SILLOTH DOCKS HISTORICAL INFORMATION WANTED

Throughout August of 2009, which will be here before we know it, Chris Puxley is hoping to put together another exhibition of the history of the Port of Silloth. A similar event to that presented over a weekend in 2005 for the "Sea Britain" celebrations.

The proposed exhibition next year will be to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the grand official opening of the Silloth Dock, (renamed Marshall Dock at the opening ceremony), which occurred on 3rd August 1859.

Over Chris's years here he has compiled a comprehensive history of the port and its' shipping activities, including numerous photographs

and other historical papers. There is however, probably due to security measures taken at the time, a lack of any detailed information of activities during the first and second World Wars. It is known that Silloth Docks were very busy during those periods due to their relatively safe location.

If any of our readership could assist with any information, memorabilia or photographs of those times, or indeed provide details which would enhance the archive already collected, Chris would be very interested to hear from them.
