As a rate payer I wish to voice my opinion through your paper on the waste of public money which has been spent by the Cumbria County Council by the "White Elephant" that has appeared at my front gate this being the Zebra Crossing here at West Silloth.

Before this happened, the Highways Department set in two dropped kerbs 18 months ago for access for wheelchairs/prams/and pedestrians to cross the main road going to and fro to Silloth via the playing field. These were set in near the T junction, never once did I see the public use this facility, they still crossed the main road by the T junction. I have been asked to take part in collecting data for the national database on documenting building dates.



Regarding the May edition of the Buzz, concerning members of the Solway Woodcarvers Group carving a coat of arms to donate to the Abbey.

I hope that they have not followed the description given in the Buzz as it is incorrect.

The coat of arms of Holme Cultram Abbey is Blazoned (i.e. the written description), in laymans terms, is a shield divided vertically up the middle.

The left side, as viewed from the front, in Azure (Blue) on which there is an Or (Gold) Cross Moline.

The right side of the shield is Or (Gold) on which there is a Sable (Black) Lion Rampant facing left with a Gules (Red) tongue.

The Cross Moline was also used in heraldry as a mark of Cadency for the eighth son. I guess in those days of long nights and little entertainment the lions weren't the only things rampant! The Templers Cross is quite different in shape to the Cross Moline.

Nearly forty years ago I painted the Abbey Arms on

a small wooden shield and gave it to Mrs Jean Stringer, then landlady of the Wheatsheaf, Abbeytown. Jean put it up behind the bar, but not for long as the vicar at that time saw it and told her to take it down because only the Abbey had the right to display their Arms.

About the same time he visited the shops in Silloth that were selling souvenirs showing the Abbey Arms with the name below, and demanded they be removed from sale. Quite rightly, but although it is wrong in England to use heraldic arms of someone else, the legal position is obscure.

However, in Scotland, it is a crime and at the very least defrauding H.M. Treasury, fine-able and property may be confiscated!

There is also a discrepancy on the Arms shown on the notice boards situated at the entrance to the Abbey. The Lions (?) shown are Lions Statent (i.e. all four feet on the ground, facing left, tails flourishing) that have been turned from horizontal to vertical to face skyward. Perhaps there is some hidden message intended.
