Abbeytown Library

At a meeting in Abbeytown Jim Grisenthwaite (Head of Culture, Cumbria County Council) explained how he wanted to discuss options to improve performance at Abbeytown Library. He emphasised that this is not a programme of library closure, it's about library improvements.

Why Abbeytown Library? In 2004 the Audit Commission inspected Cumbria Library Service and concluded that overall the service was good, however it made recommendations to review the county's libraries and to look at the pattern of service provision in relation to need.

Since then changes have already been seen such as: Sunday Opening and Christmas Holiday opening in 6 main libraries Library Link in the local community. As part of this review process the library service has looked at the 20 smallest libraries in the county to confirm that the service being delivered is being used, this was done using the following performance criteria: Visits and Visits trends

(over 4 years) Loans and Loan trends (over 4 years) Stock usage. And the following community criteria: Opening hours Population Distance to larger library Public transport

Each library was scored against the above criteria and out of 32 libraries there were 6 scoring less than 15, Abbeytown was one of these six – implying that the service is not efficiently meeting the need of the local population. As a result, there is the need to develop the library service in order to meet the needs of the community.

Alan Welton (Cumbria Library Services Manager) illustrated the outcome of the library survey including number of loans and visits at Abbeytown Library LOANS down by 30%

over 4 years VISITS down by 19%

over 4 years STOCK ISSUED Less than once per year

TOTAL LOANS 2005/2006 2,723

There was then a short film to illustrate the alternative option of Library Link and residents were also invited to look round the mobile library bus.

Comments made during the discussion: Opening Hours The opening hours have changed since it was

moved to the school, and

now many people are unsure of the times.

Fewer days but longer hours may suit more people.

People don't come into the library before 4pm because 3-4pm is a busy time at the school with parents collecting their children etc. Location

A large population live at the bottom end of the village, and there are car parking issues at the school, which may have led to a decrease in use.

Is there a perception that due its location at the school it is seen as a school library only?

Moving the library is not an option due to capital costs. Mobile Library

Service: It is proposed to

review the mobile library service to make it more community led.

In order to make it feasible in Abbeytown you would need a couple of long stops each week.

The mobile library service refresh their stock more regularly, compared to a static library.

We want to see more children in the library, we need to encourage a younger element because they are the future users. The school is part of the solution.

This was followed by a session to establish the community's views on Abbeytown Library.
