Mayors Report

The Chairman has attended Civic Services at Harrington, Maryport and Cockermouth. Presented flowers at the Vintage Rally and welcomed the crew of the Grand Turk to Silloth. He gave notice of his Civic Service to be held at Christ Church on 6th August.

P.C. Andy Robertson's written report listed complaints and disturbances dealt with over the past month. WPC Yvonne Benson attended the meeting and introduced herself as the Community Liaison Officer for our area.

Correspondence dealt with this month included a document from Cumbria County Council headed Cumbria Minerals and Waste **Development Framework** all 145 pages and requests comments by the end



of July. A letter from Allerdale Borough Council with regard to the policy for granting street trading licences within Silloth. Another letter from A.B.C. requested we reconsider the request for the Sunday market, to use the edge of the Green so as not to close the street to traffic. Councillors present rejected the proposal.

Other reports submitted this month included Primary School: the windows have been installed and the school has received a good Offstead Review. Joint Advisory: Sir Martin Doughty future chair of Natural England had recently attended a meeting of the A.O.N.B. in Silloth. Regeneration: The first step in the bidding process to the Heritage Lottery has been

submitted for evaluation. Allerdale Councillor Jefferson asked that it be noted he had not been sacked from A.B.C. and that the leader and Chief Executive could not do so as he is an elected member. County Council: A.J. Markley stated he was now Chair of the Allerdale Local Committee and although funding was very tight it was envisaged some amount of Highway work would be carried out in Silloth. Ken Wannop reported on work carried out and planned around the town, he also made a request for a small dumper for use on the green. This was agreed by all. The Town Clerk reported the accounts have been audited and submitted to the Audit Commission. It was also noted that there is still a vacancy on the council.

An Overview of the councils financial position after three months of the financial year shows we are on course.

Their offices are manned by volunteer's, who are trained for six to nine months, confidentiality is one important factor in their

deal with a whole range of problems, the largest being debt. They now have contracts for legal services, and are also able to offer advice and support to disadvantaged people to the conclusion of their problem. Over the years they have been able to bring about changes in regulations, due to information gathered from branches all over the country, which can then be passed to the relevant department of the Government Ministry. At the end of her talk Mrs Hine had quite a few questions to answer. One being - How did the C.A.B. cope with the load from Legal Aid, and Benefit Contracts, and did you feel it was a cheap way of dealing with this problem?

Yes! It was made a scapegoat; too much was put on volunteers who had to work a set number of hours in the offices under great pressure. The system was being abused. 2. Do you have any

specialist on staff? Yes! The speaker specialised in Debt and Benefits. Everyone starts from the same point, but later after training, may want to specialise in a particular field.

3. What are your hours? 9-5 in the Office, most times during lunchtime, and at home which made for longer working hours, which could be very stressful, and you could not speak about it because of confidentially. Volunteers worked six hours per week.
