Today we have a very successful shrimp industry with the small boats providing an excellent food source and also a tourist attraction. What part did Silloth play in the former Irish Sea/Solway Firth herring industry? What part did Silloth harbour play during the last war? Have we anyone in our midst who has a Silloth naval or merchant shipping story to tell? For many years the Irish cattle trade into Silloth was a major local feature. Have we anyone able to recall and enlighten us about this trade? Have we anyone who has studied

the many local Solway shipwrecks, the former shipping links with local Solway ports and others far afield?

In its short existence Silloth has developed shipping links far and wide, have we anyone who has studied this? Where have our ships and sailors sailed to and where have they come from?

Everyone in Silloth and district will have read the fascinating story of RAF Silloth, now we would like to bring together the shipping/ maritime history of the area based on local activities. From Roman shipping to present day maritime matters including life saving at sea we would welcome your views and help.

Together we can then arrange a Silloth/ Allonby programme of events for SeaBritian 2005 of equal quality to those of the major national and other local ports.

SeaBritian 2005 is a national maritime celebration on a grand scale. Silloth/Allonby is very much a part - everyone can become involved.
