are still going through the responses in fine detail, a quick glance at the feedback shows there's lots of positive opinions of the library service and how we operate, with particular praise for the staff, as well as plenty of food for thought on what could be improved in the future.

As I said, the team are still working through the responses at the moment, but it's clear that we all share the same goal: We really value our library service and want it to be the best it possibly can be.

Since the survey closed at the beginning of July, the team have been reading the feedback, doing some number crunching and trying to identify the trends, all while taking the time to read the longer, more qualitative answers

What happens next, you ask? Well, throughout the rest of the summer that work of going through the results will continue. This work is being combined with analysis of things like demographic data to better understand Cumberland's current and future need.

Once that's happened, we'll

We will be sharing ideas for developing the service with our stakeholders and residents to get feedback before making any significant changes to our library services. Where there are quick wins identified we'll get them actioned so we start making improvements straight away where we can.

There have been lots of really good ideas put forward (and some more 'out there' ones too!) and while we won't be able to take on every suggestion, we'll do our best to design the library service that reflects what people want from it now – and importantly in the future. While walking along the road to the West Beach many folk will be familiar with the sight of the green tanker, ZAPADNYY, unloading molasses on the far side of the dock. Built in 1988, she has long been the oldest ship to regularly call at Silloth, however, that record has now been beaten. The small cargo vessel, BONITA, recently made her first visit and is one year her senior.

BONITA arrived on a sunny afternoon with wheat from Cowes, Isle of Wight, a leisurely three day sailing for the old lady. It was during the school holidays so she had a good audience to greet her at the dock entrance. Conditions were calm allowing the ship to make a direct approach without having to spend too much time lining up. This meant fewer opportunities to take close-up photos as the ship made a fast approach and passed smoothly into the dock. The Silloth pilot was able to step outside the wheelhouse for a few moments to acknowledge the gathered crowd. He was in a good position for

The diminutive BONITA has a deadweight of only 1,500tons, about half the size of most of the shipping seen at Silloth. The 38 year-old ship has had a few name changes, starting life as LAURA. She is now privately owned, being the sole ship under the care of Latvian company 'Waterfall Projects'. She flies the flag of Latvia, with Liepaja her port of registry. Looking back at recent itineraries, BONITA's size appears to work to



her advantage as she is kept busy serving some of the smaller ports around England, Ireland and France.

Turning to ZAPADNYY, the tanker recently made her fifth visit of the year with molasses for the local animal feed business. Nothing unusual so far, but sharp-eyed onlookers may have spotted a new port of registry painted on the hull. For many years Belize City has been emblazoned across the stern. The Central American flag of Belize has always been thought of as an unusual choice, but now the owners have chosen another obscure flag to fly, that of Comoros. The port of registry is Moroni, the capital of this remote East African island. ZAPADNYY never ceases to provide interest!

After unloading, ZAPADNYY headed south to await new orders, spending several days at anchor in the Thames estuary. Meanwhile, her older sister BONITA had been busier moving cargo between the south coast and Channel Islands.

Silloth Town Councillor publishes his debut novel.


Charles Searle, a Silloth Town Councillor, is due to publish his debut novel in late October of this year. Entitled, The Hooded Man, it is a historical thriller set in 1920s Indochina and 1930s France. The novel is planned to be part of a trilogy called the Dark Years. The second in the sequence, provisionally titled Crossing the Line, is due for publication next year.

Charles, who has lived in Silloth for twenty years, decided to write the novel when he stopped working full-time. He had always wanted to write fiction but had found it difficult to find the time among his working and family commitments.

Charles has always been fascinated by the history of the inter-war years, leading into the Second World War. He decided to set his novel in France and to use real French historical figures mixed with his fictional characters as over the years he has read extensively around the topic.

'I realise that the characters and topics in the novel couldn't be further removed from my direct experience. But the joy, and challenge, of writing fiction, is that you can use your imagination. I try to make the settings and characters as authentic and true to their time, mainly by grounding them in detailed historical research, but at the end of the day, it is fiction. My aim in writing is to thrill and entertain, but if by reading my books, people get interested in the period I set them in, then all the better'
