Wind Lowther Arms Turbine Opens Again

After the death of Landlady Elsie Pigg in August 2005, the Lowther Arms was advertised for sale and was jointly purchased by Miss Dawn Lindsay and Mr Andrew Mattinson who have renovated the bar and enlarged the main room.

The opening ceremony took place at 6pm on the 23rd December with carol singing by villagers and cutting of a Ribbon at the door. A free pint of Beer or a glass of Mulled Wine with soft drinks for the children were given that night.

The closing of the pub hit the village community, especially the domino players which included 92 year old Leslie Robinson from Wolsty. He recalled that it once closed for a fortnight for renovations, in his 75 years of visiting only four different alterations took place. It was once State Controlled with Mr & Mrs Tom Graham as Landlords, Tom was also the Blacksmith which

We have been informed that Npower **Renewables** Limited intend to submit a second application for permission to erect four wind turbines and their associated infrastructure at Parkhead Farm, near Silloth.

Readers of the Buzz will recall that an application was submitted in June 2004

by NPower to erect six wind turbines on this site but the application was refused by Allerdale Borough Council. At that time a vigorous campaign was fought by Silloth on Solway Action Committee (SOSAC) and other concerned parties such as the AONB, English Heritage and the RSPB. Continued on page 2.

Christmas and New Year passed off relatively peacefully in North Allerdale.

Unfortunately there were a spate of incidents at the Silloth **Community College** during the school holidays: a number of windows were damaged as were down spouts and gutters. We are also asking for any information in connection with the following crimes: A green Kawasaki ZX6R Motorcycle was reported stolen from Fell View on the 11th December, it has not be found yet. Two cars were damaged on the 14th December. A Peugeot car had its rear window smashed on Wampool Street, whilst a Toyota car had a corrosive substance poured over it on Waver Street. On New Years Eve or New Years Day, a wing mirror was kicked off a car parked on Waver Street. On 3rd January the telephone kiosk on the junction of Skinburness Road and Moricambe Park had its cash box forced and the coins taken. On 5th January a Ford car parked on Solway Street had a window smashed and an Alpine DVD player stolen. Finally, we are attempting to find the owner of a white Ford Escort van which was found on 7th January at the recycling centre with a smashed window.

This new application is for up to four wind turbines each of a maximum height from ground level to blade tip of 121m (396ft) and a tower height not exceeding 80m (260ft). The application submitted in 2004 was for six turbines with a ground to blade tip height of 105m (344ft). The sketch on page 1 gives an indication of the height of these turbines, compared with the spire of Silloth Church.

Obviously the visual impact of this new proposal will be greater than the first one.

Npower will be required to undertake environmental studies in support of this application. As far as we are aware, the same environmental issues exist now as they did

in 2004, e.g. AONB, tourism and wild life.

These utilities want the wind turbines to stretch from Workington to Silloth! If we become a large wind factory, how many tourist visitors will we then see? We must all fight to stop this desecration of our beautiful landscape.

Unlicensed Taxi Driver

At a hearing on 12 December 2006 West Allerdale Magistrates heard how investigations, following a complaint made to Allerdale **Borough Council** regarding the dirty condition of a hackney carriage licensed to Select Cabs of Silloth revealed that the driver of the vehicle, Robert Tinnion, 24, of Pica Cottages, Pica, Workington, was not licensed nor insured to drive a hackney carriage.

Over two days in April 2006, Council officers witnessed Mr Tinnion touting for taxi business and sitting in the driver's seat of a hackney carriage. When interviewed, Mr Tinnion admitted driving the vehicle as a hackney carriage whilst unlicensed and uninsured.

Mr Tinnion pleaded guilty to the charges driving a hackney carriage when not a licensed driver and driving a hackney carriage without insurance on 24 and 25 April 2006. The case was adjourned until 20th February 2007 for Mr Tinnion to produce his driving licence to the court.

Firefighters Memorial Service

On the 10th December a service was held in a packed Christ Church, Silloth, to honour the memory of four Silloth firefighters; John Johnstone, Joseph Bell, Stanley Graham and Alex Ramsay.

