We are all used to hearing messages of the importance of eating healthy food and to buy local produce to reduce food miles but the Solway Plain has up till now, not had an event to support these causes.

On Sunday 6th August the first Solway Food and Drink Festival was a great success and was enjoyed by locals and visitors alike. The event took place at the Solway Coast Discovery Centre in Silloth, it successfully highlighted the wealth of locally produced food available on the Solway Plain.

The event included two demonstrations by local chef Annette Gibbons who used ingredients sold by the producers who attended the festival. Her demonstrations were popular and we learnt how to make Moroccan Tabouleh with bulgar wheat and local vegetables, Mawbray potato confis and Solway shrimp salad with red beetroot leaves. Annette commented 'It is vital that events like these enable local people to find out that a high standard of local produce is available close to

home instead of relying on supermarkets who mass produce food that does not support its producers.'

The Solway Sandwich Competition was judged by local cookery specialist and Allerdale Councillor, John Crouch. The criteria were the sandwich had to include at least one element of locally produced food and it should be reasonably healthy. The winning sandwich was made by the Silloth Rainbow Guide Unit who worked



friendly, it included fresh local vegetables, particularly carrots which was an unusual sandwich ingredient, it had no dressing which was a healthy option and the blue cheese had a judge, they included red complementary flavour'.

John was excited to find out after he chose the winner that the sandwich was designed by a group of children and encouraged at their interest in the competition and said, 'It is all about encouraging young people to think about the food they eat

and encourage them to eat not just healthy, but local food as well.' The prize was a hamper of locally produced food which will be raffled off by the group leader later in the year to raise money for the Rainbow Unit, a big 'Thank you' to all the producers who kindly donated to the prize.

Despite the damp conditions which were not ideal, Fiona Parker and her helpers continued to demonstrate throughout the day their skills of
