fished from the fjord, and visitors with their home made cake etc.. all they could hear was Eddie and Doreen the sound of the icebergs

On 4th July they arrived at Qaqortoq (Kwat a tack). They finished the visit in a seafood restaurant where they were offered the following delights. Whale meat and skin, dried seal, dried cod, dried trout and dried reindeer meat. They were told by the locals that this must be eaten dry and not re-hydrated as the Danish eat it.

On 5th July they arrived at Nanortalik (Nan or talick) where everyone was treated to coffee and cake whilst watching traditional dancing in national costume. They then went to the beautiful church where everyone was entertained to an

then embarked on the long voyage home, some 1,500 nautical miles (about 1,750 miles).

On the evening of 7th July (their golden wedding anniversary), they were treated to the sight of baked Alaska being paraded round the restaurant with sparklers in each piece accompanied by the Filipino band. They had a farewell drink with the Captain and Senior Officers followed by a show put on by the Filipino members of the crew, treating us to singing and dancing in various colourful national costumes.

On 9th July Eddie and Doreen arrived at Greenock in Scotland after a memorable anniversary trip.



£200,000 for MND

Pedal the Ports, the 1,600-mile tandem-relay fund-raiser organised by Associated British Ports (ABP), concluded recently after raising a grand total exceeding £200,000 for motor neurone disease (MND) charities.

Starting at the Port of Grimsby in June, and ridden by a relay group of ABP employees and friends of the Company, the tandem circumnavigated Britain in an anti-clockwise direction, calling at each of ABP's 21 ports, including Silloth on 13th June, before finishing its journey at the Port of Grimsby in July.

ABP employees from every port and every department were brought together by Pedal the Ports. ABP's customers, suppliers and members of the local media also joined ABP employees in the relay. Throughout Pedal the Ports, thousands also read the trials and tribulations of the riders via a blog on ABP's website, which

eventually ran to over 30,000 words.

When the tandem returned to Grimsby, the port hosted a port community open day that saw thousands of people visit the port to have a look around the ordinarily secure area. The day included river trips in one of ABP's pilot launches, Grimsby docktower tours, exhibitions, fairground rides, stalls, live music and street theatre, raising thousands for the campaign.

Donations to Pedal the Ports range from substantial pledges - such as ship's agent GP Shipping's £21,000 - to smaller donations from passers-by and pedestrians who were inspired to give what they could after seeing the Pedal the Ports team cycle past. It is a testament to the amicability of the ports marketplace that the majority of ABP's competitors also contributed. ABP itself donated £35,000 to the campaign.

When we were kids you could walk around the docks and use the dock gates to walk back and forth to the west beach.

We did swim a lot in the docks, it used to be the safest place to swim due to it having no currants like off shore from the beach.

There was always a big gang of lads all ages swimming off the raft, used to paint the boats that came into the docks and was tied up to the dock wall next to the dock gates. We used to jump into the dock off the top crane cabins and bunch up into a ball after hitting the water to see how deep we could go. Some of the lads could bring a hand full of mud up off the dock bottom. (I think the in word for that type of thing these days is tombstoning).







In the Garden ~ Powdery Mildew

At this time of the year powdery mildews can become quite noticeable on a range of plants. It is identifiable as a dry whitish powder which coats leaves, shoot tips and often flowers.

Other symptoms include stunted and distorted growth, and reduced flowering. Many garden plants are affected, both woody and herbaceous, particularly apple trees, roses and sweet peas and those growing in containers. Vegetable foliage is also prone, including beetroot, parsnip and spinach. Powdery mildews are caused by a range of closely related fungal species. As each has a limited host range the powdery mildew affecting one plant is unlikely to be responsible for mildew on another species. For example powdery mildew on lilac is unlikely to infect your phlox, although phlox will be susceptible to a different powdery mildew. However some mildews can spread to cultivated plants from closely related weed hosts, so weed control is an important part of disease limitation.

