We run an Older Persons Project offering housing and benefit advice to anyone aged over 55. Shelter recognises that it is often difficult for older people to access services



to help them deal with their housing problems and we aim to address this and offer support and specialist help in this area.

We also operate the South Cumbria Offenders scheme – a caseworker works with offenders and those at risk of offending to secure accommodation and reduce the risk of re-offending. Also within this project we have tenancy support workers who work with offenders to empower them to settle into their new homes, maintain them and to feel confident to be involved in their local community.

We run surgeries across the county each week and can offer appointments for you to see any of our caseworkers, support team or solicitors.

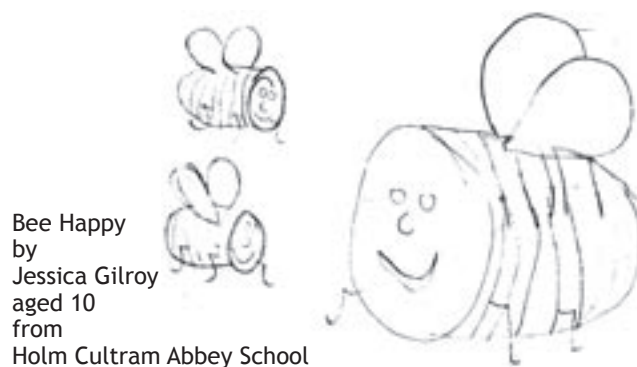

Silloth's Record Breaking Cargo

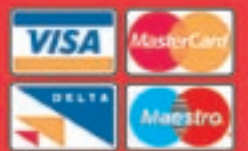

On Sunday morning the 30th April two Bottlenosed Dolphins were sighted from the Silloth Lifeboat and its sister training boat, while out on exercise off Lees scar lighthouse.

The Dolphins then followed the boats back to Silloth and played around the vessels close to the promenade for well over an hour, during which time a large crowd of onlookers gathered to watch. The coastguard team from Maryport, who helped in rescuing Marra from Maryport marina earlier in the year were at Silloth and confirmed from markings on the dorsal fin that one of the dolphins was Marra.

The Dolphins played with the lifeboat, rubbing alongside the hull and jumping through the bow waves to the delight of the crowd. They re-joined the Lifeboats on Sunday 7th May for another spectacle. Little did we know just how close we were going to get to one of them.

Bill & Wendy Allison from The Albion were walking along the beach at Beckfoot when they found a dolphin stranded at 6:30pm.

They asked Margaret Studholme at the closest house to get help and she called Silloth RNLI, who were soon joined by a Coastguard team who were at Beckfoot beach attending to a find of 14 live shells. They were then joined by the British Divers Marine Rescue and Vicki Weeks, the vet from Millcrofts. A local

farmers JCB was used to build a dam to create a pool and everyone, including many local children worked for over 6 hours to keep the dolphin cool and calm until the tide got close enough to put it on a sled and carry it 200 metres to the sea.

Credit must go to everyone, especially the locals who stood knee deep in water for hours in the pouring rain.

Initially it was thought the 2.55m (8ft) long dolphin was not Marra, the vets photos later proved it was.