Tragically, 50 years ago to the day, they lost their lives on a stormy December evening. They were called out and launched a 14ft rescue boat to go to the rescue of someone reportedly in difficulties on the Solway Marsh. There was no lifeboat in Silloth at that time and the rescue boat was housed in the fire station and manned when needed by the local firefighters or firemen as they were then called.

After this tragedy a lifeboat was provided by the RNLI and a crew of volunteers were trained up.

During the service the weather outside gave everyone a taste of what it must have been like on that night 50 years ago. The Church was lashed by the wind and rain. A small service was held at the graveyard at Causewayhead where the four firefighters are buried side by side.



Wreaths were laid by Watch Manager Peter Long, Crew Manager Martin Slack, Crew Manager Steven Henderson and Firefighter Michael Aird on behalf of the Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service. Crew Manager Stuart Graham of the Silloth First Responders, Jim Blake on behalf of the Lifeboat Station and Geoff Betsworth on behalf of Silloth Rotary. A memorial plaque

has since been erected on the front wall of Silloth Fire Station recorded with the date of the tragedy, the names and ages of the four very courageous firefighters.

The Garden in Late Winter

Despite our reluctance to venture out, the garden is stirring from its winter slumbers.

Snowdrops, always a welcome sight, will soon be everywhere and Winter Aconites and the tiny blue Iris reticulata or Iris unguicularis can also be sighted. Soon on their heels come crocus and once the early flowering species of Narcissus appear late in February, the promise of spring will definitely be with us.

February is a strange month weather wise, frost and snow used to be commonplace though less in recent years. The traditional saying as the nights get shorter the days get colder is often true and yet the daytime temperatures in February can occasionally equal those of a pleasant summers day. If this proves to be the case, the enthusiastic gardener or those with good intentions can get the gardening year off to a head start. Trees and shrubs, whether

container grown or bare rooted can be planted now and the herbaceous border can be cleared of old stems, foliage, debris and weeds, then mulched. The lawn can be given its first cut of the year, if ground conditions are suitable. Frost or persistent rain however give us the excuse to remain indoors. Trying to cultivate waterlogged ground will only compact the soil and is counter productive. As a general rule, if the soil sticks to your boots don't try to work it.

A closer inspection of the garden will reveal a surprising number of flowering shrubs. These include Hammemellis (Witch Hazel), Viburnum, Sarcococca (Christmas Box) Mahonia and Daphne. If your eyes don't spot these shrubs, your nose surely will, as they are perhaps some of the finest scented shrubs. Flowering so early in the year these shrubs have developed a strong scent in order to attract the relatively



few insects to aid their pollination.

What needs doing? If you have not already done so, ensure that tools are cleaned and sharpened and in a good state of repair, ready for the year ahead. If tools need replacing, buy the best quality you feel comfortable with.

Now is the time to order Snowdrops, Aconites and English Bluebells to plant in the green. Buy bulbs from a specialist nursery to ensure they are grown from cultivated stock and not taken from the wild. Feed Daffodils and other bulbs while they are in growth. Aconites and Snowdrops can be lifted and divided as soon as their flowers have faded.

Hellebores are must have plants for this time of the year, enjoying a shady spot. Buy and

plant now, choosing plants that seem to hold their heads up. Hellebore flower heads look good floating in a bowl of water and make an unusual

centrepiece for a table. Herbaceous and mixed borders will benefit from the

application of a soil

conditioner such as manure or garden compost, but if you have to buy a proprietary soil conditioner ensure it does not contain peat as this is an unnecessary use of this limited resource. Plant out perennials in the borders to fill any gaps. If the weather is mild herbaceous plants can be divided now. Take precautions against slugs before tender new growth appears.

Lift and divide Crocosmia to get better flowering. Plant Lily of the Valley before crowns start to shoot. Any lily bulbs to

be grown in containers



should be planted up. Prune Clematis that flower after June, and hardy Fuchsias by cutting down to just above ground level. This will encourage new top growth that will carry this years flowers.

Tidy any fallen leaves around roses. Spraying with a fungicide will help to prevent black spot. If roses are starting to make early growth, prune them now and mulch around the plants.

