Wareing.

Jimmy was playing for Cumberland County Team before the war at stand off, alongside his clubmate Jonathan Carr.

The war came and Jimmy went to the Army, but sadly Jonathan lost his life in the Royal Navy in 1940. Jimmy represented the Army, Combined Services and was selected for England in a wartime international but injury deprived him of his cap. After distinguished war service at Dunkirk and later on the Normandy landings, he returned to Silloth R.U. but was quickly signed up for the newly formed Workington Town R.L.

By now Jimmy was a prop forward and the formidable front row combination of Jimmy Hayton, Vince McKeating and Jimmy Wareing paved the way for much of Town's success, when they played on Borough Park in front of crowds of up to 18,000. The

ball was won by forwards and given to incisive centres Eppy Gibson and Australian Tony Paskins who made ground before feeding flying wingers, Happy Wilson and John Lawenson. The League championship was won in 1951 and the Challenge cup at Wembley in 1952.

Jimmy was in all these games and also a member of the Cumberland County Championship Team. After his playing days he was coach to the 'A' team.

He liked to visit Silloth and his knowledgable conversations at the Rugby club were well worth hearing. His last visit was as "special guest" at the renaming of the Jim Brough Park at the club's 125th Anniversary Day.