Plants dry at the roots may become susceptible to mildews but it then thrives in moderate temperatures and high

The RHS suggests the following measures to reduce susceptibility to the disease:

- Keep plants well watered, so they are not dry at the roots
- Mulch to preserve soil moisture.
- Improve air-flow around plants to reduce humidity. For woody plants such as roses this can be achieved by pruning to establish an open branch structure.
- Avoid overcrowding smaller plants.
- Thin vegetable crops to recommended spacing.
- Avoid high nitrogen fertilisers, as these encourage soft sappy growth that is more easily colonised by fungi.
- Ensure plants are in their ideal position. For example, a sun-lover will struggle in shade and be at greater risk of infection.
- Check catalogues and grow resistant varieties wherever possible. If the plant has flowered cut out the affected shoots and destroy. It is never a good idea to add disease spores to the compost heap. Fungicides are available for powdery mildew control which contain myclobutanil, penconazole or sulphur. Check the labels carefully before choosing a product. Occasionally, the label will also list certain cultivars that may be damaged by the application of a specific fungicide, e.g. certain gooseberry and apple cultivars may be damaged by sulphur dusts.

Plants for late summer Lily of the Nile or

African lily (Agapanthus) This is a stunning bulbous plant, which grows best when grown

rather crowded in tubs. It grows to a height of 2-3 ft. It needs a sunny spot and winter protection.



Globe Thistle (Echinops



This is a perennial with large ball shaped blue blooms on tall stalks, with jagged leaves which are green on top and gray underneath. The plant is drought resistant growing to a height of 4 ft. It likes a well drained soil and full sun.

Lacecap Hydrangeas

Lacecap Hydrangeas are easy to grow shrubs for sun or shade growing to a height of 5 ft. The lacecaps have flat heads which are much more attractive than the mop head hydrangeas. The flower heads can be used in dried flower arrangements.





Council is supporting the 'Clean it up' campaign by stepping up its checks on illegal carriers of waste.

Clean It Up

Allerdale Borough

A joint initiative, supported by Allerdale Borough Council, The **Environment Agency** and the Police, to 'stop and search' vehicles in the Allerdale area will be stepped up over the next few months to ensure that trade waste from businesses is being transported by those with a Waste Carriers Licence.

Businesses and individuals are being advised to ensure they are aware of their legal 'duty of care' for the trade waste they produce. Margaret Heyes, Allerdale Borough Council's Local **Environmental Quality** Officer, said: "Last year fly tipping cost the tax payer £57,522. Part of the problem is due to some businesses not disposing of their waste legally and effectively. It is a major concern to the authority where illegally handled trade waste will end up, as well as the costs to our communities in dealing with the problem. "By law businesses need to take all reasonable steps to keep waste secure and ensure it is transported and disposed of legally. The Council recognises that many businesses and tradesmen may misunderstand or neglect their legal responsibilities for waste, so our advice to businesses is to:

- Know your waste management 'duty of
- Check if you are legally carrying waste
- Ensure you have a 'waste carriers licence' if you carry waste.
- Store waste securely to prevent escape or scavenging
- Double-check that person(s) taking your waste away is an 'authorised carrier'
- Complete 'waste transfer notices' for all transfers and keep copies for inspection."

Failure to comply with the legislation may result in a Fixed Penalty Notice or court proceedings.

The 'Clean it up' campaign was launched in April 2008, supported by Allerdale Borough Council, the Civic Trust and the Times and Star and contributes to the 'big tidy up' a national campaign which is to be launched by ENCAMS

Derek Griffiths from Barrow in Furness swam the Solway Firth from Southerness in Scotland to Silloth on 5th August.

It is believed that this is the first time this has been done and recorded. The British Long Distance Swimming Association (BLDSA) has confirmed Derek's record breaking swim with an actual swim time of 3 hours 14 minutes and 9.51 seconds, a remarkable achievement! The distance he swam was approximately nine miles.

Derek started his record attempt by walking into the sea at Southerness at 13.02 hours and swam across the Firth, arriving at Silloth's West Beach at 16.16 hours where he was of the official time keepers and recorder.

Derek has also raised over £250 for the RNLI through sponsorship of the event.

Derek is 46 and has previously swum every lake in Cumbria in one year. He has swum round Walney Island and from Morecambe to Barrow. He says the currents and jellyfish made this his hardest swim yet!




Silloth Tennis Club held its annual under 16 doubles event and in the boys' event it was the seasoned pairing of