If you have any shrubs that need moving, now is the right time.

Gardening Folklore The Romans were enamoured with broccoli. Pliny the Elder, an Italian naturalist and writer, 23 to 79 AD, tells us the Romans grew and enjoyed broccoli during the first century AD. The vegetable became a standard favourite in Rome where the variety called Calabrese was developed.

Roman Emperor Tiberius, (35 AD to 76 AD), had a son named Drusius who took his love of broccoli to excess. Excluding all other foods, he gorged on broccoli for an entire month. When his urine turned bright green and his father scolded him severely for "living precariously".

Listed Buildings Warning

Owners of listed buildings in Allerdale have been told that they could be liable to prosecution for carrying out unauthorised alterations.

The warning follows a number of cases recently in which illegal work on listed buildings has been carried out. Allerdale Borough Council's Planning and Development Manager, Ric Outhwaite, said: "There is a lot of misunderstanding about what does and doesn't require listed building consent. This can cause unnecessary expense, both in fines and in correcting the problem. Works that affect the building's character need listed building consent and it is a criminal offence to carry out works without listed building consent. It would be far preferable for people, particularly those living in old traditional properties, to check if their building is listed and seek the advice of officers so a suitable proposal can be prepared for consideration." A listed building is one that's held on a national list of buildings that are judged to have sufficient architectural or historic interest to be worth preserving. If you do not know whether your building is listed, you can contact the Conservation Officer at Allerdale Borough Council or you check on the website: www.imagesofengland.org.uk. Listed building Consent is needed for: • Almost all works affecting the exterior of any listed building, including the replacement of elements, even if they look very similar;

Mayor's Report - December meeting

The Chairman reported on his attendances, which included an enjoyable day with the Officers and Crew of "HMS Biter", sailing from Brunswick Dock, Liverpool to Salford Quay.

PC Andy Robertson reported the surgeries being held in the Fire Station on the first Monday of the month are well attended.

Correspondence dealt with included; response to Allerdale Borough Council's corporate improvement plan, Association of Local **Councils Consultation** into the effectiveness of Neighbourhood Forums.

Following last months request from Allerdale B.C. asking if the town would consider taking over the day to day maintenance of the four toilet blocks in the town, an outline of the funding was received and was found inadequate, this will be relayed to Allerdale B.C. for further consideration.

Planning applications dealt with included the Town Council approval of the development of both the Railway Station and Police Station. We have objected to any further development on the Solway Lido site, as it lies within a flood plain and the sewage system will not be able to cope. We also lodged an objection to the Skinburness Hotel development.

Reports were given on outside Bodies; Primary School are in the process of appointing a new Clerk, Joint

Advisory Committee are recruiting a replacement Educational Officer, Silloth Tourist Action Group are looking for a new Secretary, any one interested are requested to make themselves known. The new promotional leaflet and website are being developed, these will be circulated in the spring. The Regeneration Partnership have received a grant of £8,000 from Awards for All to help their National Lottery bid for The Green. Sea Dyke Charity, had awarded £3,000 to the Convalescent Home.

Silloth Sunday Market, the question was raised as to the use of the Green. The Town Council are not in favour of this option as the stall holders pay rent to a private company, who operate under the Market Charter held by Allerdale B.C., who also have authority to close the street on market days.

A question was raised with regard to the Christmas lights in the town, as the Council have budgeted £5,000 but to date no work has been carried out regarding feeder pillars. Bill Allison reported that the small group of volunteers have been going through all the legal documents relating to the erection of

lights within the streets. Also permission has to be given by property owners for the fixing of cables and time clocks to walls with all fittings having to be non-corrosive. United Utilities have been most helpful in the matter and await further instruction from the group, who must also find two million, yes! Two million cover from an insurance company before any work can start.

A request has gone to County Highways for a pedestrian crossing between the playing field and the Crofts.

With regard to a speed indication device, following discussions by the Town Council and representations from Parish Councils, it was agreed to fund a group venture where the police will move the device around the area. Most drivers will have noted one in use at Allonby and more recently at Blitterlees, these are to be followed up by police speed checks.
