Recycling

Did you know that every household produces approximately 1 tonne of rubbish every year?

This increasing amount of rubbish we are producing puts added pressure on the environment to cope. No one can avoid producing rubbish but don't forget the less we produce the better it is for the environment.

The way we collect and dispose of our rubbish is changing through Government and European Union pressure. Up until now we have produced and got rid of our rubbish without much thought into what has been happening to it. Recycling is a good way of helping to reduce the problem.

Allerdale's residents have embraced the concept of recycling and thanks to residents Allerdale Borough Council has not only met, but, exceeded the targets set by the Government for waste reduction and recycling.

The challenging task of increasing our recycling rate and reducing the rubbish we take to the landfill site has been addressed by increasing the kerbside recycling of paper and garden waste within the Borough.

Bring Sites are a widespread recycling scheme currently in operation. Containers are placed at various sites throughout the Borough. Residents can deposit their recyclable material into these recycle banks which are then emptied by Allerdale Borough Council and sent for recycling.

The main 'Bring Site' is located at The Green in Silloth (on the car park where the public conveniences can be found opposite Good Companions home). The banks are designed to accept mixed cans, (which includes empty aerosol cans), glass (colour separated) and paper/card. There are a number of smaller 'bring sites' in the Borough such as the one located next to the play area in Allonby and those on caravan sites along the coast. For a full list please visit our website on www. allerdale.gov.uk.

If there is no recycling 'Bring Site' in your local area and you feel that the community would benefit from one then please contact Allerdale Borough Council on 01900 607900.

Facts: A person will drink on average 100 cans a year! The energy saved from recycling one glass will power a 100w bulb for almost an hour, a computer for 25 minutes, a TV for 20 minutes or a washing machine for 10 minutes. Every tonne of paper recycled saves 15 trees.

Abuse of Crunch Service

There have been a number of reports, generally from both members of the public and our cleansing staff, that waste is being deposited at the Silloth crunch sites in advance of the vehicles arrival.

This type of incident is causing the residents, particularly in West Silloth, considerable inconvenience and we would like to ask the residents from the town and surrounding areas to only deliver waste to the sites at the dates and times outlined below.

The collection dates for 2005/2006 are June 25th July 23rd August 13th September 17th October 15th November 19th December 10th January 21st February 11th March 11th The crunch vehicle will be parked at Criffel Street between 9am and 10am.

From the Criffel Street site, we then move to the Crofts and are on site from 10.10 am to 10.45 am, the vehicle then moves to Aspatria.

This situation is regrettably not uncommon in other parts of the borough where the crunch service operates. We have at another site undertaken measures to reduce the possibility of this happening and feel that if the dumping of waste prior to arrival of the vehicle in Silloth were to continue, then we would need to review the situation.

We are aware the service is valued and feel the problems that we are encountering may undermine the continuation of this operation as it is at present.

Dog Fouling Prosecution

A Workington man has been prosecuted by Allerdale Borough Council for failing to clean up after his dog fouled.

David Birkett, of Cumberland Street, Workington, was fined £150 and £50 costs by West Allerdale Magistrates on Monday 18 April 2004 after he failed to pay a fixed penalty fine of £50.

The Court heard that, on the morning of Wednesday 8 December 2004, Allerdale's **Environmental Wardens** witnessed Mr Birkett's springer spaniel fouling beside a bush at Vulcans Park, Workington. Mr Birkett failed to clean up after his dog.

A fixed penalty notice was hand delivered to Mr Birkett's home but was not paid by the due date of 22 December. Despite a reminder letter being sent to Mr Birkett on 23 December, the fixed penalty remained unpaid.

For the evening she was joined by Stuart Stokell, concert pianist and tenor, and 11-years old Bethany Durose, one of her pupils from Holmrook.


The event was

This money will be used to fund pioneering research that saves and improves the lives of vulnerable adults and children.


